



Dr. Otis A. Singletary has maintained an active role both in academics and athletics since he became the University of Kentucky's eighth president in August

Great strides toward academic excellence have characterized Dr.
Singletary's presidency at UK. The Schools of Dentistry and Pharmacy consistently rank among the best in the nation. Departments such as political science, history, and mathematics have also gained nationwide attention while the UK Library now rates among the best in the Southeast.

Under Singletary's leadership, the University of Kentucky has also become a major research institution. The Albert B. Chandler Medical Center is an established leader in research on cancer and the aging. UK's agricultural college

has provided important research in tobacco and equine diseases while other University research has focused on the field of coal and other energy sources.

Singletary's involvement in athletics is as impressive as his academic achievements. A former president of the Southeastern Conference, Dr. Singletary is a member of the NCAA Select Committee on Athletic Problems and Concerns in Higher Education. He is also chairman of the board of directors of the College Football Association.

As president of the principal institution of higher learning in the Commonwealth, Dr. Singletary is greatly concerned with the University's role as a land grant institution, a "people's university" accessible to all who can profit from education.

In the 13 years Singletary has been president, the University of Kentucky has grown in enrollment to about 23,000

students on its Lexington campus and more than 22,000 students in the University's 13 community colleges.

Recognition of his service to the University of Kentucky was evidenced by the UK Alumni Association which presented to Dr. Singletary its Alumni Service Award, an honor rarely bestowed upon a non-alumnus of the University.

A native of Gulfport, Miss., Singletary holds degrees from Millsaps College and Louisiana State University. An accomplished administrator, Dr. Singletary served as chancellor of the University of North Carolina at Greensboro and was executive vice chancellor for academic affairs for the University of Texas system prior to coming to Kentucky.

He and Mrs. Singletary, the former Gloria Walton, have three children: Bonnie, Scot, and Kendall.



Continued growth in practically all phases of UK athletics has been the hallmark of Cliff Hagan's nine-year reign as athletics director with outstanding attendance at football and men's basketball games, increased attendance at Lady Kat basketball games, and a steady upgrading of facilities.

In the coming year, the University will host the 1984 NCAA Volleyball Championships and the Mideast Regional of

the 1984 NCAA Basketball Championships. In 1985, the presitigious NCAA "Final Four" basketball championships will be hosted by UK and held in Rupp Arena

Having graduated from the University of Kentucky with high distinction in 1954, Hagan has been a long-time advocate of a strong scholar-athlete program.

Hagan, one of the greatest players in UK basketball history, received one of his highest individual honors in 1978 when he became the first University of Kentucky player to be inducted in the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass.

An Owensboro, Ky. native, Hagan is married to the former Martha Milton.

When Terry Hall arrived at Kentucky in 1980, the Lady Kats were coming off their most successful season ever and beginning to gain national respect. They had been ranked in the Top 20 throughout the 1979-80 season and had finished the year with a 24-5 record and a berth in the AIAW National playoffs.



But the season was just a hint of the great things to come under Hall's guidance. The Lady Kats have gone far beyond respectability and into the perennial role of national contender. They have been ranked in the Top 20 every week and averaged 24 wins per season since Hall's arrival.

In her first year at UK, Hall's Lady Kats went 25-6, winning the Kentucky Women's Intercollegiate Conference and reaching the final round of 16 in the AIAW National tournament. Hall was named the KWIC Coach of the Year that season

In 1982 and again last season the Lady Kats were considered among the top contenders for the NCAA championship. The 1981-82 squad won the Southeastern Conference championship and reached the quarter-finals of NCAA play before losing to eventual national champion Louisiana Tech on the Lady Techsters' home floor. Last year's Lady Kats were ranked fourth

in the nation but fell to Indiana in the first round of the NCAA tournament.

Hall's record at Kentucky is 72-19, and considering Kentucky's tough scheduling habits (10 games with ranked opponents last season AND this season), a .791 winning percentage is outstanding. Her career record is 165-79. That mark includes one season at Eastern Kentucky, five at Louisville and three at Kentucky.

Hall began her coaching career in the high school ranks. Following her graduation from Indiana State in 1966, she was named head coach at Butler High School in Louisville. In five seasons at Butler, Hall coached her teams to two Jefferson County titles and an overall record of 69-33.

Then it was on to Eastern Kentucky University, where Hall earned her Master's Degree in 1974 and was immediately named head basketball coach. The Lady Colonels went 14-6 that season and won the KWIC title over Kentucky, Louisville, Western, Morehead, Murray and Northern Kentucky.

Hall then accepted the coaching job at Louisville, where she was faced with rebuilding a program. She succeeded, guiding the Lady Cards to a 79-54 record over five years. In 1979-80, her last season at U of L, the Lady Cards won their first Metro Conference championship. Hall also coached tennis and softball at U of L.

A native of Salem, Ind., Hall earned both her undergraduate and graduate degrees in Health and P.E. While attending Indiana State, she starred in basketball, field hockey and volleyball. She was honored with the "I" Woman Award in 1965, and received the prestigious Hillman Award in 1966 as the most outstanding female athlete at ISU.

Coach Hall on Kentucky's Style of Play: "Our style of play, or trademark, is the fast break. We believe that applying immediate pressure on the defensive team is one of the best ways to win a basketball game. Kentucky is one of few teams in the country totally dedicated to fast break basketball. Defensively, we play whatever defense we feel will exploit our opponents' weaknesses. Our main concerns are controlling the tempo of the game, teamwork, and shot selection by our players."

Coach Hall on Working With the Players: "I place a high premium on hard work and dedication to the task at hand. I want my players to feel the same way. I try to teach them that "doors of opportunity" open and close very quickly in life as well as on the basketball court. So always be prepared. In the span of a lifetime, their 4 years of college basketball is short, therefore they should work hard, be dedicated, excel, and enjoy the opportunity that exists."



Mike Kindred
Assistant Coach
Eastern Kentucky University, 1980

Mike was hired as a part-time assistant at UK in July, and then was elevated to full-time assistant in late September following the resignation of assistant coach Dottie Berry. A 1980 graduate of Eastern Kentucky, Mike served for two seasons as assistant girls' basketball coach at Estill County High School in Irvine, Ky., before coming to UK.

A native of Winchester, Ky., Mike graduated from Clark County High School in 1975. He then attended Morehead State University for one year before transferring to Eastern. He received a degree in Industrial Education, and then taught at Clark County for one year before accepting a job at Estill County.

In his first season at Estill, Mike helped direct the varsity squad to its first-ever winning season in 1982. The following year, the Lady Engineers won their first district championship. Mike's junior varsity squad, meanwhile, was doing even better, finishing with a 15-4 record in 1982 and a 19-4 record in 1983.

Mike is very active in the Big Brothers-Big Sisters program, and currently sits on the organization's Advisory Board in Winchester. He is also an active member of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, and was the FCA's 10th Region representative last year while coaching at Estill County.

Joining the coaching staff at UK fulfills a life-time dream for Mike, a 26-year old bachelor who has always been a "Big Blue" fan.

Graduate Assistant Louisville, 1983

A former player for Coach Terry Hall at Louisville, Robin joined the Lady Kat staff in September. While at Louisville, Robin lettered in basketball four consecutive years, two of those seasons with Coach Hall at the helm. She was a member of the Lady Card teams that won Metro Conference titles in 1979 and 1981 and is in the record book for best free throw percentage in a season, which she set in 1979. Robin was also an outstanding high school player at Louisville Butler High. She helped her team to the Girls' State Tournament in 1976 and 1978. She was All-State honorable mention for three straight years and played in the East-West All-Star game in 1978. She also played tennis for three seasons and ran track one year at Butler.

Robin is pursuing a Masters Degree in Recreational Therapy at UK. She has a great interest in young people and has participated as a volunteer for Special Olympics for five straight years. She also is credited with starting two Youth Basketball Camps in 1981 and 1982 at the St. Matthews YMCA in Louisville.

A former collegiate softball player at U of L, Robin has umpired softball and officiated basketball and volleyball. She is 23 years old and single.

SEC Standings at Stake in Tonight's Game

Kentucky 12-12 Vanderbilt 17-6

Series Record: Kentucky leads 4-1

Tonight's game shapes up as one of the most important of the season for both the Lady Kats and the Lady Commodores. The winner of this contest will likely clinch third place in the Southeastern Conference East Division and earn a bye the first day of action in the SEC tournament March 2-5 in Athens, Ga.

The SEC East is comprised of Kentucky, Vandy, Tennessee, Georgia and Florida. Tennessee is unbeaten in East play and could have clinched the top spot by defeating Georgia yesterday at Georgia. The Lady Bulldogs, meanwhile, have only one division loss, and could have clinched the title if they defeated Tennessee by more than four points, which was how much UT won by in an earlier meeting between the two—AND IF they defeat Florida on Feb. 25.

Vandy and Florida have two division wins each after splitting with each other and each getting wins over Kentucky. The Lady Kats have only one victory, but have an edge over Florida because they beat the Lady Gators 76-61 after an earlier 68-64 homecourt loss to the Lady Gators.

Vandy defeated Florida 86-77 while Florida downed Vandy by only one, 66-65. Florida's only remaining SEC East game is Feb. 25 with Georgia.

In their first meeting of the season, Kentucky fell 77-74 to Vandy in Nashville. As a result, the Lady Kats need a four-point win tonight to move past the Lady Commodores in the standings. The East race looks like this:



Lisa Collins led Kentucky with 20 points by hitting eight of 11 from the field and going 4-for-4 from the line. Kentucky outscored Vandy by six from the field, but was outscored by nine from the foul line. Kentucky was whistled for 25 fouls while Vandy was called for 14.

Board Gears up for Coaching Career

When Robin Board finished her career with the University of Louisville Lady Cardinals, it was not the end of her involvement with collegiate basketball. Rather, it signaled the beginning of a career in basketball coaching which she has decided to pursue since coming to UK this year as Graduate Assistant on the staff of the Lady Kats.

Much of that decision was due to her ties with head coach Terry Hall, under whom she played at Louisville during her first two college years. Over the past several months, her interest and experience with coaching has grown immensely—something she credits to Coach Hall's direction of the Lady Kats.

"I'm basically learning," Board said of her assignment this year at Kentucky. "That's what I want to do right now because I don't feel like I have enough experience yet to actually get out there and coach on the college level."

Board lettered in basketball at U of L four consecutive years, beginning in 1979. She was a member of Lady Card teams that won Metro Conference titles in '79 and '81, and set a record for best free throw percentage in a season during her freshman year. Board played her junior and senior years of basketball under head coach Peggy Fiehrer, who is still with the Lady Cards.

In high school, Board was an outstanding player at Louisville Butler High and helped her teammates to the Girl's State Tournament in 1976 and '78. She was All-State honorable mention for three straight years and played in the East-West All-Star game in 1978. Board was also a member of the tennis and track teams at Butler.

Upon high school graduation, Board had narrowed her college choices down to Eastern Kentucky and Louisville, but said her decision to become a Lady Cardinal was ultimately influenced by Coach Hall. That influence on Board has carried over into her studies as well, now that she has changed from her earlier plans of working toward a Master's degree in Recreational Therapy to earning a Coaching Endorsement at UK. Board said she hopes to graduate in May and secure a coaching position somewhere by next fall.

"I really like coaching. It's all new to me, but I've learned a lot from Coach Hall," she said. "I know how Coach Hall runs her practices and I am familiar with the drills because many of them are basically the same as when I played under her."

Some of Board's responsibilities this year with the Lady Kats include corresponding with potential recruits, sending out information and brochures, and scheduling hotel and other travel plans for the team. But it is the things she is learning on the court that Board hopes will prove valuable in her future coaching career.

She has a great interest in young people and has participated as a volunteer for Special Olympics for five straight years. She is also credited with starting two Youth Basketball Camps in 1981 and '82 at the St. Matthews YWCA in Louisville.

This year, Board is hoping to combine her learning under Coach Hall with her past experience of working with young people to form a foundation for a successful career in the coaching profession.

"For me, the key is to just put forth the effort and watch others coach, as well as Coach Hall. I try to talk to her and gain experience through her because she knows what it is like. I've just touched on the coaching aspect of basketball, but by watching and talking with her, I'll learn."

Dance Kats Make Lady Kat Debut

"I think it is a real good idea and if it goes like we think it will, it will be great," she said. "A lot of girls showed a lot of interest and there were a lot more girls that tried out for the team than we expected."

The team consists of 18 girls with two of the 18 being alternates. Last December, 55 girls tried out for the squad.



pportunities for UK students are not limited to the academic world. Involvement in the social and cultural aspects of University life also is important.

Recognizing this, the University provides the widest range of opportunities for personal and social development. If a student likes music, for instance, the Concert and Lecture Series brings outstanding soloists and symphonies on campus. There are chamber music concerts and hard rock concerts, impromptu bluegrass groups and flute recitals. If one likes to participate, opportunities abound—there are several choral groups, a marching band, the symphony orchestra, the symphonic band—or there is always the guitar with a few friends under the trees. Whichever one chooses, at UK it's available—and there's someone to share it.

There are 22 national fraternities and 16 national sororities on campus. "Rush," or member recruitment, takes place before classes begin, and informally throughout the year.

In addition to supporting the various Wildcat and Lady Kat teams, men and women students take part


