Reportedly of heart attack

MOSCOW — The new Soviet leaders, faced with a transfer of Kremlin power following the death of President Leonid I. Brezhnev, yesterday named former KGB chief Yur V. The Communist Party and government, indicating Brezhnev's foreign policy would be continued, retirerated his policy to "ensure detente and disarmament" with the West, but warned it would deal a "crushing retaliatory strike" if threatened by attack.

Brezhnev, 75, died Wednesday of an apparent heart attack. The announcement was withheld for 26 and one-half hours but when it was made, black-trimmed flags quickly were raised around Moscow. Public reaction to Brezhnev's death was surprisingly subdued.

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Visitation revision efforts are commended

In the next few weeks, a special advisory committee chaired by Dean of Students Joseph Burch will consider a proposal to extend visitation hours in the University's 18 residence halls.

The committee has these questions before it: whether to start weekday upperclass visitation at 5 p.m. or 6 p.m. rather than 7 p.m., whether to extend weekend upperclass visitation from 1 a.m. to 2 a.m. and whether freshmen should be given weekday visitation. It will also consider, on a trial basis, a co-ed dormitory with 24-hour weekend visitation.

The proposal to add visitation time during the week has met with few objections from students and administrators. Currently, students that wish to use their visitation privileges after dinner must wait until 7 p.m. to enter the dormitories.

This proposal will eliminate excess period between the 6:15 p.m. cafeteria closing time and the beginning of visitation. The idea is a good, common-sense proposal.

The proposed extension of upperclass weekend visitation has not been met so openly, however. Some University administrators and students think the additional hour will lock a roommate out of his or her room and put a strain on resident advisers.

But the idea is backed by a considerable number of students.

Sandy Mills, Blanding Tower House Council president, and Greg Crockett, Kirwan Tower House Council president, along with several other residence hall officers, report that their halls are overwhelmingly in favor of the weekend change.

About 75 people attended the two-hour rally, with the theme "Nuclear Destruction: What's in itor You?"

"If there is a World War III, it will occur because of the Reagan, spelled R.A.Y-G-U-N, administration," Yanarella said. "His appointees have brought a willingness to believe in a limited nuclear confrontation, and that's nucls."


