To improve campus safety, Pratt wants to talk to students and identify key areas of problems. He suggests that UK police be given some jurisdiction in the neighborhoods around campus where students live.

Vote no on referendum to end fight over water

For the past four years, the issue of whether Lexington should condemn the Kentucky American Water Co. for the purpose of public water ownership has divided the local community.

Community.

The community of the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Council in November 2004, it looked like the city was ready to move on and deal with other matters. But condemnation advocates contended that the vote somehow didn't represent the public's wishes — even though water was the biggest topic of debate in local elections that year — and they have kept the issue alive with their successful push for a referendum.

Tomorrow's vote provides Lexington residents an opportunity to end the condemnation process, which has torn apart the community and wasted millions of tax dollars. To that end, we urge voters to choose "no" on the water referendum.

that end, we urge voters to choose "no" on the water referendum.

A "no" vote will let local officials know that eminent domain — under which the government can forcibly acquire private property for public jurposes — is not a power that should be taken lightly or abused. It should certainly not be used in the case of Kentucky American Water, which has done nothing to contravene the public interest.

One of the main arguments by condemnation advocates is that a privately owned water company is not responsible to the public and can thus be a corporate predator, setting water rates artificially high.

But a number of legal safeguards force Kentucky American to be accountable to the residents it serves. It is subject to state and federal regulations, and any rate increase it proposes must be approved by the Public Service Commission — made up of three commissioners appointed by the governor — before it can go into effect. Those concerned about rate increases would do better to take a greater interest in PSC membership and hearings than to advocate condemnation, which will be (and has already been) rather expensive for taxpayers.

Moreover, condemning the water company could have

harmful repercussive effects for the local economy, Business owners who see a local government that is over-eager
to use eminent domain against private enterprise will be
less likely to locate their companies here.

Finally, condemnation has already cost Lexington taxpayers too much. The city sport \$1.2 million on legal fees
in the initial condemnation effort, according to an Oct. 15
article in the Lexington Herald-Leader. Continuing condennation would probably cost millions more to continue battling Kentucky American in court, not to mention the hundreds of millions of dollars — estimates range from \$15.8
million to \$535 million, according to the Herald-Leader article — for the water company itself.

Although condemnation advocates have tried to conflate
the company. Voiting down the referendum does not necessarily entail opposition to pit referendum only signals as opposition to using coercive methods — i.e., eminent domain
— to attain Kentucky American in cain, Purchase attempts that do
not entail forcible seizure will still be on the table.

This election provides Lexington an opportunity to
break with the past four years and work on issues that are
more pressing than the water company, such as public safety and the drainage infrastructure. We strongly endorse a
"no" vote on tomorrow's water referendum.

Celebrities and politics

Tomorrow, millions of Americans will vote. And I'd bet that most citizens know more about the political beliefs of George Clooney and Susan Sarandon than the candidates they will be voting for.

Celebrity politics is nothing new. Each of the four times Franklin Roosevelt ran for president, stars like Katharine Hepburn publicly supported him through radio and movie endorsements. By the time John F. Kennedy ran for President in 1960, media had exploded, and Frank Sinatra and others used television to endorse their candidate.

After the chaos of the 2000 presidential election, celebrities were shocked when Al Gore lost and began preparing for the next election. Actors and musicians like Susan Sarandon and Barbara Streisand went on

talk shows to plug movies or CDs but instead bashed George W. Bush and endorsed
left-wing politics. In 2004, Diddy began the
"Vote or Die" campaign, which encouraged
young people to vote and express their

I commended the "Vote or Die" appeal


