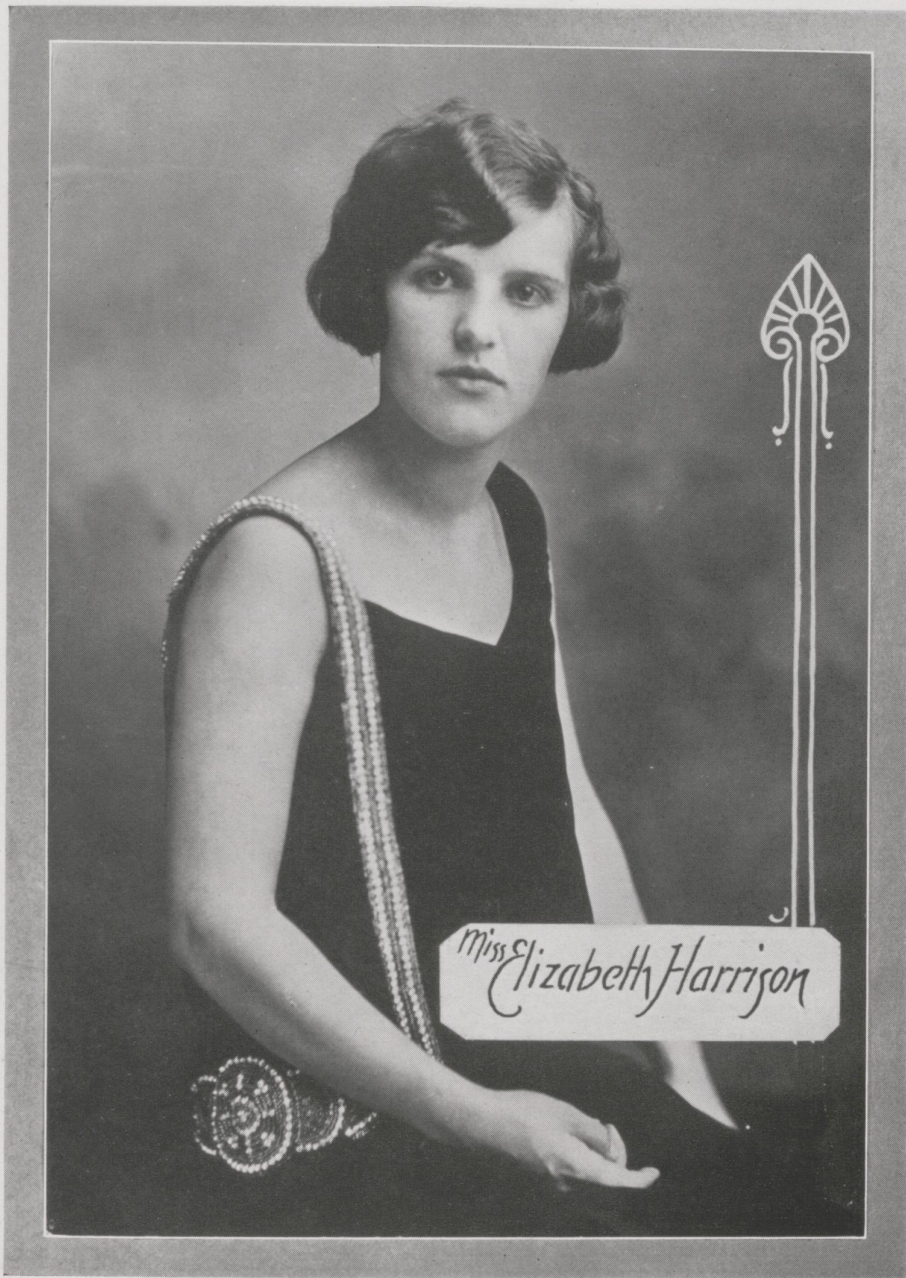
VANITY FAIR

This time we were not so successful in football because of a lack of experienced and proper material, but we were represented by the best basket ball team that has ever been produced at this school. The success of the team was due to two facts. Pat Gormley, midget forward and captain elect, never failed to gain the admiration of the crowd by his stellar floor work and sensational goal shooting.

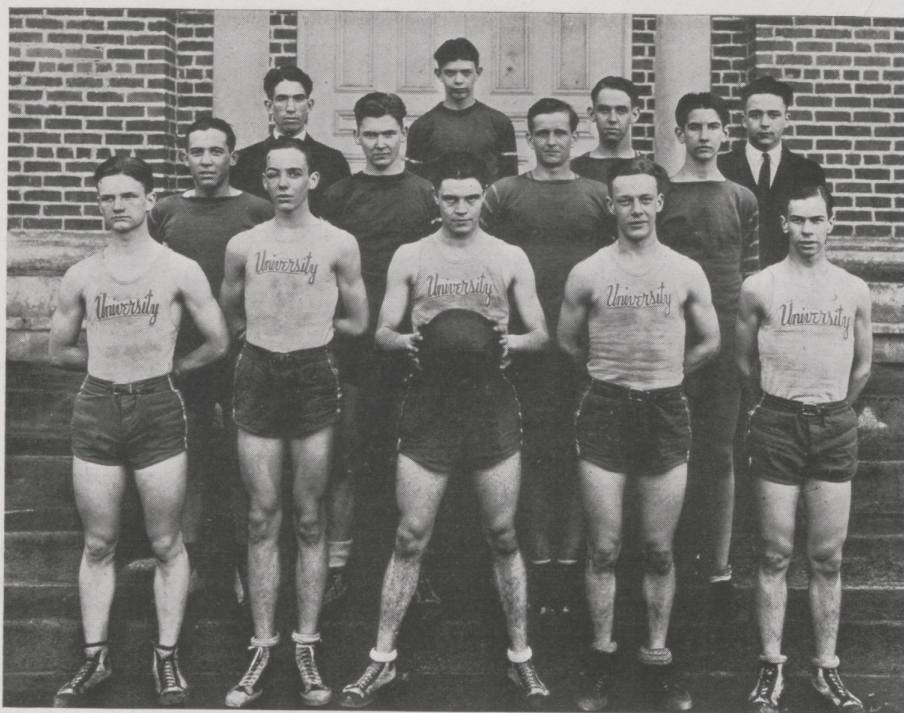
John Giles, a beginner in the profession, advanced very rapidly to his position on the team and could always be depended on when called into action.
