Education leaders say budget cuts will undo progress

President Lee Todd and other lead-ers of Kentucky's major higher educa-tion institutions declined in a letter Fri-day to give specific figures requested by Giov. Steve Beshear for how an addi-tional 12 percent cut in state funding would affect public universities. "Any plan to accommodate a cut of this magnitude, prepared in less than a week, would not be reliable, valid or credible, and no such plan can therefore

be provided," says the letter to the governor signed by Brad Cowgill, interim president of the Council on Postsectondary Education, and by the presidents of 10 state universities and college systems.

The letter was in response to Beshear's request that UK and other state institutions prepare budgets by Friday with 12 percent less in state funding. The reduction would be in addition to a 3 percent cut already in effect for the rest of the fiscal year ending in June.

The online textbook vendors compiled on Bigwords.com include Amazon.com, Half.com and Abe-Books.com.

Students at UK can also take advantage of UK BookExchange (www.ukbookExchange (www.ukbookExchange (www.ukbookExchange) and allows students to post their used books online for the price they want from them.

While online purchasing of textbooks may be cheaper than buying in campus bookstores, some believe it is not the best way to go. "I believe the biggest concern with buying online is just buyers beware," said Carol Behr, the gen-all manager of Kennedy Bookstore. There may be hidden shipping costs, and there may be problems with timeliness, especially if

Trust must be earned by Herald-Leader's new owners

The Herald-Leader has had a bargaining relationship with the Lexington Newspaper Guild-CWA Local 33229 for four decades. In that time, there have been relatively few grievances or arbitrations. It has been a fair, balanced relationship marked by a willingness to discuss and settle problems before the could be been problems. they could become problems.

We offered our new owners, The McClatchy Co., that same relationship. But apparently that Sacramento, California-based company doesn't care to maintain such solid working relationships with its employees. It would prefer to operate by unilateral edicts and decrees without getting input from its workers.

As you may know from the local news, the Herald-Leader and its newsroom employees are in negotiations for a new contract. The central issue in negotiations is the company's demand that it have the right to gut sick time and affordable health care for part-time workers. We, on the other hand, are not asking for any more than what is already in the contract. The company's demands are designed simply to eliminate any discussion with employees over whether changes are necessary or fair, tipping the scales against the workers.

If the company were in a tight financial situation or had some specific need, the Guild would work to reach a reasonable deal. Already in this round of bargaining, we have tentatively agreed to several changes in the contract that give the company Beability it claims to need. But in the cases of sick time and part-time employee insurance, the Herald-Leader doesn't have a specific need. It doesn't have a financial problem. It simply wants to eliminate the bargaining process over two very important health-related issues.

We have a solid track record at this newspaper. McClatchy does not. This round of contract negotiations is not setting a good standard for this employer in our

Campus bookstores usually price a book by
the publisher's current price. However, depending

"When bookstores have books left over, they

current retail price or leave them a little lower,"
Behr said. "When we know books will not be
used anymore, we keep them lower. Used books

price."





UK launches alert system, encounters technical problems

e-mails concerning difficulties with the registration Web site yesterday morning. More than 2,500 people registered in the first day, but echnical problems kept many from signing up.

About 14,000 people tried to sign up with the system in its first hour but were unable to because the registration process locked up from the heavy onine traffic.

Of the thousands of people who attempted to sign up for UK Alert, 2.634 were able to log on and register for an account as of yesterday evening.

Most of those people were able to finish the process and enter their contact information, Giles said, but there were a few people who were kicked off before they finished signing up. Once the traffic on the Web site slows down, those people will be able to add their information using the log-in name they created yesterday.

The Web site (www.uky.edu/UKAlert) allows anyone connected to UK, including students, faculty, staff, parents and Lexing-ton residents, to sign up to receive text messages, e-mails, faxes or pône calls in case of a campus energency.

The number of people who tried to register for UK's system in its first hour of operation rivals the number of people who have signed up for the alert systems that other universities launched in the fall.

Michigan State University launched its system in August, and 13,000 people have since signed up to Ohio State University opened registration for its text-messaging system in late 3eptember.

Within a month, 12,000 people in its campus community had signed up, and now 15,500 have registered. People at North Carolina State University began signing up for its system before the winter break. About 10,000 people have registered, but the university is waiting to implement the system until more sign up.

"I think what you're going to find is campuses are only getting 25 percent of fewer people to sign up," said David Rainer, associate vice chancellor for environmental health and public safety at NC State. "We're trying to run an ex-

Beshear: Ky. must deal with 'dismal' budget

FRANKFORT — Gov. Steve Beshear firmly laid out the "fi-nancially dismal" situation Ken-tucky will face in coming months during last night's State of the Commonwealth Address.

In his first annual address, Beshear announced what may be a longer-term cut across the enter state government in response to an "unprecedented budgetary shortfall."

"It is not a time for whining or "woe is us" — It is a time for leadership, bold action and temporary cost

cutting." Beshear said in his speech to the Kentucky General Assembly.

Beshear's call for funding cuts across state government follow an order for a 5 percent budget cut for almost all state agencies and public universities until the state of the stat

Beshear called for public universities to prepare for an additional 12 percent loss. UK President Lee Todd said that UK will continue to push for full funding of the Top 20 Business Plan, which calls for an increase in funding and faculty each year through 2020. "We're on an upswing now," Todd said. "We can't afford to stall."

Last week Todd said the budget cut of 12 percent Beshear asked universities to prepare for would require a tuition increase of 30 percent to fund. This is an increase that "would not be an option for Kentucky." Todd said. In last night's address, Beshear did not focus on higher education. However, Todd said he believes the governor should leve universities funding to continue research efforts within the state.



Proposed study on textbooks won't help lower cost

Like tuition, fees, rent and parking passes, textbooks are one of the inevitable expenses of the inevitable expenses of the inevitable expenses rent spumbling. The cost of buying textbooks and supplies adds up quickly each semseter, especially when individual volumes often have triple-digit price tags, and selling books back rarely provides much relief. The burden of purchasing textbooks is nearly universal for college students. Nationally, students at four-year public universities spend an average of nearly \$500 each year, according to a 2005 study by the U.S. General Accounting Office, and the cost of textbooks has been rising at twice the level of inflation since the mid-1980s. State Rep. Rick Nelson, D-Middlesboro, hopes that the Kentucky General Accounting that the Kentucky General Accounting the the stife of the stife o

as it stands is unlikely to actually achieve this goal.

Completing a study will mean expending state funds and research staff for what will most likely be little gain. Textbook prices have been studied before, most notably in the federal Gernal Accounting Office report from July 2005, and there does not seem to be a compelling reason for the state to repeat the work that has already been done. The textbook market in Ken-

tucky is not significantly different from that of any other state, and the federal report is still recent and relevant.

Although college students are one of the more technologically savey segments of the population, accessing textbooks online is hardly a solution to the cost problem. In the near future, the availability of books is a major concern, as it's up to the publishers to make their content available electronically. And while lugging several heavy textbooks is certainly amonying, printed material avoids such persistent technological issues as software crashes, sporty Internet connections and eyestrain from prolonged computer use.

Ultimately, the price a student pays for textbooks each semester is sufferent individual base and the professor requires multiple textbooks or a new edition for which there are no used books available, the cost goes up for every student in the class. Often-times these requirements are justified, though sometimes these requirements are justified, though sometimes they are not. While there should be policies in place to protect students from spending extra money unnecessarily, they should be set by UK and other universities on an individual basis; the General Assembly should not try to micromanage how textbooks are selected.

The rising cost of textbooks is an issue that needs to be addressed, but in a meaningful way that will bring results. Using state resources to duplicate existing research is unlikely to solve the problem. Instead, Kentucky's colleges should lead the way in finding ways to reduce the cost of education through more effective use of text-books.

Universities have a duty to spend endowments

the Dallas Morning News on Friday.

By law, most private foundations must give away 5 percent of their earnings each year. Why not universities? They pay no taxes on the earnings of their endowments. Plus, donors to those endowments receive tax breaks. We admit that the issue sounds awfully legalistic. But it's not just one for lawyers to chat about at the alumni center. Across the nation, headlines are screaming about the middle class being unable to afford college tution. The price is racing upward while some endowments are witnessing double-digit growth. Is it really fair for families to foot so much of the bill under those flusd forcumstances?

No.
The reports evidently have caught
Sen. Charles Grassley's attention. The
Senate Finance Committee's top Republican wants his panel to consider requiring universities to spend 5 percent
of their endowment earnings annually.
We don't particularly like government telling institutions what to do.
But the affordability of college is a
growing concern.

If an annual spending requirement would free up money for more scholarships or help schools pay more of their costs instead of shifting them onto students and parents, we're open to it. Plus, why shouldn't university endowments play by the same rules that govern private foundations?

Interestingly, Mark Yudof, the University of Texas System chancellor, agrees. He sees nothing wrong with a spending standard, since schools get public benefits. (The UT System spends about 4.75 percent of its endowment's earnings annually. The Legislature also has limited what the system can spend it on.)

Now. Congress may need to smooth out any spending requirement. Maybe universities can average expenditures over a three-year period, has a point. And if university leaders don't like it, they had better start showing they aren't simply watching their endowments grow. Yale's increased recently by as much as 28 percent in one year. However, Yale also is opening its checkbook, so that's a plus. Will other schools follow? If they don't, they're begging Washington to mess with them.



If the company were in a tight financial situation or had some specific need, the Guild would work to reach a reasonable deal. Already in this round of bargaining, we have tentatively agreed to several changes in the contract that give the company Besibility it claims to need. But in the cases of sick time and part-time employee insurance, the Herald-Leader doesn't have a specific need, it doesn't have a financial problem. It simply wants to eliminate the bargaining process over two very important health-related issues.

We have a solid track record at this newspaper. McClatchy does not. This round of contract negotiations is not setting a good standard for this employer in our
