Information

WORKING TICKETS—Address requests to Sports Information Office as far in advance as possible. After Tuesday preceding the game, tickets will not be mailed. Pick up at the Information Window in Memorial Coliseum, directly across the street from the stadium.

COMPS-No individual game allotment.

WESTERN UNION—Advise if you intend to file from press box so that you may be assigned a Western Union operator. It is also advisable to notify the manager of Western Union in Lexington.

PRESS BOX—Limited to male working personnel and Western Union operators. Kentucky Sports Information will service running play-by-play quarterly, half-time and final statistics, scoring summary, lineups and coaches' comments. Light refreshments are available.

RADIO—Broadcasting rights to UK games are assigned exclusively to the G. H. Johnston Agency, 59 East 54th Street, New York, N. Y. 10022 (Telephone 421-8055). One free reciprocal outlet is guaranteed opponent schools visiting Lexington. Any additional stations must clear through the Johnston Agency and the UK Director of Broadcastong, Mr. Pete Manchikes (258-9000, Ext. 2175). Working passes will be supplied approved stations by Sports Information Office.

TELEVISION AND MOTION PICTURES—Live television coverage prohibited except under NCAA auspices. Accredited TV stations or newsreel agencies permitted to make motion pictures of game action for delayed showing provided that no more than 200 feet of highlights of any game are used. An agreement to this effect must be executed before permission will be granted. Application should be made to the UK Director of Broadcasting and forms may be signed for the entire season. On request, the University Film Lab will provide TV stations with a 100 to 200-foot newsclip of game highlights (processed 16 mm color film) at actual cost. Film can be shipped on Sunday following game.

THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY . . . The State Is Our Campus

Located in Lexington, an urban community of over 140,000 population in the heart of Kentucky's famed Blue Grass region, University of Kentucky is a state-supported, land-grant institution which celebrated its centennial year in 1965.

The present school, which this fall expects 27,000 students and now offers instruction in 10 academic colleges plus a Graduate School and a Community College system of 13 centers, had its beginnings in 1865 when it was established as a part of old Kentucky University. This action by the State Legislature united sectarian and public education under one organization for the first time. Federal funds authorized under the Morrill Act were used to develop agriculture and mechanical arts within KU and, in 1878, A&M College was separated from KU to become a separate state institution on the general site of what is now the 706 acre main campus. Name changes in 1908 and 1916 resulted in the title by which the school is now known.

It is fully accredited in its respective colleges and departments by all of the major professional societies and educational organizations.

President of the University is Dr. Otis A. Singletary, 47, who came to Lexington this year from the University of Texas, Austin, where he was executive vice chancellor for academic affairs.

Dr. Singletary, who is eighth president of the University, served a total of eight years at Texas, progressing during seven (1954-61) of those years from instructor to professor, associate dean of Arts and Sciences and assistant to the president. Then for five years (1961-66), he was chancellor of the University of North Carolina, although he was on leave from October 1964 to January 1966 to serve as director of the Job Corps, Office of Economic Opportunity.

ATHLETICS AT KENTUCKY

Kentucky's athletic program, a well-balanced and ambitious activity featuring inter-collegiate competition in ten different sports, is organized under the Department of Athletics and a corporation known as the University of Kentucky Athletics Association.

The program is conducted without overemphasis or sacrifice of educational objectives and in strict compliance with the rules of the University, the Southeastern Conference and the National Collegiate Athletic Association.

A board of directors, headed by the President of the University in the capacity of chairman, maintains overall policy supervision of the athletic program. In addition to the UK President, board officers include the Vice-President for Student Affairs as vice-chairman and Dr. W. L. Matthews in the capacity of secretary. Fourteen other men, drawn from the University faculty and the general public, also serve on the board as appointees of the president as does a student representative.

Supervising the steady growth and balanced development of the athletic program is Athletic Director Harry C. Lancaster.

MEMORIAL

Kentucky's athletic complex off Cooper Drive was named "The Bernie A. Shively Sports Center" in ceremonies last April 26 in memory of the distinguished Wildcat director of athletics who died of a heart attack at his home December 10, 1967.

Shively joined the Kentucky staff in 1927 as football line coach, following a brilliant athletic career at Illinois. An All-American as a blocking guard for Red Grange, he also was Big Ten heavyweight wrestling champion and a track standout.

In 1933, he was appointed head of the UK Physical Education Department, and five years later became director of athletics. He continued coaching until 1946, handling football, track and baseball at various times.

Under his leadership, Kentucky greatly expanded and improved its physical facilities and developed a fine athletic program.



HARRY C. LANCASTER Director Of Athletics

The appointment of Harry C. Lancaster as director of athletics at the University of Kentucky last December was hailed as a most appropriate move, as well as a fitting reward for a person who has given more than a quarter century of dedicated service to the University.

Furthermore, there was no doubt that Lancaster was fully capable of filling the vacancy left by the death of longtime director of athletics Bernie A. Shively.

One of the first big tasks facing Lancaster after he was named acting director of athletics Sept. 1 was picking up the reins of administrative leadership, which he did with ease, thanks to the respect of colleagues, players, associates and persons with whom he had come in contact during a long and productive career of coaching and teaching.

The next challenge was to obtain a football coach to replace Charlie Bradshaw, who resigned unexpectedly. Lancaster and his screening committee worked long and hard to come up with a choice—John Ray—which stirred the imagination of people throughout Kentucky.

Lancaster kept expanding beyond his role as nationally known assistant to basketball's winningest coach Adolph Rupp and near season's end turned over the Wildcat freshman coaching reins to Joe Hall and announced he would step down as assistant coach, thus ending one of the most successful coaching combinations in the nation.

His association with Rupp began after he was discharged from the U.S. Navy as a lieutenant (sg) in 1946 and has been one of mutual respect and harmony. Rupp, who always prides himself as one who "surrounds myself with the best people for the job at hand," made Lancaster a full assistant in 1948. During the two previous years, the youthful veteran had busied himself by serving as part-time assistant while carrying on teaching duties and studying for a master's degree.

The dual duties, plus extra studies, were second nature to Lancaster, who had served as assistant football and basketball coach at Georgetown College (1932-33) and Paris High School (1933-34), head basketball coach at Bagdad High School (1934-36) and principal and coach at Gleneyrie High School (1936-42) and physical education instructor at UK in 1942. He was to continue that trend of carrying extra loads, serving as UK's baseball coach for 17 seasons prior to relinquishing the post following the 1965 campaign and teaching a physical education class during the past 18 years.


Basketball was his forte, however, and he became recognized as one of the game's master strategists and designer of offenses and defenses to fit certain situations. In addition to coaching Rupp's freshman teams, he has always been at the side of the "baron" during the heat of battle. In his own right, Lancaster has traveled extensively and received a signal honor when he was invited to prepare the Greek National Basketball Team for the 1968 Olympics. A six-week tour in Athens was cancelled when Lancaster was asked to stay home and serve as acting athletics chief of staff.

Traveled To Greece In 1951

Lancaster had traveled to Greece in the summer of 1951 on a special athletic assignment for the U.S. State Department. The mission called for him to act as an advisor to Greek Basketball Federation officials in Olympic procedures and other matters. He also conducted numerous clinics and coaching schools and gave public lectures on the cage sport. During the summer of 1962, he helped Coach Rupp conduct clinics for Army personnel in the Far East Theater and worked with Rupp on the team's Middle East Tour in 1966 and a clinic in Germany in the summer of 1967.

It is ironic that Lancaster gained greatest fame in basketball, since he always considered himself a better football player. He was an all-conference halfback for three straight years and captain during his last two seasons at Georgetown College and also played semi-pro ball in Louisville and Cincinnati. His success on the basketball court was equally great, however, as he earned three all-conference nominations and two team captaincies. As a coach, he has guided Kentucky yearlings to 204 victories, against only 57 losses, against formidable competition that included the more elite junior college clubs and top-notch service teams during the past 18 seasons. He posted respectable records as a baseball coach and gave the school its winningest seasons in history by posting identical 18-8 marks in 1959-1960.

A native of Paris, Ky., Lancaster attended Paris High School, where he lettered in football, basketball and baseball under Coach Blanton Collier. At Georgetown College, he was president of Kappa Alpha Social Fraternity and the Student Body during his senior year.



JOHN RAY ARRIVES

Coach John Ray brings to the University of Kentucky a record of winning, a reputation as one of the top football minds in the business and a three-fold goal: Get UK in the Top Ten national ranking, win the Southeastern Conference and participate in a bowl game.

A unanimous choice of the screening committee assigned the task of finding

a replacement for Charlie Bradshaw, Ray gave up a prime job to accept the Wildcat challenge.

As assistant head football coach at Notre Dame University, he was co-ordinator of and solely responsible for the defense; advisor to head coach Ara Parseghian as to offense and generally responsible for squad management and recruiting.

A native of South Bend, Ray graduated from John Adams High School in June 1944 and was a regular center three months later at Notre Dame.

He joined the paratroopers, served in the Pacific and returned to Notre Dame in time for spring practice in 1947. A look at Bill Walsh, George Strohmeyer and other center candidates convinced Ray to leave town again.

He transferred to Olivet College in Michigan, where he played three seasons of football and also was afforded an opportunity to be a student assistant on the coaching staff of Frank Ham, who had moved up from John Adams High.

Ray received his bachelor's degree in history at Olivet and then coached in Michigan for five years, first at Three Rivers and then at Sturgis High School. He gave Sturgis its first state championship team.

Ray became an assistant at the University of Detroit for four years and then assumed the position of head coach at John Carroll University in Cleveland.

As head coach at John Carroll from 1959-63, he put together a very successful small college program (29 wins and six losses) and set several national records in defense, putting together his tactical methods of offense and defense which brought recognition in national coaching circles.

Ray was at John Carroll in 1964 when Parseghian was brought to Notre Dame from Northwestern. Parseghian chose Ray as his chief defensive assistant and persuaded the South Bend native to leave his head coaching position at John Carroll. Ray was one of three members of the Notre Dame coaching staff involved from the beginning in the Notre Dame string of five highly successful seasons.

He was responsible for the defense that held O. J. Simpson to 55 net yards rushing in the final game of last season against Southern California.

Immediately after arriving in the Blue Grass, Ray promised Kentuckians they would be pleased and surprised at his coaching staff. He then proceeded to recruit outstanding assistants from such places as Bucknell, Michigan, Navy, Connecticut and Notre Dame.

The next move was to "paint up, fix up" football offices in the Coliseum and Sports Center. Beautiful indoor-outdoor carpeting was added to the Center, along with other improvements.

Ray also fulfilled speaking engagements throughout Kentucky and in other states and sparked an enthusiasm which was evidenced best by advance ticket sales to Wildcat games.

A member of the Catholic Church, he received his Master's Degree from the University of Michigan in educational guidance and counseling. Ray is married to the former Barbara Fuller of Muncie, Ind. They have four children: Jeff (born in 1954), Kathy (1956), Debora (1958) and Chris (1960).

Prof. A. M. Miller, who became Kentucky's first football coach in 1892, was chosen because he had learned about the game from sideline observations while a student at Princeton. His only previous coaching experience was at a girls' school in Pennsylvania.

WILDCAT COACHING STAFF



FRANK HAM Administrative Assistant

Ham brings to Kentucky a fine record as a coach and administrator. He began his coaching career as an assistant at John Adams High in South Bend, Ind., where John Ray was a member of the squad. Ham later coached Ray at Olivet College in Michigan. A native of Scranton, Ham graduated from high school at Niles, Mich., and completed his undergraduate work at Olivet. He did graduate work at Indiana University and coached football and track at John Adams in 1941-43. He was football and basketball coach at Niles in 1944-46 and then

returned to Olivet as athletic director and football and basketball coach. He gave up duties as athletic director in 1952 to become assistant to the president, with responsibilities primarily in public and alumni relations. He "worked into" a Chevrolet agency in Cassopolis in 1954 and sold the agency last year. His duties include co-ordinating recruiting efforts and handling personal matters for Coach Ray.



GEORGE SEFCIK

Co-Ordinator of Offense

An all-around athlete, Sefcik entered Notre Dame in 1958 and, until graduation in 1962, earned five monograms. He played left halfback from 1959 through 1961, gaining 789 yards for a 4.8 yard per carry average and also caught 21 passes for 367 yards. He averaged 35.8 yards on 52 punts and was a top defensive halfback, making 98 tackles, breaking up 16 passes and intercepting eight. He earned his other two monograms in baseball as a second baseman in 1961-62 and his .367 average led the team. Prior to entering Notre Dame, he at-

tended Benedictine High School in his native Cleveland where he competed in track, basketball, baseball and football. After graduation from Notre Dame, he worked under present Irish assistant Joe Yonto at Notre Dame High School in Niles, Ill. He returned to his alma mater in 1964 to continue work on a master's degree in education while a member of the staff of Coach Hugh Devore. Born Dec. 27, 1939, he married the former Linda Sabo, also of Cleveland. They have three children: Lynette, 6, George Allen, 5, and Joe David, 4.





DENNIS FITZGERALD

Co-Ordinator of Defense

Developer of all-conference linemen at the University of Michigan, Fitzgerald is recognized as an outstanding young man in the profession. A native of Ann Arbor, he is a graduate of St. Thomas High School in Ann Arbor, where he lettered in three sports before serving three years in the Marine Corps (1954-57). He earned two varsity letters as a halfback at Michigan and was named most valuable player his senior year. He also lettered three years in wrestling and was team captain his junior and senior years. He partic pated in the Pan Ameri-

can Games in wrestling and went to the world championships in Europe in 1963. Fitzgerald is married to the former Miss Elizabeth McGovern of Ann Arbor. They have four children, Timothy, 5, Laureen, 4, Eileen, 3, and Molly, 2.







Named the most outstanding athlete in the State of Florida for the past half-century, Campbell was recommended to John Ray by such outstanding coaches as Hank Stram of the Kansas City Chiefs and Jim Dooley of the Chicago Bears. A native of New Jersey, he was All-State in football, basketball and baseball at Caldwell High and was team captain in each sport. He earned 16 letters at the University of Miami, where he was voted most outstanding athlete three years in a row as well as being named most outstanding athlete in the history of the

school. Playing both offense and defense, he set school records for most passes intercepted and most touchdowns scored and was named to Coach Andy Gustafson's All-Time defensive team. He was honorable mention All-America in football, team captain and All-SIAA Tournament in basketball and holder of the school career scoring record of 1,400 points which was broken by Rick Barry. He coached defensive backs five years at Jackson High in Miami, where he was also head basketball coach one year with a record of 20-6. Coached freshmen at Miami two years before moving to varsity; also coached baseball team to 121-35 record. Coached over-all defense three years at Montana, where he also coached baseball team to 16-6 record. Joined Naval Academy staff as coach of offensive receivers in 1967 and headed defense last year.

CARROLL HUNTRESS Offensive Line Coach



A graduate of the University of New Hampshire, Huntress starred in football, lacrosse and track and was captain of lacrosse and All-America in the sport. He was fullback on a football squad which had a 27-2-1 record, including an undefeated season, in his three varsity years. He also ran dashes and hurdles for the track team. He came to Kentucky from Bucknell, where he had two years remaining on his contract. During his first year there, he molded a graduation-depleted squad into an exciting team which gave Bucknell its first conference cham-

pionship. Huntress was named Pennsylvania College Coach-of-the-Year for that feat. His 1967 team finished third and his 1966 team second in the conference. Last year, the Bisons lost the championship to Deleware in the final game of the season. Huntress attended Thornton Academy in his home town of Saco, Maine, and served a hitch in the Marines, earning battle stars for Tarawa, Kwajalein, Saipan and Okinawa in World War II. He had coaching duty at Mechanic Falls (Maine) High (1 year), Portland High (10 years) and was an assistant at Maryland from 1960-1964.

DAVE ADOLPH Assistant Offensive Line



A native of Akron, Adolph served three years as offensive line coach and one year as defensive coordinator at the University of Connecticut. He lettered in football and baseball at Mogador High in Akron and then attended the University of Akron, where he was team captain two years, earning All-Ohio Conference honors and named outstanding lineman his senior year (1958). He served as a lieutenant in the Air Force from 1959 to 1962 and was selected All-Air Force guard in 1960.

Adolph began his coaching career at Shaw High in East Cleveland and joined Akron as offensive line coach the following year. He served Akron two years before going to Connecticut. He is married to the former Miss Julianne Drake. They have two sons, Mike, 6 and Mark, 5.





The appointment of K-Letterman Cain completed the staff of Coach Ray and fulfilled his aim of adding an outstanding Kentucky high school coach. Cain, who compiled a 57-13-1 record at Seneca High, is a native of Cumberland and a three-letter winner at UK, where he was an end. He was an All-State fullback and an All-America selection at Cumberland High and was All-Academic selection at UK. Cain served as an assistant at Waggener High in Louisville before assuming the Seneca responsibility in 1962. He was named Coach of

the Year (AAA) after his Redskins won the 1966 state championship. He is married to the former Miss Phyllis Hall of Whitesburg. They have three children—Ronda Ann, Ronnie and Patricia.

JIM POYNTER Freshman Coach



Former Kentucky Wildcat fullback Jim Poynter joined the football coaching staff of his alma mater following the 1965 season and brought with him credentials as one of the state's most promising young mentors. In five seasons in the high school ranks, he directed his teams to a composite record of 40-10-1. A native of Danville, Ky., he lettered two years as a fullback under Coach Blanton Collier. He capped a sterling career in 1960 by winning the Lexington Salesmen's Club award as UK's best defensive back and was cited as a member of the

All-America Blocking Team the same year. Upon graduation from UK, Poynter took over as head coach at Glasgow (Ky.) High and gave the school its first winning team in 10 years. His two-year record was 12-8. In 1963, he moved to Clark County (Ky.) High where his teams won 17 games, lost only two and tied one in two seasons. The Cardinals copped a league title in '63 and tied for the top spot the following season. Another move prior to the 1965 season brought him to Lexington Henry Clay High and he proceeded to direct the Blue Devils to a perfect, 11-0-0 record. Henry Clay took the league championship on the strength of its first unblemished record in history and Poynter was honored as "Coach of the Year" in the Central Kentucky Conference. Jim is married to the former Gale Foster of Danville and they have two sons—Darrell 11 and Barry 8.

JIM STUBBLEFIELD Academic Advisor



A native of Louisville, Stubblefield lettered in basketball, football, baseball and track at Mt. Healthy High in Cincinnati. He attended Ohio University on a basketball scholarship but was injured his freshman year and dropped out. He finished undergraduate work at UK and expected to get his M.A. in guidance and counseling by August 1969. "Stubby" coached basketball and football at Tell City, Indiana, in 1962 after serving a year as a graduate trainer on Coach Adolph Rupp's staff. While at UK, he was a member of ODK, national educa-

tional honorary society, and Lamp and Cross, and was president of Sigma Chi and student director of intramurals. He coached basketball two seasons (1962-63, '63-64) at Millersburg Military Academy, entered business for two years and then returned to UK in 1967.

CHRIS PATRICK





A Tennessee native (Fayetteville), Patrick took over as head football trainer in March 1967. A graduate of the University of Tennessee and Eastern Kentucky University (MA 1963), he has an extensive background in training dating from his student days in 1957. From 1957 to early 1961, he was an assistant trainer for the Vols on a part-time basis. During a six-months military stint that followed, he was assigned to the Army Medical School in Texas. After his tour of duty, Patrick started work on his master's degree at Eastern and

simultaneously served as head trainer for all sports. He also worked one season as an assistant football coach at Erlanger-Lloyd High School in northern Kentucky. After graduation from Eastern, he spent some time at Furman University and then in 1964 joined Florida State as associate trainer. In 1965, the travelling trainer switched to Mississippi State—the post from which he transferred to Kentucky. During three years with the Bulldogs, Patrick also lectured at football clinics and authored technical articles. Last December, he served as head trainer of the Grays in the annual Blue-Gray Game in Montgomery, Ala. He was married last December to the former Miss Rita Lancaster of Versailles.

SERIES HISTORY: Eight interesting games, spread over a span of 70 years, make up the colorful series history of the Kentucky-Indiana rivalry. When the two clubs resumed relations in 1967 after a 40-year lapse, the visiting Wildcats completely dominated the game at Bloomington for 38 minutes, but then fell by two points in a series which now stands 5-2-1 in favor of the Hoosiers. Indiana built its current edge with success in each of the last four outings. Kentucky's last victory came in the opening game of an abbreviated (cut short by flu epidemic) season of 1918. The Wildcats' only other win was a 12-0 decision on the first visit to Bloomington in 1904.

LAST MEETING: Sept. 23, 1967 (Bloomington) IU 12, UK 10—Roger Gann put the Wildcats on the scoreboard with a 56-yard scoring run on a pitchout from Dicky Lyons on the eighth play from scrimmage and David Weld added the extra point and then a field goal in the second quarter. The Hoosiers broke the UK defense open with two long plays—a pass for 42 yards and a run for 63, each setting up a touchdown. The winning score came on the third play of the fourth quarter. Harry Gonso fired from the 23 and safety Bob Abbott leaped and hit the ball, which flipped upward and into the arms of secondary receiver Al Gage. The Hoosiers had scored in the third quarter of a one-yard pass from Gonso to Jade Butcher. The drive got its impetus on a screen from Gonso to John Isenbarger, who ran 43 yards to UK 18. Gonso passed to Eric Stolberg on the nine and then carried eight yards to the one.

1969 OUTLOOK: The new Indiana, to which optimism has become a way of life, has substantial grounds for confidence in 1969. Returning virtually intact is the greatest offensive team in Hoosier nistory—a unit which ran more plays (800) and gained more yards (3850) than any of its Cream and Crimson predecessors, meanwhile scoring an average of 25 points a game. If there is a cloud on the horizon, it's the uncertainty of the defense. Where the offense loses only two starters, the defense loses five. The major rebuilding has to do with the defense, which last fall allowed opponents an average of 377 yards and 26.2 points per game.

SERIES HISTORY: A strange sequence of upsets and near-upsets flavors the comparatively young, but colorful and intense rivalry between the Wildcats and Ole Miss. Twenty-three meetings have been held since the series started in 1944, but it was 1958 before the Rebels could claim a distinctive edge in the battling. The Wildcats got the series off to an auspicious start by winning the first game, but Mississippi took the decision in three out of the next four meetings. The fireworks really started in 1949 as Kentucky claimed a 47-0 upset in Oxford and started on the road to big-time prominence. Since then, the Kentucky game has been a "make or break" situation on the Rebels' schedule. The 1954 meeting in Memphis was a penalty-marred spectacle resulting in several conference records for violations that still stand. In 1955, UK added new fire to the "beat the favorite" series history by upending the defending SEC champs in Lexington for their only loss enroute to a second straight title and Cotton Bowl win. Ole Miss achieved a measure of revenge by winning the next eight in a row. UK extended the SEC "Team of the Decade" nine years ago by forcing a long field goal and a freakish, 51-yard quarterback sneak TD in final seconds for a 16-0 decision. In 1964 and 1965 seasons, Kentucky mustered monumental upsets over the Rebels with the benefit of unexpected big plays.

LAST MEETING: Sept. 29, 1968 (Jackson) UM 30, UK 14—The Wildcats held a 14-10 lead after three quarters and seemed en route to their second win in as many games. Perry King punted early in the fourth quarter and Kentucky's Dicky Lyons scooped up the ball but couldn't control it. Mississippi recovered on the UK 31. Two plays later, sophomore quarterback Archie Manning raced 20 yards for the go-ahead touchdown. The play came with 13:39 remaining and Ole Miss dominated the rest of the way, picking up an insurance TD a short while later when Glenn Cannon picked off a Stan Forston aerial on a second and 21 play and scored from the 26. A short time later, Bob Bailey intercepted a Forston pass and returned 14 yards for the final score. Kentucky and Forston had looked good in the first half, scoring the first touchdown with 9:42 showing as Lyons plunged the final one to cap a 54-yard drive. A 56-yard pass from Forcton to Joe Jacobs on a third and 20 play put the Cats on the Ole Miss eight and in position for their second score. Ole Miss scored on a 21-yard field goal by King in the first quarter and a four-yard run by Steve Hindman in the second.

1969 OUTLOOK: Under the tutoring of John Vaught (170-51-12), the Rebels roll right along, with the 7-3-1 record of 1968 being climaxed with a 34-17 comeback victory over Va. Tech in the Liberty Bowl. With 16 starters back, 8 on offense and 8 on defense, the Rebels may roll smoother than any time since 1963 when they last won the SEC title. Academic All-American HB Steve Hindman, TE Hank Shows and C Jim Parkes are the starters lost on offense and LB Frank Trapp, Monster Robert Bailey and HB Bobby Garrigues on defense, Sophs Bob Knight, Jim Poole, Jr. and Dave Bridgers are likeliest to move into the offensive jobs, with senior Joe Blount, junior Bill VanDevender and junior Fred Farmer moving up on defense. Superb '68 soph QB Archie Manning is being challenged by Brent Chumbler. Floyd Franks, Vernon Studdard and Riley Myers are all fine receivers and Bo Bowen is a real power runer. The defense is solid with Ends Hap Farber and Dennis Coleman, tackles Buz Morrow and Claude Herard, with Larry Thomas breaking in at MG, Fred Brister at LB, HB Ray Heidel and All-SEC HB Glenn Cannon. Kicking is excellent with Punter Julian Fagan, SEC leader in '68 on 41.6 and PK Perry King, who hit a perfect 22 of 22 on PAT's. Vaught said last September he would enjoy coaching again with the group of sophomores he had. These lads may make him even happier in their junior year.

SERIES HISTORY: Former Southeastern Conference football "doormats," Kentucky and Auburn, first got together on the gridiron at Lexington in 1934—the year after the league was organized—and played another game the following season at Montgomery before interrupting their series for nearly two decades. Each held a victory out of the early meetings and the 1954 scrap, which resumed the rivalry, resulted in a 21-14 decision in the Wildcats' favor. Tilts between the new-found powers in the years since have been fraught with frustration. With but four exceptions (1959, 1964, 1967 and 1968) the annual clashes have seen neither influence a decisive change in the trend to close games. Kentucky walked away with a memorable 14-12 upset victory in 1961 on the Tigers' home ground where no Auburn eleven had been beaten in 30 straight games. Prior to the win, UK had been able to score on the stingy Plainsmen only once in five years.

LAST MEETING: Oct. 5, 1968 (Lexington) AU 26, UK 7—John Riley kicked Kentucky into submission, registering four field goals for a Southeastern Conference record. The 6-2 specialist connected from 22, 23, 47 and 30 yards under the Stoll Field lights. He also kicked two extra points for a total of 14 and kept the Wildcats at bay with booming kicks into the end zone. Dooming the Wildcats early was a surprise pass from Loran Carter to wingback Bresler, a blocked punt by Ron Yarbrough which gave Auburn a touchdown and Riley's superb kicking. Auburn set up Riley's first field goal with a 34-yard pass from Carter to Bresler that carried to Kentucky's 10. Yarbrough blocked Dave Hardt's punt a few plays later and grabbed the ball in the end zone. Kentucky scored on a fourth and seven play, with Dicky Lyons going over from the 10 in the second quarter.

1969 OUTLOOK: With Coach Ralph (Shug) Jordan (120-61-5) having his system cleansed of all signs of a malignancy during the winter to enter his 19th head coaching season at his best weight yet, Auburn has bright prospects this fall. The Tigers' defensive team returns intact, while the offense has only four starters back-WB Connie Frederick, Tackle Richard Cheek, Guard Johnny McDonald and Center Tom Banks. Sophomores Pat Sullivan, QB, and Terry Beasley, SE, may be called on to succeed Loran Carter (1487 yds. passing) and Tim Christian (623 yds. and 7 TDs receiving). Mickey Zofko (Jr.) and Mike Currier (Sr.) are qualified running backs, but a good tight end and other line blockers are needed. All-American Dave Campbell, T, and All-SEC players Mike Kolen, LB, and Buddy McClinton, Safety, lead this defense which dominated the Sun Bowl to strap Arizona 34-10. The kicking game is strong with punter Frederick, PKer John (Rat) Riley (5th in nation on scoring by kicking) and punt returner Don Webb all on hand. The scream of "War Eagle" will be heard loud and strong in '69, for this is the ablest Auburn squad since 1963, when they compiled a 9-1 regular season record and engaged a great Nebraska team in a 13-7 Orange Bowl thrilleroo. Key is the passing game with sophs in the saddle.

SERIES HISTORY: The Wildcats and Gobblers have fought on even terms (3-3-2) in a series which began Oct. 30, 1926, with a 13-13 standoff between Coach Fred Murphy's Wildcats and the visiting Virginians. Another meeting the following season, in the heyday of John Simms (Shipwreck) Kelly, saw UK emerge on the long end of a 20-6 count. Virginia Tech notched its first win over UK, 7-0, at Blacksburg in 1932 in a game that was to be the last in nine years. Meeting on neutral territory as the series resumed in the war years of 1941 and 1942, UK captured a high-scoring (37-14) decision at Louisville and then had to settle for a 21-21 tie at Roanoke. After another intermission (21 years), the series resumed with UK winning, 33-14, at Lexington.

LAST MEETING: Oct. 14, 1967 (Lexington) VPI 24, UK 14—The Gobblers piled up a 21-0 lead in the first half on the strength of great punting, ball-hawking and fine passing. Quarterback Dave Bair sparked a comeback that left the Wildcats behind, 21-14, after three quarters. An 18-yard field goal by Jon Utin solidified the triumph in the fourth quarter as Tech made it two in a row over UK and marked the first time since 1957 that the Wildcats had lost their first four games. UK's comeback emerged after the 'Cats held for downs on their 18. They scored in nine plays, with Bar tossing from the 17 to Phil Thompson in the end zone. The aroused UK defense stopped Tech and Bair went back to work, throwing to Joe Jacobs for 13 and then finding Jacobs behind the secondary for a pass which went 41 yards to paydirt. David Weld kicked the point.

1969 OUTLOOK: Virginia Tech, which surprised in 1968 with a 7-3 record and a Liberty Bowl berth, could be more formidable in '69. The Gobblers lost 15 seniors from the '68 squad but the biggest losses were in the defensive secondary where the Techmen will miss Don Davidson and Frank Beamer, both three-year lettermen, plus reserves Randy Treadwell (a sometimes starter) and Bill Skinner. That means that aside from rising junior safetyman Lenny Smith Tech will not have an ounce of experience among its deep backs. Heading Tech's list of 14 returning two-year lettermen will be All-America Linebacker Mike Widger. In all, Tech will have 26 monogram winners. Tech lettered nine straight sophomores last season, and the number could be higher in '69. Tech might well have two of the finest running backs in the land in fullback Ken Edwards and tailback Terry Smoot, and the Gobblers have the nucleus of an effective offensive line in strongside tackle Jerry Green, Guard Butch Hall, center Dave Bailey, and weakside tackle Preston Blackburn. The Techmen, whose perenially tough kicking game suffered somewhat of a letdown, at least in punt and kickoff coverage, due to a reduction in over-all team speed in '68, should have somewhat improved team speed in '69. And the talented toe of junior Jack Simcsak (punts, EPs, FGs and KOs) should be an enviable weapon.

SERIES HISTORY: Inaugurated with a game at Baton Rouge in 1949, the Kentucky-Louisiana State grid series is the youngest football rivalry within the Southeastern Conference. A total of 18 meetings make up the series which has been annual encounters with the exception of the 1951 season and the count now stands tipped in the Bengals' favor, 12 wins to five plus a 6-6 tie in 1953. The Billy Cannon-led Tigers, enjoying their greatest seasons during the 1957-59 period, overcame the Wildcats' 4-2-1 edge in the series by taking three straight decisions in these years. UK tied it up eight years ago with a 3-0 upset victory in Lexington and then nationally-ranked LSU survived determined bids for glory by the upstart 'Cats in the last seven seasons to notch successes that again gave it the lead. A new era in the rivalry dawned in 1962 with a pair of youthful ex-Wildcats at the grid helms of the respective schools, but the Tigers hold a seven straight game advantage.

LAST MEETING: Nov. 19, 1968 (Baton Rouge) LSU 13, UK 3—The Wildcats drove to the one-yard line once and the two-yard line twice, only to fall short of paydirt. They went ahead, 3-0, on a 20-yard field goal by Bobby Jones with six-minutes remaining in the first half and protected that lead until a penalty on a third and five play gave LSU the ball on the three. The Tigers needed two plays to get the first down and two more for the TD. LSU took the second half kickoff and drove 71 yards in 15 plays for the go-ahead touchdown. The Wildcats came right back with a 62-yard march which ended with a Stan Forston fumble on the two. Kentucky led in practically every statistical department, holding a 17-16 advantage in first downs, a 148-82 lead in passing and a 339-303 margin in total offense.

1969 OUTLOOK: L.S.U., with Coach Charley McClendon winning five of six bowl games and compiling a 52-20-4 record overall for his seven seasons to date, is consistently tough. Charley Mac's challenge for '69 is that of producing a new offense, since only three starters-QB Mike Hillman, Center Godfrey Zaunbreacher and Guard Tony Russell-return. Defensively he has six, of which LB Bill Anderson, MG Fred Michaelson and Tackle John Sage are outstanding. Five good running backs gone, all of them heroes in one game or another, Trigger Allen, Glenn Smith, Frank Matte, Ken Newfield and Murice LeBlanc. Only Jim West and Eddie Ray, both knee injury victims, return. Sophs Tommy Casanova and Chris Dantin can help. Hillman is an exciting OB, but the clutch receiver, Tommy Morel, is gone, along with the TE Bob Hamlett. Andy Hamilton and Jesse Truax, top frosh receivers of '68 are needed badly. The defensive sore spot is the secondary, where only Bill Norsworthy and Craig Burns have any experience. Soph Jim Wood could cut right in there. Punter Eddie Ray (39.6) and PK Mark Lumpkin (22 x 24) both return. The past two years the Tigers have proven the SEC's best bowl team, upsetting undefeated Wyoming 20-13 after the '67 season in the Sugar Bowl, then Florida State 31-17 after '68 in the Peach Bowl. LSU has no plan to revert to a schedule of ten games in 1969.

SERIES HISTORY: Georgia and Kentucky began their rivalry on the football field with a game at Louisville on Oct. 21, 1939. The two schools met almost annually from that time until the series was broken off after the 1949 game and not resumed until 1956 with a game at Athens. During the 22 years that Wally Butts tutored the Bulldogs (1938-60), Georgia laid claim to nine victories in the 14-game series. Kentucky took the initial game in 1939 and tied the following year, but it was 1947 before it picked up another win. All told, UK shows but five victories with the last in 1965. Despite Georgia's superiority, the series generally has been interesting as reflected by the fact that Butts' four SEC championship outfits managed an average win margin of only 11 points over Kentucky. Demonstrating the frustrating turn that the series has taken in recent years is the fact that only 15 points separated the two clubs in the five meetings preceding a 21-7 loss by Kentucky four years ago. In 1965, the Wildcats smacked Georgia with its worst defeat of the campaign—a 28-10 lacing representing the most points ever scored by UK in the series.

LAST MEETING: Nov. 26, 1968 (Lexington) UG 35, UK 14—The Wildcats went without a first down the entire first half and fell behind, 21-0. They came back to play the Bulldogs on even terms the second half as quarterback Dave Bair twice hit tailback Dicky Lyons with scoring passes. A 33-yard touchdown on a pass interception by safety Jake Scott in the first quarter put the Wildcats in a hole which they never escaped. Late in the game, Scott scored again as he intercepted a pass and returned 35 yards. Almost hopelessly behind, Kentucky got its first touchdown midway of the third quarter after guard David Roller recovered a fumble on the Georgia 44. Bair passed to Joe Jacobs for 23 yards and then connected for the game's most spectacular play to Lyons, who made an end zone catch as a Georgia defender leaped in vain for the ball. Three plays later, Kentucky struck again when faced with a third down-33 situation on its own eight. Bair, fading into the end zone, found Lyons open down the middle at the 25. Lyons needed only one block to go all the way.

1969 OUTLOOK: Georgia has won the SEC championship twice in the five years Vince Dooley (38-13-3) has served as head coach. From the 1968 champs much is lost, 20 lettermen, 12 of them starters, but much abides, 10 starters among 37 lettermen. Unanimous All-American Bill Stanfill (DT) and Jake Scott (S) and All-SEC players Billy Payne (DE) and Dave Rholetter (OT) are certain to be missed, but of the ten starters returning six are rated All-SEC material. Despite the loss of such men as FB Brad Johnson and HB Kent Lawrence, Dooley has two established runners (Bruce Kemp, 553 yds. in '68, and Steve Farnsworth, 335 yds.), a proven passer (Mike Cavan, 1619 yds. as a soph) and two excellent receivers (Chuck Whittemore, 40 for 608 yds., and Dennis Hughes, 26 for 491) as standards for developing an offense. Hughes is a '68 All-SEC while Center Tommy Lyons and the others are '69 candidates. Defensively, LB Happy Dicks is gone with the entire backfield. Guard Steve Greer and Tackle Lee Daniel are top-notchers returning, while LG Tommy Crouch leads a group of rugged sophomore linemen onto the varisty. Kicking is great with All-SEC punter Spike Jones and the SEC's No. 2 scorer-by-kicking, Jim McCullough, on hand. The Bulldogs, still smarting from the 16-2 Sugar Bowl lacing by Arkansas, will likely assert themselves early as a powerful team. If an adequate secondary is developed and sophomores can fill the gaps in the line, they may successfully defend their SEC title.

SERIES HISTORY: One of the oldest rivalries on the Kentucky grid schedule, relations between the Wildcats and Mountaineers date back to Nov. 4, 1905. In that first game at Morgantown, the visiting Wildcats absorbed a 45-0 licking that stands as the biggest advantage either team has enjoyed. The series was interrupted after that contest for 34 years, not resuming until West Virginia visited Lexington for a return engagement in 1939 and absorbed a 13-6 revenge licking. The two teams met annually after that (with the exception of 1943 when UK did not field a team) until the series was broken off again following a game at Morgantown in 1947. Kentucky holds the edge in the series, 9-4-1 and held the distinction of taking the last four decisions until West Virginia stopped the string with an upset victory at Morgantown in 1964 resuming the rivalry. Kentucky's 20-point decision in 1965 was the biggest UK victory in the series since 1944 and the third largest win margin by either team—exceeded only by WVU's 45-0 win in 1905 and UK's 40-9 score in 1944.

LAST MEETING: Oct. 29, 1968 (Morgantown) UK 35, WVU 16—The Wildcats scored first on a 22-yard pass from Dave Bair to Paul Martin, but were in danger the Mountaineers' sophomore quarterback took a snap from center on the UK and flipped a pass over the middle. UK's David Hunter picked the ball off some one two yards in the end zone and took off for the other end of Mountaineer Stadium. The 100-yard TD return tied existing UK records and gave the Wildcats a two-touchdown edge. The Wildcats proved most opportunistic before West Virginia's homecoming crowd, getting three of their touchdowns with Mountaineer help. On both its first and fourth TDs, Kentucky scored after being forced to punt. Personal foul and roughing the kicker penalties enabled the Wildcats to keep possession and in each instance go on to score. Late in the fourth period, West Virginia passed on fourth down deep in its own territory and Wilbur Hackett intercepted and ran back to the WVU eight where the final UK touchdown followed three plays later.

1969 OUTLOOK: The spotlight shifts to experience in 1969 as fourth year head coach Jim Carlen III welcomes back 27 lettermen from a squad that went 7-3 last season. Heading the list of returning monogram winners is the passing combination of Mike Sherwood and Oscar Patrick, which broke 14 school pass records last year. Sherwood was 14th in the nation in total offense (as a sophomore) and passed for a record high of 416 yards in the 38-15 romp over Pitt. Patrick finished 18th in the nation in pass receiving and caught 10 passes for 190 yards against Penn State to establish two records. Senior Ed Silverio, who gained 195 yards in the season finale against tough Syracuse, returns to lead a fleet of runners including junior fullback Jim Braxton and junior tailback Bob Gresham. All-America middleguard Carl Crennel and defensive tackle George Henshaw will lead a powerful defense which finds veterans returning at 10 of 11 positions. The Mountaineers' pass defense was ranked eighth in the nation last year and everyone is back to improve on that mark. A big void to fill will be that of graduated kicking specialist Ken Juskowich who led the team in scoring the past two years. Juskowich set a school record of 49 yards when he booted a field goal against Kentucky last year.

SERIES HISTORY: Vanderbilt ended a nine-year drought by defeating the Wildcats 6-0, on Stoll Field last year. The win gave the Commodores a 24-13-4 edge in a gridiron series which began way back in 1896 at Nashville and has been perpetuated intermittedly ever since with the result that it is one of the oldest in the South from the standpoint of first meeting and number of games. Vandy registered 12 shutouts in the first 26 years of the rivalry and UK did not get into the win column until 1939. However, the postwar record shows only five setbacks. Kentucky's 27-0 homecoming rout of the Commodores in 1960 ended a three-year trend to close games, but the rivalry got back in the groove in 1961 as UK struggled hard before taking a 16-3 decision. The 1962 contest proved almost a carbon copy of that game as UK just could not connect on all the scoring chances weak Vanderbilt offered and wound up taking only a 7-0 decision. The closeness trend was overemphasized to the degree that both clubs wound up scoreless in 1963 and only one point, (22-21) separated the pair in 1964 as Kentucky broke a four-game losing streak, but hungry UK blasted Vandy, 34-0 in 1965 and notched one of its three 1966 and one of its two 1967 wins at the Commodores' expense.

LAST MEETING: Nov. 10, 1968 (Lexington) UK O, VU 6-The Wildcats, held scoreless the first time in 23 games, gave up the ball seven times on fumbles and pass

interceptions as they lost their first game to the Commodores since 1959. Hampering the homecoming Wildcats before 29,000 fans was the loss of All-SEC back Dicky Lyons, who returned the opening kickoff 34 yards for an intercollegiate record of 2,199 but received a shoulder injury on the play. Vanderbilt also was handicapped by the absence of star sophomore quarterback Johnny Miller, who had a severely sprained thumb. The Commodores marched 54 yards in six plays to score the game's only touchdown in the second quarter. Dave Strong, a wingback filling in for Miller, moved the ball into scoring position with a pair of key passes to 236-pound tight end Karl Weiss for gains of 29 and 11 yards, plus a vital play on which pass interference was ruled against UK. The Commodores gained 20 yards to UK's nine yard line on the call. Strong then hit off right tackle for six and scored at left tackle from the three.

1969 OUTLOOK: Vanderbilt returned to winning football (5-4-1 in '68) in just two seasons under Coach Bill Pace (7-11-2). The Commodores like the fresh air and intend to stay with it. Pace has 15 starters from his spirited '68 squad, 7 offense and 8 defense, plus a Freshman team which won all five games for the first time in modern history.All-American LB Chip Healy will be missed, along with DE Mike Giltner, FB Rex Raines and all-around back Chuck Boyd. QB John Miller (1,197 total offense), TB Allan Spear (438 yds.) and WB Dave Strong (7 TDs) return, however, along with Ends Curt Chesley (48 catches for 543 yds.) and Karl Weiss and Tackle Bob Asher as offensive standouts. Of the 8 defensive starters back Tackle John Robinson, MG Bill McDonald and backs Doug Mathews and Neal Sm'th are all quite accomplished. Soph backs Watson Brown and Dwight Blair will help the offense, as will Center Sandy Haury and Receiver Gary Chesley, Curt's younger brother. The Commodores are ready to square off against anyone after starting '68 with an upset of Army (17-13) and finishing with an old-fashioned struggle with Tennessee, though losing 10-7. Don't be surprised if their '69 record moves solidly past the .500 mark.

SERIES HISTORY: The Wildcats have enjoyed things pretty much their own way over the years of the grid rivalry with Florida, posting an advantage of 12 wins to the Gators' seven in the 19 contests played since the series started with a 52-0 shellacking administered to Florida in the final game of the 1917 campaign. The Sunshine Staters could manage only a pair of victories prior to 1952, but the outcomes since then have been less one-sided. In the first four years (1952-55), the two schools each produced two winning efforts—oddly enough the even year encounters (1952-1954) were Gator victories while Kentucky took its decisions on the odd years. This aspect of the strange trend of the series came to a halt with the UK success in 1956. But another unusual angle developed as a field goal with only seconds remaining played a vital part in the Wildcat wins. In 1955, a scant 23 seconds remained when Delmar Hughes, a quarterback sidelined earlier in the contest by a broken nose,

came off the bench to kick a successful 20-yard field goal that gave UK a 10-7 decision. A year later, tackle Lou Michaels booted a rain-soaked ball 34 yards to put the Wildcats in front to stay. This time, only two seconds remained before the end of the first half.

LAST MEETING: Nov. 16, 1968 (Lexington) UF 16 UK 14—Kentucky's hopes of upsetting the Gators fell on four key forward pass plays. Two Wildcat passes were vital in touchdown marches while two others were intercepted to end scoring threats. The Gators went ahead, 10-0, on a two-yard run by Larry Rentz and a 22-yard field goal by Jim Youngblood. Jack Mathews recovered a fumble on UK's 44 and David Bair moved the 'Cats into good position with the help of a 19-yard pass to Phil Thompson, a 14-yarder to Vic King and a 25-yard advance on a pass interference. With first and goal, Bair's pass was intercepted in the end zone by Skip Albury with 26 seconds left in the half. The other killer pass came in the final quarter when the Gators were in front, 16-14. This time David Roller placed UK on the offensive by recovering a fumble on Florida's 26. On third down, Albury again intercepted and returned 38 yards.

1969 OUTLOOK: Florida Coach Ray Graves (61-30-3) has only the defensive secondary returning in strength from the '68 squad which was classified as disappointing despite a 6-3-1 record, considerably better than the all-time Gator average. Gone is the running game, with All-American Larry Smith and partner Tom Christian, which accounted for the victories last year, QB Larry Rentz and most of the offensive line, including AA Guy Dennis. Graves is basing rebuilding on the veteran linebackers—Tom Abdelnour, Dave Ghesquire and Mike Kelley—and defensive backs Steve Tannen, Ted Hager, Mark Ely and Skip Albury. Tannen is AA calibre. Some of these backs may move to offense, as receivers, however. An injury-free Jackie Eckdahl at QB could be a leader of the new offense in his senior season. Jerry Vineset (Jr.) is a hard runner and Soph Tommy Durrance may be a strong one. Soph Carlos Alvarez is an exciting receiver and Soph QB John Reaves will get some action. The '68 Gators were vastly overrated in the pre-season polls, being touted for the SEC championship and finishing sixth. Because of this it will be very easy to underrate them in '69.

SERIES HISTORY: Among the oldest football rivalries in the nation, the Kentucky-Tennessee series dates from a memorable encounter in Knoxville 75 years ago. In that meeting, Oct. 21, 1893, the Wildcats annexed a 60-0 victory to get the warfare off to an auspicious start in a fashion that hasn't been equalled in the many and colorful renewals of the traditional rivalry. Except for three war years (1917-18 and 1943), the two schools have met annually on the gridiron with the result that the Vols hold a distinct edge of 36 wins to Kentucky's 19 and nine ties. Tennessee's sparkling advantage has become tarnished in the past few seasons as Kennessee's sparkling advantage has become tarnished in the past few seasons

tucky started reversing the victory trend with an upsetting tie in 1952 and ate into the Vol's polished record with successes in eight of the last 16 meetings. The seniors on the 1955 UK squad became the first class in 43 years to graduate with the accomplishment of never playing in a game in which the Vols emerged victorious and they bowed out in a blaze of glory, triumphing 23-0 over the bowl-hungry Vols in the most one-sided Kentucky win since 1935. Tennessee took the 1961 meeting for its first victory in five years, but UK's courageous "Thin Thirty" fought back to win a 12-10 squeaker in 1962. The Vols caught Kentucky in a let down four seasons back to annex a 19-0 decision, but Kentucky capped a strange 1964 campaign in glorious fashion by capturing a hard-fought, 12-7 victory over the equally-inconsistent Tennesseeans. Without passing star Rick Norton, injured the week before in the Houston game, Kentucky could not cope with the Vols in '65 and dropped a 19-3 decision.

Since 1925, the two schools have stimulated their grid rivalry with a rotating trophy-a battered old beer barrel. Many shenanigans on the part of the rival student bodies have added to the color of the series. Following the 1953 UK win, disgruntled Tennessee students raided the Kentucky campus and "kegnapped" the barrel-holding it until persuaded to return it by threats of reprisal against their coon dog mascot, Smoky. In 1955, UK students visited the Tennessee campus hiding place of Smoky and "dognapped" him. UT students promptly retaliated by painting up the Kentucky campus in a surprise raid and carting away "Colonel," UK's stuffed wildcat mascot. A trade was engineered at the '55 game. For a couple of years, things were comparatively quiet. Then the stunts erupted again in 1958 as Vol students caught a guard "napping" and slipped away with UK's stuffed Wildcat. Despite promises to return it at halftime of a nationally-televised basketball game, the mascot wasn't given back until nearly four months later. A post-game sidelight to Kentucky's victory in 1959 saw a strange calm shattered by rioting UK students protesting a faculty refusal to reward the win with a traditional pre-Thanksgiving holiday. Up to 5,000 demonstrators and onlookers carried on for about four and one-half hours, marching on the UK president's home and setting a bonfire at a main intersection in downtown Lexington. The famed beer barrel, which had remained in hiding during "Tennessee week" in 1960, came up missing almost four months later under unusual circumstances. Vanderbilt students "kegnapped" the trophy in a surprise attempt to gain support of Vol fans for the Commodores' basketball team which was meeting the Wildcats in Knoxville in a playoff for an NCAA Tournament berth. The stunt backfired, however, as UK won. Embarrassed Vandy students did not return the trophy until several months later. Eight years ago, another chapter was added to the keg's history as two UK freshman players forgot to bring the barrel to the game and the Vols left town without claiming it. Kentucky sent the keg on to Knoxville later. Since then, a strange calm has surrounded the old beer barrel.

LAST MEETING: Nov. 23, 1968 (Knoxville) UT 24, UK 7—Injury burdened Kentucky battled superior odds before 60,899 Neyland Stadium fans before falling to Cotton Bowl-bound Tennessee. The Wildcats knocked the Vols back on their heels for almost half the game, building a 7-0 lead in the first period on a 17-play march that carried the ball 93 yards for a touchdown. Then, near the end of the second period, Tennessee struck for two touchdowns within 3½ minutes on the passing of quarterback Bubba Wyche. The Vols added a field goal in the third period and a concluding touchdown, again on Wyche's passing, in the fourth quarter to wrap up the victory. "Kentucky's drive was the finest any team has had all year against us," Vol Coach Doug Dickey said.

1969 OUTLOOK: Tennessee under Coach Doug Dickey (37-13-4) won the SEC championship in 1967 then finished second in '68. Despite the loss of 12 starters, including the entire offensive backfield, and the 36-13 Cotton Bowl loss to Texas, the Volunteers plan to run right up front again in '69. QB Bubba Wyche, TB Richmond

Flowers, WB Bill Baker and All-SEC FB Richard Pickens are all gone, along with All-Americans OG Charley Rosenfelder and DB Jim Weatherfo I. Some sharp starters are back, however: Ends Ken Delong and Gary Kreis and Center Chip Kell on offense, with All-SEC LB Steve Kiner, partner Jack Reynolds and HB Bill Young on defense. Junior Bobby Scott will QB the new Volunteer backfield with Lester McClain at WB and George Silvey, Lanny Pearce, Bobby Patterson and soph Curt Watson scrapping for the running jobs. Two tackles and a guard are needed in the offensive line with Don Denbo and Kell. On defense two ends and a tackle are needed to work with Frank Yanossy and MG James Woody, plus a MM and a HB with Young and Safety Mike Jones. Punter Weaver (40.4) returns, but PK Karl Kremser, whose SEC record 53-yd. FG provided the edge over Alabama, graduates. The Vols may start somewhat slower this year, but by mid-season they will jell and assume their normal position as the team one must beat when shooting for the championship.

KENTUCKY OUTLOOK FOR 1969

A new look in the football coaching staff has meant a new look in other ways for the University of Kentucky Wildcats.

Coach John Ray, former assistant head coach at Notre Dame, brings to the Blue Grass two decades of experience as one of the nation's finest defensive coaches.

He installed during spring practice the defense he developed at John Carroll University, where national defensive records were set during his tenure, and also gave the Wildcat offense a new look.

Living up to his credentials as a high school All-America was Roger Gann, a senior tailback whose spring play earned him the Cecil New award as best back.

Other winners of the New offensive awards were junior lineman Dave Hanson, senior receiver (end) Phil Thompson and center Danny Neal, most improved.

Ray instituted a total of eight awards. In addition to the New awards, defensive honors were accorded in the name of the late Greg Page to: Lineman—tackle Dave Markem; Linebacker—Wilbur Hackett; Back—Paul Martin; Most Improved—back David Van Meter.

Markem and Van Meter are two of several good sophomores, including line-backer Joe Federspiel and defensive back Joe Stephan. Hackett and Martin lettered last year as sophomores.

Thompson, leading Wildcat receiver the past two seasons, was a favorite target of junior Stan Forston and sophomore Bernie Scruggs.

Forston and Scruggs, held out of competition last season, were alternating at quarterback when Forston received a head injury in a freak collision with a goal post and was out of action a week during spring drills.

Scruggs then received an ankle injury prior to the Blue-White game and Forston did most quarterbacking for the Blues.

In addition to Gann, Forston, Thompson, Hackett, Martin and Hanson, several other familiar names grace the Wildcat roster.

David Roller, an All-SEC sophomore team member at middle guard last year, is now playing at defensive end. David Bair, who has drawn quarterback starting assignments at various times the past two years, has been converted to a split end-halfback while Raynard Makin is now a split end instead of fullback.

Doyle King is back in the defensive line with Mike Boulware, both seniors, while Don Holland and Chuck Blackburn are rounding out their careers back of the defensive line.

Bill Duke has converted from defense to fullback for his senior year while classmate Don Holland is back in the defensive secondary.

Missing in spring practice due to disciplinary action were defensive end Dick Palmer, most valuable player last year, and starting linebacker Cary Shahid. They were to try again this fall.

The offense will have junior Pat Eckenrod challenged at center by Neal.

Joe Jacobs returns with Gann and Duke to give the Wildcats a three-fourths senior backfield as starters.

Dave Hardt, who received a hairline fracture in the ankle and missed most of spring practice, is back at tight end with Makin and sophomore Tom Crowe.

STOLL FIELD - McLEAN STADIUM

Much confusion among the general public and the sports-writing fraternity apparently exists over a seeming duplication of titles in referring to the University of Kentucky's football setup along "Avenue of Champions."

Officially, by action of the University Board of Trustees, the general area encompassing the playing field is known as "Stoll Field." Likewise by authority of the same body, the stadium proper is known as "McLean Stadium."

Kentucky's first football field, occupying the general site of what is now an intramural field west of the stadium, was first given a name when it was dedicated on October 14, 1916, as Stoll Field in honor of the late Judge Richard C. Stoll, prominent alumnus, trustee and benefactor of the University of Kentucky. Soon after the first sections of the present concrete stadium were completed on September 4, 1924, the new field site and stadium were likewise officially known as Stoll Field.

The first attraction to be held on the new Stoll Field was a football game with the University of Louisville on October 4, 1924. A gridiron clash between Kentucky and the then-powerful Centre College team was the first game played in the fully-completed stadium on November 1, 1924.

The later reference to the concrete stands as "McLean Stadium" has existed since November 1, 1924, when the stadium was officially dedicated in memory of Price Innes McLean and a bronze plaque placed in the south stands by the Class of 1925. McLean, regular center on the 1923 Kentucky football squad, died November 7, 1923, as the result of injuries sustained in the U.K. Cincinnati game played in the Queen City the afternoon before.

Major expansions of McLean Stadium in 1948, 1949 and 1959 have resulted in a current over-all seating capacity of approximately 37,500. The latest construction installed 3,655 new permanent box seats at a cost of \$115,000 and increased capacity by 1,629. New-type, "iodized" lights were installed in 1961.

A complete "face lifting" was accomplished on Stoll Field during the spring of 1962 at a cost of several thousand dollars. In the interest of preparing a durable turf that will eliminate the almost annual resodding process, a complete new drainage system was installed and tons of specially mixed topsoil hauled in to replace the existing hardpan. The project also raised the crown of the playing surface for better visibility by spectators. With the special strain of Bermuda grass thriving to an extent never before seen at Kentucky, the Wildcats now entertain foes on one of the best football fields in the nation.

New practice facilities were prepared in 1960 for the football Wildcats on the University farm. As part of a \$320,000 Sports Center, the varsity and freshman gridders now practice on an area equivalent to five football fields in size. Along with the new field, they have space in a modern dressing room building—making a facility recognized as one of the best in the nation.



STOLL FIELD 'COW PASTURE' BIRTHPLACE OF DIXIE FOOTBALL

* * * *

University of Kentucky's campus boasts the distinction of serving as the birthplace of Dixie football. Ironically, however, the forerunners of the present day Wildcats were not involved in the early grid contest.

The first inter-collegiate football game ever played in the South, and probably the first to take place west of the Alleghanies, came about April 9, 1880, on old Stoll Field. This gridiron, located adjacent to the present U.K. stadium, was the site of the early tilt which saw Kentucky University (now known as Transylvania College) take the measure of Centre College, 13¾ to 0. The match, which was said to resemble a combination of soccer and rugby, followed by only six years the introduction of the game of football to the United States.

University of Kentucky (then called A & M College of Kentucky) did not play its first game until a year later on the same field, which once served as the private pasture for University President James Patterson's bovine herd.

KENTUCKY'S COLORS

The blue and white of the University of Kentucky are known to sports fans everywhere. Officially the colors are Yale blue and white, but in the beginning, when the Lexington institution was still known as the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Kentucky, the colors were "Stoll blue" and white. One day back in the 1890's a group of Kentucky football stalwarts met to choose their school colors. Someone suggested blue and white—"blue like Dick Stoll's necktie"—and those colors were immediately adopted. "Dick" Stoll was to become Judge Richard C. Stoll, distinguished public servant and, for more than fifty years before his death, a member of the U.K. board of trustees.

Footnote A — Although numerical scoring had not yet been introduced in Rugby football, either here or in Great Britain, when Kentucky and Transylvania (then known as Kentucky University) played their series in 1881, persons in charge of the games obviously had arrived at some sort of agreement assigning numerical values to the various scoring plays. Records never existed and men who played in the games are now deceased. All we can do is accept the scores printed in the newspapers—and surmise that a touchdown perhaps counted ¼ point and that a goal or an end-kick (a punt into the modern end zone) counted 1. That seems logical, since in the ratio scoring of that day, a touchdown was worth one-quarter of a goal. The end-kick, a British heritage, undubtedly was introduced because all realized that green players would score few goals, if any.

Footnote B — The football rules took no official position on the score of a forfeited game until 1908 when it was pegged at 1-0 to make it different from any other score possible in the game. By common consent, forfeited games prior to that were entered into the records as victories by 6-0 for the offended team—everywhere, that is, except in the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association, predecessor of the Southern Conference and the Southeastern Conference. In the S. I. A. A. the 6-0 practice was followed unless the offended team had a greater number of points. In that case, the offended team won by the greater score to nothing. Thus, Kentucky's forfeiture to Central University in 1900 is 6-0, since Kentucky led by 11-0 at the time. Kentucky led Cumberland by 12-11 in 1905 when the Tennesseans forfeited. The Blue and White, under S. I. A. A. rules, gets credit for a 12-0 victory.
