Dear Lord Macartney

I was most sincerely happy to hear of your safe arrival in your Government; & I feel myself extremely obliged to you for your kind remembrance of me, in a moment of so much hurry & business. I am sure you will not doubt of my gratitude to you, for the share I may have in your appointment of the poor, now Lt Col; Campbell, to be your Middle camp: He seems fully sensible of your goodness to him, & I shall be much disappointed if his conduct should not give him some claim to a continuance of it. His Uncle thanks you very heartily; & desires to be most particularly remembered to you. He is as well, from some threats, & sensations of the gout; or he would have written to you himself.

I congratulate you on our victory over the countrymen of your subjects: it may perhaps contribute to the tranquillity of your Government. Peace, you see, does not yet appear disposed to give us peace. - My best wishes attend you.
