he says the remainder of his proof
abundantly proved his case -

Will you be good enough to look
at your notes and say how this is.
I dare say too that there was some-
thing in the case, which he has for-
gotten to state, as to the direction
complained of - and that it did
not proceed barely on the ground of
the acts being done by the Defendant
as Surveyor of Highways. -
