WORLD 14 die in crash near Caribbean island

MEXICO CITY — A helicopter with 14 people on board, mostly American tourists, crashed yesterday in the Caribbean off the island of Cozumel. Police duty Sgt. Juan Bautist Huitzil said the helicopter crashed into the sea about three miles from the airport with two crew members and 12 passengers on board.

"The passengers were all foreign tourists, Americans," he said. Rescue crews retrieved 11 bodies quickly but three were still missing, he added. Neither Huitzil nor an airport officer had details on the identities of those on board. The officer, who refused to give his name, said the crash occurred about 4:30 p.m. EST.

Hemenway introduces new plan at town meeting

Members of the UK faculty had mixed reactions last night to their first taste of Chancellor Robert Hememay's new agenda for the Lexington Campus. In his first of four University town meetings, Hememaya introduced his new five-point agenda. It outlines his ideas and goals for improving UK. Hemenway said the agenda from the past five years has had both successes and failures. "I think the Lexington Campus Agenda has served us well," he said.

The first point of Hemenway's plan is to strength-

en the learning community.

"(UK) has a vast learning bureaucracy," he said.

"We are good at measuring seat time. That does
not make us a productive place, though."
He proposed a gradual restructuring of the course
and credit system, as well as spending \$1 million a
year on increased learning etchnology.
Also, he proposed that the University go to a three
semester, or year-round program.
He said this approach would make classes more
available to students.
Faculty members said problems are not necessarily
caused by scheduling or lack of technology.

"I want to know what the administrators are doing to encourage students to do their jobs," Brock said. Hemenway told Brock he sees it as a mutual responsibility between faculty, staff and students.

Greeks need to break away from typical greek stereotypes, Mitch Crane, a former Circuit Court judge and an honorary member of Sigma Phi Epsilon social fraternity, said last night. The Crane's lecture, sponsored by Sigma Phi and the Interfraternity Council, focused upon the necessity of risk management and on the responsibility of greeks to "look out for one another."

Crane is an eight-year veteran lecturer, who speaks to greek organizations around the country. It realized through my experience as a trial lawyer and as a judge that many of the terrible things associated with greeks were acts of stupidity and not of intent,"

Crane said.

He said he sees his role as one of education and guidance. He said he wants to lead fraternities away from destructive habits and actions and have them go toward a more aware toward a more aware and responsible state of mind.

Crane entertained the crowd, using several real-life stories to make his point about the responsibilities and the "stupidity" of the greek system.

Some examples of this "stupidity" often leads to prejudice by other students, Crane s

He told a story of a young man getting beaten to death during a hazing episode.

"No one out there would care if you drank ... as long you did not drink yourself to death," Crane, referring to attention harbored by

dents on stories sucn as this, no-said.

Television and the media por-tray a negative image of greek life based upon the excesses of a few misguided individuals, he said.

"What do people see on TV?"
Crane asked. "They see you get-ting drunk, they see you getting sick from being drunk and they see you having lost of sex."

Crane said he thinks fraternities have moved a long way from those stereotypes.

The truth of the matter, he said, is greeks spend less than five percent of their time "partying"— the rest being dedicated to the concepts of "brotherhood," "loy-alty" and "character."

The Cats enter the meeting hungry for a victory. After an impressive mid-season run in which the squad had tallied a 7-3 mark in Southeastern Conference meetings, UK has fallen on hard times.



Tuition increase nothing new

If the Council on Higher Education pro-poses another tuition increase Monday, it shouldn't come as a surprise to state legisla-

poses another tuition increase Monday, it shouldn't come as a surprise to state legislators.

The funding model adopted by the council in 1984 has resulted in tuition increases nearly every year while state support has steadily declined.

Ken Walker, deputy executive director for financial affairs, said there are several factors that influence the cost of college, including income levels and the tuition rates at regional universities.

"We look at tuition in three areas. There's the community colleges, regional colleges and doctorals," Walker said.

The cost of undergraduate tuition is primarily determined by the per capita personal income is determined by the state's gross income divided into the population.

"We take the percentage of per capita income among benchmark institutions" and compare it to UK's tuition as part of the funding model, Walker said.

When all the numbers are tallied, students are most likely met with a tuition

increase, said Gary Cox, CHE's executive director.

In fact, since 1984, tuition and fees revenues have increased from 12 percent to 16 percent of the money taken in at Kentucky's eight public universities.

But administrators were unable to increase services while they were squeezed dight-rease services while they were squeezed dight-rease states support declining 8 percent stawth and the state appropriation has dropped sharply since 1991, when state appropriations accounted for 41 percent of the University's total budget. State money makes up only 33.8 percent of UK's budget this year.

Meanwhile tuition has increased from supplying UK's budget with 9.9 percent of revenue to 12.3 percent.

"I wouldn't mind the increase if they built more parking," said animal science freshman Susan Butler, who works about 22 hours per week.

Butler said the increase is fine because UK is putting the money to good use by building a library.

But she wants to see more loans and scholarships available to students because although tuition increases, students incomes may stay the same.

UK has a history of poor turnouts By Thomas McIntosh Staff Writer

Almost a year to the day of last year's student protest over tuition hikes, the Student Government Association is sponsoring a class walkout today at 1850. A officials are encouraging students and teachers to walk out of class and converge at the fountain in front of Patterson Office Tower.

But will people show up?

If the walkout resembles past UK student protests, the answer will probably be yes, but in small numbers.

Last year, a rally featuring Secretary of State Bob Babbage and other state officials as speakers drew only 250 students — a total much lower than the organizer's anticipated crowd of 1,000 protestors.

increases.

On Oct. 15, 1992, a coalition of Kentucky's eight public universities' students staged a protest in Frankfort opposing state budget cuts. Of an expected 2,000 students from all of Kentucky's campuses, only 500 students showed up. Ut's SGA estimated that 100 students from Lexington

estimated that 100 students from Lexington attended.
Will this same sense of apathy occur at this year's walkout?
The answer is no, said Senator at Large Alan Aja, who is coordinating the walkout.
Aja expects an attendance of more than 1,000 students and faculty. But he said he remains nervous about several factors that could deter possible propersers.

"Without a successful walkout and protest rally, the Council on Higher Education can make a logical assumption that students at UK just don't care," Aja said.

"(But) if our voice is strong enough, then I'm sure that the CHE will see that the students are tired."

Aja noted that this walkout is important betaught if it is passed, the proposal will effect every student who pays tuition.

"I want the students to realize that this effects everyone, whether you are lower-, middle- or upper-class." Aja said.

But will a successful walkout influence the CHE's decision?

Norman L. Snider, CHE director of communication services, would not answer but chose instead to comment on the CHE's passing "reasonable tuition increase, even when people wanted a bigger increase."

Regarding CHE's pass tuition increases, Aja said he sees the need for immediate action.

"Everyone has the right to education, and when the price gets higher, that right is taken away slowly but surely," Aja said.

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UK's geologist says library site is sound

A geologist contracted by UK assured the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Council at a public hearing yesterday that the building site for the proposed library is safe for large-scale construction.

UK needs the approval of the council tomorrow for a \$41 million bond issue to pay for the Central and Life Sciences Library.

Council members called the special meeting after hearing the concerns of Edward Wilson, a retired geologist, who said the site for the library is potentially dangerous.




