Minutes of the Meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, April 4, 1961.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky met in the President's Office on the campus of the University at 10:05 a.m., EST, Tuesday, April 4, with the following members present: Robert P. Hobson, Vice Chairman; W. F. Foster, Clifford Smith, Dr. Ralph J. Angelucci, Floyd H. Wright, Robert H. Hillenmeyer, Dr. Paul B. Hall, Dr. R. W. Bushart, Emerson Beauchamp, Dr. H. B. Murray, Dr. Aubrey Brown and Dr. Thomas D. Clark. Absent: Governor Bert T. Combs, Harper Gatton, J. Stephen Watkins, Mrs. Paul G. Blazer and Wendell Butler. Also present were President Frank G. Dickey and Secretary Frank D. Peterson.

A. Meeting Opened.

The meeting of the Board of Trustees was called to order by Mr. Robert P. Hobson, Vice Chairman. He introduced Rabbi Joseph Rosenbloom who opened the meeting with prayer.

B. Approval of Minutes.

On motion duly made, seconded and carried, the minutes of the Board of Trustees of December 13, 1960; and the minutes of the Executive Committee of January 20, February 17 and March 17, 1961, were approved as published.

C. Issuance and Sale of Revenue Bonds Authorized.

Board member Clifford Smith introduced and caused to be read in full a proposed Resolution, as follows:

"A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNI-VERSITY OF KENTUCKY PROVIDING FOR PUBLIC SALE OF THE \$300,000.00 'UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY HOUSING BONDS OF 1960' AS AUTHORIZED BY A RESOLUTION ADOPTED BY THE BOARD ON DECEMBER 13, 1960; AUTHORIZING PUBLICATION OF PROPER NOTICE THEREOF; AND APPROVING THE MATERIAL TO BE FURNISHED TO INTERESTED BIDDERS UPON REQUEST, AS TENDERED BY THE VICE PRESIDENT FOR BUSINESS ADMIN-ISTRATION."

WHEREAS, at a regular meeting held on December 13, 1960, the Board adopted a certain resolution authorizing the issuance,

sale and delivery of Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$300,000.00) "University of Kentucky Housing Bonds of 1960" for the purpose of financing the construction of a Project consisting of two new buildings for housing approximately ninety-six (96) male students, including dining facilities with necessary appurtenant facilities, such authorization being in conformity with the Board's Loan Agreement with Housing and Home Finance Agency of the United States Government, identified as HHFA Project CH-KY-39(D), reference to said Resolution being hereby made for details; and

WHEREAS, funds have been advanced from other sources and applied to the construction of said Project and the same is nearing completion so that it is in order for the Board to proceed at this time in the offering of said bonds at an advertised, public, competitive sale in the manner required by law and as particularly set forth in Section 3 of the aforesaid Resolution, and the same has been recommended to the Board by the University's Vice President for Business Administration; and

WHEREAS, the Vice President for Business Administration has also tendered for approval certain instruments proposed to be furnished to interested bidders upon request, for the purpose of providing full information with regard to the bonds, the security therefor, the terms and conditions upon which purchase bids will be received, and general information regarding the University, and said instruments are found to be in order;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNI-VERSITY OF KENTUCKY HEREBY RESOLVES, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$300,000.00) "University of Kentucky Housing Bonds of 1960", as authorized by a Resolution adopted by this Board as a meeting held on December 13, 1960, shall be offered at public sale upon the basis of sealed, competitive bids in accordance with the Board's Loan Agreement with Housing and Home Finance Agency of the United States Government, relating thereto, such bids to be received in the office of the President of the University until the day of 1961, at the hour of M., EST, at which time the bids shall be opened, considered and acted upon by this Board, or by its Executive Committee if the Board is not then in session, which Executive Committee is herebyfully authorized to take all action necessary and appropriate in the consideration of bids, acceptance or rejection of bids, and establishment of interest coupon rates.

Section 2. The Vice President for Business Administration having tendered certain instruments proposed to be used in connection with the public advertising of such sale and for providing to interested bidders adequate information with regard thereto, the same having been prepared under the supervision of the Vice President for Business Administration by Grafton, Ferguson & Fleischer, the Board's bond counsel, and the same consisting of a "Notice of Sale of Bonds," a "Statement of Terms and Conditions of Bond Sale," and an "Official Statement of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky,"

and said instruments being found to be in proper order, the same are hereby approved and are hereby authorized to be used for the intended purposes. The Secretary of this Board is now authorized to cause the aforesaid "Notice of Sale of Bonds" to be published as provided in Section 3 of the aforesaid Resolution of December 13, 1960, by which the issuance of said bonds was authorized.

Section 3. This Resolution shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its adoption.

ADOPTED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY at a meeting held on April 4, 1961.

Whereupon, the Vice Chairman declared the said motion duly carried and said Resolution duly adopted.

D. Agreement with Hercules Powder Company Approved.

Mr. Peterson submitted Agreement for field test and evaluation between the Hercules Powder Company and the University of Kentucky, Department of Entomology, whereby the University will receive \$500.00 to support field testing and evaluation studies related to the effectiveness of toxaphene sprays and granules for control of corn and sorghum insects, including corn earworm, corn borer, webworms and soil insects. Mr. Peterson recommended that the contract be approved for a period of January 1 to December 31, 1961.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the contract was authorized approved and executed.

E. Contract with Merck & Company, Inc., Authorized Approved.

Mr. Peterson stated to the Board that the Executive Committee on February 17, 1961, accepted a gift check in the amount of \$2,500.00 from Merck, Sharpe and Dohme Research Laboratory which was treated as a gift but, in reality, is a purchase of research work to be done. He stated that Merck and Company want to reserve certain rights and privileges in exchange for setting up this phase of a study with KM-360. The contract provides that the University (1) will conduct an investigation and study of anthelmintic MK-360 against internal parasites of domestic animals in accordance with an outline to be agreed upon by the Experiment Station and Merck and Company; (2) give four months notice to Merck prior to publishing the results of the research; and (3) give to Merck a non-exclusive, unrestricted license to practise the inventions covered by the claims of any letters patent which may issue on which Merck has borne the expense. A reasonable royalty is to be paid to the University on net sales.

Mr. Peterson recommended that, since this is a grant for research work and not a gift to the University, this correction appear in the Minutes of February 17, 1961, and that this Agreement be approved and authorized executed.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Agreement was approved and authorized executed on behalf of the University.

F. Agreement with Garda Farms, Dublin, Ohio, Approved.

Mr. Peterson submitted to the Board a Memorandum of Understanding by the Garda Farms and the University of Kentucky setting forth conditions of sale of an Aberdeen-Angus bull, U.K. Whitneymere, 118th registration No. 3037930, calved September 12, 1959. He explained that the University had raised the subject bull and was willing to sell two-thirds interest in it, and the Garda Farms, Dublin. Ohio, was willing to buy two-thirds interest for \$2,300.00. He explained that the Agreement provides that the University retain a one-third interest in the bull and the right to collect semen. The Garda Farms will maintain the bull on their farm at no expense to the University. A purchase option if either party desires to sell is included.

Mr. Peterson recommended that the sale agreement be approved, and upon motion duly seconded and carried, the sale agreement was approved and authorized executed.

G. Agreement between Salmon Corporation and University of Kentucky Approved.

Mr. Peterson submitted a contract agreement between Salmon Corporation, through the Mereworth Farm, Fayette County, and the University of Kentucky whereby the University would acquire one-half interest in a registered Hereford bull, Silver Prince 194th, No. 11077186, with one-half interest being retained by Salmon Corporation.

Under the agreement the University will keep and care for the bull for a period of not less than three years before it may dispose of its interest unless the bull is later determined to be sterile or diseased or dies. Each party shall have equal rights to use the bull artificially or naturally. Mr. Peterson explained that the purpose behind this purchase is to make it possible to test whether or not certain bulls can transmit beefiness or meatiness to other animals and, by having an interest in three or four bulls at the same time, much progress can be made on the project. He explained that this bull happens to be a Hereford but the project encompasses meat cattle in general. He also reported that the University desired to pay \$3,500.00 for one-half interest in the bull under the above conditions enumerated. He stated that this price seemed to be in line with those being paid for animals of this blood line, type, quality and performance record.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the purchase was authorized and the contract was approved and authorized executed.

H. 1961-62 Internal Budget Approved.

President Dickey presented the 1961-62 internal budget of the University of Kentucky for the five major divisions and related funds, with a recommendation that the budget be adopted as a basis of maximum expenditures for the year, that the inclusion of the name of any person in the budget not be considered as a contract of employment and that the Board of Trustees or the Executive Committee be authorized to make such changes in the budget as may from time to time be deemed necessary. He stated that the budget had been mailed to members of the Board of Trustees on March 24 for their study and consideration. The following statement was included in the budget document:

INTRODUCTION

The 1961-62 proposed budget of the University of Kentucky is being presented to the members of the Board of Trustees for their consideration and approval. This is your personal copy. In compliance with a resolution of the Board, this budget document is being sent to you prior to the Board meeting for your consideration. Please study this comprehensive budget document of the General fund operations for the ensuing year and bring it with you to the Board meeting on April 4, 1961.

Upon approval by the Board of Trustees the budget document will be recorded as an integral part of the University's financial system. The necessary fiscal control will be exercised for the collection and appropriation of income and the expenditure of departmental appropriations in accordance with the existing fiscal policies and procedures.

How This Budget Was Prepared:

The Deans of the various colleges and the Directors of other facets of the University were asked in January of this year to submit to the President their budget needs for the fiscal year 1961-62 with data to support their request. These Administrators, after consulting the department heads and supervisors of the various units, submitted programs and supporting information with total budget

request necessary to carry out their existing and envisioned programs. This information was studied by the President and his budget committee.

The estimated resources of the University for 1961-62 were ascertained and a distribution of available funds was made to the various colleges and divisions after each Dean or administrative officer conferred with the President. A definite sum of money for each program was allotted.

The Dean of each college or Director re-evaluated the program for each college department and division in the light of the funds available. In each case a detailed budget was prepared by the head of each department and each Dean, and submitted to the President for review and final consideration.

Each budget request was checked by the staff for accuracy and compliance with instructions distributed. Each Dean or Director individually met with the President and his budget committee, at which time each program was again evaluated. After individual conferences in which each budget received group consideration, final presidential recommendation was indicated. The University budget was then compiled and prepared in its present form, consisting of two volumes.

Therefore, this General fund budget is a product of three months of study, preparation, and recommendations involving more than 225 persons responsible for the major administrative divisions and departments for programs of the total University.

It should be understood that this is a consolidated General fund budget for the University and the summary of figures following in these comments refers to the five major divisions of the University, through which the funds are administered; to wit

- 1. Colleges and Administration
- 2. Medical Center
- 3. Geological Projects

(See Exhibit A)

- 4. Agricultural Experiment Station
- 5. Agricultural Extension Service

Budgets for Restricted funds are reported in Volume I. These gifts, grants, research contracts, auxiliary and service enterprises are budgeted separately and accounted for individually in keeping with the trust, contract and self-sustaining operation. Separate reports are made to appropriate sources in compliance with approved agreements. These operations are audited monthly, semi-annually, and/or annually as required or deemed necessary for proper accounting and control.

The University of Kentucky Athletic Association, The Kentucky Research Foundation, and the Thomas Poe Cooper Foundation are separate corporations. The funds of these corporations are not included in this budget, except as they may be transferred to the University as grants. Each Corporation is managed by a separate Board of Directors.

I General Fund Budget

The University of Kentucky General Fund Budget provides for the current operation and maintenance of the Division of Colleges and Administration, Medical Center, Geological Projects, Agricultural Experiment Station, and Agricultural Extension Service. The Exhibit A sets forth a comparison of the General Fund statement of estimated income and expenditures for the fiscal years 1960-61 and 1961-62. This comparison is made by major budget unit and reflects the estimated income by source, anticipated expenditures by function, and an analysis of the expenditures by object.

The estimated income for 1961-62 is \$21,264,084. This is an increase of \$3,667,949 over the estimated income for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1961. An analysis of the increase in income by source for each major budget unit is as follows:

The increase in income from Student Fees is based upon an expected rise in student enrollment on-campus and off-campus. This increase in income will be realized on-campus from the nine Colleges and Graduate School. The off-campus increase in student fees is expected from the rise in enrollment within the five existing centers (Ashland, Fort Knox, Northern, Northwest, and Southeast). Also additional increases in income are anticipated from evening and extension classes and home study. Pages 2 and 3 reflect a more detailed analysis as to the various sources of income for the major budget units for the fiscal years 1960-61 and 1961-62.

The state appropriation increase in income represents the amount recommended by the Governor and appropriated by the State Legislature for the second year of the current biennium budget request, except for the \$247,699 shown on page 2 as a receivable-debt service costs for the Consolidated Educational Buildings Bond Issue. The University of Kentucky and the State Department of Finance have agreed to include this amount in the coming biennium budget request.

The increase in grants from the Federal Government will be made through the Smith-Hughes and related Acts. These funds are used in the College of Education for the Vocational Education Programs.

The estimated increase from Sales and Services is from educational departments and Medical Center Hospital, farm sales, public services, and regulatory sales and services. The sources are detailed within each division on page 3.

The proposed expenditure for the 1961-62 fiscal year is \$21,263,477. This is an increase of \$3,617,027 over the estimated expenditure for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1961.

An analysis of the increase in expenditures by function for each major budget unit is as follows:

An analysis of the increase shown above reflects the total increase in costs of programs and activities of an exact or similar classification of service. These totals include the costs for personal services, current operating expenses, purchases of equipment, and payment of interest expense and retirement of bonds.

In addition to the above analysis by function, included on the following page is a schedule showing the expenditure increase over the fiscal year ending June 30, 1961 for each of the major budget units by object or nature of expenditure.

The increase in personal services of \$2,701,094 was used primarily for salary adjustments of the University personnel presently employed, with the exception of the Medical Center, where the use was for salary adjustment and departmental staff expansion. A limited amount was appropriated for additional personnel in the Division of Colleges, Agricultural Experiment Station and Agricultural Extension Service for expansion and new services.

The mean salaries in Land Grant Institutions in the United States for 1960-61, not including professional schools, were Professor \$11,590, Associate Professor \$8,960, Assistant Professor \$7,500 and Instructor \$5,700. The increments for 1961-62 throughout Land Grant Institutions in the United States will further raise these averages.

Current operating expenses increased in the amount of \$683,287, and will provide for departmental expansion, new services, and the mounting cost of utilities, materials and supplies, and interest expense.

II. Auxiliary Enterprises

Estimated income from the operation of residence halls for the fiscal year 1961-62 totals \$835,696.

Appropriations for the operation and debt service charges total \$831,437. The unappropriated income balance is a reserve for future debt service charges and vacancy losses.

IV. Restricted Funds

The Board of Trustees has authorized the establishment of various funds classified as Restricted or Trust Funds (Kentucky Revised Statutes 41.290).

The Board directed that these "private funds and contributions" be retained and deposited in a local bank. Budgets are included herein for most of these monies.

After the adoption of this budget, the acceptance of additional funds by the Board of Trustees, during the fiscal year 1961-62, is considered authorization for spending funds in accordance with the terms of acceptance.

President Dickey made the following supplemental statement to the Board:

In the section under the title of "How This Budget Was Prepared" we have tried to indicate to you the care that has gone into the preparation of this budget, the number of people that have been involved in various ways in preparing this detailed budget. I think it is worthy of note that a budget is not a one, two or three-man job, but as is indicated here, the study, preparation, and recommendations involve more than 225 persons who are responsible for the major administrative divisions, departments, and the various programs of the University. . . .

The summaries are contained in the introductory statement indicating the increases by function and also by source of income; then indicating the major budget increases by object and nature of expenditure and finally a summary of the proposed mean salaries by rank for the 1961-62 year. I would like to comment just briefly on that particular point because we have for some time been "singing the blues" about the rank we have with other states. We are exceedingly proud that these increases for the year in which we now find ourselves and the year of this proposed budget bring us to the levels that are comparable and even slightly above, in some instances, the national average for comparable institutions. That includes the land-grant institutions and the state universities.

Obviously if you pick ten or twelve institutions and compare them with our institution you can do almost anything you want to. You could pick out the ten lowest paying and we would appear exceedingly well off. You could pick out the ten institutions that pay the highest salaries and we are below those salaries. In terms of a nation-wide picture we are now at the mean salary level in comparison with these institutions for 1960-61. We are proud of this gain in salary levels. . . .

There is one other thing that I would like to comment upon briefly that is not contained in this introductory material. Some of you may have wondered about increases which have appeared to be abnormally large as compared with others, and in order to explain this I need to give you just a little bit of background information, In the self-study of the University completed last year the following statement was made with reference to the practice of adding incentive pay for contract research. The quote is "The University should study its growing program of contract research in terms of its effect on teaching efficiency. In particular it should re-examine its position with respect to incentive payer. Then after we had completed the self-study, the visiting committee, which reviewed the University's self-appraisal, made this statement: "It is important that the atmosphere of the University campus be one in which intellectual curiosity and the will to know what is happening at the boundaries of knowledge prevails. One of the criticisms which has come to the attention of the committee from several sources is that many members of the faculty of the University of Kentucky consider research study as a kind of extracurricular activity for which they have no responsibility. Teaching is, on the whole, well and competently done, but there does not seem to be the general awareness for the responsibility for research achievement. The administration should be commended for making available funds for the support of faculty research projects. These funds, though modest in amount, have been effective in stimulating interest in research and encouraging the efforts of those who have original investigations under way. There appears to be general approval of the Research Foundation and the methods it is using to encourage research activities. Adequate coordination exists between the Research Foundation and the Graduate School to enhance the effectiveness of both agencies and research planning. There are, however, some aspects of the research program which need re-examination and thoughtful appraisal. of these is the policy of permitting faculty members who obtain research grants to receive some compensation beyond their academic salaries from the grant funds.

The unfortunate implications of such practices are obvious. Our own faculty committee and the Southern Association visiting committee recommend that the research incentive pay policy be changed, effective July 1, 1961. . . . An amount equivalent to approximately the average of incentive pay over the last four years has been added to the base salary of those professors who are affected by this change in contract research policy. This increase will be a permanent increase to the base salary of those individuals and will not be dependent upon the continuation of particular research projects. It is not intended that such research increases will take the place of any merit increases which might be possible this year.

The change in policy certainly should not reduce the amount of contract research undertaken at the University of Kentucky. In fact, it is felt that an increase will follow. . Persons beginning the research increase system this July will come up for review for upward increase from year to year. . . It is our hope that this program will materially strengthen the combined programs of teaching and research at the University.

. . . One additional step has been taken in the review of this budget. By virtue of the fact that it was available, the Governor, as Chairman of the Board of Trustees, asked the personnel of the Budget Division of the Department of Finance to review the budget in order that he might have some of their thinking and recommendations. I am informed that they indicated that the budget is a sound one, in accord with their understandings and includes, as you will note, a receivable from the State in the amount of \$247,699. is a receivable debt service cost for the Consolidated Educational Buildings Bond Issue. The University of Kentucky and the State Department of Finance, Budget Division, have agreed to this amount to be included in the coming biennial budget request, and that is a part of the budget projected income for the University. It is my understanding that the Governor has given a statement that this budget is in complete accord with their thinking, and they consider it to be a sound and equitable budget and makes satisfactory use of the funds which have been provided and in accordance with the Legislative appropriation.

Members of the Board asked questions and stated that they had studied and considered the document before them and, being advised, upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the budget was authorized accepted as a basis of maximum expenditures for the year 1961-62. The inclusion of the name of any person in the budget is not to be considered as a contract of employment, and the Board of Trustees or the Executive Committee shall be authorized to make such changes in the budget as may from time to time be deemed necessary.

J. Recommendation for Honorary Degrees Approved and Authorized.

President Dickey stated that he was submitting the recommendation of the Graduate Faculty, concurred in by the University Faculty, for honorary degrees to be given to the following persons: Mr. Bert T. Combs, LL.D. degree; Mr.I. Forest Huddleson, Sc.D. degree; and Mr. Raden O. Kosasih, LL.D. degree. He read the following biographical data about each person:

Bert T. Combs, Governor of Kentucky, 1960-

Born in Manchester, Ky., August 13, 1911, he attended Cumberland College at Williamsburg, and received the Bachelor of Law degree from the University of Kentucky in 1937, graduating with the second highest grades in his class. While at the University he was Managing Editor of the Kentucky Law Journal and a member of the Order of the Coif.

Mr. Combs practiced law from 1937 to 1942 and was in the U. S. Army from 1942-1946, being discharged with the rank of Captain. He served as City Attorney at Prestonsburg and as Commonwealth Attorney in 1950. In 1951 he was elected to the Court of Appeals where he soon became a leader among his colleagues as a result of his logical and well-written opinions.

Since his election as Governor in 1959, Mr. Combs has given outstanding leadership in developing the natural and human resources of Kentucky, and in making the government a more effective instrument. He demonstrated vision and courage in developing and securing the enactment of legislation which provides a broader and more adequate tax base for the support of education and other governmental functions. Public education at all levels received an increase of \$109,391,930 over what the legislature previously had considered adequate. This provided more funds for salaries, transportation, teaching materials, etc. He led the campaign for a limited revision of our state constitution.

A number of remarkable advances have been made by the Combs administration in its brief tenure. It has taken state employees out of politics and is establishing a statutory merit system for them. It has instituted election reforms, including compulsory use of voting machines in all counties. It has launched an extensive program for basic industrial research and has placed new emphasis on soil and water conservation, reforestation, rural libraries and other projects designed to make Kentucky a better place in which to live.

In recognition of these accomplishments, the Committee recommends Governor Bert T. Combs for the Honorary Degree, Doctor of Laws.

I. Forest Huddleson, Professor of Microbiology and Public Health, Michigan State University

Born in Murphysville, Mason County, Kentucky, on October 17, 1893, he received the Bachelor of Science Degree from Oklahoma State University in 1915 and the degrees of Master of Science, D. V. M. and Ph. D. from Michigan State University in 1916, 1925 and 1937 respectively. He received an Honorary Doctorate from the University of La Plata, Argentina in 1950.

Dr. Huddleson has pioneered in research of enormous value to both agriculture and public health. He is one of the world's greatest authorities on brucellosis (contagious abortion in cattle and undulant fever in man). He has made outstanding contributions in the detection and control of this disease. He developed a serological test which came to be known as the rapid agglutination test and is used throughout the world for the diagnosis of brucellosis. He also developed a skin test, similar to the suberculin test, known as the

brucellergen test, for the diagnosis of brucellosis. He developed brucellin for the treatment of human brucellosis. He recently developed a simple method for growing and isolating bacteria in the blood of a patient using the patient's blood alone as the culture media.

Dr. Huddleson is the author of two books, one in a second edition, and is author or co-author of about 170 scientific papers dealing largely with brucellosis. He is a member of several professional associations and has been honored in various ways by the International Veterinary Congress, the American Veterinary Medical Association, the Michigan Chapter of Sigma Xi, and the Illinois Society of Bacteriologists, as well as receiving last year the Kimble Methodology Research Award from the Conference of State and Provincial Public Health Laboratory Directors.

The Committee recommends Dr. I. Forest Huddleson for the Honorary Degree, Doctor of Sciences.

Raden O. Kosasih, President of the Institute of Technology of Bandung, Indonesia

Born in Madjalaja, Indonesia, on May 15, 1905, he was educated at a Technical High School and in 1943 received a degree in electrical engineering from Delft, the Netherland Institute of Technology.

From 1937 to 1939 Mr. Kosasih was chief of operations for the Batavia Petroleum Company in South Sumatra. From 1944 to 1946 he was engineer for the Excise Council at The Hague, dealing with excise rates. From 1947 to 1957 he was back in Indonesia as head of the Traction and Material Department of the Indonesian Railroad and in 1953 was Vice Director of the Railroad.

In 1956 he was appointed part-time instructor on the Faculty of the Technical University of Indonesia at Bandung. He was promoted to a high position in the Planning Bureau and in 1959 to a Professorship "Guru Besar", a rank which we are told is rarely and reluctantly granted. On October 1, 1959 he was promoted further to the Presidency of the Institute of Technology. This institute is the oldest institution of higher learning in Indonesia. Its standards are high but its graduates include many of Indonesia's notables. Indonesia has relatively few fully trained professional people, of which Mr. Kosasih is one. Completely non-political, he has been a delegate to various international agencies and has devoted his life to the major service of his country. He is one of the key non-political figures in modern Indonesia.

President Kosasih is planning a trip to the United States and has been invited by President Dickey to attend the University of Kentucky's commencement in June, 1961. In view of this opportunity to strengthen the gradually developing bonds between the University of Kentucky and the Institute of Technology at Bandung, as well as in recognition of President Kosasih's outstanding accomplishments, the Committee recommends that he be awarded the Honorary Degree of Doctor of Laws.

The Board of Trustees considered the recommendation of the President, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, concurred, and authorized the degrees noted given to Mr. Bert T. Combs, Mr. I. Forest Huddleson and Mr. Raden O. Kosasih.

K. Scholarships for 1961-62 Approved.

President Dickey presented a recommendation for the academic year 1961-62 that \$600.00 plus free fees scholarships be granted to A. H. Abdalla, of Jordan, and Emi Naniwa, of Japan; that the Kentucky Federation of Women's Clubs Award, approved by Miss Chloe Gifford, be given to Christine Bergener, Germany; that the Panhellenic Scholarship be continued for Elizabeth Anne Thomson, Scotland; and that free fee scholarships be granted to the following: Inna Iljin, Finland, Maria Isip, Philippines, May Yang, China, Chien-ping Hsu, China, Katumi Nakai, Japan, Mrigendra Bose, India, Isam H. Safady, Jordan, Cheng-chien Chou, China, Eul Soo Pang, Korea, and Cevat Kardan, Turkey. He recommended that the following names be chosen as a list of alternates for free fee scholarships with the understanding that they will be moved to more favorable positions if any of the above withdraw: Alexander Haines, India; Hanna Marta, Jordan; and Raquel de Guzman, Philippines.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the recommendation was concurred in and the appropriations and free fee scholarships enumerated above were approved for the academic year 1961-62.

O. R. D. Johnson Approved as Executive Dean of Extended Programs.

President Dickey made the following statement concerning the appointment of Dr. R. D. Johnson, Executive Dean of Extended Programs.

As you will recall, I recommended last year the appointment of Dr. A. D. Albright as Provost of the University in order that more emphasis could be given to academic program development. At that time we realized that it would be impossible for Dr. Albright to continue to serve as Provost and Executive Dean of Extended Programs; however, he agreed to continue to serve in this dual capacity until we could have the opportunity to establish criteria for the selection of a new dean of Extended Programs and recommend a person to fill this position.

In order that Dr. Albright may give even more time to his duties as Provost, I am ready today to recommend the appointment of a new Executive Dean of Extended Programs. The Advisory Council for Extended Programs, which is composed of representatives of all of the component parts of the University which participate in the extended programs activities, made a thorough study of the qualifications for the deanship of the University Extended Programs. Their statement of criteria grew out of several considerations, among them the functions and programs, the relationships to the total University, the administrative responsibilities and requirements of the office, and leadership desired for a continuing program of education through extended programs. The import of this study can be summarized in a statement made by this Council, "Already Extended Programs is a multi-faceted part of the University that requires leadership skills and competence in marshalling broadlybased resources, academic and others, of the institution. As changes in the State and the University continue to occur, these skills and competencies will be in greater focus in the days ahead. "

The following criteria for the deanship of the University Extended Programs were developed in terms of the considerations just stated. The dean should:

- 1. Hold an earned doctor's degree and a record of continuous professional growth.
- 2. Have increasingly successful academic instructional and administrative experience.

- 3. Have demonstrated an increasing ability to work effectively with various academic and administrative personnel in an institution of higher learning.
- 4. Have a growing capacity, including an understanding of many fields, to gain the respect and confidence of an academic and administrative staff in a university.
- 5. Have successful experience and a mounting competence in working with civic and other professional groups, not only for Extended Programs but for the University at large.
- 6. Be able to interpret clearly and effectively to others pertinent information about the University and Extended Programs, both in written form and orally.
- 7. Be competent in conducting or supervising research and studies on Extended Programs.
- 8. Be competent in the management of fiscal affairs and physical matters.
- 9. Have a record of sound relationships with people.
- 10. Have a growing ability to plan, project, and to make decisions.
- 11. Be of appropriate age to assure good health and a reasonably long period of service in the position.

It is my considered judgment that Dr. R. D. Johnson, who has served as Associate Dean of Extended Programs for the past four and a half years, is eminently qualified to become the Executive Dean of this important part of the University's total program. Dr. Johnson combines the abilities and strengths which the Council has deemed desirable for a new administrative officer. His knowledge of the Extended Programs area and his continuing interest in this program qualify him for this position. I am recommending Dr. Johnson with confidence and feel that he can continue the activities of the Extended Programs to the benefit of the University and the Commonwealth. Dr. Johnson's appointment will be effective July 1, 1961; however, I am asking him to work closely with Dr. Albright during these next few months in order that the transition in the program will be as smooth as possible.

Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Board concurred in the recommendation of the President and authorized the appointment of Dr. R.D. Johnson to the position of Executive Dean of Extended Programs.

President Dickey presented check for \$1,400.00 from The Ford Foundation to be used to cover travel expenses of staff members who will visit educational television experiments in furtherance of a planned program of educational television. He recommended that this grant be accepted, and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Board concurred in the recommendation and requested the President to thank the donors.

Q. Elementary and High School Textbooks at the University School Adopted.

President Dickey stated that it seemed desirable to adopt elementary and high school textbooks for use in the University School of the College of Education, grades 1 through 12. He submitted the list of books for the elementary grades 1 through 8, high school grades 9 through 12, and stated that these books had been adopted by the University School for use in the

School in the coming year, and that he desired to recommend that Form TC-6, prepared by the Department of Education for use throughout the Commonwealth of Kentucky, be accepted, approved and executed. He made available the list of books by subject and book title for the information of Board members, and they being duly advised, upon motion seconded and carried, the textbooks for grades 1-12, as listed on Form TC-6, were approved, and the proper certification was directed to be submitted to the Superintendent of Public Instruction.

Dr. William R. Willard was present and, upon being asked, made a brief statement concerning the policy on referrals and on care of indigent patients of the State. Members of the Board evidenced considerable interest, asked questions and, after a brief period of discussion, thanked Dr. Willard.
