

Eastwick, Edward Backhouse (*b.* 1814, *d.* 1883), Orientalist; entered the Indian army; held political posts in Scinde; was professor of Hindustani at Haileybury; went to Persia in 1860 as secretary of legation; became private secretary to Lord Salisbury, and was member of Parliament for Penrhyn and Falmouth (1868-74). He has translated Sadi's *Gulistan* (1852) and much Persian literature, and written *The Journal of a Diplomat in Persia* (1864), etc.
