the continent for some years, and lived for a considerable time at Anspach, where she occupied a prominent place at Court, wrote plays, and established a theatre. On the death of the earl of Craven and of the margravine, she was married to his serene highness the margrave of Anspach and Baireuth, whom she accompanied to England when he sold his territorial rights to the king of Prussia. On the death of the margrave, she again went abroad, and died at Naples in 1828, leaving a certain reputation for literary talent, and a name in social aspects noways enviable.
