Top-dollar: Med Center chancellor, BOT member among the buyers

With the 1999 UK football season less than six months away, the picture of who will sit in Com-monwealth Stadium's new luxury suites in the revamped and expanded stadium is shaping up.

UK has released a list of the tenants for the 40 new suites, which is highlighted by several high-profile names in Kentucky and the Lexington area.

profile names in Kentucky and the Lexington area.

Four 24-seat suites are being rented for \$52,800 a year, and require a minimum five-year lease agreement. Those four boxes have already been sold. The four suites have been rented by several well-known area names. Jim Host of Lexington's Host Communications, Inc., Ralph Anderson of Beican Corporation, Luther Deaton of Central Bank and Frank Shoop, a UK Board of Trustees member.

The other 36 suites are 18-seat boxes that self \$39,800 a year. As is the case with the other suites, the list of names reads like a who's who of Kentucky, including Dr. James W. Holsinger, Jr., chancellor of the Chandler Medical Center; the Gatton Business School's namesake Bill Gatton, Curtis Green of Green's Toyota of Lexington, John McCall of LG&E Energy, who just bought Kentucky Utilities, Royce Pulliam, owner of World Gyms, and former football player Paul Karen.

The suites, which will open with the rest of the stadium's expansion for UK's first game this fall against Louisville, feature top-tier amenities. Those amenities include 500 square feet of space, 12 permanent theater-style seats and six high-stool seats, air conditioning and heating, as well as semi-operable windows that allow for crowd noise.

Each box has a private restroom, kitchen and

Each box has a private restroom, kitchen and service area, two televisions, a refrigerator, sofas and a closet.

There is elevator access to the skybox level, a suite parking area and each box is served a standard meal during the games.

The suites will be located primarily in the end zone corners of the stadium.

Watts speaks at Tenn. school

Watts speaks at Tenn. school

Former UK football player Jason Watts spoke for the first time publicly about the accident and what he plans to do with the rest of his life.

"Iliterally saw my buddies dying in my arms because of me." said Watts. "The mental and emotional scars will last forever."

Watts, 21, of Ovieda, Fla., goes to trial July 19 on two counts of second-degree manslaughter and one count of wanton endangerment. He is scheduled for a court appearance Wednesday. Watts spoke about the crash to students at Southern Adventist University, about 18 miles north of Chattanooga, as part of the school's drug and alcohol awareness week.

"It's all because of a stupid mistake," he said. "Drinking beer and getting behind the wheel is something that could've been avoided."

Watts told the audience But he said now he feels he is living three lives — his own and for his dead friends. Watts' manager said Jason would still like to go pro if he can get all of these legal matters behind him.

NATO bombs Yugoslavia again

NATO bombs Yugoslavia again
BELGRADE, Yugoslavia — Western leaders
promised a second night of attacks by bombers
and cruise missiles on Yugoslavia and NATO followed through yesterday with an aerial bombardment. NATO fired on Serb targets from
ships in the Adriatic and aircrafts also took off
from allied bases. Wednesday's first round of attacks reportedly killed at least 11 people and delivered a serious blow to the Yugoslav military
infrastructure. But there was no hint the assault
was causing Yugoslav President Slobodan Milosevic to rethink his refusal to end his forces' offensive in separatist Kosovo province or accept a
peace plan calling for 28,000 NATO troops, including 4,000 Americans, to enforce it.

Russia says it won't use force

MOSCOW — Russian leaders angrily de-nounced NATO airstrikes on Yugoslavia yester-day, but President Boris Yeltsin said Moscow would not use force in retaliation. Some top offi-cials hinted Russia could provide Yugoslavia with weapons. Demonstrators hurled bottles at the U.S. Embassy in Moscow. But Russia has mostly responded to the bombings with little more than harsh words. Russia is no longer a ma-jor tactical military power, and it is pleading with the West for aid to revive its shattered economy.

Kevorkian case deliberations begin

PONTIAC, Mich. — Jurors began deliberating a murder charge yesterday against Dr. Jack Kevorkian after a prosecutor told them the eu-

thanasia crusader killed Thomas Youk "like a medical hitman in the night with a bag of poison." But Kevorkian, who was acting as his own attorney, likened himself to civil rights heroes Rosa Parks and the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr., and insited his helping to kill the Lou Gehrig's victim was not a crime. The trial that began only Monday raced toward a conclusion yesterday as Kevorkian rested his defense without calling witnesses. Youk, 52, died last September, and a tape of his death was later seen on CBS-TV's "60 Minutes."

EU may back Palestinian statehood

BERLIN — European Union foreign ministers approved the text of a declaration that would signal the EU's strongest support to date for the Palestinians' right to declare their own state, officials said. The text says the Palestinians have an unqualified right to self-determination, including the option of a state. The draft also says the EU is convinced the creation of a democratic, viable and peaceful sovereign Palestinian state through negotiations would best guarantee Israeli security.

IRS offering installment deals

WASHINGTON — Millions of Americans who discover they do not have the money to pay their tax bills may find the Internal Revenue Service is not playing its same old brand of hardball. Because of last year's IRS reform law, numerous requirements are being eased so taxpayers can work out installment plans, or, in some cases, settle large debts by offering a lower compromise payment.

Committee OKs Y2K lawsuit bill

WASHINGTON — The Senate Judiciary Committee yesterday approved one of several bills before Congress aimed at averting lawwits related to Y2K computer breakdowns. The bill, sponsored by Sen. Orrin Hatch, R-Utah, and Sen. Diamne Feinstein, D-Calif., would establish a 9-day grace period so companies could fix computer problems before suits go forward. It would encourage alternatives to lawsuits and put limits on class action suits.

Mercury goes online to debut sale

DETROIT — As part of a campaign to recast its stodgy image, Mercury is going online to debut its 2000 Sable, the automaker's flagship family sedan. The Sable launch is scheduled for Wednesday at 1 p.m. at http://www.mercuryvehics.com. The Web launch will be followed by virtual chatrooms in which Ford Motor Co. president Jac Nasser will answer questions. Mercury is a Ford brand.

Stocks end higher; Dow up 169.55

NEW YORK — Stock prices rebounded yester-day, boosted by strong earnings reports and grow-ing confidence that NATO air strikes in Kosovo would not reverberate on Wall Street. The Dow in-dustrials closed up 180-55 at 9,806.39, the blue chips' first advance after four days of losses.

ACLU lunges at delay

No waiting game: Union's lawyers, students say 24-hour waiting period an undue burden

The American Civil Liber-ties Union recently filed suit challenging a Kentucky law that requires a 24-hour manda-tory delay for abortions.

In a strange twist of fate though, the lawsuit was as-signed to Judge John Heyburn, the same federal judge who re-cently struck down another Kentucky abortion law.

Heyburn, a Federal District Court Judge in Louisville, struck down one Kentucky abortion law last October after the ACLU filed a first lawsuit.

That law was Senate Bill
121, also known as the partial-birth abortion ban. Heyburn would have to rule again on the controversial abortion issue and possibly overturn another Kentucky law.

When asked about the irony of being assigned both cases, Heyburn declined to

After an intense battle in the 1998 Kentucky legislative session, state representatives passed three new laws that reg-ulated abortion in Kentucky.

Included was a 24-hour
mandatory delay for Kentucky women seeking an abortion. The law, called House
Bill 85, would require that
women receive information
about abortion alternatives
and consequences at least 24
hours before they can have an
abortion.

make an "informed choice" about abortion, but the ACLU says the 24-hour delay is unfair.

"What HB 85 requires,"
ACLU attorney Kim Greene said, "is that a woman must make a separate visit to the abortion provider at least 24-hours before she is deemed capable of consenting to the procedure. That is an undue burden on some women."

Shannon Machholz a

Shannon Machholz, a broadcast journalism senior, also said the law was mis-guided.

"I think the 24 hours is more intended to prevent women from having abortions than to educate them about it," Machholz said.

Enactment of HB 85 has been delayed, though, because state officials cannot decide exactly what information women need to know during the 24-hour waiting period. The fate of HB 85 became even more unclear when the ACLU challenged the constitutionality of the bill.

The ACLII lawsnit will act

The ACLU lawsuit will ask the federal court to rule on two points. First, if making a women wait 24 hours is an un-due burden.

Because abortions are only provided in Lexington and Louisville, the ACLU argues that requiring two trips for an abortion will be especially hard on low-income, young and abused women, and women who live in rural Kentucky.

But not everyone opp the 24-hour delay.

Heather Burgin, a commu-nications senior, said nothing was necessarily wrong with the delay before an abortion.

"Twenty-four hours would give women time to weigh their options before making the choice," Burgin said.

HB 85 would make private counseling services, such as those provided by the center, a public function of the state of Kentucky.

Abortion providers would have to inform women about alter-natives and emotion-al consequences of abortion through in-formational handformational hand-outs written by the state. Transferring this responsibility from private organi-zations into the re-sponsibility of state administrators is a major problem for the ACLU.

"The (handouts) are clearly designed to be anti-abortion material," said Beth Wilson, of the ACLU of Kentucky. "Doctors should not have to pay to promote the state's anti-abortion message."

Judge Heyburn's decision on HB 85 is expected some time this summer. He said he will review the handouts and other information the state produces before he makes his ruling.

The Wildcats return to Alabama for third time this season and SEC hopes

The state of Alabama might as well be the GymKats home away from home. On Feb. 26, they scored a 194-925 against the Crimson Tide in front of more than 7.000. Two weeks ago, UK posted its first SEC win while posting its second highest score of the season, with a 198-25.

This Saturday, the GymKats return one more time for the SEC Championship in Tuscaloosa. But they're not just excited to be back in 'Bama again — this time, they know they're legitimate contenders.

"We had a really good meet there and we're confident there," said junior all-around competitor Krissy Hoeferlin. "We're a stronger team than we have been before, and that gives us a good chance against the traditionally stronger teams that are having an off-year," at programs like Florida or LSU, which are both ranked in the top 15. The GymKats are coming into their own as a team.

"I'm just going out and trying to hit (her routines), and that's all I can do for the team," said Simmons, who finished first in the all-around scoring at Auburn.


