As a local contribution to the current nation-wide student neutrality campaign, a meeting was held last week in Patterson hall to find out exactly where we stand on the question and what we can do about it. Although the attendance was regretable, and although no tangible conclusions were arrived at, the assembly cannot be regarded as a failure because it decided before it adjourned that something can be done, and moreover, it made up its mind to do it. It voted by a unanimous count, to draw uppublish, and distribute a leaflet or pamphlet planned to rouse the University student body from its current apathy, and to show it the folly of a defeasit attitude. The publication will be designed strictly for local consumption, and is to be jointly sponsored by a campus "peacefront" consisting of the Independent Association, the Interfraternity party, the American Student Union, the ROTC, and The Kernel.

This newspaper sincerely hopes that the committee appointed to carry out the project will be one campus committee, at least, which will be fully aware of its potentialities, and will have something in mind other than getting the meetings over with as soon as possible. The plan herewith is offered the whole-hearted support of The Kentucky Kernel. We believe it is a good one, we feel something good can come out of it. For, like Old Ben Franklin, we can see much rout in the statement that "there never was a good war or a bad peace."—J. C.
