Cats return to screams of faithfuls

The two boys huddled together, wrapped in a white UK blanket to shield themselves from the drippling afternoon cold.

A blue Wildcat cap topping his head, Kay said if Jamal Mashburn (his favorite) or one of the other Wildcats would walk over to the fence behind which fans waited yesterday afternoon, "It dlance."

Police estimated roughly 1,000 Wildcat well-wishers joined the boys yesterday afternoon satting at about 4 p.m. Fans trudged through a cold, rainy afternoon anticipating the team's scheduled 6 p.m. arrival.


The throng frequently broke into cheers and chants with no apparent provocation. Fuel trucks, TV camera lights and almost any landing plane could ignite them to precise cheers, "Blue ... White' and 'C-A-T-S," or to generic crowd clamoring and caterwauling.

Speech pathology sophomore Amy Anderson said she wanted the Wildcats to know fans like her were still proud of the team. "I just wanted to show them my support. Let them know 1 still love them."

Unlike many UK students who gathered in residence hall rooms and restaurants to wach Saurdary night's game, Anderson had a prior engagement, having already invested nearly \$80 in tickets to the Alan Jackson concert, inconveniently scheduled at the same time.

That didn't stop her from following the contest.

She said she "listened to them on my Walkman during the Alan Jackson concert." Her ears must have taken a beating because all during the show "I had (the volume) all the way up."

Women must request equality, speaker says

One of the principal reasons women do not receive equal pay and promotions is they don't ask for them, a women's rights activist said this weekend.

said this weekend.

Elanor Smeal, founder of the Fund for the Feminist Majority and former president of the National League for Women, addressed nearly 1,000 sorority members from 100 college campuses during her keynote speech Saturday at the Southeastern Panhellenic Conference held at UK.

"We must go for power in the form of promotions, in the form of pay raises. There is no reason to take half as much," Smeal told the

smeal, a Phi Beta Kappa from Duke University, said it was natural for her to become involved with feminist issues.
"I was very active in college, in all my life really, but I don't like injustice," Smeal said before the speech.

speech.
"I think my parents saw how it
hurt people, and they instilled in
me a desire to help people. When I
saw how cheated women were, it
was just natural to get involved."
"Empayering."

Smeal's speech, "Empowering Women," addressed progress made and ground to be covered in the arena of women's rights.

Sincer sau the greatest according plishment for women in the past 20 years has been the advancement of public knowledge on women's rights and increased challenges to inequality.

"We have cracked higher educa-tion," Smeal said, citing increased enrollment of women in nearly ever-ry discipline. ry discipline.

sity for further change. With only 11 percent of tenured professorships now going to women, she said, it would take 435 years to reach equality at the present rate of growth.

Smeal said women are not given the self-esteem to seek leadership when they are young, and the result is underrepresentation in power po-

is underrepresentation in power po-sitions.
"If we want to change it, we must challenge it," she said, pointing out that women average about 5 percent of the voice in the most powerful decision-making processes.
"We wanted someone who would

"The women around me seemed inspired, like they had a responsibility to go out there and seek leadership positions," West said. "They need to be encouraged because many don't have the self-esteem to

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — In the end, Eddie Fogler said his decision to leave Vanderbilt for South Carolina came down to respect rather from a financial issue to principle to me — what is fair, what is equitable, what is right." Fogler said yesterday in a farewell news conference at Vanderbilt.

"I could've finished my coaching career here," Fogler said. "I wouldn't have left to go somewhere just because of finances. That would be ridiculous, People who know me know how much my family really likes it here."

LOS ANGELES — An appeals court declined yesterday to inter-cede in the Rodney King beating intal, refusing a request to block the showing of a videotape in which one officer accuses a co-defendant of hitting King in the head.

U.S. District Judge John G. Davies announced shortly after the trial convened yesterday morning that the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals had relayed its decision to his office.

Those statements, which are inadmissiable in the federal trial, contain admissians by the officers.

"This study will provide state-of-the art treatment ... and answer im-portant questions about the manage-ment of these patients," said Dr. Anthony S. Fauci, director of the National Institute of Allergy and In-fectious Diseases.

Up to 650 HIV-infected persons with active tuberculosis will be enrolled in the clinical trials.

New plan will increase small business loans

Say goodbye to trickle down. Clintonomics is putting capital back into the hands of those who need it the most.

To end the so-called "credit crunch" that has prevented the economy from breaking free of a prolonged recession, the Clinton administration has announced its plans to ease documentation requirements for small business loans.

The move is expected to allow for \$38 million in new loans to small businesses.

Since the founding of this coun Since the founding of this coun-try, the entrepreneurial spirit has reigned supreme. We champion the business person who starts with a simple idea and builds the idea into a profitable business. It is this spirit that has fueled America's rise to ec-onomic prominence. During the 1980s, it became in-

creasingly difficult for small busi-nesses to obtain the start-up capital required to begin turning dreams into reality. Federal bank regulators required extensive documentation, such as suttent financial enterports and as

Federal bank regulators required extensive documentation, such as audited financial statements and anunal apprinsials of property used for collateral on small business loans. It is was more attractive for banks to loan their money in big chunks to loan their money in big chunks to lange corporations than it was to hassle with the unnecessary paperwork of small business loans. President Clinton, along with many bankers and borrowers, now claims that all the red tape is preventing banks from making loans to small businesses so that they can create the property of extensive docu

economy.

The new policy of the Clinton administration allows banks to begin making "character loans." These loans are based solely on the ability of the borrower to repay the loan,

and not strictly on their ability to provide necessary documentation. "What they're saying is that if the bank is comfortable that the borrower can repay the loan, the regulators won't question the documentation," a lobbyist for the banking industry said. "It's definitely going to be valuable to small business."

Because the plan requires neither congressional action nor formal federal rule-making, the character loans may begin in as few as eight to 10 weeks. The boost to the economy will be felt almost immediately, and, best of all, it will cost the taxpayers nothing.


