An efficient and compre-hensive cut service might also be incorporated in a daily with reference to the happenings in other col-leges. It has always been the humble purpose of the Literary Section to encourage original writing among the student body by publishing their efforts herein Recently, however, interest in literature and creative work seems to have lamentably declined and contributions have been few and far between.
