Russell "Russ" Groves is remembered for his humility and knowledge; students and faculty reflect on loss

The College of Design lost an irreplaceable mem-ber of their staff this week-end, said students and facul-

Russell "Russ" Groves was killed in a plane crash near Bardstown, Saturday after-noon

"We are going to miss
his presence around our
school," said architecture
senior Rachel Hardy.
Groves acquired a Ph.D.

from the UK College of Education, and was a graduate from UK's Architecture, Law and Patterson schools.
"I'll is a devastating loss for us, not just for the college, but because of the man," said David Mohney, dean of architecture.
"He was so talented in so many ways. He had so much respect across the Commonwealth. It will be for six years as Kentucky

UK, Lexington plan to build residential. retail areas

College town project focuses on growth

Proposed convenience stores around campus may provide more than milk and bread.

They play a part in the connection of UK's cam-pus to Lexington's down-town.

These stores are a component of the "college town" concept, a combined effort of UK and the Lexington Downtown Authority, which will increase residential areas, create jobs and provide more retail opportunities for the area. Started in 2001, the project has grown to include developments with outside firms and hometown businesses.

Many of the plans in-

many of the plans in-clude increasing residen-tial space.

There are plans to break ground for a new dorm building that holds about 150 beds on the Av-enue of Champions later this year, said Warren Den-ny, university architect.

ny university architect.
UK and the Lexington
Downtown Authority also
hope to include academic
facilities and parking facilities in the development,
he said.

ities in the development, he said.

Current negotiations are taking place with developers to increase residential areas along Martin Luther King Boulevard.

Negotiations for condos and a new parking area will replace an existing parking lot between High Street and Maxwell Street, said Harold Tate, resident and executive director for the Downtown Development Authority.

Independent groups will do these renovations, Tate said.

He isos said they hope to announce a home-ownership plan for Lexington residents soon, but couldn't give more details until the plan was officially unveiled.

Athlete faces misdemeanor charges

UK basketball player Rave Moss was arrested after altercation with police

UK basket UK basket-ball sophomore Ravi Moss was arrested after an altercation with police Friday night at a high school football game in Hop-kinsville. He is sched-

He is scheduled to be arraigned Wednesday morning the MoSS

and attempted to prevent police from arresting his son, according to the arrest report.

Austin Moss is the chairman of the Christian County Board of Education and vice president for human resources at Jennie Stuart Medical Center.

Both men were taken to the Christian County prison and were released approximately an hour later.

The arrests took place at Stadium of Champions, home to both the Christian County Colonels and the Hopkinsville Tigers football teams.

Friday's game ended the Colonels' four-year losing streak to the Tigers and was played in front of "one of the largest and loudest crowds in the Stadium of Champions history," according to a story in Hopkinsville's Kentucky, New Era on Saturday.

"These football games are big social cents," said Jennifer P. Brown, a reporter for Kentucky, New Era. "People go to see the games, but they also go to see friends and hang out. A lot of what happens in the stands has very little to do with the game."

UK officials say Moss's arrest will not affect his ability to play basketball this year.

arect. In solinity to pay deserted this "Coach Smith is aware of the situation and has met with Ravi and his parents," said Scott Stricklin, spokesman for UK"s athletic department. "He believes this is an isolated incident and it will not affect Ravi's status as a member of our basketball

team."

Members of the Moss family declined to comment Monday evening.

Moss was four-year starter for University Heights Academy, averaging 21 points and 10 rebounds per game as a senior. As a freshman guard for UK last year, he played 28 minutes in 12 games, scoring nine points and making four rebounds total.

If you ever paid for a roll of film and found that you didn't like half of your pictures or that some of them didn't come out the way you had hoped a digital camera may be the best for you ... or is it?

"Digital cameras offer a higher quality than reload-able cameras," said Best Buy employee Terry Lipscomb.
"Though they are more money, developing costs are completely eliminated, plus you! never have a bad ple-tur."

Though digital cameras eliminate costs for film proeliminate costs for film pro-cessing, they are still very costly. At Best Buy, an elec-tronics and home appliance retailer on Nicholasville Road, digital cameras aver-age between \$300-\$400, and an additional \$100-\$200 for accessories.

Yet with stores centering on digital camera customers,

"Right now, Nikon and Canon is our top selling re-loadable camera." Blotter-said. "Nikon is more for pro-fessional use and Canon is for digital cameras, a Nikon or Olympus is best." With reloadable cameras averaging \$505-8400, a digital camera can range anywhere from \$150-\$600. Though single-use digi-

according to Info Trends Research, they are sure to follow shortly.

Best Buy for instance is no longer offering film processing for 35 mm and instead will only offer development for digital pictures.

"With standard (film) roameras the developing process is half the fun," said psychology sophomore Michael Shadoan. "What you get with a reloadable cameras is a kind of hands on experience, allowing you to overxpose and underexpose your propriets of the processing for the search, disposable cameras are more convenient, photography as an art form will continue to use reloadable film, even though prices of reloadable film may drop."

Other stores will also be adding digital cameras but have opted to still inculer loadable cameras for their stores.

"35 mm will still largely be in use especially for those who are more acquainted to the control of the cont



a uigital camera: zoom, lens quality, easy usage and buy-ing your camera at a retail store.

"Personally I would never recommend buying a camera online," he said. "It's much easier and more reliable knowing that you can deal with a person in a store if something goes wrong."

College Town could be promising – if it works

Lexington and UK's college town plan represents a promising venture for improving and enhancing areas surrounding campus and stream-lining the relationship between campus and downtown

We hope that this dream blossoms into reali-

ty as planned, without too much expense or has-sle for the communities of UK and Lexington. In early 2002, UK hired the Ayers Saint Gross Architects and Planners firm to develop a campus master plan that would integrate with the city. The plan is a blueprint for future development in the neighborhood bordered by Rose and South Limestone streets, and Euclid and East

The ambitious plan includes new dorms, college buildings and parking structures all over campus. Planners want to retool the street map in the area with an extension of Virginia Av-enue through campus and close Rose Street near its intersection with South Limestone.

its intersection with South Limestone.

These and other details make the project sound as if it might create quite a hassle before all's said and done.

One issue of concern is cost — we know that UK and Lexington are splitting the planning firm's fee, which was \$200,000 in February of last year. Other costs are still unclear, because it

is still unclear what parts of the proposal will actually be implemented.

We urge UK and Lexington to be forthcoming with the public and local media on the expected costs of the project, before making final decisions. And we urge the public to be understanding if it takes some time for these efforts to bring rewards.

A bright aspect of the plan is pushing to increase the population density and diversity.

crease the population density and diversity around campus with mixed-used buildings. This means apartments, single-family housing and businesses assorted throughout the neighborhood. Persons of all walks — not just students would be welcome.

But we also hope that improving the neighborhood would not increase property values to prohibitive levels.

Other Lexington development issues aside, it

Other Lexington development issues aside, it is crucial that we build the city up — not out — and leave the bluegrass to the horses.

The city and campus also need more support for alternative modes of transportation — such as bicycles and buses — to unclog our trafficladen streets and clear our lungs of pollution. The college town plan could accommodate both of these needs, and also could bring out the more obscure attractions of central Lexington.

Heavy cuts in entertainment expenses, such as those going toward parties and concerts, lead us to believe \$G\$ is on the path to fiscal responsibility. We look forward to seeing sincerity and follow-through in \$G\$ efforts to improve and return to students the value of their mandatory student fees. What is still of concern are the per-semester stipends and salaries going to \$G\$ officers, both elected and unelected. Some \$G\$ members will be receiving hundreds in bonuses — on top of the already-exorbitant salaries of up to \$2,500 that some are receiving.


