## Regulations

#### Congress must realize industry should clean-up their act

The Clean Air Act is up for reauthorization in Congress and thousands of lobbyists are working in Washington, some to fortify it and others to water it down. One important facet of the act regards acid precipitation and regula-tions for industries who emit poisons into the

Acid precipitation is not something to be shrugged off. It can kill fish and other aquatic life, eat away buildings and monuments, and threaten crops, forests and humans.

Industries that are responsible for vomiting sulfur dioxide and nitrogen oxides into the air are widening loopholes in the 1970 Clean Air Act by thrusting quarter-mile high smokestacks through them.

Since the pollutants are emitted into the atmosphere at such extraordinary heights, par-ticles don't settle in the ground or in the air surrounding the plant. Instead they are car-ried hundreds of miles by air currents into the wild grey yonder, only to react with moisture and then precipitate to earth.

Once the particles become acid precipita-tion and deposit back upon the ground, the ef-fects can be devastating. Fish die in massive numbers, lakes and ponds are strangled and marble and limestone buildings deteriorate. Repercussions on humans range from chronic bronchitis and asthma to death from cancer, not to mention acidic regund, rain and dripk. not to mention acidic ground, rain and drink-

ing water.

Offending industries are now lobbying in Washington against stricter clean air legislation. Unless there is extensive counter-

lobbying, chances are good that the utility and industrial monsters will win because they've got money, influence and James Watt on their

One gross problem with the Clean Air Act is that each state is expected to regulate itself. Because of this, what is an acceptable air quality level in one state is not acceptable in

"The Clean Air Act is really one of the chief reasons for the increase in acid rain," said Robert F. Flacke, comissioner of New York State's Department of Environmental Conservation. "Not only did its earlier policy bring about the long-range transport of air pollution via tall stacks, it also permits New York and other clean-plant states to be dirtied by states with looser air standards."

Scrubbers, machines that clean smokestacks, would greatly reduce the amount of soot and particles being thrust into the atmosphere. Industries are reluctant, however, to put in scrubbers because of excessive installation and maintenance costs.

Although some solutions have been im-

Although some solutions have been implemented, they are only temporary. The liming of lakes and ponds acts only like a Rolaids by neutralizing acids. Building smokestacks higher only carries particles farther. Not only should the Clean Air Act be reauthorized, but more stringent restrictions ought to be placed on industries that blatantly circumvent existing regulations. The price of our environment is too high a price to pay for their negligence.

BOSTON — Former Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger was "alert," talking to doctors, and visiting his wife yesterday, one day after four-and-one-half hours of open heart surgery to relieve three clogged arteries.
"We are all very pleased," said one of the surgeons, Dr. Mortimer J. Buckley Jr. "The major risk is lower." Martin Bander, spokesman for Massachusetts General Hospital, said Kissinger was "fully awake, alert and resting comfortably. He started talking to doctors after a tube inserted into his throat was removed this morning."

The tube was booked up to a respirator which

The tube was hooked up to a respirator which controlled Kissinger's breathing during the triple bypass operation, he said.

The 35-year-old Nobel Peace Prize winner was officially listed in stable condition in the hospital's intensive care unit. Doctors gave him permission to see guests, including his wife, Nan-

Members of Kissinger's medical team said Wednesday they were satisfied with the results of the lengthy operation and predicted a full recovery for the world-famous diplomat. After a week of recuperation, Kissinger should be able to get up and move around his room for several minutes at a time, hospital officials said.

ATLANTA — Jurors in Wayne B. Williams' murder trial will be allowed to visit the Chattahoochee River bridge where prosecutors contend Williams disposed of the bodies of two young blacks, a judge ruled today. Judge Clarence Cooper, acting on a defense request, said a visit to the bridge would help the jury understand evidence presented by prosecutors. He did not set a date or time for the visit.

Williams, a 23-year-old black free-lance

photographer and aspiring talent scout, is charged with murdering Nathaniel Cater, 27, and Jimmy Ray Payne, 21, two of 28 young blacks whose deaths over a 22-month period have been investigated by a special police task force.

There have been no arrests in the 26 other cheaths, but prosecutors presented evidence about 10 additional slayings in an effort to show a pattern that might fit the Cater and Payne cases. Prosecution witnesses placed Williams with a total of seven victims, including Cater and Payne, although Williams has demied knowing any of the 28.

GENEVA. Switzeriand — American and Soviet negotiators, amid mounting indications of an impasse, conferred for two-and-one-half bours yesterday in the 18th full round of talks on limiting medium-range nuclear arms in Europe. The session followed a pointed exchange between Washington and Moscow, highlighting the distance between the two sides at the politically sensitive talks.

The Reagan administration said Wednesday it rejects as "spurious" a Soviet proposal to reduce medium-range nuclear strength to "300 units on both sides" by 1990.

A State Department spokesman said the plan would leave untouched the most formidable intermediate-range weapon in the Soviet arsenal, the triple-headed, mobile SS-20 missile. A major American objective at the talks has been to dismantle the SS-20s. About 280 SS-20 systems, capable of hitting targets anywhere in Europe, have already been deployed. The West has no comparable intermediate-range weapon in place.

The revised Soviet offer was disclosed day in Moscow. At the same time, the Kr day in Moscow. At the same time, the Kremlin assailed as "absurd" a draft treaty submitted last week by the American delegation. The United States proposed that both sides dismantle or cancel plans to deploy a variety of sophisticated missile systems. The offer, commonly called the "zero option," been likened by the Kremlin to unilateral disarmament.

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

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

## Game intentionally avoids interracial pairing

Although racial segregation is prohibited in the by-laws of the University, there are apparently few objections to separation by color when it comes to the question of inter-racial duting

separation by color when it comes to me question of mer-racial dating.

The Holmes Hall House Council's annual "Holmes Hilton Dating Game", held last night, was deliberately segregated according to members of the committee in charge of the game.

On applications for the game distributed to freshmen men and women in the north campus area, the committee included "race" among the questions. Jimmy Estes, Holmes Hall House Council president and a member of the committee, said separate groups of black and white panelists were planned for the game because 'we didn't think that a black girl would want to go out with a white guy."

Make don what criteria the committee based its decision not to run the game on an interracial basis, he said, "It was our moral judgement that we shouldn't do that." Estes, a foreign language freshman, said plans for a black panel fell through when no applications from black women were received.

black panel fell through when no applications iron naix-women were received. Holmes Hall Head Resident Gary Gilmore, an accoun-ting senior, said the decision to segregate the dating game was not intended to "encourage or not to encourage or make stand on" internacial dating, adding that Holmes Hall has held segregated dating games in the past. He said the race question was included on the applica-tion form drawn up by the committee — which has no

dating.

He said the final selections for the dating game were made by the dating game committee.

Although section III, 3.94 of the Student Code governing prohibits registered student organizations such as the Holmes Hall House Council from "discrimination against any person due to race, color, see or religious affiliation or belief," Robert Zumwinkle, vice president for student affairs, said he was unsure whether or not the segregation of the dating game would be considered an offense under the code.

code.
"I think that there's a legitimate question here," he said, "but I wouldn't want to come down on either side... it would come down to a question of what is sound policy." Although Chester Grundy, director of minority student affairs, called the question of discrimination "trivial."

affairs, called the question of discrimination "trivial," Darrel Williams, president of the Black Student Union, said it was difficult to determine if discrimination had in fact occurred.

"Obviously, it is a form of discrimination," he said.
"They're making the decision (whether on no to date interracially) for (the applicants). But you will have a lot of people who don't want to date interracially.
"I guess in a way it's valid," he said. "You can't force them to do it. That's not really kosher either."

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




