I hope that you will not be too sad, my dear, no matter what happens. The life one gets to live is the important thing, not its end. By that test your mother has had a great success in her eighty-four years. She has been happy in her family and sees them in health and prosperity.

Malcolm has telephoned twice, once while we were at the airport, to say good bye, and again yesterday, to get news. Sam Peale also called yesterday. He got the news from Virginia Halley.

Let me hear from you as often as possible, I am thinking much of you and your mother.
