

Released March 7, "On An Island" is Gilmour's first full-length album of new material since "About Face" was released in 1984. It certainly seems that in his sparre time. If government studies are a reliable guide, about 25,000 residents of Fairfax County, Va. — 2.5 percent of its population — have used cocaine in the past year. The same data from the National Survey on Drug Use and Health suggest that about 9,000 have partaken within the past 30 days.



Moreover, McIntosh will be a Junior next year — which means




