# Jones calls for new process to select trustees

Saying that old political ploys frequently "get in the way" of progressive ideas, Lt. Gov. Brereton Jones yesterday proposed a new system for choosing trustees for state universities.

Speaking to the Lexington Rotary Club, Jones said the present system allows a governor to appoint a trus-tee based on how much money he

or she raises for the gubernatorial campaign or how many votes he or she delivers.

His goal is to develop a system that would eliminate any suspicions of possible improprieties taking place.

Jones said he is working with the legislative leadership in the General Assembly and with state deucational council. According to a spokesperson from Jones' office, contribution to education.

## West angered by Iraqi threat to kill diplomats

Western governments reacted with outrage yesterday to Traq's threat to execute diplomates who shelter foreigners, but Baghdad sought to portray it as a misunderstanding, saying the warning was aimed at its own citizens.

Eight weeks to the day after Iraq overram Kuwati, its exited emir addressed the United Nations General Assembly, decrying the "rape, destruction and terror" inflicted by Saddam Hussein's armies and appealing for a withdrawal of Iraqi troops.

But Iraq tightened its grip on the conquered emirate, ordering Kuwatii nationals to apply for Iraqi citizenship.

# Candidate threatens lawsuit over UK forest

U. S. Congressional candidate Will T. Scott yesterday threatened that a lawsuit may be filed to remove UK as trustee of Robinson Forest, claiming the school improperly developed it and is putting 1,900 jobs in Jeapordy.

UK, which was given the forest in separate conveyances more than 50 years ago from the E.O. Robinson Trust, says the formed to the sessential to its forestry research. But Scott, a republican running against incumbent Democrat Chris Perkins for 7th district congressman, said UK is not fulfilling its obligations of the trust and that the jobs which would be provided by mining in areas around the forest are more important than UK's current research.

"I ask (UK) to cooperate with the

areas around the forest are more important than UK's current research. "I ask (UK) to cooperate with the 1,900 families that want to keep their jobs," Scott said in a statement from a news conference in Jackson. "But if you don't, I personally promise that the people of eastern Kentucky will file suit to replace you as

trustee."

Scott spoke to about 40 people on the steps of the Breathitt County court sudge.

UK spokesman Bernie Vonderheide said in a statement that UK regrets Scott is questioning the University's commitment to Eastern Kentucky in the political campaign. "We stand on our long record of service over the years to this region and promise no less in the future," Vonderheide said. The forest consists of seven land tracts totalling 14,800 acres of land in Knox, Breathitt and Perry counties.

Scott supported Arch Mineral, Co.'s request to mine tracts adjacent to the forest's main tract, which the University has opposed. He asked UK to "compromise and work with" the St. Louis-based mining corporation, and that if they did not, a suit would be filed.

He did not specify who would file the suit or when it would be filed.

UK says mining on Arch's adjacent tracts of land would damage the nearly pure Clemons Fork watershed, which runs into the forests.

Jeff Speaks, a spokesman for Scott, said the candidate had been in contact with Arch, but not with UK. "Will just didn't feel that it would be use-ful, going on their past actions," Speaks

ful, going on their past actions," Speaks said.

UK and Arch have failed to negotiate a settlement despite the exchange of facts and proposals between them.

The University offered to trade tracts of land outside the forest's main body for the land adjacent to the forest to which Arch owns the mineral rights.

Arch has rejected that proposal, saying the value of economically recoverable coal in the outlying tracts is not comparable to the coal of the adjacent land. Recent negotiations have centered on the value of the coal offered in the trade.

The UK Board of Trustees this month authorized UK legal counsel to offer the outlying tracts of land to other mining companies.

est. Scott said Arch's mining would not destroy the watershed, citing Arch's plan to divert the mining waste into an already polluted stream.

#### Cartoon composer finally gets deserved respect

The name Carl Stalling may not ring a bell with some folks, but there are few who have not heard his music.

his music.

As the mastermind tunesmith behind Warner Brothers' most-revered Merrie Melodies cartoons, Stalling should be a permanent fixture in American soundtrack history. He all but invented the scoring technique used to mimic on-screen action, called appropriately "mickey-mousing." Despite this, his work has been incorred in most circles.



What's up, doe?
That oversight was corrected by the efforts of cutting-edgers John Zorn and Hal Willner. Overdue by about 40 years, The Carl Stalling Project chronicles a career marked literally with the screeches, boings, and ker-powwws! of a great cartoon tradition forged by directors like Fritz Freleng, Tex Avery and Chuck Jones as well as voiceman Mel Blanc.

Blanc. From the early '30s until about 1958, it was Carl Stalling's distinc-tive orchestrations that gave aural life to Bugs Bunny, Daffy Duck,

Porky Pig, and the rest of the Merrie Melodies crew.

and prancing flues been acknowledged for what they are: Not just musical "mickey-mousing," but radically literal tone poetry, a remarkably advanced predecessor to modern film scoring techniques. The Project's producer, Hal Willner, started a kind of tribute album mania which has yielded eclectic salutes to music like Disney movie tunes, Kurt Weill stage numbers and the jazz of Thelonius Monk. John Zorn, a New York saxophonist/ composer, served as production consultant for the Project. He made

drawing equally from the likes of Stalling and Ennio Morricone to jazz great Ornette Coleman. Mostly, Zorn and Willner have



skillfully assembled medleys of "moments" from assorted cartoons. These bright, breathtaking orchestral works are plenty adventurous

even without the intended images. Also included are three full-length cartoons complete with Merrie Mel-odies fanfares (in various mutations)

cardons complete with settler should share so dies fanfares (in various mutations) and the ear-boggling sound effects of Treg Brown.

Adding to the overall impact are liberal spicings of dialogue snippets and assorted sound effects. Opening the record is Stalling, a notorious perfectionist, commanding the Warner Brothers studio orchestra through five takes of "Puddy-Tat Trouble." Elsewhere, the listener hears vintage cartoon dialogue ("... and if you DON'T pay, we'll take the FARM!") and familiar musical themes, some original and others outright appropriated.

Ultimately, The Carl Stalling Project beckons listeners back into the golden age of animation — an era of extraordinary animation, bitting so-cial commentary and uproerious stanstick humor Some things come

extraordinary animation, outing so-cial commentary and uproarious slapstick humor. Some things come across in no dubious terms, like the factory clunks and whirrs of "Pow-erhouse," while other areas conjure memories of a vaguer variety.





When a football player has a name like Pookie, you wouldn't think he'd have to worry about making a name for himself. But that's just the case with UK freshman quarterback Robert "Poo-lies" tones.

## Gunman killed by police after 7-hour standoff

BERKELEY, Calif. — A "deranged" Iranian gunman with a hatred for blond Americans died in a
burst of police bullets yesterday,
seven hours after he stormed a bar,
killed one man, wounded seven
people and took 33 hostages.
Six officers stormed Henry's Publick House and Grille in the Durant
Hotel after police negotiators deciddthey couldn't talk the gunman
out of the bar, said Lt. Jim Polk.

"We decided there was no other
way, "Polk said.

way," Polk said. He said the gunman, identified by

University of California, Berkeley, spokesman Ray Colvig as Mehrdad Dashti, gave away his position inside the bar by using one of the terrorized hostages as an intermediary in talking to police by telephone.

"Every time the hostage would have to ask a question of this bad guy, he would have to turn around and look at him and this gave us a good idea of where he was," Polk said.

Seconds after the burst of police

said.

Seconds after the burst of police gunfire around 7:20 a.m., hostages, some of whom had been forced to sit in the windows of the bar as shields, ran from the hotel.

Dashti, 30, was naked and bleed-

ing when he was loaded into an ambulance and taken to Highland Hospital. He was dead on arrival, according to hospital spokeswomen Phyllis Brown.

"He was apparently very confused," said Berkeley Police Capt. Phil Doran. "Deranged is not a bad description."

"For some reason, he had something against blonds, Caucasian women and blond-haired, blue-eyed men," said Douglas Moore, 25, a UC student and manager of the bar who was one of the hostages. "He had something against Americans.

who was one of the hostages. He had something against Americans.
"He accused the women of showing too much leg," Moore said. "He accused them of wearing tight skirts, short skirts...
"He said it was that kind of trash that was leading guys like him on and that they deserved to be punished... He did a pretty good job of degrading the women."
Mayor Loni Hancock said women

wouldn't give details.

Moore, however, said no one was sexually abused.

Moore said Dashti claimed the

Moore said Dashti claimed the "government owed him \$16 rillion for mental telepathy work and this was his way of getting it back." San Francisco Police \$50, Jerry Senkir said Dashti was named in a warrant charging grand theft in connection with cashing two stolenchecks worth more than \$16,000. He said Dashti was advised of the charges and police expected him to urn himself in. One of Dashti's demands was that San Francisco Police Chief Frank Jordan appear live on television and drop his drawers," according to Doran.

Doran said one of Dashti's complaints was that "he didn't get a student loan."

Moore said John Sheehy, 22, of Lafayette, was shot in the chest at close range early in the incident. Sheehy, a UC student, died during surgery, said Thomas McGarry, a spokesman at Eden Hospital in Castro Valley. ro Valley.

Witnesses said the shooting was punctuated by the gumman screaming. "When is it going to end? Hou long?" How long?" Frederick Smith, 19, a UC junior from Los Angeles and Dashti's roommate for a month, said Dashti grew up in Iran and mowed to this country about eight years ago. He said Dashti was a gun collector and had given Smith shooting lessons

Dashti told him Wednesday that Smith would have to move out be-cause Dashti was flying to Hawaii to meet a woman his parents had ar-ranged for him to marry, Smith said.

Smith said Dashti had earned an engineering degree from San Francisco State University but couldn't find a job.

The apartment they shared was cluttered with family photographs, ammunition, drab furniture and bookshelves crowded with books. One document found in the apartment, a form from the Alameda County Department of Health Services, described him as a paranoid schizophrenic.

Two of the wounded were in guarded condition with multiple bullet wounds, two were being treated for leg wounds, and three were treated and released, hospital officials ead.

## **Meditation subject** of teacher's speech

A former UK English professor enlightened people about Shambhala training by discussing the meaning of meditation in his lecture Wednesday, "Meditation and the Art of Building a Sane Society."

Professor Emeritus William Gordon, now the director of the Shambhala Training Center in Lexington, said Shambhala training teaches people to approach heir lives from a new perspective through the practice of meditation.

ation. Meditation is a difficult subject to discuss because often its qualities cannot be explained through words, said Gordon, who taught English literature at UK for about 20 years before his retirement in 1988.

Shambhala meditation, considered to be a way of investigating

Shambhala mediatain, considered to be a way of investigating one's self, existed long before Buddhists began practicing it. It has been taught in the United States since 1978 and in Lexington since 1980.

Loosely, meditation means "the mind," but almost every book on Shambhala has a different definition. There are there to definition.

book on Shambhala has a different definition. There are three qualities marking successful meditation: Freedom, or creativity; discipline, meaning the ability to learn; and responsibility, or doing what needs to be done. The ultimate quality of the meditation pattern is luminosity, which means clarity or awareness, but Gordon said this is not

"Luminosity is very hard to obtain. When you get to that point, you acquire all the other qualities, such as creativity, well-being, and skillfulness."

experienced easily.

"Luminosity is very hard to obtain," he said. "When you get to that point, you acquire all the other qualities, such as creativity, well-being, and skillfulness."

Shambhala sees everything in the world as enlightened, and everyone as having some kind of vision. All ideas in the mind begin with a "flicker."

For example, when a person

vision. All ideas in the mind begin with a "flicker."
For example, when a person hinks of eating a piece of cake, the mind then puts out a picture of the piece of cake. If the flicker persists, it is called a "grasp and cling" flicker.
Gordon said he has found his current pursuit of educating people about Shambhala training to be rewarding.
"My experience on meditation is that people are very appreciative about what they have learned," he said.
The first of five beginning levels of Shambhala training will be held the weekend of Oct. 12-14 at the Shambhala Training co-ter. The weekend will include alks by the Gordon, individual interviews, group discussions, and periods of stiling meditation. interviews, group discussions, and periods of sitting meditation.

## Senate committee approves Souter By STEVEN KOMAROW

WASHINGTON — The Senate Judiciary Committee approved in the nomination of New Hampshire jurist David H. Souter to the Supreme Court yesterday with but one dissenting vote. The full Senate is expected to confirm him easily but not before the court begins its fall term on Monday.

Democrats as well as Republicans on the committee said they saw in President Bush's nominee a brilliant legal scholar and a man of good temperament and integrity. Only Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., voted against him, saying he feared Souter would "solidify a 5-4 amti-civil". Howell Heflin, a conservative Alabama Democrat whose opposition helped kill the 1987 Supreme Court nomination of Robert Bork, said he liked Souter's "clear-headed approach" and lack of an ideological



#### **Hussein protected** from overthrow

By JOAN MOWER

WASHINGTON — Iraqi President Saddam Hussein's security shield is so thick and mobile that the only way he'll be toppled is if one of his intimate advisers turns against him, U.S. officials said yesterday.

Based on reports from Iraq, the officials said they've concluded that Saddam remains in Baghdad but moves around frequently from his various palaces in the capital.

troin ins various panaces in the capital.

The officials spoke on condition they remain anonymous.

"He is moving around a lot," no official said, Saddam's houses are "well-defended and structurally strong" and he is taken from place to place usually in a heavily secured convoy.

Saddam's whereabouts and his habits have been somewhat of a mystery since he ordered his troops to invade Kuwait on Aug. 2.

2.

Before the invasion, Saddam was a visible leader, making frequent public appearances at mosques and schools.

But he has been in virtual seclusion since the invasion, apparently because he fears for his safety. His pronouncements are usually by his spokesman on television.

"Saddam is alive, well and breathing," said an official. Various visitors have seen him recently, including the Moroccan

foreign minister and Palestinian officials.
But Saddam, who has been the target of 11 assassination attempts in the last 13 years, apparently only deals face-to-face with a handful of close advisers.
Among them are Taha Yasin Ramadan, the first deputy prime minister, and Latif Nasuayyif Jasim, the minister of culture and information.

information.

Were Saddam to be assassinated, the plotters "would have to be senior enough to get through the security," he official said. "It would have to happen very fast.

They would have to go directly to Saddam."

But the officials said the top.

But the officials said the top advisers "keep each other in sight" to ensure none of them dis-

sight to consumpte appears.

"They know if one is missing what that means," the official said.

Saddam has a history of ruthlessness; he once shot to death a health minister who disagreed with him.

health minister who disagreed with him.
"He doesn't allow a whiff of opposition," an official said.
Saddam's security apparatus is awesome. It is comprised of various forces, many of them controlled by Saddam's relatives. He also has the clite Revolutionary Guards numbering about 100,000.
