**Anorexia Nervosa**

- Deliberate self-starvation with weight loss.
- Intense, persistent fear of gaining weight.
- Refusal to eat, except tiny portions.
- Continuous dieting.
- Denial of hunger.
- Compulsive exercise.
- Excessive facial/body hair because of inadequate protein in the diet.
- Abnormal weight loss.
- Sensitivity to cold.
- Absent or irregular menstruation.
- Hair loss.

**Bulimia Nervosa**

- Preoccupation with food.
- Binge eating, usually in secret.
- Vomiting after bingeing.
- Abuse of laxatives, diuretics, diet pills or drugs to induce vomiting.
- Compulsive exercising.
- Swollen salivary glands.
- Broken blood vessels in the eyes.
- Physical Problems From One Or Both Diseases
- Malnutrition.
- Serious heart, kidney and liver damage.
- Intestinal ulcers.
- Ruptured stomach.
- Tears of the esophagus.
- Dehydration.
- Tooth/gum corrosion.

**Psychological problems from both diseases**

## Students face eating disorders

**UK cares:** Disorders such as anorexia and bulimia are prevalent on campus

Hollywood and the fashion industry's super leanness fad still sends the message that thin is in.

But this "thin" ideal of beauty has resulted in an alarming amount of college men and women falling prey to eating disorders.

A National College Health Risk Behavior Survey conducted in 1995 found that 12 percent of students, or one out of every four, uses extreme measures, like starvation, bingeing and purging and diet pills, for weight control.

The University Health Service and UK CARES (Counseling, Awareness, Resources and Educational Services), a student and community organization dedicated to the treatment and prevention of eating disorders, presents "A Week for Every Body," a week of campus events for National Eating Disorders Awareness Week, Feb. 12-19. The group hopes to educate UK Students about the dangers of eating disorders.

The Lifetime Television video, "I Am Beautiful," will be shown in the Student Center Theatre from 6 until 7 p.m. on Thursday, Feb. 17.

National Eating Disorders Awareness Week will wrap up on campus, Friday, Feb. 18, with a speech called "The Road to Recovery" about the personal experience of someone who has had an eating disorder, in the Student Center Theatre from 1 to 2 p.m.

Yonnie Bailey, an undeclared freshman and resident in Blanding Tower said, "Eating disorders are definitely a big deal on this campus when people vomit in the showers so much that I can smell it."

Jill Kindy, a dietitian and health educator with University Health Services who treats students with eating disorders at the Counseling and Testing Center, said the Health Service takes a "team approach" to treating victims.

The first goal is to stabilize the patients medically, then deal with the psychological aspects of the disorders and finally to incorporate nutritional counseling.

Kindy said it is important to find the "why" of the behaviors through psychological testing before nutritional counseling — otherwise no progress can be made.

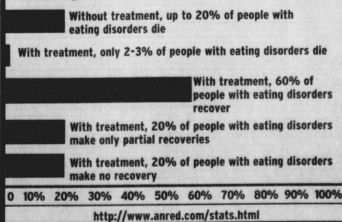
Hollywood ideals, along with confusing misinformation and societal pressure have led to an increase in the incidence of eating disorders, Kindy said. Eating disorders are a coping mechanism for sufferers.

Currently there are no statistics for the rate of eating disorders on UK's campus, but a research project to look at the eating attitudes and behaviors of UK students is underway, says Dr. Gabriella Pessah, a staff psychologist specializing in eating disorders at the University Counseling and Testing Center.

Pessah does believe, however, that UK matches Eating Disorders Awareness Prevention statistics that 5 to 10 million girls and women and 1 million boys and men struggle with eating disorders.

"In the last 20 years we have seen an increase in the cultural pressures that glorify an unrealistically thin body type and place extremely high value on creating the 'perfect body,'" she said. "Individual difficulties paired with cultural pressures teach young women that their bodies are not acceptable and that they

## UK hosts Love Your Body Fair to increase awareness

Eating disorders continue to prevail as a major problem among college age students. As a result, UK and other schools are sponsoring the "Week For Every Body," a weeklong effort to inform students about the dangers and prevention of eating disorders.

The Love Your Body Fair took place in the Student Center small ballroom yesterday as the first event of the week.

Sponsored by the UK Health Services and UK CARES (Counseling, Awareness, Resources and Educational Services), this event served to increase awareness of eating disorders among college students and to offer information about prevention and cures.

Jill Kindy, the health education coordinator of Health Services, said she hopes the fair created awareness of the seriousness of eating disorders.

"Imagine how much more happy we would be if we didn't

have to worry about our self-image," Kindy said.

This is the first year that UK has sponsored the fair and its activity schedule in conjunction with National Eating Disorders Awareness Week.

Facts, statistics and personal testimonies about eating disorders were displayed about the ballroom. Activities engaged students while teaching them basic facts about the disorder and how to tell if someone suffers from it.

Some statistics were eye-

opens into the abundance of dieting, including one estimation that 40-50 percent of American women are trying to lose weight at any point in time.

Several students participated in the fair, including Farrah Ballard, a dietetics junior and president of UK CARES, a student organization that focuses on the prevention and treatment of eating disorders.

"Eating disorder information should be stressed and made widely available on campuses," Ballard said.

## 22 die in Georgia tornadoes

CAMILLA, Ga. — Tornadoes slashed through southwest Georgia early yesterday, killing at least 22 people and injuring more than 100. The Mitchell County town of Camilla appeared to be hardest hit, with a tornado cutting a five-mile path through a housing development south of town. "All you heard was a roar, woo-woo-woo," said Johnny Jones, whose mobile home south of Camilla was lifted up and thrown on its side. He said he freed his 14-year-old son, who was pinned under a washing machine. They then crawled out a window.

## Cyanide could poison food chain

BUDAPEST, Hungary — A cyanide spill that polluted the Danube and Tisza rivers in central Europe will "poison the whole food chain" for years to come, a Hungarian environmental official said yesterday. Zoltan Illes, the head of Hungary's environmental committee in parliament, called the spill "the biggest environmental catastrophe since Chernobyl," (the world's worst nuclear accident). "The fact that heavy metals also got into the rivers means an even worse problem (than the cyanide)," he said in a television interview. The spill originated in Northern Romania and moved into Hungary and Yugoslavia. The poison eventually diminished to non-lethal levels. But not without destroying the river's wildlife habitat.

## Two Columbine students murdered

LITTLETON, Colo. — Two Columbine High students were found dead early yesterday morning after a shooting at a sandwich shop about two blocks from the school, which is still reeling from the worst school shooting in U.S. history. A woman who worked at the Subway sandwich shop was driving by and noticed a light on inside. Since the business was supposed to be closed by 10 p.m., she stopped, went inside and found the bodies of a 15-year-old boy who also worked there and a 16-year-old girl, police said. The victims were dating, a relative said.

## Clinton optimistic about Mideast

WASHINGTON — President Clinton said yesterday that the Middle East peace process is "in a little tough patch right now," but that he remains optimistic about reaching agreements between Israel and the Syrians, Palestinians and Lebanese. The president said he hoped for progress in the next few weeks. He said peace was in the interest of all parties, and that they are close on substantial issues. The president was interviewed by CNN in the Oval Office in what was billed as his first on-line news interview.

## Baffling rise in lymphoma studied

WASHINGTON — Cancer experts are launching major studies worldwide seeking reasons for a baffling rise in lymphoma in the United States while many other types of cancer are diminishing. Lymphoma cases have nearly doubled since the 1970s. Scientists want to know whether pesticides, air pollution, viruses, obesity or other things are responsible. Meanwhile, doctors are testing promising new immunotherapies for the worst type — non-Hodgkin's Lymphoma. Lymphoma attacks the immune system.

## Spacecraft orbits asteroid

LAUREL, Md. — A robot craft yesterday became the first spacecraft to orbit an asteroid, settling into a Valentine's Day rendezvous with a space rock named for the Greek god of love. The Near Earth Asteroid Rendezvous, or NEAR, spacecraft automatically fired for 57 seconds and then signaled success to Earth. NEAR will spend a year in orbit of Eros, dropping to lower orbits. It will gather basic research that one day may help humans defend the Earth against a "killer asteroid" like the one thought to have wiped out the dinosaurs.

## Dow climbs 83; NASDAQ is up 9

NEW YORK — The Dow Jones industrial average is up 83.46 to 10,508.67 just before the 4 p.m. close yesterday. Decliners on the New York Stock Exchange outnumbered advancers 1,605-1,404. The NASDAQ Composite Index is up 9.05 to 4,404.50. Among Dow components, Alcoa rose 3 1/16 to 71 5/8. United Technologies rose 2 1/16 to 50 7/16 and Exxon Mobil rose 2 3/4 to 38 3/4. On the NASDAQ, software maker Medical Manager Corp. soared 22 1/4 to 87 1/4 after agreeing to be acquired by Healthcon/WebMD, a provider of health care information. NetOpt rose 17 1/4 to 133 1/4 on the news that it will be acquired by Corning for \$149.18 per share, or about \$2 billion in stock. NetOpt makes filters used in fiber-optic technology.

## Hasek won't retire yet

BUFFALO, N.Y. — Dominik Hasek will play next season, backing off on his plans for retirement because of an injury that has limited his play this year. He said in a news conference that the reason he's staying is that the injury made him miss so much of the season — three months — that he had hoped to have a full, good season with the Buffalo Sabres before filling a desire to return to his native Czech Republic. Hasek is a two-time Hart and five-time Vezina Trophy winner. He's 2-0-2 since returning Feb. 1.

# Swimmers a force in SEC

**Kudos for Cats: Juniors Aaron Workman and Shaun Zitani bring home Southeastern Conference honors to UK**

Juniors Aaron Workman and Shaun Zitani came to UK in the fall of 1997 wanting to add balance to a UK team loaded with distance swimmers. "We like to think when we first got here UK had one sprinter and that was pretty much it. It was pretty much a distance program," Workman said. "We like to think now that we've changed that."

Workman and Zitani have more than met their goals — they have turned the team upside down. UK's strength now lies in its sprinting.

Zitani has been named Male SEC Swimmer of the Week twice this season and is undefeated in the 50-yard freestyle. His time of 20.14 seconds on Jan. 29 against Cincinnati is the 13th fastest in the country. Last year, Zitani set a new school record in the 50-yard freestyle with

a time of 19.97 seconds. Workman has the team's second fastest time in the 50-yard freestyle and the third fastest time in 100-yard freestyle this season. He ranks in UK's all-time top five in the 50 and 100-yard freestyles. He has also been a part of three school record-setting relays.

Workman and Zitani's success helped UK bring in a talented freshman class this year. "They're both real likable guys. . . and they've swum real well," said head coach Garry Connelly. "They're both really good advertising."

During their three years at UK, Workman and Zitani have developed a close friendship. Besides being roommates, they spend 20 hours a week together practicing in the pool.

"We hang out all the time. We're really good friends," Zitani said. The two rely on one another to pro-

vide motivation and encouragement. "We pretty much push each other . . . he's the biggest competition I have, so every day is kind of like a meet with us racing against each other," Workman said.

"It's been a great three years having someone to train with," added Zitani. "We know we'll be pushing each other and that's been really good for both of us."

Workman and Zitani have qualified for the U.S. Olympic Swimming Trials and plan on training this summer to prepare. However, they said their best shot at making the team would be for the 2004 games. "It's good to know that you have a chance to go to trials and step up there with all the big boys," Zitani said. "But really, if we wanted a good shot at the team, we would probably have to wait another four years."

Workman doesn't have a problem with waiting four more years, as long as he has someone to train with.

"If there's any way we can stay together, I'm ready to keep going, because I shoot to go after him."

# Smith weathers criticism proudly

Saul Smith might be one of the most scrutinized players in college basketball. Despite all of the criticism his personality and his game have remained intact.

"I've always been in the spotlight or under the microscope so this is nothing new," admitted Smith, son of UK coach Tubby Smith. "I just go out there and have fun."

Smith has played in every game this season, starting all but one, and he hasn't missed a practice. He also leads the team in assists and is second in free throw shooting and steals. He made his first start as point guard when Kentucky played Pennsylvania.

"I wear that title proudly," Smith said, "because the great point guards that came before me were class acts and I look back at them as a good blueprint for me."

Perhaps nobody had a greater impact on Smith's career than former UK point guard Wayne Turner. Smith was Turner's backup en route to UK's national championship in 1986.

"I picked up a lot from Wayne," Smith said of Turner, who led the Cats to two consecutive Final Fours in 1997 and 1998. "He is what you call a 'student of the game,' meaning he lived and breathed basketball. He taught me the way to be successful was to love the game and play with a passion."

Turner's most important advice to his protégé? "You can never practice enough," Smith said. But countless hours in the gym may never be enough to satisfy some fans' expectations. You know the rap: Smith shouldn't be starting, he's out of control, he's daddy's boy, daddy's girl and everything else opposing SEC student bodies conjure up. Smith heard it all.

"The criticism I get, I never

really hear or allow myself to hear," Smith said. "Those people cannot really determine what the team is doing — just us, the coaches and the administration."

Teammates know the hecking Smith gets. Freshman guard Keith Bogans called the criticism tough but expected.

"He should expect it because he's the coach's son and he's an easy target," Bogans said.

In Sunday's loss to LSU, Smith sparked a late second-half run for UK by draining consecutive three-pointers, which helped cut a once 20-point Tiger lead to five. Smith finished with a team-high 15 points.

"He's a great leader on and off the court because he's been here," UK forward Marvin Stone said. "He's a good point guard."

Smith has learned a lot while being a basketball player at UK.

"You have an idea of what hard work is when you are in high school but at the collegiate level basketball consumes everything you do," Smith said. "The time and work put into being a good player is enormous."

This season has seen the Cats struggle out of a 4-4 record to a 17-7 one. Through it all, Smith said, the coaches and players have remained extremely positive.

"We were in every game down to the end, and we just knew it was a matter of time before we were pulling those tight games out with victories," he said. "Everyone of our goals are attainable now."

The next goal for Smith, who was part of the 1997-98 national championship team as a freshman, is to lead the Cats back to the game's mecca once again.

"It felt great to get a ring as a freshman," Smith said. "Now the only feeling that could top it would be to win another one."

# Taking the 2000 election seriously

This past summer, I came across a particularly interesting "Larry King Live" on CNN. The guest was Hulk Hogan, and because Hogan had been an idol of mine through much of my youth, I felt compelled to watch the program. For about 20 minutes, Hogan answered King's questions, most of which had to do with the world of professional wrestling.

But shortly thereafter, the conversation turned to politics. King noted that after the surprise victory of Jesse "The Body" (sorry, "The Mind") Ventura, there had been rumblings that Hogan was contemplating running for president. Was the Hulkster serious?

Hogan responded, "I think we could put together a platform of positions that have proved to be popular — the flat tax, for example. That, combined with my popularity from wrestling, could put us over the top."

In truth, I don't take Hogan's comments too seriously. This is, after all, a man whose crowning achievement was defeating King Kong Bundy in a steel cage match at Wrestlemania II. I haven't heard any more of Hogan political pursuits, but there is something about his statement that strikes me as fundamentally unacceptable and dangerous. Even more disconcerting, it is a view that seems to have grown tremendous acceptance in my lifetime and seems especially worrisome as the primaries for the 2000 presidential election begin in earnest.

What scares me about Hogan's comments is that they are missing the "why," or as George Bush Sr. would have called it, "the vision thing."

Hogan never came close to

addressing his reasons for wanting the office. I am forced to conclude, therefore, that the real reason that Hogan wants to be president is merely that he could be. As citizens, we should want a leader who has some kind of values, regardless of whether we agree or disagree with him or her. The one thing we shouldn't want is a president who sought the post simply because it seemed cool.

Perhaps I am taking Hulk King too seriously. But it is not only former WWF champions who demonstrate this fundamental lack of purpose. Most of the mainstream candidates for major political offices fall in the same category.

George W. Bush was curiously mute on the question of Pat Buchanan's jingoist isolationism and anti-Semitism while Herr Buchanan was still a member of the Republican Party. But once Buchanan bolted to the Reform Party, Bush was suddenly the most ardent Nazi-hunter this side of Simon Weisenthal.

What a phenomenal coincidence — that Bush happened to have a change of heart and a renewed commitment to principle at the precise moment that it suited him politically.

Bush's counterpart on the Democratic ticket isn't much better. Al Gore moved his campaign headquarters to Tennessee in the hopes that it would bring him back to his roots and get him more in touch with everyday people.

The thing I like best about Gore is that you can tell where his next campaign stop is by the outfit he wears — when he has a fund-raiser or another event where he meets with other people who have lots of money, he wears

a suit and tie. But when he addresses Common Folk Just Like Him, he wears a button-down work shirt.

# Gov. Ventura ventures off

Jesse Ventura should be commended for standing up for his convictions

Michigan governor Jesse "The Mind" Ventura has started the next chapter in his ongoing political saga.

The man made famous as the non-traditional politician has bid a fair adieu to the Reform Party. The former WWF Intercontinental Champion says the Reform Party that he joined is different from the party that exists now.

Part of the problem is that over the years various personalities have come and gone under the banner of this third party. And the party and its principles have changed with these different people.

On Friday, during his departure announcement, Ventura, the highest-ranking official ever elected on a Reform Party ticket, said he'd rather be politically independent than continue to work within "this dysfunctional national party."

This abrupt change brings up a major concern. First the issue of party jumping. It seems that an increasing number of politicians are deciding to change their political affiliations, especially in the middle of their term.

This is like being a traitor to the constituents who elected them to support a particular political agenda.

However, in this case, Ventura's views have not changed. The character of this party has. He said that his beliefs do not support him being associated with the likes of David Duke and Pat Buchanan.

For that reason, Ventura should be applauded for recognizing that his party no longer represents his views and cutting the affiliation.

Hogan's comments remind me of Americans — and we, because we elect them — have become so concerned with minuscule battles that they forget about the overall war.

Their entire focus goes toward jockeying for position in the horse race of public opinion and toward gaining the most political points for one's party. Any question of why those parties exist in the first place is not only forgotten, it's seen as nonsensical.

As an active public, we should reject this perverse arrangement. We should vote for those who share our convictions, not for those affiliated with a party that once, long ago, may have shared them.

If someone, calling herself a Republican, ran for President advocating strong increases in funding to education, a woman's right to choose, the complete and total application of the 1964 Civil Rights Bill to homosexuals, serious gun control and the public flogging of Jesse Helms, I'd cross party lines in a heartbeat.

The complicity of the voting public is the biggest tragedy of all. The transparent maneuvering ought to be taken as an insult to our collective intelligence. We ought to respect the candidates who respect us.

But we play the game. Perhaps I'm being something of a Pollyanna. After all, there are good public servants out there who will stand up for their principles. While I disagree with almost everything John McCain says, I at least respect him for telling Buchanan and his racist rhetoric to get the hell out of the party.

I admire Bill Bradley for his relatively strong support of gay

rights and his commitment to universal health care.

I even like Jesse "The Mind," Ventura even if I don't often share his opinions. He's stated what he believes in, and he's made it clear that he isn't going to shift around to win a vote or two. Oddly enough, it took an interview in Playboy to make me respect the man.

Maybe I'm nostalgic for an era that never existed. But I refuse to accept that. Even if government has never been about principle, it's also never existed at this particular time, with this particular electorate.

Our generation has a chance to radically redefine the way that politics is conducted. If in the year 2000 we elect a president who is simply going to play to the polls, then we might as well completely revamp the government and rule by plebiscite.

We need a leader who will lead, who will grab the bully pulpit and who will shove the chaos. Who will be, in the words of Martin Luther King Jr., "not a taker of consensus, but a molder of consensus?"

We need someone who will coax, cajole and kick this county into his or her particular vision until that vision no longer fits, and then we'll find a new leader.

We need someone who will stand up and say, "This is who I am, this is what I believe, take me or leave me." And until we demand that, we will hold ourselves hostage to the utterly unimportant questions about what type of shirt Al Gore wore today.

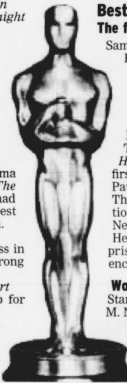

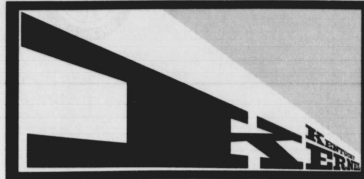
