Dayton (W. L.) U.S. Minister to France
to Wm. H. Seward Attorney General N.Y.

Paris December 14. 1861.

Mr.

It is right perhaps to inform you, by
through you the War Department that two
days since I directed a man, named
James Scott, formerly of Buffalo, but late
of New York City, a lawyer as he says, to be
arrested for fraud or forgery, and may turn
out -

He represented himself here in Paris
as a Captain Charles R. Lawrence of the U.S.
Revenue of United States Infantry de-
tached from service, and sent to Europe
as an agent for the purchase of arms and
equipment. His credentials were brought
to me, without his knowledge, by a merchant
for examination. Upon an examination of
the seal of the War Department, the Consular
seal at London, the signature of the Com-
mission, and also the Chief Clerk McLesley
in connection with the general appear-
ance of the entire paper. I was satis-
fied they were fraudulent, a forged stamp
etc. I therefore requested the merchant
to return the money.

the strength of them however the Prov-

prise of this time he must have been
occupied in getting up these spurious
papers. He is now in prison and
one doubts in due time he brought
to answer for his offence
