I had however so far my Recollection at the Time, that as to know (what I believe I then exprest) that, however generous the Proposal was on your Part, it ought not, in Justice to your Family, to be accepted on mine.

Since that Time I have frequently considered the Matter in my own Mind, and, after many deliberate Considerations, I have been obliged to come at last to the Conclusion, which the Impulse of my first feelings dictated to me, viz, that, though I can never forget the kind Offer made to me, I find a great and insurmountable Difficulty in accepting it, though I most willingly accept the Testimony of your approbation and Esteem. you will accept the Payment alluded to in the common
way, and in gratification of yours, ~~that I would~~^{to} promise
at any future time, whenever I may have occasion
for your judgment, to send for you and consult you,
without any offer of Remuneration, and entirely as a
friend. I hope that this, which strikes a middle kind of
course, will be satisfactory to you - I shall do my
self the pleasure of calling upon you in a day or
two.
