Coroner: Alcohol played role in fatal falls from dormitory

Months later: Coroner report shows alcohol level over legal limit; metal bars will be installed on the windows in all South Campus dorms

The two men who fell to their death from the third floor of Kirwan Tower last May were intoxicated, the Fayette County Coroner's report says.

The incident, which happened the morning of May 3, prompted UK officials to evaluate the safety of the windows.


Jeffrey Pfetzer, a 19-year-old UK
freshman, and Mathew Rzepka, a 22year-old from Bowling Green who had a
brother in the dorm, had more than two
times the legal limit of .08 blood-alcohol
level, said Miles C. White II, the chief
deputy coroner.

The two fell through a window at about 2:30 a.m. They had been drinking and wrestling around, and when they hit the glass, it broke, UK officials said.
Alcohol was found at the scene, but at the time there was no way to tell if the boys had been drunk.
Pfetzer, from Villa Hills and a Kappa Sigma member, had a .198 blood-alcohol level; Rezpeka, a former UK student who transferred to Western Kentucky University had a .225 level.
"It probably impaired their judgement." White said. "I wouldn't say it was a total cause of accident, but it was a contributing factor."

The quarter-inch-thick window pane that broke had been installed in

1966 when the dorm was built. In 1973, federal codes called for windows to be tempered glass, which is stronger. The owner of a commercial glass company speculated the tempered glass would

owner of a commercial glass company speculated the tempered glass would not have broken as easily. UK hired a consultant from Austin, Texas who specializes in windows in high-rise buldings to find ways to make the windows safer. The consultant simulated what he thought happened that right, along with other scenarios, said Ben Crutcher, the associate vice president for auxiliary services. "The solution he's proposed is a bar that will go across the window area in somewhat of a "U"-shape, so the bar will sort of follow the dimensions of the window." Crutcher said.

Morriss gets five additional years at UK

No more worry: Athletics Director Mitch Barnhart, players want Head Coach Guy Morriss to stay

No more wondering. No more questions. UK Athletics Director Mitch Barnhart has his man.

At Monday's weekly football news conference, Barnhart announced a contract extension for football Cond. Guy Morriss. While the financial stipulations will remain the same as in his current contract, the new contract guarantees that Morriss will remain at the helm of the football program through 2007.

"We wanted to begin a special week of preparation for our football team with a very special announcement." Barnhart said. "I think we've determined it through conversation with (President Lee) Todd and through our staff, and we're going to move ahead and extend an offer for a multi-year guaranteed contract to Coach Morriss."

Barnhart said his decision to extend Coach Morriss' contract was based upon him wanting "to stabilize where we want to go with this football program and what we want to get done.

After UK's 4-0 start this year, the first time since 1984, the Cats won their first four games, Barnhart wanted to make it clear he was behind Morriss and his team. Although talks of the extension began hard knew before the four wins that Morriss needed to stay at Kentucky.

"A lot of things have happened in the last two months to this football program." Barnhart said. "But no one has held the course and been more rock steady through all of that Ana Guy Morriss."

The announcement couldn't have come at a better time. Not only is UK undefeated and getting national recognition heading into perhaps its toughest game of the year, but it also a crucial time for recruiting. Now, Morriss said. "There are no negatives out there that people can use against us. "Morriss, who has been head coach; and each and offensive line coach. Though 2000. UK dad runs across nation for diabetes research

 $\bf 2,460$ miles and going: Jim McCord plans to end his run in D.C. to lobby the president to support more federal funding for diabetes

Jim McCord will run a long way for diabetes research — and for his daughter Maggie, who has diabetes. He's jogging a mile every 10 minutes to the tune of about 3,000 miles to raise awareness for diabetes and build support for stronger research efforts.

The 45-year-old from Fort Thomas, Ky, stopped on campus Monday to support a diabetes raily here with Maggie and another daughter. Molly, who is an undeclared freshman at UK.

"I think what my dad's doing is great. It's so heart-touching." Maggie said.

Maggie, 20 is a speech communica-

said.

Maggie, 20, is a speech communica-tions junior at Northern Kentucky Uni-versity. She was diagnosed with Type I diabetes 11 years ago. Starting from San Diego last May.

McCord has run 2,460 miles and worn out 12 pairs of shoes on the way to his destination of Washington. D.C. He hopes to meet President Bush or a presidential delegate in the capital on Nov 1. McCord plans to make his case there for increased federal funding for diabetes. McCord says diabetes research is sorely underfunded in comparison to other illnesses.

Federal funding for AIDS research per patient is about \$2,400 a year. For breast cancer research the government spends about \$230 a year per patient. But for diabetes nearch, the funding is at \$28 a year per patient, he said. In contrast, more people in the United States have diabetes than the number with AIDS and breast cancer combined.

"It is totally out of whack with other diseases," said Greg Lawther, Kentucky Diabetes Network president. Lawther spoke at the rally about dia-

betes and the disparities in research funding.

McCord said that in the last 15 years deaths from diabetes have in-creased by 40 percent, while diabetes' portion of National Institutes of Health funding has decreased by 20 percent.

"Diabetes doesn't deserve special treatment," McCord said, but he's lobbying for 'our fair portion.

Economics: Treasury secretary hopeful despite corporate fraud

U.S. Treasury Secretary Paul 'Neill said he is optimistic about the ation's economy, despite public con-

cerns.
"I'm a great optimist. With good leadership, everything is possible," he

"I'm a great optimist. With good leadership, everything is possible," he said.

The country remains strong after the terrorist attacks and corporate scandals, O'Neill said during a discussion at the Worsham Theatre Monday.

"It's a wonderful testimony to our people and system to absorb all of that and still stand strong," he said.

The recent scandals involving Enron, delphia and WorldCom have taught everyone a lesson in basic economics, he said.

"Now we know it's not true that a company can have \$10 billion in market capital with no earnings or sales," he said, drawing a laugh from the audience. Several hundred community members and students came to listen to O'Neill, who was at UK for the discussion as part of a tour of Kentucky and Tennessee.

O'Neill said there is no excuse for

sion as part of a tour of Kentucky and Tennessee.

O'Neill said there is no excuse for corporate fraud. For example, Tyco records show ex-CEO Dennis Kozlowski used unauthorized company loans for personal expenses, such as a \$6,000 shower curtain.

"It never occurred to me that anyone would be able to do that kind of abuse and justify it," he said.

O'Neill, who is the former president of International Paper and chairman of Alcoa Steel, said it was his idea to have CEOs personally sign their earnings reports.

"There's uncertainty with Saddam Hussein, the threat of future terrorist attacks, and the markets hate uncertainty," he said.



After a 4-0 start, UK Athletics Director Mitch Barnhart gave football Coach Guy Morriss approval to lead the Cats for at least five more years.

Morriss signed an extension through 2007 (his previous contract

had him signed on a year-to-year basis through 2005) that gives him a buyout clause and the confidence that he will be back beyond 2002

At first mention, fans might loathe a buyout because of former Coach Hal Mumme's walkoff with \$1 million in February of 2001. But \$1 million in February of 2001. But Morriss' clause is accompanied by a "wrongdoing" clause. He'll get nothing if UK is accused of similar wrongdoings as Mumme.

But there is little to fear in the way of wrongdoings. Morriss has proven to be a man of character and credibility.

And his contract had little to do with money. There was no raise in salary, It was about putting confidence behind Morriss and proving to potential recruits that the

former offensive lineman would

be at UK longterm.
Naysayers may say that Morriss has proven little on the field vet despite a 4-0 record this sea son, but they cannot argue with the direction of the program. Mor-riss instilled confidence in players that had nothing to be confident about. A group that was 4-18 the last two years is now the only team in the last 18 years to start a season 4-0.

The players are also treated with respect and honesty now, two things that were lacking two years

Morriss credited the players' commitment to his philosophy for the team's success and the eventual contract solution.
Give credit to Barnhart and President Lee Todd, too. Todd never wavered in his support for Morriss, and Barnhart took just a couple of months to evaluate Morriss' cheeveter and coephing shifty be

ple of months to evaluate Morriss' character and coaching ability be-fore ending Morriss' wait. To make Morriss sit on the edge of a cliff all season would be wrong. But if it were not for players rallying around an unknown of-fensive line coach 20 months ago Morriss would have never been in this position this position.

Gatewood Galbraith, perennial contender for any local election, is making a run against incumbent Ernie Fletcher, R-Lexington, for the once-coveted 6th District seat.

For Galbraith, politics isn't about parties, money or ambition. It's about standing up for his beliefs and about exercising our country's right to seek public office regardless of how popular his ideas may be.
