Saturday fifteenth October, 1859

Dear Sir

Coming home from reading in
the country, I find your note. The envelope
in it not addressed to me, allow me to return.

I have conveyed to a large publishing
house in Paris, the right of translating all my
books; it is therefore quite out of my power to
afford any facilities to Mlle. Blanche. I hope
Miss Lloyd will kindly undertake to explain
why I cannot help the young lady.

It is a great pleasure to me to see your
hand-writing. I beg to send my kind regards
to Miss Lloyd and her daughters, and to assure
you that I am heartily well, and never am
the worse for being busy.
