The blessings and guidance of a merciful Father has directed and controlled the efforts that have been used to bind in one common bond the frosted veterans of another day and year, Almost entirely unaided, he has gathered up who followed the flag of a withered hope and a dead cause, until all was laid away in the grave with the brave in misfortune who fell. The Officers of the various Counties where Camps are established have been, as a rule, untiring in their efforts to gather in the fold all those who were eligible to membership, and for their zeal, the thanks of the Association are due them and they are deserving of the highest praise. The good people have been kind and generous in their offerings to the needy of our ranks. Conspicuous and most prominent stands out the name of Colonel H. B. Morehead, of Cincinnati, Ohio, the President of the Cincinnati Commercial Gazette Company. While he has protested against any publicity of his benefactions, the Association feels so deeply grateful to him, that a plain duty compels it to express here the sense of obligation resting upon every Confederate soldier for his kindness and generosity to them and all will bless and honor his name.

A glance at the list of those of our members who have died since the organization of the Association must forcibly remind us all that our lives are held only by the frailest tenure; that time has not been idle in our ranks, and all should be greatly impressed with the importance of preserving and perpetuating their records of those years of warfare, hallowed and made glorious by the blood and treasure of our own Sunnyland. To the living Confederate Soldiers we come, beseeching them in the name of the dead Cause for which they fought, in the name of the gallant spirits

who laid down their lives upon their Country's altar, in the name and memory of the wives and children of all who wore the Gray, to not, for a day longer, neglect the opportunity to enroll their names once more beside their comrades who stood shoulder to shoulder with them in the hours of peril.

In submitting this work of hands illy fitted for the duty, of brain inexperienced and incompetent to perfect so sacred a charge, it is hoped that all will accept it as a simple offering of a heart whose every beat goes out in love and tenderness for those who followed as he did—the flag of Dixie until it went down forever.

## Articles of Incorporation.

E IT KNOWN, That we, John Boyd, Robert S. Bullock, Thomas S. Logwood, O. L. Bradley, Wm. H. Cassell, G. A. De-Long, John M. Montague, L. P. Young, Joseph B. Simrall, Will Ev. Spencer, John H. Carter, O. F. Redd, Hart Gibson, and Wm. R. Jones, have formed ourselves together for the purpose of promoting the general welfare of the Confederate soldiers, and hereby form an Association.

2. The name and style of said Association shall be the "Confederate Veteran Association of Kentucky." By that name it shall have perpetual succession, with power to contract and be contracted with, sue and be sued, plead and be im-

pleaded.

3. Said Association shall have the power to acquire and hold real estate and personal property, stocks, bonds, etc., and to sell, transfer and dispose of the same at their pleasure, possessing the same right that private individuals now enjoy.

 The officers of said Association shall consist of a President, Vice-President, Secretary and a Treasurer, and an Executive Committee, and such other officers as the Association or the Executive Committee may deem necessary, or may provide.

5. Said Association shall have the power to make a Constitution, pass rules and regulations and by-laws, and amend the same, not inconsistent with the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of this State, as the interests of the Association may require.

6. The capital stock, admission fee, dues, etc.,

shall be provided for in the Constitution.

7. The private property of the members shall be exempt for the debts of said Association.

#### Constitution.

ARTICLE I.

"Confederate Veteran Association of Kentucky," with headquarters at Lexington, Kentucky.

ARTICLE II.

The object of this Association shall be the cultivation of social relations among those who were honorably engaged in the service of the Confederate State of America; to preserve the fraternal ties of comradeship; to aid and assist those of its members who, from disease, misfortune, or the infirmities of age, may become incapable of supporting themselves or families; to pay a decent respect to the remains and to the memory of those who die, and to see that no worthy member shall ever become an object of public charity.

ARTICLE III.

SEC. 1. Members shall be elected by ballot by the Executive Committee, and no one shall be ballotted for unless recommended by two members of the Association, who shall certify, to the best of their belief, to his honorable record in the Confederate service, and that he has brought no dishonor on the service since. Any member objecting to any person elected by the Executive Committee, shall have the right of appeal to the Association, the decision of which shall be final. But two members of said Committee voting in the negative, the applicant for membership shall be rejected.

#### ARTICLE IV.

Sec. 1. Each member of this Association shall pay an initiation fee of five dollars, and the

further sum of four dollars a year as dues, and payable quarterly in advance on the first days of January, April, July and October of each year.

SEC. 2. Any member failing for two consecutive meetings to pay his dues shall, after due notice from the secretary, be reported as delinquent and stricken from the roll: *Provided*, That the Executive Committee shall have power to remit the dues of any applicant or member when they are satisfied that he is unable to pay them.

#### ARTICLE V.

#### Officers.

SEC. 1. The officers of this Association shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, Chaplain and Executive Committee, to be composed of the President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, and ten members, who shall serve until their successors are elected and qualified; all of them may, after the present year, be annually elected by ballot on the first Saturday in April of each year. A majority of the members of the Executive Committee who reside in the city of Lexington, Kentucky, shall constitute

a quorum. The officers shall conduct the business of the Association as provided in the by-laws.

SEC. 2. There shall be, in addition to the regular officers mentioned in section one of this article, one Vice-President from each county in the State represented by a membership in the Association of not less than six members, and shall be known as Second Vice-President of the county so represented, and shall be nominated by the President and confirmed by the Executive Committee.

SEC. 3 Each Second Vice-President, himself as Chairman ex-officio, shall appoint an Adjutant, whose duties shall be the same as a secretary, and an Executive Committee to consist of two members of his county, whose duties shall be the same as, and subject to the approval of, the Executive Committee of the Association.

# ARTICLE VI. Meetings.

There shall be two stated meetings of the Association annually, towit: On the first Saturdays in April and October; also such called meetings as may be ordered by the President or provided for in the by-laws.

#### ARTICLE VII.

#### Funds.

SEC. 1. The funds of this Association shall be deposited in bank to the credit of the Association, and shall be drawn only on the order of the President, Secretary and Treasurer. All claims shall be approved by the Executive Committee before payment.

#### ARTICLE VIII.

SEC. 1. This Constitution shall not be altered or amended except by motion made in writing at a regular meeting of the Association; such motion shall lie over until the next stated meeting, when every member entitled to a vote shall be notified in writing to attend; and if the proposed alteration or amendment shall receive a majority of two-thirds of those present, it shall then be come a part of this Constitution, except as otherwise provided for in article XV.

Sec. 2. The Association shall adopt such bylaws for its government as may be deemed necessary, not to conflict with the provisions of this Constitution. The influence or sympathy of this Association as a body shall never be enlisted or used in favor of any political or religious organization whatever, nor shall any political or religious discussions be permitted in its meetings.

#### ARTICLE IX .

This Association shall have power to receive and hold any property, real, personal or mixed, that may be donated by any person for the use of the relief fund or for other purposes of the Association.

#### ARTICLE X.

Every member of this Association shall make the following pledge:

"I hereby solemnly promise to observe, obey and support the Constitution and By-laws of the Confederate Veteran Association of Kentucky so long as I remain a member thereof. I wil not divert any of its funds from the legitimate purpose of the Association, nor suffer it to be done if I can prevent.

"I will be a true and faithful Comrade to every member of the same.

"I will defend his honor, vindicate his good

#### ARTICLE XI.

Any person, either male or female, whose sympathies were with the Southern arms, or the wives or sons or daughters of soldiers or sailors who were faithful to the Confederate States Government, can become honorary members of this Association.

#### ARTICLE XII.

Only persons of good moral character can become honorary members of this Association, and must be elected members in the manner provided in article III of the Constitution, upon the payment of a membership fee of five dollars. No dues or other expense.

#### ARTICLE XIV.

The insignia of the ladies who become honorary members shall be a design in gold of a Confederate flag in enamel colors, which shall be given free; but the male members will not be furnished with any insignia, or allowed to wear any mark of membership, unless otherwise ordered by the Association or the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee have directed that a silver button of same design as provided for the ladies be furnished free to the male mem-

#### ARTICLE XV.

No honorary member shall be allowed to vote upon any question, and no section pertaining to honorary members shall ever be altered or amended, except upon seven-eighths of the vete-No person can ever become an honorary mem- ran members voting in the affirmative.

#### By=Laws.

Ι.

with the duty of investigating and reporting upon any case of distress among the members which may come to its knowledge, and which requires aid of any sort on the part of the Association. This aid shall be extended to these members and their families, and the Executive Committee is further charged to render such aid.

II

The Executive Committee shall meet at the Secretary's office as often as they may be called by the President or five members of said Committee. They shall keep a record of their proceedings, and shall recommend to the President any member who, in their judgment, should receive aid from the Association, stating in said recommendation the amount they deem proper to be paid.

III.

The President shall draw his check, counter-

signed by the Secretary and Treasurer, in favor of persons recommended by the Executive Committee in any amount not exceeding that recommended.

IV.

The Executive Committee may fill all vacancies which may occur in their own body by death or resignation.

V.

The Secretary shall be charged with the duty of collecting the moneys due the Association by members, and may employ and pay a collector for that purpose.

VI.

The Secretary shall report to each stated meeting all members in arrears, and members so reported shall be dealt with as provided in section 2, article IV of the Constitution.

VII.

Upon the death of any member of the Associa-

tion the commanding officer of the county wherein said death occurs shall notify all surviving comrades of his county to meet and attend the funeral in such a manner, as, after consultation with the family and friends, he may deem best.

#### VIII.

The insignia of this Association shall be worn at all times, and must be "A circular design fiveeighths of an inch in diameter, with the medallion head of R. E. Lee thereon, surrounded by an enamel belt, on which are oxidized stars; on the reverse, across the center, the owner's name, and around the circumference the name of the Association." The badge of the Association shall be furnished free to each member, to be held by him as long as he is in good standing in the Association, subject to recall for cause. At a member's death the badge goes as an heirloom to his family.

## Burial Service of the Confederate Veteran Association of Kentucky.

N the absence of the Chaplain the commanding officer shall select some other member to perform the duty.

When all are assembled at the grave, the Chaplain shall say:

In the morning it flourisheth and groweth up; in the evening it is cut down and withereth.

Amen.

And all the members shall respond—Amen.

When I consider thy heavens, the work of thy fingers, the moon and the stars, which thou hast ordained;

And all the members shall respond—Amen.


Let us pray.

In the summer of 1862 he was commissioned a Brigadier General in the Army of the Confederate States, and served with the Army of Tennessee until 1863, when he was assigned to the command of a Brigade in

Loring's Division, Pemberton's Corps, Army of the Mississippi. In March, 1864, he was assigned to the command of a Division in General Forrest's Cavalry, which position he held until near the close of the War. He participated in all of the battles in which his command was engaged, and was severely wounded in the thigh on the retreat of General Hood's Army from Nashville, in December, 1864. He surrendered at Gainesville, Alabama, May, 1865, and died at Danville, Indiana, June 9th, 1884, and is buried at Lexington, Kentucky.

Born near Georgetown, Ky., May 27ht, 1811. In September, 1861, he left his home with Gen. Breckinridge and others and went to Bowling Green, Ky., at which place he organized the provisional Confederate Government for the State, which was effected by a Convention at Russellville, Ky., and a Constitution adopted, and he was chosen Governor, and by formal act of the Confederate Congress the State of which he was the head was admitted as a member of the Confederacy. He was the companion and friend of General Albert Sidney Johnston, and in death they were not divided. At the battle of Shiloh where he fell fighting as a private soldier in Co. E, 4th Kentucky Infantry, is better described by a letter from his son, which is appended: "My father was wounded on second day of the battle of

Shiloh, Monday, April 7th, 1862. He remained on battle-field until following day, when he was found by Gen. McCook, of the United States Army, and recognized by Gen. J. S. Jackson, U. S. A., about 2 o'clock P. M., April 8th. By order of Gen. Nelson, U. S. A., he was taken aboard a U. S. Transport and received marked—attention and kindness until his death—which occurred at an early hour on Wednesday morning, April 9th, 1862. The U. S. Chaplain, Rev. J. F. Jaques, gave my father every attention and kindly wrote my mother fully as to the last sad details. Gen. J. S. Jackson attended to the snipment of the body to Louisville, Ky., where his friends took charge. He was buried in the cemetery at Georgetown, Kentucky, on April 17th, 1862."

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

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

In 1861, he was commissioned a Brigadier General in the Army of the



Confederate States and assigned to the Department of South-Western Virginia, serving in the Divisions of Jones and Loring and participated in all the engagements of his command. In 1863 he was elected a member of the Confederate States Congress from Kentucky, and resigned his commission in the army and remained in Congress until the close of the war. He died at his home in Louisville, Kentucky, March 28, 1872.




#### EPITAPH OF Albert Sidney Johnston.

[Written by J. B. S. Dimitry, of New Orleans,\*La., who served with him at Shiloh Copied and transmitted by a lady unknown, who is said to have found the lines written in pencil, and tacked on the headboard of the temporary resting place at New Orleans.

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"Beneath this stone is laid for a season Albert Sidney Johnston, a General in the Army of the Confederate States who fell at in the Army of the Confederate States, who fell at Shiloh, Tennessee, on the 6th day of April, 1862. A man tried in many high offices and critical enterprises, and found faithful in all. His life was one long sacrifice of interest to conscience, and even that life on a woeful Sabbath did he yield as a holocaust at his country's need. Not wholly understood was he while he lived; but in his death his greatness stands confessed in a people's tears Resolute, moderately clear

of envy, yet not wanting in that finer ambition which makes men great and pure. In his honor impregnable; in his simplicity sublime; no country ever had a truer son, no cause a noblier champion, no people a bolder defender, no principle a purer victim, than the dead soldier who sleeps here. The cause for which he perished is lost; the people for whom he fought are crushed; the hopes in which he trusted are shattered; the flag he loved guides no more the charging lines. the flag he loved guides no more the charging lines. But his fame, consigned to the keeping of that time which happily is not so much the tomb of virtue as its shrine, shall in years to come fire modest worth to nobler ends. In honor now our great Captain rests; a bereaved people mourn him three commonwealths proudly claim him, and history shall cherish him among those choicer spirits who, holding their consciences unmixed with blame, have been in all conjectures true to themselves, their country and their God."

Born in Madison County, Kentucky, October 4th, 1842. Enlisted in the Army of the Confederate States at Cumberland Ford, October 8th, 1861, as a private in Captain Baker's Company of Major Brazelton's Battalion. Serving under General Zollicoffer in Eastern Kentucky, and later with General E. Kirby Smith, and on Sep tember 10th, 1862, joined the 11th Kentucky Cavalry and was afterward promoted to Captain, Company F.,

He was in the battles of Hartsville, Tenn., Milton, Ky., Lebanon, Ky., Cynthiana twice, Greasy Creek, and wounded there, Muldrough's Hill, Ky., Rolling Fork, Monticello, Christmas Raid, Elizabethtown, was cut off from his command at the last fight at Cynthiana, escaped to Canada, and was in the Saint Albans Raid, and afterward went to Paris, France, where he died, April 12th, 1869.







This remained the "Battle Flag" until the close of the war.





The file of soldiers quickly did the rest, and the warfare of these two gallant soldiers was ended and all that was mortal was returned to their homes and loved ones in Kentucky, where they peacefully sleep in not unforgotten nor unhonored graves.


































