A Trip to the Campus

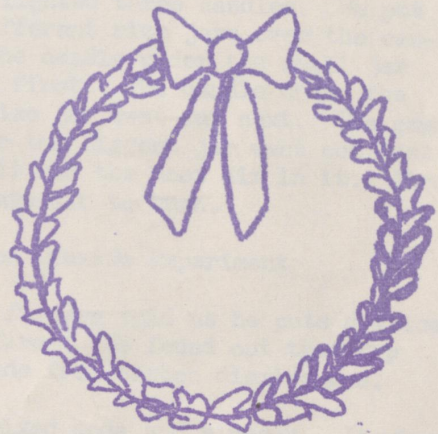
The First Grade took a walk. We saw some pretty trees. We saw a cannon. We saw our American flag. A dog wanted to play with us. We found slick buckeyes.

Fire Experiment

Alarm Room

In the firemen's bedroom there were ten beds and a big gong to wake them up. Five firemen stay there for a day and night. Then the other five come. They put their pants and boots by their beds every night so they can get dressed quickly.

The first scene shows the firemen coming home from a fire. They clean up and get everything ready before going to bed.

Kitchen

We went into the kitchen and saw where they cook their own food.

The second scene shows some people walking down the street. They see a fire and turn in the alarm at a fire box.

The third scene shows the firemen waking up when the alarm comes in and rushing off to the fire.

The fourth scene shows the people running out of the house and the firemen putting out the fire.

How to Turn in an Alarm at a Fire Box.

1. Raise cover.
2. Pull lever down once.
3. Wait until firemen come and show them where the fire is.

How to Turn in an Alarm Over the Telephone

If you live in the county, dial 3-1224.

If you live in the city, dial 3-3335.

- Tell them your address.
- Tell them what is on fire.
- Tell them the owner of what is on fire.

What to do if Your Clothes Catch on Fire.

1. Wrap a rug or coat or anything around you.
2. Lie down and roll over and over to smother out the fire.
3. Do not run. It fans the fire and makes it burn faster.

If Your House is on Fire

1. Get all the people out.
2. Turn in the alarm.
3. Get far away from the fire.
4. Keep quiet and think what you are doing.

5. Two telephones we can use to send in an alarm.

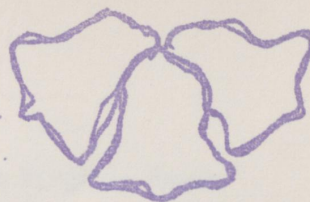

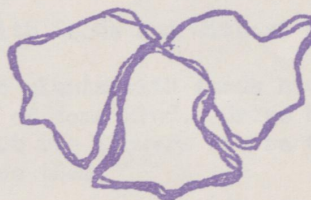
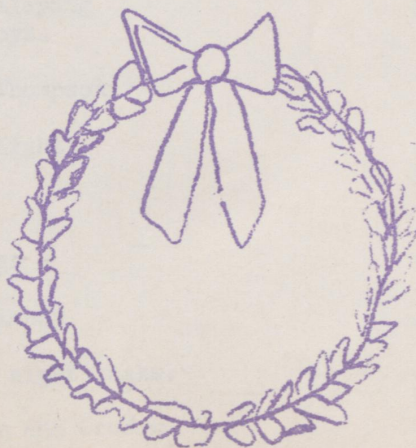

The Starfish

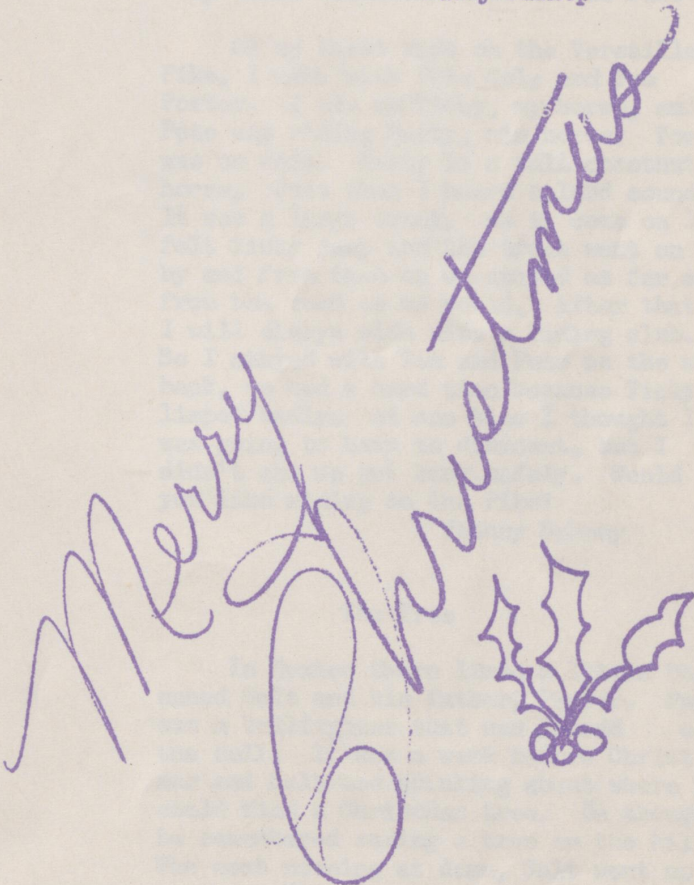
