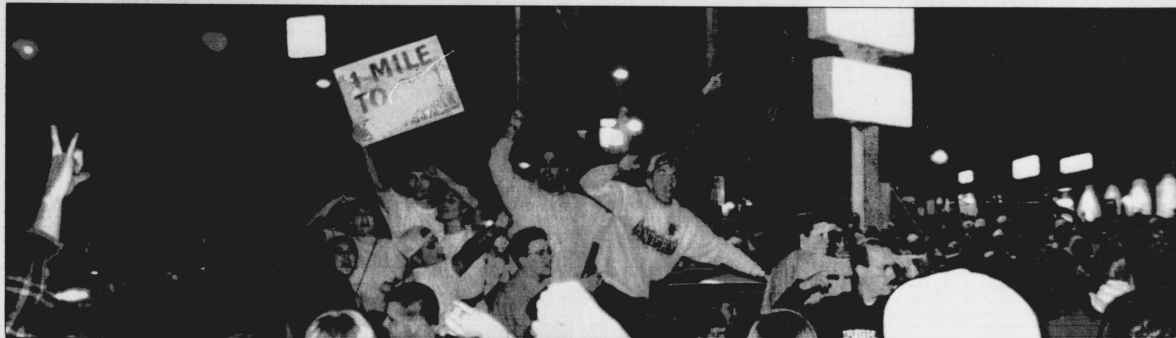

### Cats avenge loss to Minutemen

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. — After being exploited for 32 points by Massachusetts' center Marcus Camby in November's Great Eight Tournament, UK had almost an entire season to mull over the break down in interior defense and the 92-82 loss to the Minutemen.

Thirty-two games later the Cats got another shot against Camby and UMass with a trip to tonight's NCAA Championship game with Syracuse on the line.

The Cats didn't stop Camby — the All-American had 25 points, 17 in the second half. But the UMass big man wasn't able to dominate the action and UK escaped with an 81-74 victory at the Continental Airlines Arena.

"If he had gotten off, we probably wouldn't be playing for the National Championship," UK's Allen Edwards said.

Added Derek Anderson: "They really fed off (Camby) last time. He's an emotional player. You can't let him get his game off."

Rick Pitino's squad has honed its skills against some of the nation's top big men since Camby, the latest test coming last week against Wake Forest's Tim Duncan in the Midwest Region finals.

And just like Duncan, the Cats used their ferocious double-down traps to contain Camby.

Anderson said the Cats used a similar defensive strategy in the two teams' earlier meeting, minus one key ingredient.

"We trapped (Camby) last time, but I don't think we got to him quick enough," Anderson said. "We just made sure when he caught the ball he didn't see two people coming, he saw two people on him."

Said Camby, who still led all scorers with 25 points: "I probably needed to be a little more aggressive when the double team came. They're were knocking balls out of my hand and forcing me to take shots I didn't feel comfortable taking."

### Frenzied fans storm city streets

The buzzer sounds. UK has avenged its earlier loss to UMass. Let the madness begin.

From Haggin Hall, the celebration of the win came in stages.

First stage: Students celebrated on floors of residence halls.

People ran all around screaming and giving high-fives to anyone they saw.

From there, people ran out to the courtyard, still screaming at the tops of their lungs.

"I waited around an extra year so they could win this," said David Stobaugh, a history senior.

Fearing a repeat of what occurred in 1993, when UK lost to Duke in the semifinals and \$4,000-6,000 worth of damage done to Haggin Hall, resident advisers sent their residents to South Campus, where the party had already begun.

"Nobody can beat us now. That was the National Championship," said Taylor Bolen, a second-year physical education and business major.

On South Campus, political science freshman Tudor Makary celebrated UK's win by stripping down to her bikini.

"I love to be naked all the time," Makary said.

In another instance of creativity, students climbed lampposts. When on top of it, the person started the G-A-T-S chant.

Each time someone new climbed it, they tried to better what occurred the previous time. This led to someone destroying the lights and even climbing up the post naked.

Keith Karummen, an undeclared sophomore, decided that a lamppost was not high enough for him, so he climbed a tree.

People stood around watching the fireworks, lighting bonfires, throwing rolls of toilet paper and listening to the chants predicting Syracuse's downfall tonight.

"Syracuse sucks," as well as numerous other chants, was heard.

Watching the activities from a distance, electrical engineering graduate student Madan Mantharan said: "It's awesome. My blood bleeds blue, too!"

After the festivities on South Campus had worn down, students headed down to the intersection of Euclid and Woodland avenues.

There, elated fans gathered for a few hours of unity to celebrate Kentucky's win.

Lexington-Fayette County Police officer Lt. Kenneth Hall said the crowds were very cooperative Saturday night.

"We were glad to let them have their party," Hall said.

Of the 450 people at the intersection of Euclid and Woodland, only 6 to 10 people were arrested.

"People that were arrested were being destructive and posed a potential danger to the crowd," Hall said.

The favorite pastime was crossing the street when the light changed color and trading high-fives, as well as inadvertently spilling beer or other alcoholic beverages on others.

Students climbed on top of the newspaper box in front of Steakfest restaurant and led the crowd in cheers. Students also gave high fives to people in a parade of cars cruising Woodland Avenue.

The students hung out of cars and sunroofs and cheered with the partiers on the street.

One car that was trapped between the fans crossing the street was shaken by those same fans.

News of the Lexington craziness quickly spread to New Jersey.

UK junior point guard Anthony Epps said: "I heard there were people running around in the nude (in Lexington). I was really surprised our students would do that. I can't wait to win the National Championship and see what they do next."

### Title visions dancing in everyone's heads

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. — Life as a UK basketball fan just received a teeth-whitening jolt. Massachusetts has joined the large ranks of "Those Which Have Fallen to the Wildcats."

And tonight, in more pressing matters, the Cats (for the first time since 1978) will play for the National Championship.

Saturday, at Continental Airlines Arena, there was a slight wind after the game, heading northeast. It was a stupendous sigh of relief, gushing from Kentucky.

The throats of Kentuckians, parched and raw after seeing the Wildcats come close a few times, only to fold, are now nourished. The Cats have beaten the best team left in the tournament (and the most dangerous), and are on the verge of their sixth national title, Coach Rick Pitino's first.

This Massachusetts win might be the most important in UK's history. For certain, the Cats' modern history. It's been 18 long, excruciating years.

There's been horrendous second halves (Georgetown 1984 and North Carolina 1993); heartbreakers by better teams (Michigan 1993 and — sorry to

bring this up — Duke 1992); and probation (the Eddie Sutton years).

The burden of the championship has shielded UK teams from enjoyment — which is supposedly what basketball is about. This pressure to win has hit everyone.

Remember the irate Pitino walking from the Birmingham Civic Center floor last year, as if he wanted no part of his team?

Remember Rodrick Rhodes, who — after a splendid half-year as a freshman — was so discombobulated, transferred to Southern California after entering the NBA Draft? And then Travis Ford, slumped against his locker, sobbing after losing to Marquette in the 1994 tournament?

All of these memories will be blurred by a victory tonight against Syracuse, a gritty, gutsy team reminiscent of Kansas in 1988.

John Wallace — the Orangemen's Danny Manning, is dangerous — playing with unbridled emotion. This is what stands between UK and another banner in Rupp Arena.

Should it happen, bedlam will likely

transfix Lexington. This is good: Lexington needs a jump-start of emotional juice.

It should be enough to make a Final Four. It is 'n.

UK is one of the only TWSH (Teams With a Storied History) not to win a national title in the '80s. Louisville, Indiana, North Carolina, Kansas, Duke and UCLA have won 11 of those 16 national titles.

"That's weird," said UK guard Allen Edwards. "You'd never think that."

Derek Anderson, UK's solid swingman, almost single-handedly started a UMass run late in the game with two key turnovers.

The Minutemen cut a 10-point Wildcat advantage to three late. Poise was maintained; UK won 81-74.

Anderson was thumping through a Final Four program after the game, half-listening to reporters, half-studying NCAA Championship history.

Asked what he was looking at, Anderson said: "The '78 team. Look at those shorts," he said, pointing to the picture. "Those really are shorts."

Obviously, the shorts aren't the only thing that has changed.

## Artist paints from within

### 'Song of Myself' is Skidmore's answer

It can take some artists years to develop the ability to be comfortable with themselves, their art, and the ways they choose to express their work.

After overcoming many obstacles and finally adapting to her world, artist Ellen Skidmore has proven her own existence in her latest display of art, called "Song of Myself," at Chase New Editions Gallery.

In her latest show, Skidmore gives viewers a taste of what her world is like. While viewing a variety of paintings close to her heart, we can only begin to wonder what hurdles she has had to overcome to express herself

through her work.

"Ellen is the most internal painter. All the paintings in this show are about her, though she is not always in them. They are about her life in general," said Frankie T. York, owner of Chase New Editions Gallery. Skidmore was born and raised in Baltimore, Md. At 18, she moved to Eastern Kentucky with her parents to farm. Ellen attended the Bible Institute in Greenville, S.C., and then enrolled at Asbury College, where she began to seriously study art. It was here that her love of art began to shape her life and mind.

Skidmore later transferred to UK, where she graduated with a bachelor of fine arts in art studio in 1988 and completed one year of graduate work.

She currently lives on a horse farm in Bourbon County with her

favorite horse, Harvey. This is where she paints and creates unique murals and wall surfaces for both the home and office.

"All my life, I have had great difficulty trying to understand the underlying nature of my existence. For a long time, I looked outside myself for a basic connection, direction and validations," said Skidmore in an artist's statement.

"Because of my painting, I have been able to accept the disturbing contradictions and pain of life itself. I have been able to accept instead of question. I am at last relieved of my preoccupying burden of 'why,'" Skidmore said.

Skidmore further comments that receiving and accepting the whole package in life — the good, bad or best gifts — has enabled her to be a stronger person.

"The pleasure of listening to great music while I paint has let me experience an opening-up. In the music, I can hear pain and joy of humanity and what it means to be truly alive — rather than separate and alone. I feel at last that I belong here," Skidmore said.

Ellen's oil paintings depict her life and relationships with those things closest to her. Most of Skidmore's paintings contain people with featureless faces, long appendages and extraordinarily

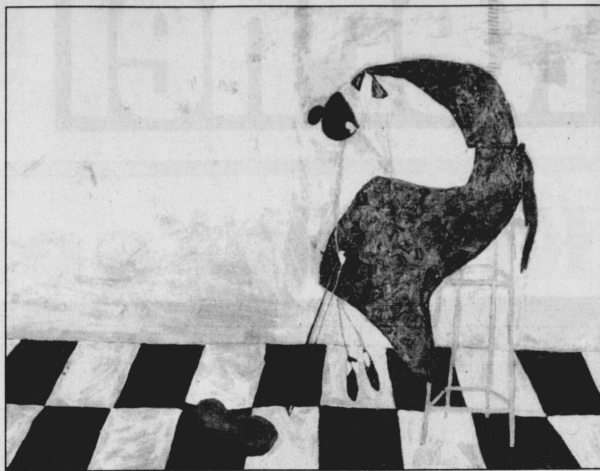

## Hoax on talk show further lessens integrity

CHICAGO — If you think no topic is taboo for TV's much-maligned talk shows, try this one: "Scam Artists Who Pose as Dysfunctional Guests."

Of course, that wasn't the real title of an episode of "Jerry Springer," in which a man was said to reveal to his wife that he'd been sleeping with their children's teen-age baby sitter.

The actual title was "Honey, Have I Got A Secret For You!" But the secret wasn't the one Springer and his producers had counted on.

Turns out the philandering

husband was really a Toronto comic, as were his purported wife, the baby sitter and the baby sitter's boyfriend, all of whom appeared on the show.

The truth was not revealed until afterwards, and the show's producer, Multimedia Entertainment Inc., was not amused. It filed suit against the four in federal court in Chicago, maintaining that their hoax threatens the very integrity of shows like Springer's.

But critics contend integrity is hardly these shows' strong suit. And the comics' counterclaims of generally slimy and dishonest behavior by Springer's producers essentially put TV talk shows on

"By trying to make an example out of us they've laid themselves bare," said Suzanne Muir, 28, who portrayed the unsuspecting wife. Facing what could be a highly publicized trial where the comics promised to tell all, Multimedia has reached verbal agreement on a settlement of the lawsuit, spokesman Robert Zimmerman said last week. But he said the settlement was not final, and added that the comics might have breached it by discussing the episode with The Associated Press.

Beyond that, Multimedia — which also produces Sally Jesse Raphael's talk show — will say very little about hoaxers and even

less about the comics' allegations. Springer himself declined repeated requests for an interview. And a spokeswoman said a self-imposed gag order was essentially in effect.

Media watchers say talk-show hoaxers probably aren't very common; a spokeswoman for Oprah Winfrey says her show has been fooled by imposters just three times in 10 years.

But several shows have folded recently, those remaining are under increasing pressure "to get the man who slept with his dog and was observed by a rabbit," said Christopher Sterling, a media scholar at George Washington University in Washington, D.C.

# Film lacks quality script and song

A music teacher once promised me that anyone can learn to sing. Hollywood would tend to disagree.

Georgia, which opened this weekend at the Kentucky Theatre, delves into the nitty-gritty lifestyle of a girl who loves to sing but can't.

Wanna-be rock star Sadie (Jennifer Jason Leigh) and her folk star sister Georgia (Mare Winningham) are polar opposites. Sadie's entire existence revolves around the search for musical bliss. Limited by her raspy voice, she relies on her passion for music to maneuver from gig to gig.

Ironically, Georgia, whose voice was "touched by God," lacks Sadie's passion, but nonetheless enjoys a very successful career as a musician. The sisters are aware of the injustice, but do little to alleviate the stress it puts on their relationship.

Leigh, who has made a name for herself in the art film industry by playing jaded characters such as Tralala in *Last Exit to Brooklyn*,

and Dorothy Parker in *Mrs. Parker and the Vicious Circle*, chose another unglamorous role in Georgia.

Leigh has once again expertly captured the spirit of an angst-ridden soul. At the Montreal Film Festival, judges recognized her fine performance by giving her the award for Best Actress.

Throughout the movie, Leigh was called on to sing passionately. Sounding gruffer and drunker than Janis Joplin, Leigh proved that her character had soul, but not the tools to express it.

Mare Winningham's portrayal of Sadie's older sister successfully completed the on-screen relationship. Winningham, as the stoic folk singer, perfectly contrasted the emotional Sadie.

The excellent acting, however, didn't support the mediocre screenplay.

Time and again, the movie begins to sketch their relationship, but seems to stop short of the goal. In one scene, Georgia at last tells Sadie that she can't sing. Since their extreme difference in talent is the engine that drives the

movie, this scene deserves to be played out fully, but it stops there without further development.

# Author will speak tonight about experience as Iranian hostage

The author of a book on Baha'i faith will be speaking about her life tonight at 7:30 in the Eagle Creek Public Library on Richmond Road.

Olya Roohizadegan, who spent time as a hostage of Iranian officials who interrogated her about her faith, has written a book called *Olya's Story: A Survivor's Dramatic Account of the Persecution of Baha'is in Revolutionary Iran*.

The 350,000-member Baha'i religious community make up the largest religious minority in the country of Iran.

People who follow the faith are said to believe in the worldwide unity of all races, ethnic groups and religions, as well as pray for the eliminations of extreme poverty and wealth in the world.

Individuals of the Baha'i faith are also said to recognize the value and necessity of universal education and the responsibility of each person to search for the truth.

They work for a world government based on justice, and believe in need for everyone to

adhere to high moral standards. Roohizadegan was imprisoned with 10 other women of the Baha'i faith for teaching children in Iran about the Baha'i faith in what amounted to Sunday school.

She was released after her husband signed over the deed to her house to Iranian Police, and fled with her family to Pakistan and eventually London, where she still lives.

Roohizadegan was the one lucky woman in the prison where she was held. All ten of her cellmates were hanged on June 18, 1993.

Roohizadegan said that she knew she had to write a book about her experiences when she heard about the executions.

However, she said she harbored no hate for people of the Muslim faith, who make up the majority of Iranian citizens.

"I don't hate them," she said. "I forgive them. There is nothing wrong with the Muslim people."

"There is nothing wrong with their religion. What's wrong is prejudiced people."

Ryan Lawrence, the UK Baha'i Association President, said it was important for students to hear the message.

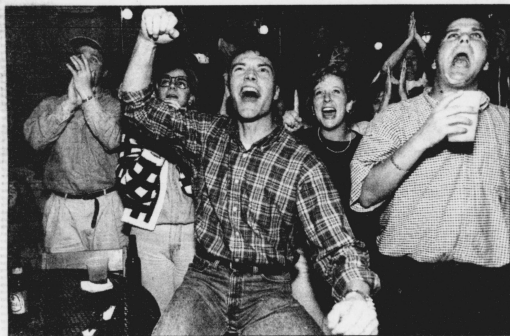

## In 1978 ...

*Editor's Note: The following are excerpts from issues of the 1978 Kentucky Kernel, which covered campus the last time UK won the title.*

### March 28, 1978

Within minutes of UK's NCAA Championship victory last night, the streets were filled with celebrating Wildcat fans. UK students poured from dormitories and apartments to march through the streets, walking over cars and screaming at the top of their lungs.

The eerie, haunting sound of automobile horns spread over all Lexington, as if the Martians had just invaded or New Year's Eve had arrived early.

Parades of honking autos screamed into the streets surrounding campus, choking traffic and frustrating police. Hundreds of the fans would struggle to reach Bluegrass Field, where the team arrived early this morning.

The evening started for many at various bars around Lexington. Stingles, on Euclid Avenue, was without table or chair room by 6:30. At the start of the game, the bar was well over its 300-person limit. Fire marshals showed up and threatened to clear the bar unless fire lanes were cleared.

### March 29, 1978

James Lee's championship-clinching, season-ending slam dunk touched off a city-wide festival that sent students into the streets to celebrate UK's first NCAA Championship in 20 years.

University Police were at a loss to control the pandemonium that brought out more than 1,000 students.

"The police stood by the various large groups of people to maintain some order," Director of Public Safety Tom Padgett said. "It was mostly a lot of harmless partying."

After the game, students spilled out of the various dorms forming large blocks that roamed the streets, venting their chants and handshakes on anyone they happened to meet.

Damage was held to a minimum and only one arrest was made, Padgett said.

"A few light shades were torn down out at the Complex," he said. "And a few trees were damaged, but we were able to limit the damage."

The crowd grew throughout the night, reaching a peak on Euclid and Woodland avenues. Padgett estimated the crowd at that time to be "about 2,500."

Padgett said the crowd "disappeared within five or 10 minutes at about 3 a.m."

From there the celebrants headed for Bluegrass Field to welcome home the conquering athletes. Jim Brough, manager of the airport, estimated the gathering at between 7,000 and 10,000 people.

"Ninety to 95 percent of the crowd were just loud, happy and celebrating. The other five percent got caught up in the excitement of the moment and began wrecking things."

The crowds, Brough said, ripped telephones off the walls of the terminal building, broke a display case holding several historical documents donated to the airport, demolished a ledge built around heating ducts near one of the car rental counters, somehow put footprints eight to 10 feet up the wall, and left behind a collection of various bottles and cans that airport employees literally had to shovel out.

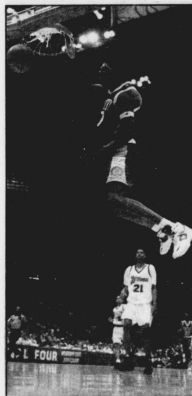
Pope, a senior, laughed, then said: "We get so much weird stuff every week, it's hard to count. But, I was just joking around last week and showed my socks on the air."

Apparently, there's nothing like it. UK's players couldn't put into words what the feeling is like after the 81-74 win over UMass.

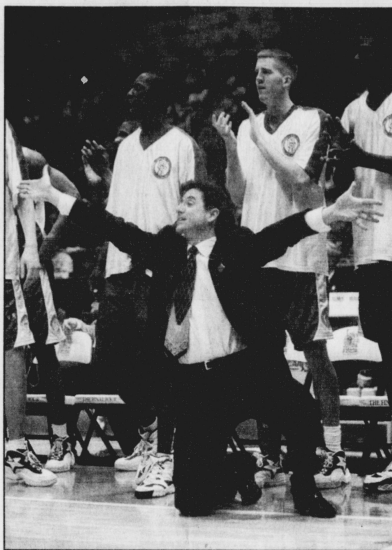
"I'm really overwhelmed by it," UK sophomore Antoine Walker said.

**Titleless coaches want to be the fool no more**

NEW YORK — Jim Boeheim likes a good surprise.

The Syracuse head coach especially likes a surprise when it allows his basketball team to play into April.

Coming into the NCAA Tournament, the Orangemen (29-8) weren't getting much mention as the West Region's No. 4 seed, but after an upset of second-seeded Kansas in the regional final and a convincing win over Mississippi State in Saturday's national semifinal, Boeheim finds his team in the Final Four.

"When you wake up on Christmas morning and you know something's under the tree, you're not that excited," Boeheim said.

"But if something is totally unexpected that makes you feel a little better."

Syracuse's opponent, UK (32-2), enters tonight's 9:22 National Championship in a different position. The Cats were expected to be at the Meadowslands competing for the school's first NCAA Title since 1978.

"We've been a team that sets goals for ourselves and we've fulfilled

"We don't care about pressure. That's good pressure it makes us work harder."

Tonight's game will be UK's first appearance in a national final since 1978 when the Cats defeated Duke for the National Title.

Syracuse's last final came in 1987 when Indiana's Keith Smart hit a last-second jumper to down the Orangemen and deny Boeheim his first National Title.

"I haven't even watched the tape of that game," said Boeheim, who hired Pitino as an assistant at Syracuse 20 years ago on the UK coach's wedding night. "It hurts too much."

Like Boeheim, UK's Pitino has never won a National Title in his sparkling coaching career.

Both coaches have been criticized over their titleless resumés, but by the end of April Fools Day, one of the coaches will be a "fool" no more.

"I think some people think I'm 75-years-old and have coached in 30 NCAAs," Pitino said.

"I've cashed in six NCAA Tournaments so I don't know what the panic is."

"People keep saying two books and no titles. I want to let them know that I didn't write the books to tell my story. I wrote them for money. I was thinking of my children's college educations."

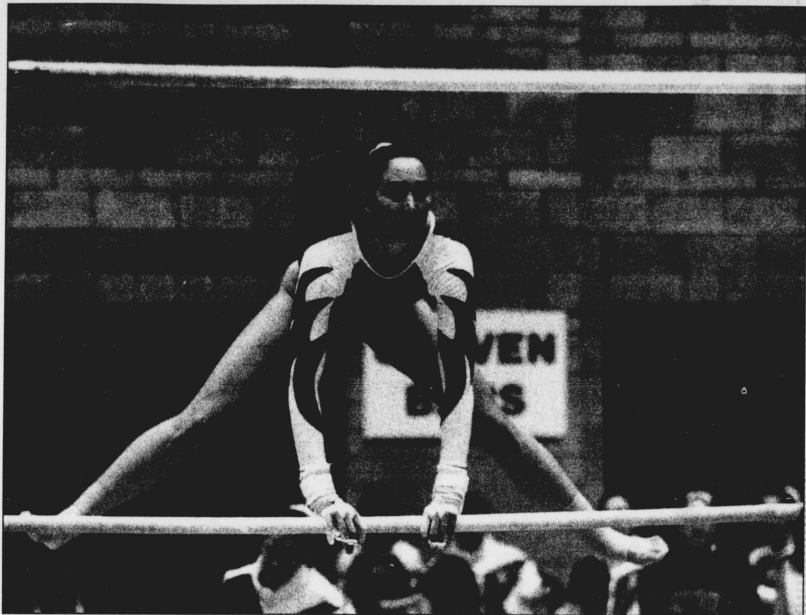

## UK finishes fourth at SEC gym meet

The focus of the collegiate gymnastics world was on Lexington this weekend as the Southeastern Conference gymnastics meet was held at Memorial Coliseum.

The Cats finished fourth overall behind Georgia, Alabama and Florida. That was UK's best finish ever in the tournament.

The big surprise of the night came early in the evening when three-time NCAA All-Around

Champion Jenny Hansen fell from the uneven bars. She earned a score of only 9.25 on the bars, dropping out of the running for the all-around title right at the outset of the meet.

"That's one of my nerve places," Hansen said. "So I'll just have to work on that a little harder in the gym, and next time I'll get it."

The rest of the night went very well for Hansen, who tied for third on the vault, tied for first on the floor exercise, and won the balance beam exercise outright.

The beam was a bright spot for the Cats throughout the evening. They scored a 49.050, a new team record for UK.

Despite Hansen's great effort on three out of four events, the UK high scorer for the night was junior Robin Ewing, who had an all-around tally of 39.200.

"I'm just really pleased with my performance," Ewing said. "I'm glad I could contribute a high score to the team total."

Misty Marinik, the other all-

rounder for the Cats, also had a solid score of 39.100, a surprisingly strong showing for a freshman.

Marinik was very excited about getting to perform in her first SEC Championship.

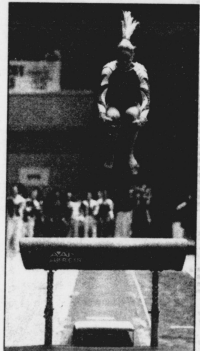
"I've never been through anything like this before," Marinik said. "It was a new experience, but a very great experience."

The highlight of the night for the Cats might have come after the actual competition was over. During the awards ceremony after the meet, UK head coach Leah Little was given the SEC Coach of the Year Award. Little was shocked that she was given the award.

"There are a lot of great coaches in this league," Little said. "Just to be in the company of this kind of people and be awarded this by your peers is a great feeling."

Abby Conklin helped with some timely 3-point shooting for the Lady Vols. Tennessee outbounded Georgia 63-30 in that game and enjoyed another big edge on the boards last night, this time 54-39.

That total included 21 offensive rebounds, which led to 17 second-chance points.

Davis, Tennessee's leading scorer in the tournament, stood out with her defense by shutting

down Georgia's All-America guard, Saudia Roundtree.

The 5-foot-7 senior, who had 63 points in her two previous tournament games, rarely was able to get Georgia into its deadly transition game and scored only eight points.

She went scoreless in the second half.

Freshman Chamique Holdslaw led Tennessee (32-4) with 16 points and 14 rebounds.

Tiffani Johnson also scored 16 for the Lady Vols and Conklin added 14, including four 3-pointers. Pashen Thompson had 12 points and 11 rebounds.

La'Keshia Frett led Georgia (28-5) with 25 points but had only seven in the second half. Tracy Henderson scored 16.

Ahead 42-37 at halftime despite shooting only 43 percent, UT opened the second half with a 15-5 run to increase its lead to 57-41. Conklin hit two 3-pointers during that stretch and four other UT players scored as the Lady Vols took control.

# Tempers flare over UK ticket troubles

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. — Tempers flared and confusion reigned as UK students waited to redeem ticket vouchers for the Final Four on Saturday.

Students claimed the process was too complicated and a waste of time, while University officials said the process was necessary to prevent students from abusing the system and scalping tickets set aside for them.

Here's a look at UK's ever-changing policy. At last Monday's student ticket lottery, UK officials announced that students could redeem their vouchers for ticket books at the Continental Airlines Arena on game day.

Later on Monday, Larry Ivy, senior associate athletics director at UK, announced a policy designed to help prevent students from scalping ticket books. This new scheme required students to pick up ticket books at Gate C of the Continental Airlines Arena. Supposedly UK was going to stub the tickets for the tournament's first session.

Without the stub, tickets cannot be sold. With a process in place to eliminate scalping of first-session tickets, UK announced that students

wishing to return vouchers could do so by noon Wednesday. Numerous vouchers were returned — presumably from intended scalpers.

"They cleared away all the people who were going to scalp back in Lexington," psychology senior Ken Verba said Saturday. "These people in line are the ones that really want to see the game."

Thursday afternoon, the UK ticket office sent out a fax outlining a new policy that required students to pick up tickets at Gate B of Giants Stadium — a one-mile walk from the basketball arena. Students making the 750-mile trek to New Jersey on Thursday morning were not informed of the latest policy change until arriving at the Meadowlands.

Under the final policy, students could scalp tickets eliminating the need for the vouchers altogether. "Why didn't they just give us a book in the beginning and not waste all of our time?" said Jay Dean, a civil engineering junior.

Ivy explained that since students planned to abuse the system and sell student tickets to scalpers, it was UK's duty to try and eliminate scalping. He said UK would've stuck with its original plan, but last-minute decisions by the Meadowlands required UK to move distribution to Giants Stadium.

"We did the best we could," said Ivy, who pointed out that UK students received significantly more tickets than students at other schools. UK students received 833 tickets compared to 375 at Syracuse and

200 at Mississippi State.

UK gave out more student tickets than the other participating schools, but UK was the only school that didn't distribute ticket books at the original student lottery.

"Why are we the only school that has to go through this bullshit?" said Tim Merryman, a business graduate student.

There were other problems. With lower level seats being distributed on a first-come first-serve basis, jockeying for a prime position in line became somewhat dangerous.

"This is the awfulest thing I've ever seen," said Mike Kavanaugh, who was accompanied by his daughter Michelle. "People could've gotten hurt, people could've gotten killed in the mad rush for the gate."

UK students began lining up at Gate B of Giants Stadium at 6 p.m. Friday — a full 21 hours before UK ticket officials opened the windows to exchange the students' vouchers for actual ticket books.

When the windows finally opened around 3 p.m. Saturday, more than 1,000 people were in line, many were afraid they wouldn't be able to walk the mile or so to the Continental Airlines Arena before tipoff of the first semifinal game between Mississippi State and Syracuse at 5:42 p.m.

The process of distributing ticket books was slowed further as ticket officials matched up student

ID cards with carbon copies of vouchers.

"I'm going to miss the game, the fucking cocks," said marketing junior Jeff Zinger.

"We paid for the Final Four, not the Final Three and a half."

Ivy said the decision to wait in the long lines was the students' choice.

"It all depends on what kind of seats you wanted," Ivy said. "You could've showed up at 8 tonight and still gotten a ticket."

In addition, some students standing in line together didn't even get seats in the same row. This caused a mad fury of ticket trading, as students scrambled to get seats next to friends.

"Why would you want to come down here with people if you didn't want to sit with them?" said Michelle Kavanaugh, health care administration freshman.

Cheers of "UMass sucks" slowly changed to spirited versions of "We want Stiles" — the UK director of administrative services who ran the student lottery for the University.

The wait and the line lengthened, and the crowd became even more vicious.

"A rope, a tree, hang Rod-ney," chanted some students. Stiles could not be found for comment.

In addition to pushing, shoving, and a few minor skirmishes over line jumping, UK students were seen shaking security vehicles and throwing beer bottles. This unruly behavior by students stretched thin an already tight Meadowlands security force.

"It's a mess," said Joe Wolak, who works for Metropolitan Security, the company in charge of keeping the peace at the Giants Stadium gate.

In addition, the Cats were able to get UMass in serious foul trouble.

Two players — forward Donita Bright and guard Edgar Padilla fouled out — while Camby and guard Carmelo Travieso both had four.

"We played hard," said UMass head coach John Calipari, whose squad finished the season at 35-2.

"It's just they played with a little more emotion than we did."

UMass was within striking distance in the games closing minutes, cutting a 15-point UK lead to three on a three-pointer by Travieso with 1:01 left to play.

But the Cats kept their cool,

scoring the next six points to take a 79-70 lead.

"We knew they were going to make their run," Antoine Walker said.

"But we really kept our composure."

The Cats cool play down the stretch came without leading scorer Tony Delk, who cramped up and left the game at the 4:04 point.

Delk, who led the Wildcats with 20 points, returned to action with 1:49 remaining in the game.

"The game was played an unfolded the way we wanted," Calipari said.

"We gave ourselves a chance to win against a great basketball team."

UK's ability to thwart the UMass run was especially pleasing to Pitino, whose squad's ability to perform in close games has been questioned all season.

"The thing I feel the best about is there was no panic in the eyes of our players when

(UMass) made its run," said Pitino, whose team improved to 33-2.

# Campus preparing for victory party

In anticipation of tonight's game and possible celebration of winning the National Championship, UK officials say they want people to reserve their excitement for a pep rally planned for tomorrow night at Rupp Arena.

But if tonight's celebration is like Saturday night, with students swarming out of residence halls, bars and apartments and onto the streets, the University is prepared to deal with the crowds. The official celebration will be Tuesday at 7 p.m. in Rupp Arena. The basketball team, coach Rick Pitino, the cheerleaders and the bands will be at the celebration, which is open to the public, said John Scharfenburger, University spokesman.

"Hopefully, everyone will save their voices and their excitement for Rupp Arena," Derickson said.

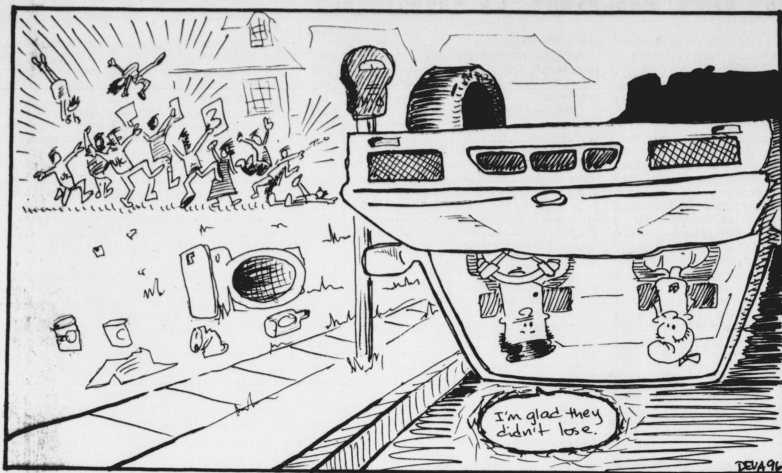

## Divided campus briefly unified by UK victory

The scoreboard read 81-74, and the back door of our fraternity house burst open, with 30 happy Fijis, pledges and girlfriends taking to the streets.

We charged down the hill from Maxwellton Court, a UK flag fluttering at the head of the pack, guided and driven by the not-too-distant sound of an entire city gone mad.

Race relations, student government, fraternity rivalries and political differences were suddenly immaterial. For one night, we were a completely unified campus.

Now there are those who mock this phenomenon. They believe basketball is a trivial thing for people to rally around. They see it as superficial, and as a distraction from the "real issues."

Since national security does not rest on whether UK wins or loses, they believe it should have no bearing on the reactions of the masses.

These people need to lighten up. I, of all people, worry almost excessively about national and international political issues. In addition this has been a personally troubling semester full of important decisions, demands and distractions.

But UK's victory Saturday night set all that aside, if temporarily. The fact that millions across the country annually put away their worries to find recreation in the greatest college athletic event of the year is part of what keeps the nation in good health.

Our praise for the super-athletes who make it all happen is well-warranted. Tony Delk, Walter McCarty and all the rest have exhibited far more mental discipline on the court than any of us editorial page pundits have on our soapboxes.

However, there are those on this page who apparently don't think so. We have a columnist — a talented writer and a reliable staffer — who nevertheless has taken up the personal crusade of making race the foremost issue on students' minds, and is currently disgusted that people are more concerned about the NCAA Tournament.

He even goes so far as to make a hypothetical reference to UK basketball players as "seven-foot, thoroughbred negroes."

Now, the alleged threat against Tanya Marie Cole by two white males is a very serious matter, as I

thought had already been made clear.

But I believe the men in denim uniforms did more one Saturday night in New Jersey to improve race relations, and campus relations in general, than any of us hotheads in the Kentucky Kernel newsroom have done or ever could do.

In fact, I think we create the problem to some degree.

As I walked the streets of this campus Saturday night, I was not that fascist editorial editor or that blue-eyed whitey — I was another

UK fan, and I was loving every minute of it. Everyone slapped five with everyone they passed, and if any of the blacks or hippies or feminists I came across had known who I was, I don't think they would have cared anyway. We were all too happy about kicking UMass ass to give a damn about much of anything else.

We can't win in the Final Four every day, and the issues that divide us aren't going to go away permanently because of a basketball game. (If they did, I'd be out of a job.)

Nevertheless, there are things about Kentucky's basketball tradition that go beyond mere recreation. The Cats symbolize a set of universal values the Lexington community and the entire Commonwealth holds dear — hard work, persistence, excellence, competition, pride. The list goes on.

Mass hysteria isn't generated by a simple game just because it's a simple game. The city didn't go haywire just because we had an excuse to go haywire. Lexington Police didn't decide to go easy on us (and in some cases, join in the fun) just because they didn't feel like enforcing the peace on that particular night.

Maybe some students did capitalize on the situation just to misbehave. Nevertheless, most UK fans bleed blue because they like belonging to something that's bigger and better than all of us put together.

A bouncing orange ball is not as important as putting bread on the table.

But the sense of unity and purpose that surrounds that bouncing orange ball most definitely is.

our 7-foot, thoroughbred negroes on the basketball team, we would have jumped to your aid immediately. From now on, we hope that you'll exercise more caution before you write your next letter."

I waited for the University to issue an affirmative statement. I waited for the Kentucky Kernel to write more than an unsatisfactory piece simply saying that black people complain too much.

I got nothing. So, I and two other students decided to take matters into our own hands. We planned a sit-in on the Administration Building, to bring attention to Tanya's situation.

The administration responded as soon as they found out about

the sit-in. We attended a nice meeting with Dean Victor Hazard, Dean David Stockham, Chester Grundy, and Chancellor Elisabeth Zinser.

They were extremely responsive. However, we can't forget that it took the threat of a sit-in to get the administration to respond.

My mother used to tell me "Boy, your big mouth is either going to make you great or get you killed!" implying that my inability to tolerate injustice would cause problems for me in a racist society.

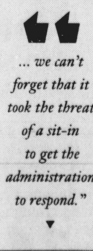
Why did she say that? Why

University of Kentucky Senate Council, in a statement on behalf of the faculty, regarding the alleged racially-motivated death threat on a student last week.

Today, in front of the Student Center, there is going to be a rally in support of Tanya, to let her know that her life is more important than a basketball.

Every black student owes this debt, but most of us refuse to acknowledge it, instead taking these opportunities for granted and allowing others to trivialize and ignore the suffering of our ancestors without fear of repercussions.

What is saddest is that there are black basketball players receiving national TV coverage, who feel more loyalty to their coach, their fans and a damn basketball than to the lives of the black women who raised them, fed them and may very well bear their children.

I am offering a \$250 reward for anyone providing information leading to arrest and conviction of the cowards who committed this dastardly act.

Tanya, most people don't care about what happened to you. But your black family cares, and so do many white students, and it is us who are going to take care of you.

## Kappa Sig gets two years off campus

The University Appeals Board ruled Friday night that Kappa Sigma social fraternity should spend two years off campus for hazing.

"My concern is that I am not sure this is going to fix the problem. The student-to-student program we proposed would," said Michael Bowling, Kappa Sigma District grand master.

Kappa Sigma admitted to the hazing charges, but was appealing the three-year suspension from campus that the Dean of Students Office imposed Oct. 24.

As part of its appeal, Kappa Sig proposed a partnership with the University to fight hazing on campus.

"I feel like I have lost a member of my family. I still believe that the guys we had at that time and have been with since October are good men and worthy of a second chance," said Mic Wilson, executive director of Kappa Sigma and a UK graduate.

The case was heard by five students and five faculty members who took about 30 minutes after the hearing to reach a decision. About 25 Kappa Sigma members also attended the hearing.

Kappa Sigma's main argument focused on the severity of the sanctions versus the minor hazing violations.

"We do not feel our chapter deserves the death penalty," Wilson said.

Ashley Ward, an attorney and Kappa Sig alum, cited other hazing cases at UK where the fraternity received probation for hazing.

Records show that in 1992, Sigma Chi social fraternity was placed on probation for one year for holding early-morning work sessions and having pledges complete acts of personal servitude, charges that mirror Kappa Sigma's offenses. In addition, Sigma Chi also was charged with aggressively kidnapping pledges.

In a letter the Sigma Chi President, Victor Hazard said that if there were another hazing inci-

dent, Sigma Chi would be removed from campus. But in October 1992, Sigma Chi was charged with another hazing violation, and the probation was extended another year.

Ward argued that the Dean of Students Office changed the way they enforce the zero-tolerance hazing policy without notifying the fraternities and was now trying to make an example of Kappa Sig.

"(Dean of Students Office) changed the rules in the middle of the game," Ward said. Ward said. Dean of Students David Stockham and Associate Dean of Students Victor Hazard agreed that the office changed the way it reacts to hazing violations.

"We have stepped up the heat on the reaction side," Hazard said. Stockham also said the office made a mistake with Sigma Chi.

"We were seduced by the notion that a little hazing is OK. We were wrong," Stockham said. "When we realize we are wrong, we correct it."

Stockham and Assistant Dean of Students Jay McCoy cited several places that state that the University does not tolerate hazing and said the fraternity should have been aware of the rules.

"There has never been a direct statement that if you haze you will be removed from campus," McCoy said. But Stockham said the fraternity should have known the penalty for hazing because Phi Kappa Tau and Alpha Kappa Alpha social fraternities were removed from campus for hazing.

Stockham said one of the reasons for the strict punishment is that a little bit of hazing leads to more hazing.

"We do not believe degrees of hazing is OK," Hazard said.

But Ward argued that as in any enforcement of a regulation, there have to be degrees of punishment to equal the severity of the crime.

Stockham said another reason for the strong stance against hazing is protecting students in the Greek system. Stockham said giving Kappa Sig probation would not solve the problem.

"Everytime you do that, you

are giving a second chance to hazing," Stockham said. "I know a lot about hazing. I did it and had it done to me."

Stockham also said that if Kappa Sig received probation it would "jeopardize the University's future ability to deter hazing."

Stockham said that if there is any hazing found in a fraternity, even if it is minor, "we will probably dismiss the fraternity."

Vice Chancellor of Student Affairs James Kuder forwarded the case to the Appeals Board last month when he upheld the Dean of Students Office's decision.

The fate of Kappa Sigma now rests in the hands of Chancellor for the Lexington Campus Elisabeth Zinsner.

Kappa Sigma President Tony Zechella said the fraternity plans to continue in some form.

With an attendance of about 35 kids and upwards of a dozen UK students, the fraternity members and kids played games, had a field day, and ate lunch at Haggin Field.

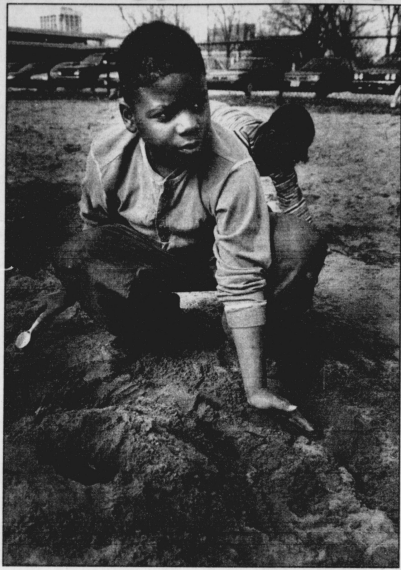
Not only did the kids enjoy the afternoon, but they were also glad to be away from their normal surroundings.

## Groups organize rally in response to racial incident

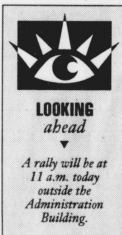

At 11 a.m. today, several student groups, including the Alliance Working to Achieve Racial Equality, Students for Social Justice, and the Black Student Union, will hold a rally addressing racism on campus.

The rally will assemble outside the Administration Building and move to the Free Speech Area at 1:15 a.m. Speakers are scheduled, and anyone in attendance will have the opportunity to address the crowd.

Representatives from the student organizations want to see people of all races in attendance in "a multi-racial effort."

"We want to raise awareness of the event on campus and show that all students and fac-

ulty members or all races are concerned about racism and racial violence on UK's campus," said Kelly Meget, a leader in the AWARE group.

"The event" mentioned by Meget occurred last Monday morning, when a female student was threatened by two white males outside the back entrance of Kastle Hall.

Tanya Marie Cole, a biology junior, was pushed into the hall, and one suspect held a knife to her face, according to UK Police. Cole was not hurt.

Police believe the incident may be related to a letter to the editor by Cole which was published in the Kentucky Kernel. In the letter, Cole wrote about what it is like to be a black person at UK, and how black students have to work hard for respect.

Cole said she was unable to see the faces of her attackers.

David Stockham, dean of students, called the incident "unacceptable" and said the University will not put up with this type of action.

"It is especially despicable because it contains both the elements of a hate crime and it strikes at the heart of what the University represents, the free exchange of ideas," said Stockham in a released state-

ment. The University Senate Council, in its statement, said it believes the incident reflects an unaddressed campus issue.

"As faculty, we have committed to a learning environment that respects and embraces differences," said the council's statement. "A climate that allows intolerance and hatred falls far short of that commitment."

The Senate said it will institute actions to promote more open dialogue on racial issues. Stockham asked anyone with information on the incident or the attackers to report it to the Dean of Students Office

the annual event. Suzanne McGurk, director of advising conferences, said this year's venture had a 95 percent attendance rate.

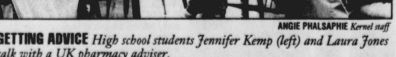
"It was slightly bigger than last year," McGurk said. "We're really pleased with it."

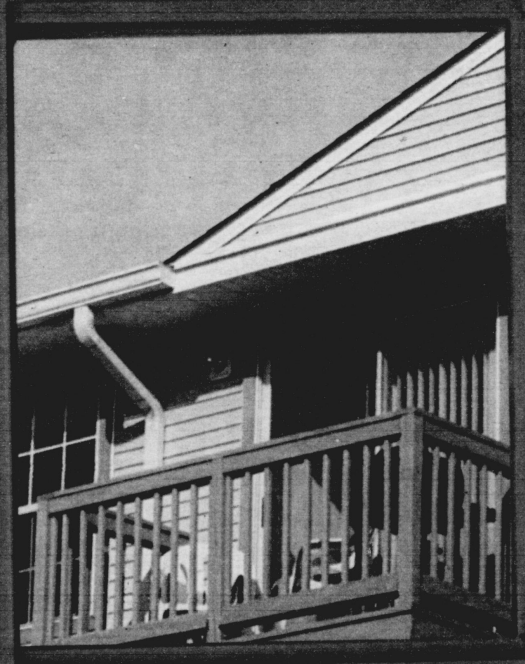

A word of advice if you're thinking of staying in Lexington over the summer: don't.

Having lived in Lexington my entire life, I can assure you that boredom will strike early and often. Unless you have a compelling reason to stay, I suggest you flee quickly to somewhere bigger, better, more exciting or just less mediocre. By the way, summer school doesn't count as "compelling."

To be fair, Lexington is not a bad place. Crime rates haven't reached New York City levels, and pollution isn't as bad as it is in, say, Pittsburgh. It certainly has more entertainment options than 98 percent of the towns in Kentucky, and at least Billy Ray Cyrus wasn't born here.

An article in a local publication recently listed a few entertainment options for people visiting Lexington for the Sweet Sixteen basketball tournament. About halfway down the list was visiting the house of Mary Todd Lincoln, a local historic site. No doubt, most people could benefit from visiting a historic site, but how many people do it for entertainment?

If you choose to ignore my warnings and stay in Lexington this summer, you'll have to fill hours somehow, and hopefully you won't have to resort to visiting historic homes.

You could of course sit around in your underwear watching TV in the dark, eating nachos.

You could go to the movies with a friend (assuming you have one). Then you'd be sitting around in your clothes eating nachos, and you'd be about \$10 poorer

(movie and nachos). But there would be the potential for some human interaction.

For movies, I would recommend the Kentucky Theatre on Main Street. It's one of Lexington's high points, with a huge screen and a beautiful old-fashioned interior. On weekends the Kentucky offers its famous midnight movies. They're a real bargain at \$3.75.

Lexington is home to dozens of talented bands, but since they usually play in the clubs, your chances to see them will be few and far between if you haven't yet reached your 21st birthday. House of Heresy does offer frequent all ages shows, and the Wrocklage occasionally opens its doors to the chronologically challenged. These shows usually cost around \$5.

To get out those aggressions, check out Laser Quest in South Hill Station. For \$6 you can play the laser tag game for 20 minutes, shooting to your heart's desire.

In the same building is Banker's Bank Shot Basketball, a miniature golf-style basketball game. The cost is \$4 for 18 shots.

For authentic miniature golf, try the Lexington Ice Center. It has three courses, with 18 holes each. You'll be putting over bridges, through tunnels and through water (if you golf like me). It costs \$3.75 per person.

Java lovers can hang out at one of Lexington's many coffeehouses. Common Grounds is probably the most popular, and it attracts an eclectic group of people, many of whom are there just to look cool. All of the coffeehouses offer a huge array of coffees, and most serve desserts (at about double the prices you'd pay elsewhere).

So if you're planning to stay in Lexington over the summer: good luck, you'll need it.

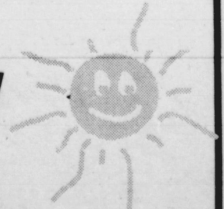

It may be for this "underwear" reason that living in a house with many roommates has become so popular for UK students.

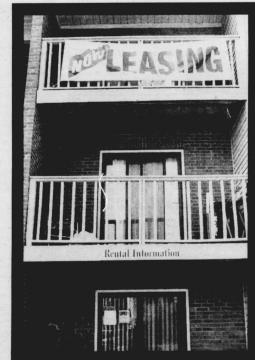

Rafferty still sees the benefits of living on campus.

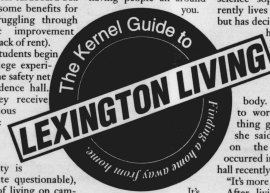
"Living in a dorm you can partake in a lot more of campus social activities," Rafferty said.

Jenny Hiten, manager of Royal Lexington on Virginia Avenue, said all residents in the complex are students.

Clements said the rent and deposit difference are not that great for what students receive in return.

Amy Gray, an art history sophomore, lives at Royal Lexington. She said living in a pre-furnished apartment has been necessary because the only furniture she had was a toaster.

"It's a problem because it's hard to have study hours," Carroll said.

"It's hard on the morale of those in the fraternity because we don't have central meeting place."

Because they do not have a place to meet, there is a lot of miscommunication about where things are going to be held.

Greek organizations who do have a house decide who will live in their respective house by seniority.

If they hold an office in the individual chapter, they are guaranteed a room. Grades also determine who will live in a house.

Surprisingly, it is about \$400 cheaper to live in a Greek house than in UK dorms.

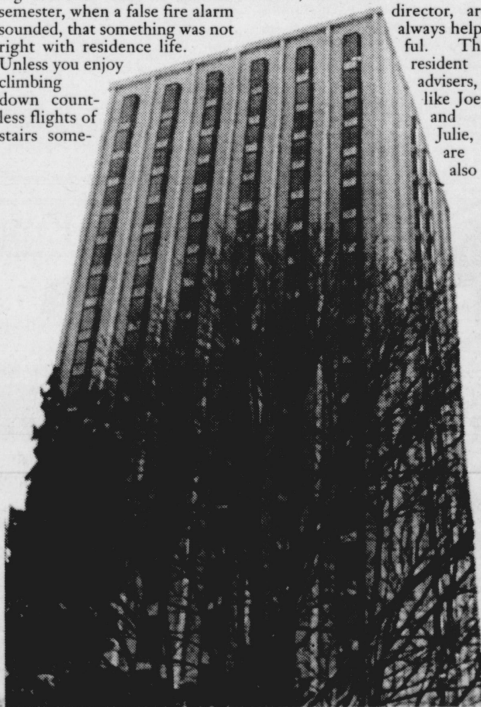

# UK Police stress theft prevention for security

If you do not have an insurance policy that protects your personal belongings, you might want to consider getting one.

Assistant UK Police Chief Rebecca Langston said students should know their parents' homeowners policy and find out if they are covered.

"You definitely need to get a policy that will cover your belongings while you are here," Langston said.

She recommends getting replacement insurance, which would safeguard any items that could get stolen or damaged.

According to Langston, if you do not have an insurance company, you should still consider calling an insurance company to find out the best way to protect their belongings.

"A tenant's policy or dorm policy is fairly inexpensive, when you consider all the money you got tied up in your belongings," Langston said.

Students should also write down and keep in a safe place the serial numbers off of televisions, computers, stereos and any other property.

Often police go into pawn shops and match up serial numbers with merchandise and recover a lot of stolen property, but if the victim does not have the serial number written down somewhere they will probably never see it again.

According to UK Police the key to crime prevention is awareness.

"It's a shame that you have to be crime prevention oriented," Langston said.

"Unfortunately, everyone is not trustworthy and it's up to you to take care of your own belongings.

"Students are very trusting people, because it's the nature of campus, but you've got to be careful where you have your credit and bank card P.I.N.

numbers," Langston said.

▼Lock the door even if your only going to be out for a minute

▼Lock up belongings especially expensive jewelry

▼Take reasonable care to not leave valuables lying around

▼Leave a light on and a TV or radio playing quietly when you go out in the evening, to give the impression that someone is home

▼Have safe locks on all doors. If the property management will not provide a

good dead-bolt, install one yourself

▼Use a peephole. Don't let strangers into your home. Don't be afraid to ask for identification from service people.

▼Be careful in giving credit card numbers and ATM pin numbers

▼Safeguard checkbooks

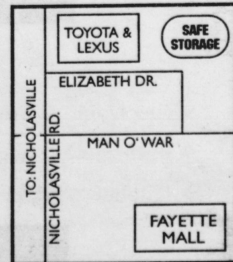

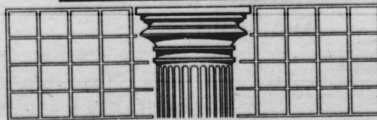
