Doddington, George Bubb, Lord Melcomb-Regis, dod'-ing-ton, a British statesman, remarkable alike for his talent and for the subtle subserviency of his character, came into Parliament in 1715 for Winchelsea; was shortly afterwards sent envoy to Spain; was a lord of the treasury in Sir Robert Walpole's government; and obtained as the reward of his political subserviency and intrigue, the title of Lord Melcomb-Regis. He associated much with the wits and learned men of the time, some of whom-such as Churchill and Pope—ridiculed and satirized him, while Hogarth introduced him and his wig into his picture called the "Orders Periwigs." His "Diary," published in 1784, is eurious as exhibiting the traits which distinguished the statesmanship of the time. B. in Dorsetshire in 1691; D. 1762.
