**NANCY MORGAN JONES**

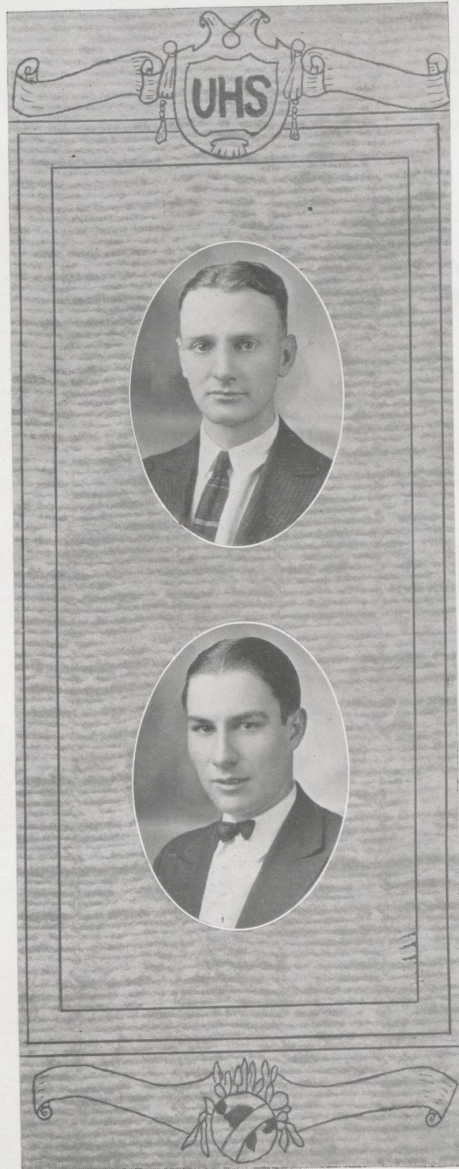

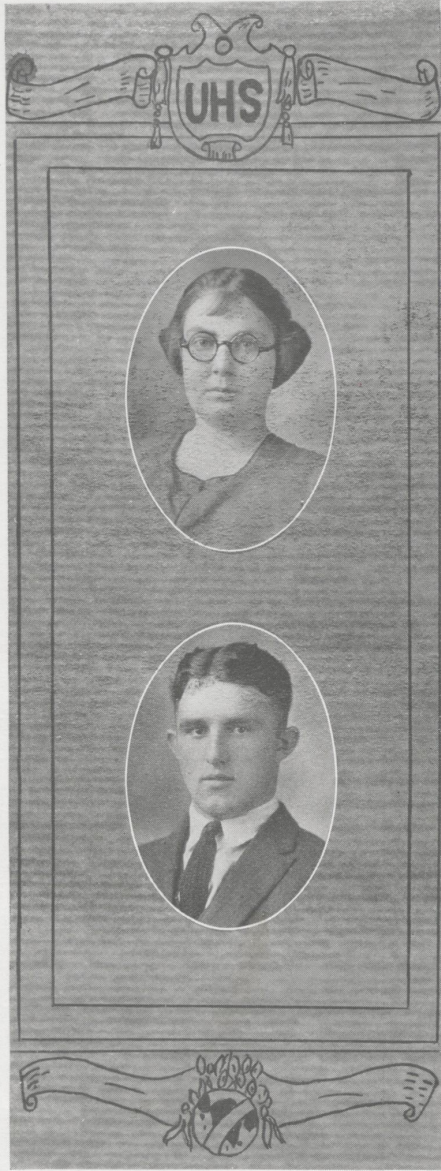

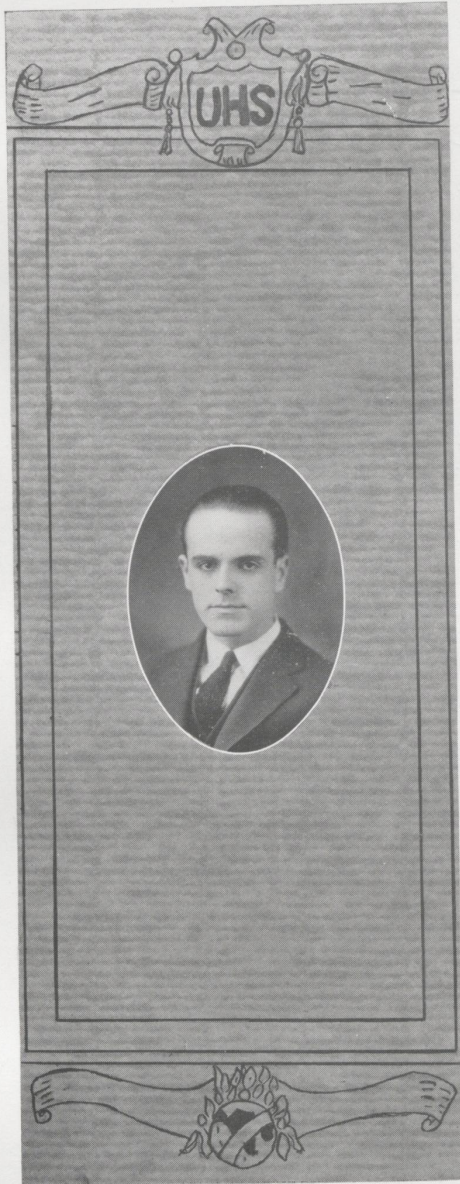
**ANN DELCHER**

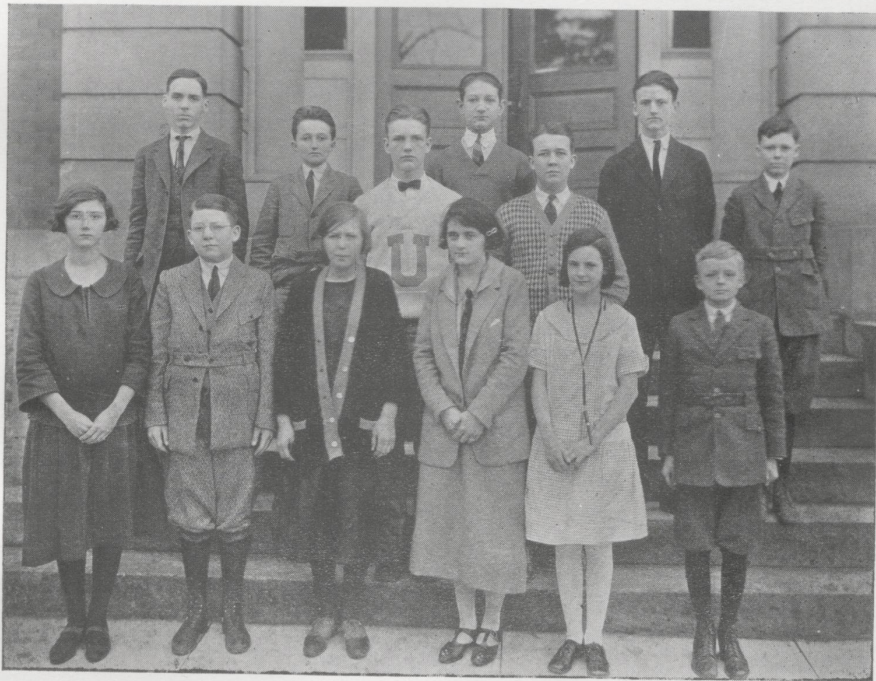
## FRESHMEN

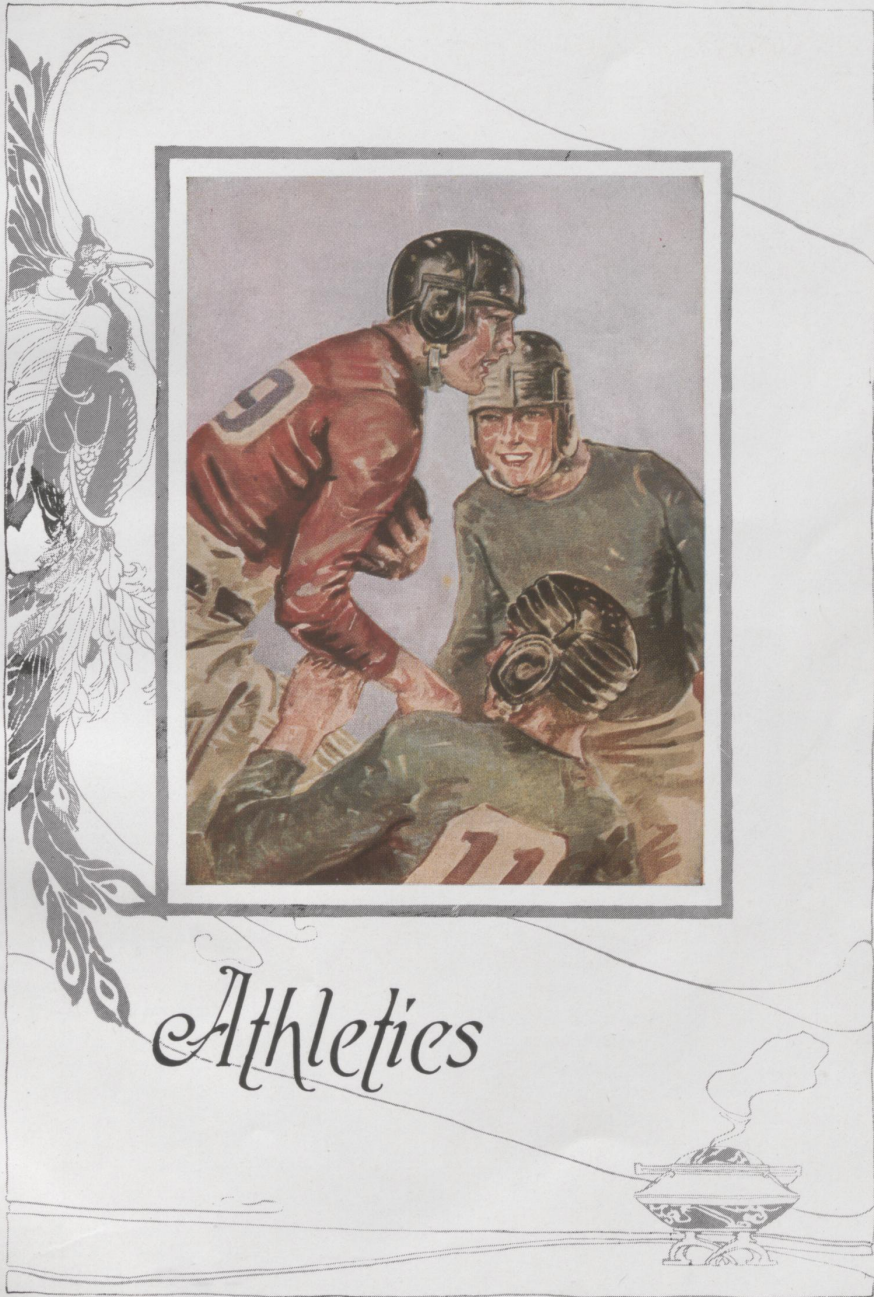


### AN APPRECIATION

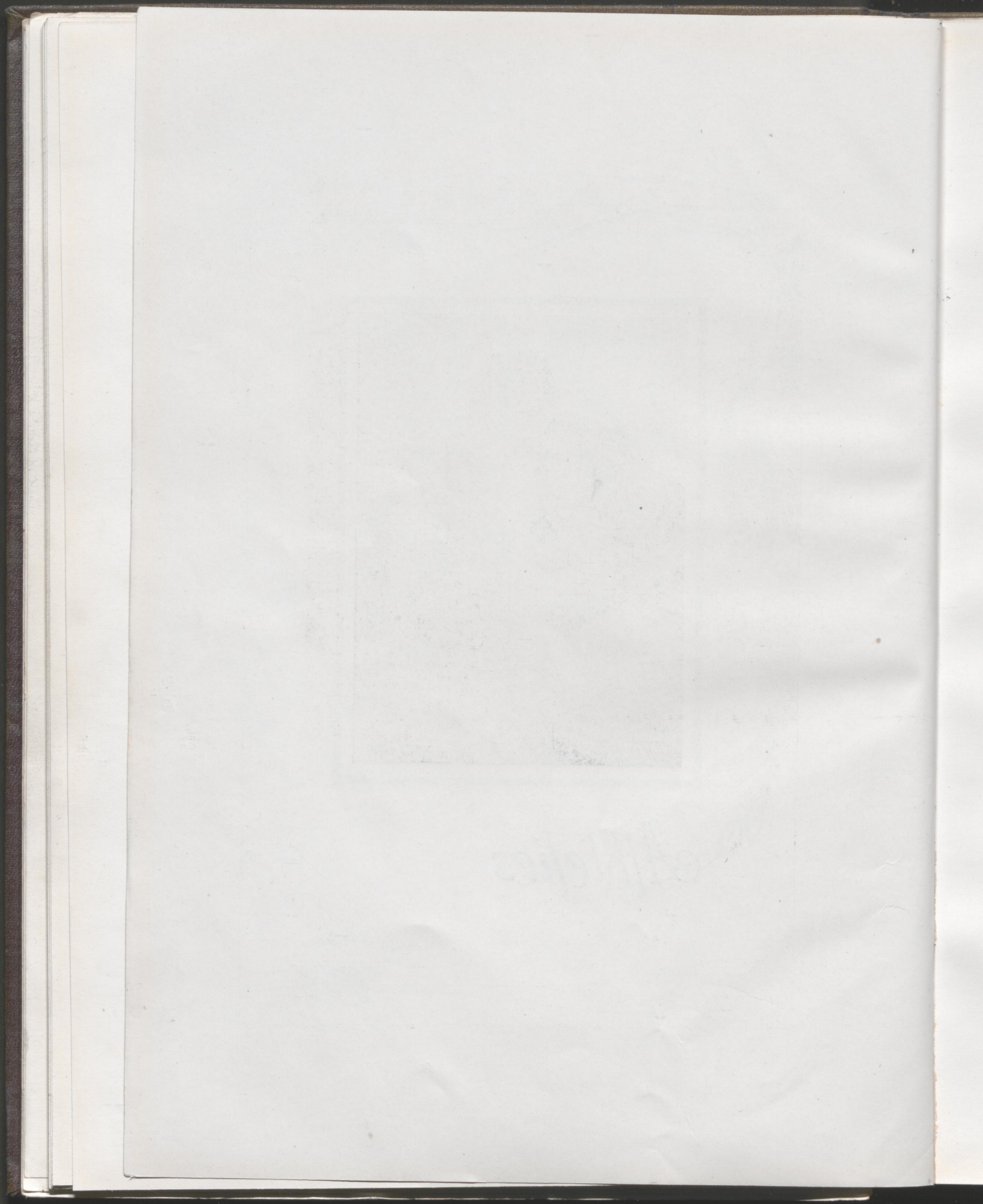
It was with deepest regrets that we learned of the resignation of Professor H. P. Fling as principal of University High School.

### COACH R. E. JAGGERS

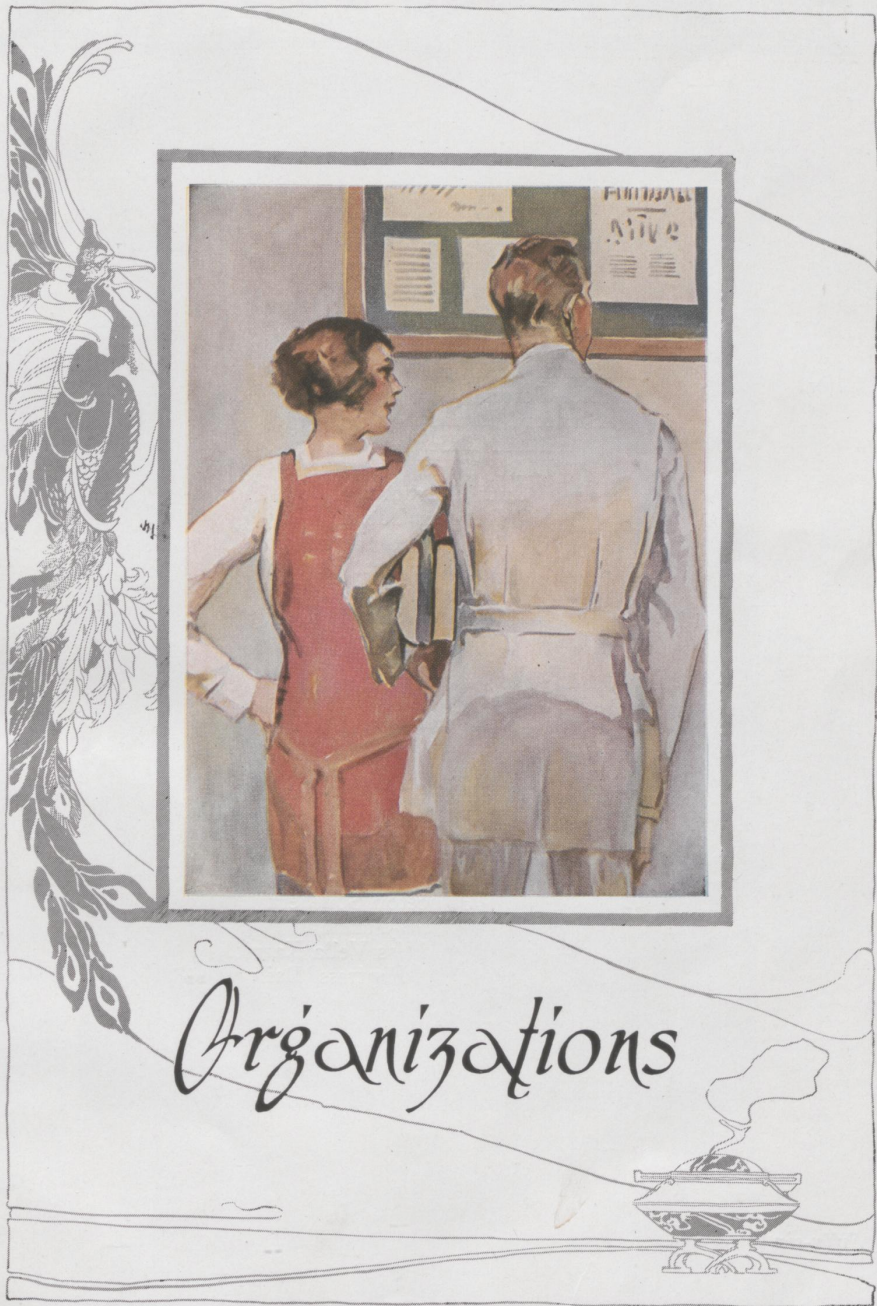
In the past, the chief difficulty of athletic activities at University High School has been the inability to secure a director of athletics.
