MESSAGE FROM THE PRESTDENT

L' Shana Tova. As we all look forward to a happy, prosperous and healthy New Year, CKJA reflects with pride upon a year of community service and real accomplishment. For the first time our organization has a centrally located, professionally staffed office from which we can coordinate our many programs. We are especially fortunate to have as our first community worker, Judy Saxe, a person who has long demonstrated her commitment to fulfilling the ideals of our Jewish heritage. In addition, at our last meeting the CKJA Board of Directors voted to become a member of the Council of Jewish Federations. We hope that our affiliation with this group of Jewish community organizations across the United States will provide us with the resources to broaden the scope of our programming and to enhance the quality of the services we already offer.

We were especially happy to negotiate a contract with the Louisville Hebrew Home, Four Courts. Five beds have been reserved for our older citizens who require residential care within a traditional Jewish setting. The Forum series, Camp Shalom, our annual Israel Independence Day Celebration, the Israeli dance group, and the Jewish Fellowship Bowling League continue to thrive, attracting the participation of large and varied segments of the Jewish community. This past year CKJA sponsored a second Russian family, the Rozmans. Again you opened your hearts to welcome them and to make them feel that our home is their home. All of these programs depend upon your contributions to the CMJA Annual campaign. This year you have chosen to show your support by increasing your contributions, which support programs in Israel, in Central Kentucky, across the United States and throughout the world, to record levels.

It is not enough, however, to congratulate ourselves for past accomplishments. Too many of us allow our neighbors to write that important letter to our Congressional representatives, to make that contribution to the Annual Campaign, to participate in the planning and hard work that bring our programs to fruition. Creating an active, viable Jewish life is the responsibility of each of us. Our survival as a people is too crucial to leave to someone else. We need to work together during this New Year to make our community a better place for us to live as Jews.





Hear Ye! Hear Ye! C.K.J.A.'s Scholarship Committee has funds available for young people who are interested in participating in an educational program in Israel or who need financial assistance in order to attend a non-profit Jewish summer camp. It's not too early to begin planning for next summer and for next fall.

Israeli Scholarships are available to young Lexingtonians who have been accepted into a study or a work/study program in Israel. Other eligibility criteria are that the student will be returning to this community for at least six months after his or her Israeli experience and will participate in local Jewish youth activities during that time. These scholarships, available in amounts of up to \$500.00, are awarded on the basis of personal written applications which detail past participation in the community and plans for using the Israeli experience to the future benefit of this community.

Camperships, in amounts not to exceed one half the total amount needed for camp fees and transportation, are awarded on the basis of need. Any information submitted on the application form is held in confidence by the members of the Scholarship Committee.

Many young people in our community have benefitted from these scholarships. We hope many more will take advantage of this offer, this year and in the future.

Saudi AWACS deal

As you are well aware by now the Reagan Administration has submitted to the Congress a proposal to sell sophisticated military equipment, including AWACS to Saudi Arabia. A number of people in the community have sent letters to Congressman Hopkins and Senators Ford and Huddleston urging them to vote against the sale of this material. For your information, both Senator Ford and Huddleston signed the Packwood/Jackson letter which urged the Administration not to sell these armaments to the Saudis. Congressman Hopkins has not taken a public position to date. Please write your Senators and Congressman and let them know your thoughts on this matter. For your information, just about every national Jewish organization has gone on record as being against the sale.
