

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FOREWORD

The Inventory of the County Archives of Mississippi is one of a number of bibliographies of historical materials prepared throughout the United States by workers on the Historical Records Survey Program of the Work Projects Administration. The publication herewith presented, an inventory of the archives of Grenada County, is number 22 of the Mississippi series.

The Historical Records Survey Program was undertaken in the winter of 1935-36 for the purpose of providing useful employment to needy unemployed historians, lawyers, teachers and research and elerical workers. In carrying out this objective, the project was organized to compile inventories of historical materials, particularly the unpublished government documents and records which are basic in the administration of local government, and which provide invaluable data for students of political, economic, and social history. The archival guide herewith presented is intended to meet the requirements of day-to-day administration by the officials of the county, and also the needs of lawyers, business men and other citizens who require facts from the public records for the proper conduct of their affairs. The volume is so designed that it can be used by the historian in his research in unprinted sources in the same way he uses the library card catalog for printed sources.

The inventories produced by the Historical Records Survey Program attempt to do more than give merely a list of records - they attempt further to sketch in the historical background of the county or other unit of government, and to describe precisely and in detail the organization and functions of the government agencies whose records they list. The county, town, and other local inventories for the entire country will, when completed, constitute an encyclopedia for local government as well as a bibliography of local archives.

The successful conclusion of the work of the Historical Records Survey Program, even in a single county, would not be possible without the support of public officials, the historical and logal specialists, and many other groups in the community. Their cooperation is gratefully acknowledged.

The Survey Program was organized and has been directed by Luther H. Evans, and operated as a nation-wide series of locally sponsored projects in the Division of Professional and Service Projects, of which Mrs. Florence Kerr, Assistant Commissioner, is in charge.

PREFACE

Work on the Historical Records Survey began in Mississippi in February 1936 as a part of the program of the Federal Writers' Project and under the supervision of William B. Haynie. In November 1936 the Mississippi Survey became a separate unit of Federal Project No. 1 with Mr. Haynie as State Director. In July 1937 Charles C. Fisher, editor-in-chief, was made State Director and in July 1938, Dr. Percy L. Rainwater, for 11 years in the department of history at the University of Mississippi, was appointed head of the Survey. In August 1939 Dr. Rainwater resigned and Miss Moina Evans was named Director.

By an act of Congress, Federal Project No. 1 was abolished on August 31, 1939 and the Historical Records Survey was made a State project to be maintained under the official sponsorship of Dr. William D. McCain, Director of the Mississippi Department of Archives and History, and under the cooperative sponsorship of local governmental agencies. It now functions as a State-wide project of the Division of Professional and Service Projects of the Work Projects Administration, of which Miss Ethel Payne is State Director. It is in the Research and Records Section of this division under the supervision of Felix J. Underwood, Jr.

To attain its general objective, the Survey has examined thoroughly and carefully, records kept by State, county, and municipal governments. In addition, preliminary lists of historical manuscripts, maps, and early American imprints contained in private, official, and unofficial collections have been prepared. Much has also been accomplished in locating and inventorying the records of all churches in all counties. In completing this particular task, the Survey will include the records of defunct churches if it is possible to locate them.

The Survey has stressed the completion of a State-wide inventory of county records, and the preparation and publication of the completed inventories. It plans to publish the Inventory of the County Archives of Mississippi in 82 units, one for each county in the State. Each unit will be numbered separately from one to 82, its number depending on the relative position of the county in an alphabetical list of all counties. Thus, the inventory of the records of Gronada County, herewith presented, is number 22. The inventories of State archives, and of municipal, church, and other local records will be published separately.

The survey of the records of Grenada County was started February 1, 1938 and was completed August 10, 1938. The field inventory was rechecked between January 6 and February 10, 1939. The preliminary draft received a further recheck in August 1939, and a final recheck in March 1940.

The inventory of the records of Grenada County is the fifth county inventory prepared for publication. It is arranged so that the records of the executive branch of county government come first, followed by those of the recording, judicial, law enforcement, fiscal, and miscellaneous agencies. Included also is a short essay on each agency of county government including

organization of the agency in Grenada County, its present status, the method of filling the office, and the term of office.

The Survey has followed general regulations and procedures applicable to all WPA project units in the 48 States. Mississippi WPA officials have given the Survey their cordial support and assistance. The Survey also acknowledges the interest and cooperation of the Grenada County officials in its work in their county.

The State office has profited in all phases of its work by the constructive advice and criticism of the national office and its representatives.

John C. L. Andreassen, Regional Supervisor, has rendered invaluable assistance during his visits to the office. This inventory in manuscript form was edited by Mabel S. Brodie, assistant archivist in charge of public records inventories, of the Library of Congress project staff.

This unit of the Inventory of the County Archives of Mississippi is being issued in mimeographed form by the Survey for free distribution to State and local public officials and libraries in Mississippi and to a limited number of libraries and governmental agencies outside the State. The inventory was prepared in the State office of the Survey by an editorial staff composed of Elsie May Chambers, Bessie Kate Bradford, Zelma Ruth Jolley, Dixon Pyles, and Fred Beacham, editorial assistants; and Robert E. Strong, Assistant State Supervisor and editor-in-chief.

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1. HISTORICAL SKETCH

Grenada County, situated in the north central portion of Mississippi, contains 442 square miles or 282,380 acros. 2 It was created May 9, 1870 from parts of Carroll, Choctaw, Tallahatchie, and Yalobusha Counties, 3 and is a fairly regular parallelogram, bounded on the north by Tallahatchie and Yalobusha Counties, on the east by Calhoun and Wobster Counties, on the south by Montgomery and Carroll Counties, and on the west by Leflore and Tallahatchie Counties. The boundaries of the county, which have never been changed, were described as: "Beginning at the northwest corner of township 22, range 2, east; thence east along said township line to the southwest corner of section 34, township 23, range 3, east; thence north to the northwest corner of said section; thence east along section line to range 4; thence north on said range line to township line 24; thence east along said township line to the northwest corner of section 3, township 23, range 5, east; thence south to the southwest corner of section 10, township 23, range 5, east; thence east along section line to the eastern boundary of range 7, east; thence south along said range line to the southeast corner of section 13, township 21, range 7, east; thence west along section line to the southwest corner of section 18, township 21, range 2, east; thence north to the beginning."4

Varying from level to hilly land, and drained mainly by the Yalobusha River and its tributaries, Grenada County has a varying topography with no outstanding scenic features. The eastern and most of the central section of the county are included in the Loess Hill section of the State, while the central section along the Yalobusha River, as well as the western area, is in the Alluvial Plain, known as the Yazoo Dolta, lying between the Yazoo and Mississippi Rivers. 5 The Loess Hills, composed of brown loam overlying yellowish, calcareous silt, are exceedingly fortile, although still not so rich as the Alluvial Plain to the west. This Plain, enriched through many centruies by the overflow from the Mississippi River and tributary streams, consists of dark, sandy loam near the streams, and black, sticky clay in other parts.6

The robust and extensive timber formerly growing thickly over the Loess . Hills consisted almost entirely of hardwoods, now largely cut off. Yellow popular, magnolia, honeylocust, mulberry, linden, elm, chestnut, white oak, walnut, and beech trees still grow in parts of the Locss Hills not cleared. Such smaller bushes or tree growths as: chinquapin, witchhazel, dogwood, crab apple, iron wood, pawpaw, red maple, and redbud flourish extensively in the county, together with the grey-moss and numerous climbing vines, wild grape, Virginia creeper, poison-oak, crossvine, trumpetcreeper, and, in the open places, the Cherokee rose. 7

The Delta section of the county where the forest trees still remain, has much the same profusion of timber growth as the Loess Hills, as well as a greater variety of oak, and many cypress and gum trees, willow, cottonwoods, and sycamore. Along the stream banks grows the bluecane, and over all the Delta section a large number of vines and tree-growths, little different from those of the hills.

The climate of the county is mild. Temperature readings covering a period of 38 years for this section of the State show a mean annual average temperature of 64.4; an annual average maximum of 75.3; and average annual minimum 53.4.9 The annual precipitation for the same area is 50.52 inches.10

The section of Mississippi in which Grenada County is situated was Choctaw Indian country. However, the Chocchuma invaded and occupied it until they were exterminated in a general war, the last battle of which was fought on the Old Grenada Road six miles west of Bellefontaine in what is now Webster County. 11

Early travelers considered the Choctaw treacherous or honorable according to the degree of success of their own dealings with them, but all admitted that they were "ready witted, and endued with a flow of smooth, artful language":12 They were usually courageous, with an intense love of their land. Unlike most Indians, few of them could swim, since their country contained few large streams or lakes. However, they excelled other Indian tribes in the raising of crops, chiefly corn, and they took pride in their ability to combine farming skill with fertile land and a favorable climate to produce rich yields. The Choctaw engaged in little hunting for subsistence. Their customs generally were not different from other tribes, except in their habit of flattoning the foreheads of their infants by fastening a bag of sand to the skull. 13 Several place names in the county indicate an Indian Origin; the early towns of Tuscahoma and Chocchuma, and such names of streams as, Buttaputtan, Lossa Scoona, Batupan Bogue, and Yalobusha. The Choctaw country, spread over most of central Mississippi and into Alabama, had from 15,000 to 20,000 native inhabitants around 1700, when the tribe first came into relations with French explorers. 14 More than a century elapsed, however, before the Choctaw relinquished their title to the territory which was eventually to become Grenada County. One mound south of Coffeeville in Yalobusha County remains as tangible evidence of Choctaw residence in this vicinity. 15

In 1541 Hornando De Soto and his Spanish expedition passed through or near the land now included in Grenada County and spent the winter in "the village of Chicasa, situated in a beautiful plain in the valley of the Yalobusha River." Spain thus established claim to this territory, but "Spanish occupation did not keep pace with Spanish claims,"17 and there was no colonization. England claimed the land including Grenada County in 1629, 18 and the French likewise in 1582, 19 as did the State of Georgia. 20 None of these claims had any influence in shaping events in Grenada County, since the Indians continued to dwell unmolested there until at least 1798, when Congress created the Mississippi Territory, 21 and immigration was stimulated. In 1802 the Federal Government paid Georgia 91,250,000 for its claims 22 and in 1817 the land now comprising Grenada County was included in the State of Mississippi.23

The Indian title to the region was extinguished by the Treaty of Dancing Rabbit Creek, September 27, 1830.24 After the government survey of the Cession was completed, 25 the United States land office for the northwestern district of Mississippi was established at the now extinct town of Choccahuma, 17 miles west of the present city of Grenada. 26 In 1840 the office was moved to Grenada, 27

On December 23, 1833, the lands obtained from the Choctaw Indians were divided into 16 counties: Noxubee, Kemper, Lauderdale, Clarke, Oktibbeha, Winston, Choctaw, Tallahatchie, Yalobusha, Carroll, Jasper, Neshoba, Smith, Scott, Leake, and Attala. 28 Three more, Bolivar, Coahoma, and Newton were organized in 1836 from counties already ostablished, 29 and in 1844 Sunflower County was created. 30

In the Reconstruction Period which followed the close of the Civil War. Gronada, Webster, Leflore, and Quitman Counties were established; Grenada from

park of Carroll, Choctaw, Tallahatchie, and Yalobusha. 31

The act creating Grenada County designated the town of Grenada as the county seat and provided for the appointment by the Governor of five members of the board of supervisors, a sheriff, a coroner, an assessor, a treasurer, a surveyor, a clerk of the circuit court, a clerk of the chancery court, and a competent number of justices of the peace, all of whom were to serve until the general election of 1871 and until their successors were qualified. 32

Lebbeus French was appointed shoriff on May 18, 1870 and tax collector on May 28.33 William B. Davis was appointed clerk of the circuit court on May 23.34 J. D. LeFlore, Dr. John L. Milton, F. P. Ingram, Andrew Davis, and Freeland Towns were named to the board of supervisors. 35 James B. Townsend was made clerk of the chancery court June 25, James W. Hall, assessor on August 9, and Thomas C. Buffington, Treasurer on December 2.36

The board held its first meeting on May 30, 1870 in the office of Dr. John L. Milton above Lake Brother's store. J. D. LeFlore was elected president and Dr. Milton was chosen secretary pro-tem, to serve until the appointment of a clerk of the chancery court, by law the clerk of the board. At this meeting the board fixed the boundaries of the five supervisors' districts and adjourned to meet the first Monday of June. 37

The appointed members of the board served until their successors were elected at the general elections of November 1871 and sworn into office in January 1872.38 The original board organized the county, provided for the first courthouse, 39 ordered transcriptions made of the land records of the territory in the counties from which Grenada County was created, 40 established schools, and laid out and constructed roads and bridges. 41

County officers elected on November 7, 1871 were: Andrew Davis, Edward Scott, Douglas Green, Freeland Towns, and Robert H. Turner, members of the board of supervisors; Charles P. Lincoln, clerk of the chancery court; William B. Davis, clerk of the circuit court; J. T. Parker, treasurer; Lebbeus French, sheriff and tax collector; and Henry B. Heath, tax assessor.42

At its August 1870 meeting the board of supervisors appointed a commission

composed of Lebbeus French, the sheriff; William B. Davis, the clerk of the circuit court; and Dr. John L. Milton, a member of the board; to buy or lease a suitable place in the town of Grenada for a county courthouse.43 On August 4, the commission reported that A. S. Brown, a citizen of the town, offered to sell the county his frame store building and lot, situated on the northwest corner of the public square, for \$3,000. This report was acted on favorably and the purchase was ordered. At the same meeting the board rented two rooms on the first floor and the second floor attic to W. M. Harkins for \$8 a month for a period of three to 12 months or longer.45

The commission was retained and was instructed to have the building painted and partitioned into offices, a courtroom, and jury rooms. It was further ordered to procure suitable and substantial furnishings for the courthouse including "a water bucket, 30 split-bottomed chairs, one hair seat for the court, one stone water pitcher, one metal dipper, one tumbler, three hoop water buckets, and two reflector side lamps."46

In September 1870 the board contracted with James Ladd to build a jail at a cost of \$16,000.47 However, by 1880 extensive repairs were made to this building by H. P. McDonald and Brother, for the sum of \$2,362.50,48 paid by warrants issued June 1, 1881.49

Land on which to erect a new courthouse was purchased in 1883 and the building now in use was completed in 1884.50

The earliest known settlement in the territory which is now Grenada County was Elliot, established by the American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions, as a missionary station for the Choctaw Indians. The village practically passed out of existence after the removal of the Indians to the west by the terms of the Treaty of Dancing Rabbit Creek. It is situated 15 miles south of the town of Grenada and has a population of 128. Another settlement was Troy, made in the early 1830's five miles below Grenada on the Yalobusha River. This town died out as most of its inhabitants moved to Grenada. The settlement of Tuscahoma, 12 miles northwest of the county seat grew into a town of 300 by 1836 when it was incorporated, but by 1850 it was extinct.51

The town of Grenada, situated at the fork of the Yalobusha River and Batupan Bogue Creek, was formed and incorporated in 183652 by the merging of two rival and adjoining settlements, Tulahoma and Pittsburg. The two villages

were settled soon after the Choctaw Cession was open to white occupation, Tulahoma by Hiram G. Runnels and Pittsburg by Franklin E. Plummer. Runnels, Governor of Mississippi 1833-35 and Plummer, a United States congressman from Mississippi, were uncompromising political opponents as well as competitive land speculators. The two villages carried on a bitter and partisan fight for supremacy but consolidated in 1836 with the help of a law enacted by the legislature and a mock marriage ceremony symbolic of the union. 53

Transportation and communication in the days of early settlement were by means of meandering dirt roads or the Yalobusha River. 54 Sometimes goods were brought in or out by a land-water route, overland from Grenada to Manchester, now Yazoo City, on the Yazoo River, and thence on that river to the Mississippi.55 A stagecoach line from Jackson to Memphis ran through what is now Grenada County, the first coach going over the route in January 1838. 56 The rate was $6\frac{1}{2}$ cents per mile. 57 Travel, however, by river or land was apt to be affected by the weather or the failure of means of transport, and there were complaints especially about the slowness of delivery of the mails. 58

The town of Grenada was a railroad center long before it became the seat of justice of Grenada County. The Grenada Railroad Company was incorporated May 13, 1837 to build a railroad from Grenada to Douglas, in Carroll County, a distance of 35 miles. 59 In 1852, two railroads, both passing through Grenada, were incorporated. These were the Mississippi Central Railroad60 and the Mississippi and Tennessee Railroad Company. 61 They were given permission to consolidate November 30, 1853, 62 but it was not until March 2, 1859, that they actually merged: 63 The railroad was completed from Grenada to Jackson, Tennessee, January 31, 1860.64 Two years prior to this date, 143,488 bales of cotton had been shipped over this road, and in 1860 the amount was doubled.65 railroad, the Grenada, Houston, and Eastern, was incorporated in 1860,66 to construct a road from Grenada to Pittsboro in Calhoun County and "if deemed practicable. . . to Houston in Chickasaw County and eastward to the Mobile and Ohio railroad and to the Alabama line. . . "67 The official map of Mississippi of 1871 shows that this road was built to Okolona, where it connected with the

Mobile and Ohio. 68

During the Civil War practically all railway tracks in and around Gronada were destroyed by Federal troops under General A. P. Hovey and General B. H. Grierson.69 In 1862, General Grant had 15 or 20 locomotives and 100 cars burned at Grenada.70 In 1864, floods swept away many of the remaining bridges on the Mississippi Central.71 With the close of hostilities, however, the railroad companies began the work of rebuilding their tracks.72 New ventures in railway transportation were also undertaken, and among the reads incorporated soon after the close of the war were the Grenada and Prentiss Railroad Company on February 21, 1867, 73 the Grenada and Meridian Railroad on February 19, 1867, 74 and the Grenada, Louisville, and Meridian Railroad Company, in 1870.75 In 1878, the Mississippi Central Railroad was consolidated with the Now Orleans, Jackson, and Great Northern; 76 and in 1882, the Illinois Central assumed control of the road after the legislative act to that effect was approved on March 1 of that year. 77 At the present time, Grenada is at the junction of the main line of the Illinois Central and its Memphis Division, and a branch of the Yazoo-Mississippi Valley Railroad. 78

Two State highways and one Federal highway run through the county at present. United States highway 51, following north to south in a general way the old Memphis-Jackson stagecoach road, is paved throughout the county. State highway 7, running through the county from southwest to northeast, is paved in the section northeast of the town of Grenada; and State highway 8, running from Grenada east, is unpaved, but is a good secondary road. Two bus lines operate over these roads; the Tri-State Lines on U. S. 51 and State 7, northeast to Holly Springs; and the Normis Bus line to Calhoun City on the east and Charleston on the northwest of the city of Grenada. There are no airports in the county and hence no regular air travel or air mail. Of the several landing fields, the largest is at Grenada, located at the fair grounds. 79 Communication is aided by radio station WGRM, at Grenada. 80

The earliest newspaper in what is now Gronada County of which there is record was the Pittsburg Bulletin, a weekly, published at Pittsburg, one of the two towns merged to form Grenada. Founded early in 1835, and selling for \$4.00 per year, the paper had as editor, John J. Hamilton.81 The Grenadian,

a weekly, established December 7, 1838, was \$5 for the year, and its first editor was W. F. Hampton. Later editors were N. C. Hampton and J. N. Newton. 82 There are no known extant copies of the Bowie Knife, a Grenada weekly began publication about March 1839, also edited by John J. Hamilton. 83 The Southern Reporter, a weekly, was first issued May 18, 1839, with William Reed and James N. Newton as editors.84 On January 6, 1842, Col. F. A. Tyler, as editor and proprietor, began to publish the Weekly Register.85 Also in 1842, on September 1, appeared the Herald, publisher and proprietor, J. J. Choate, Jr.; editor, T. B. Homer. 86 Choate was editor of another Grenada weekly, Harry Of The West, which appeared March 9, 1844, championing, as its name indicates, the presidential aspirations of Henry Clay. This paper was edited by J. E. P. Bacon, with W. T. Sledge, publisher and proprietor, after July 5, 1845.87 Two weekly newspapers and one daily are published at the present time in Grenada County, all being issued in the county seat. The older of the weeklies, the Gronada Sentinel, 88 was established in 1857 by J. Augustine and has had as editors and publishers J. W. Buchanan, O. F. Lawrence, W. W. Whitaker, and the present editor, Rice Lawrence. 89 The other weekly, the Grenada County Weekly, began publication in 1937 with W. W. Whitaker as editor, and the Grenada Nows, a daily, has been published since 1936 by Frank Jones, Sr., publisher and oditor, 90

Educational advantages likewise were available in this section sometime before the county was organized. In 1839 two academies, Gronada Male and Grenada Female, were established. 91 School funds in township 22, range 5, cast, were appropriated to the academies equally. 92 They were abolished in 1856, however, and the funds transferred to township schools. 93 On the same date, February 15, 1839, that the academies were established, Gronada College was also incorporated, 94 but there was no connection between this early school, which was short-lived, and the Grenada College of 1875. The Yalobusha Baptist Female Institute, established in 1851,95 and incorporated in 1852,96 flourished until the outbreak of the Civil War, when it was closed and used as a hospital. 97 In 1867, it was reopened as the Emma Mercer Institute. 98 A stock company purchased the property in 1875, calling it Grenada Female College and employing

Dr. D. D. Moore, of Tennessee, as president. 99 Other changes followed, and the Methodist Church procured the property, re-naming it Grenada Collegiate Institute. 100 In 1939, Grenada College, as it came to be known, was permanently closed by the North Mississippi Conference of the Methodist Church. The buildings have been converted into a modern hotel.

Following the legislative act to organize a uniform system of public schools throughout the State, 101 passed a short time after Grenada County was organized, 11 schools were established in the county during its first year, seven of which were white and four negro. 102 Six years later, in 1877, 49 schools attended by 3,448 children (white and negro), functioned in the county. 103 In the 1938-39 session there were 1,940 white children and 3,051 negro children enrolled in all schools in the county. 104 The county has three accredited high schools, the Grenada High School being accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. 105

Grenada's churches also had their beginning many years before the county was established. The first Sunday School, inter-denominational, was organized in 1838. 106 William Minter and J. C. Hall, pioneer Baptist ministers, organized and built a small Baptist Church in Grenada in the same year, 107 while the Presbyterians had organized in 1837. 108 James Sims donated a lot on which the first Mothodist Church was erected in Grenada in 1850.109 Grace Church was organized as a parish of the Episcopal Diocese of Mississippi and was admitted to the Diocese in 1840. Services were irregular but in 1870 Grace Parish was again admitted to the Diocese, lll and in 1873 it was given the name by which it is known at present, All Saints. ll2 The Yalobusha Baptist Associátion, which embraced the Baptist Churches of Grenada County for many years, was organized January 15, 1836 at Troy. 113 A Roman Catholic mission of the

parish or missionary district of Water Valley was established by Father Maurel in the town of Grenada in 1877 and at the present time there is a station in the city where mass is said in a private home. 114

Grenada County was a rather thickly populated section when it was organized, having an aggregate population of 10,571, in 1870.115 Of this number, 3,929 were white and the remainder negroes.116 The population has increased steadily but rather slowly since that time, reaching a total of 16,802 in 1930, of whom 6,754 were native white, and 9,987 negroes. Only 61 residents of the county are of other groups than native white or negro. 117 Per square mile, the density of population is 38.0118 which is below the State average of 43.4.119 Grenada, the largest town, had a population of 4,349 in 1930.120 Two other incorporated places, Holcomb and Elliott, have populations of 229 and 128, respectively.121

Although this section is tending to become more industrialized, agriculture remains of primary importance to the economy of the county. The county had 444 farms in 1870, 122 929 in 1880, 123 and 2,301 in 1930, 124 In 1870, 6,479 bales of cotton and 191,675 bushels of corn were produced in the county. 125 In 1880, the production amounted to 10,228 bales of cotton and only 163,580 bushels of corn. 126 The 1930 consus figures show that 13,359 bales of cotton and 365,754 bushels of corn were raised in that year. 127 Farm land was valued at \$1,006,960 the year the county was organized, and 56,828 acros were listed as improved land. 128 In 1930, the farm land of Grenada County totaled 163,711 acres, of which 63,140 acres were crop land. The average size of the

present day farm is 71.1 acres, 129 as compared with an average 201 acre farm in 1880. 130 The total value of all the land in 1930 was \$1,985,536. 131 The rural population of the county numbers 12,453 132 out of a total of 16,802, indicating that the county is largely dependent on its agriculture for a livelihood. 133

In 1936 the cotton crop year was worth \$1,075,275, while all other crops amounted to only \$571,942.134 The value of livestock in the county has not greatly changed, the value in 1870 being \$385,493, 135 and in 1936, \$443,353.136 The gross income per farm, there being 2,287 in the county in 1936, was \$914.11 against a State average of \$963.99.137 After several years of acreage reduction, Grenada County produced only 9,223 bales of cotton in 1938.138 Although the county is not yet an industrial center, its industries are of some significance. In 1870 there were 19 manufacturing plants in the county with an output valued at \$42,700.139 The value of manufactured products in 1936 was \$1,456,513.140

At the town of Tie Plant, two miles south of the county seat, is a plant for the treatment of cross-ties, poling, and lumber with creosote or zincchloride to prevent decay and rot. The plant is located on a tract of 500 acres, employs 175 men, and has a payroll of \$1,800 weekly. 141 The Federal Compress and Warehouse, founded 1885 in the town of Grenada, for the storage of cotton, can accommodate 23,500 bales. This company has a payroll of \$26,000 yearly. 142 Much of the timber of the county has been cut off, but mills are still active, and second growth timber, together with the remnant of the original forest, guarantees some lumbering in the county for many years to come. The D. L. Fail Lumber Company of Grenada, employs 75 men, on a payroll of \$3,000 per month. 143 The Grenada Oil Mill, at Grenada, employs 40 men during the active season in its plant for the crushing of cottonseed, and can process 10 tons of cottonseed a day. This mill offers a ready market for seed and furnishes a supply of cottonseed products. 144



2. GOVERNMENTAL ORGANIZATION AND RECORDS SYSTEM

Legal Status of the county

The county in Mississippi, as in other commonwealths, is a territorial area established by the State government for convenience of administration. The State Supreme Court has ruled that a "county is a governmental agency, created for local purposes" by the State. According to the court, "The counties of this state are in certain respects municipal corporations, charged with the duty of making provisions for the building of bridges and the making of roads, and this duty is committed to the board of supervisors of the respective counties, and their duties in this respect are defined by statute." The county is mentioned many times in the Constitution of 1890 and its existence is clearly taken for granted, yet counties are not created by the constitution nor given any powers by it. This fact has led the Supreme Court to say that the "powers of. . . the county are statutory. . . But the county is not a municipal corporation in all respects; it is really a quasi-municipal corporation for in regard to its liability to be sued it partakes of the immunity of the State itself. A county, with us, has certain prerogatives and judicial powers, and with respect to the exercise of such powers it may not ordinarily be sued. But a county is also, for many purposes, a corporation. . . . Our laws provide that a county may hold property, may sue and be sued, etc.; and in these respects it is a corporation, or at least is clothed with corporate functions in relation to such

The county may sue and be sued, 4 but the Supreme Court has ruled that a county is immune from liability to the same extent that the state is, and unless statute authorizes a suit the county cannot be held liable. 5 The legislature has authorized suits against the county by providing that when a person having a just claim against the county and has presented it to the board of supervisors and the board has refused to allow it, the claimant may appeal from the judgment of the board to the circuit court, or may bring suit against the county.6

With respect to the creation of counties, the Constitution of 1890 provides that "No new county shall be formed unless a majority of the qualified electors voting in each part of the county or counties proposed to be dismombored and embraced in the new county, shall separately vote therefor. . . . The elections shall not be held in any county oftener than once in four years. No new county shall contain less than four hundred square miles; nor shall any

existing county be reduced below that size."7 The constitution also permits the legislature to provide for the consolidation of existing counties if a majority of the qualified electors of the counties to be consolidated vote in favor of the consolidation.8 Apparently the legislature cannot abolish a county without the consent of a majority of the qualified electors in the area concerned, but it may however, change the boundaries of any county without the consent of the local electorate.

Registration of Title to Property

Every conveyance of real or personal property, to be valid and to serve as constructive notice to all subsequent purchasers, must be lodged for recording with the clerk of the chancery court as recorder and must be acknowledged as his voluntary act by the person who executed it, or proved by one or more of the subscribing witnesses to the instrument. The acknowledgment or proof must be in writing on the instrument and must be signed by the officer before whom it was made. 19 The sheriff's certified lists of lands sold to individuals or struck off to the state for taxes must be recorded by the clerk of the chancery court as recorder, 10 as must lis pendens notices of suits begun to enforce a lien, right, interest in, or easement in any real estate when the claim is not based on any judgment or decree proviously entered or recorded. 11

To insure adequate descriptions of boundaries, the board of supervisors must furnish the office of the clerk of the chancery court as recorder with a copy of the field notes of the original United States Survey, transcriptions of the records of other counties which affect titles to land in Grenada County, transcriptions of original entries of land, and all necessary township plats and surveys. 12 Since 1920 the board has been required to furnish the office of the clork of the chancery court as recorder with a sectional index to all land conveyances and other instruments touching or concerning title to land in the county. 13 The board may provide a complete abstract of title to land in the county.14

Judiciary

Civil and common law jurisdiction is vosted in the circuit court and in the justice of peace courts. The circuit court has civil jurisdiction in all actions in which the amount in controversy exceeds \$200 and in all other causes not exclusively cognizable in some other court. 15 It also has jurisdiction in cases transferred to it by the chancery court and remanded to it by the Supreme Court, and appealed to it from justice of peace court. 16 Justice of the peace courts are given civil jurisdiction in all actions in which the amount in controversy is \$200 or less, 17 in matters of unlawful entry and detainor, 18 and in the partition of personal property when the appraised value of the property involved does not exceed \$200.19 A justice of the peace is chosen by the clerk of the circuit court to conduct hearings in eminent domain proceedings. 20

The circuit court has power to hear and determine all prosecutions in the name of the State for treason, felonies, crimes and misdemeaners, except such as may be exclusively cognizable before some other court; and it has all the powers of a court of over and terminer and general jail delivery. 21 Justice of the peace courts have jurisdiction concurrent with the circuit court over all crimes occurring in their districts in which the punishment prescribed does not exceed a fine and imprisonment in the county jail. 22 In addition, justice of peace have power to conduct preliminary hearings in cases of felonics committed within their respective districts, to bind the accused over to await the action of the grand jury, and to fix the amount of the appearance

The chancery court has both chancery and probate jurisdiction and it is given power to try and determine all matters of equity, divorce and alimony, matters tostamentary and of administration, minors' business, and cases of

idiocy, lunacy, and persons of unsound mind. 24 It has jurisdiction in all causes transferred to it by the circuit court and remanded to it by the Supreme Court.25

The circuit court and the chancery court have concurrent jurisdiction in cases of juvenile delinquency, 26 and in Gronada County this function is oxercised by the chancery court.

Appeals from the judgments and decrees rendered in justice of the peace courts may be taken to the circuit court, 27 and appeals from the judgments and decrees of the circuit and chancery courts may be made to the Supreme Court. 28

Law Enforcement

The sheriff is the principal officer charged with the preservation of the peace. 29 However, constables have the same duty, 30 and if there is a vacancy in the office of sheriff, for any reason, and there is no deputy to act, the coroner performs all the duties of the sheriff except that of collecting taxes. 31 In the event the office of shoriff is vacant for any reason, and there is no deputy to act, and there is no coroner, the circuit judge or the chancellor may appoint some qualified elector of the county to perform the duty of coroner in this regard. 32 All members of the board of supervisors, 33 the circuit judge, the chancellor, and all justices of the peace of the county are conservators of the peace. 34

The coroner is required to hold inquests of all violent and sudden deaths

in the county, 35 but if there is no coroner or the coroner is unable to act, any justice of the peace may hold an inquest and perform all the duties of the

The power and duty of returning indictments and presentments is given to the grand jury.37

Arrests for crimes and offenses may be made by the sheriff, his deputies, or by any constable or conservator of the peace within his county, or by the marshall or policeman of any city, town, or village within the county. Private persons may also make arrest. All persons, when commanded to do so by an officer seeking to arrest an offender, must aid and assist in making the arrest and must obey the commands of the arresting officer. Arrests for criminal offenses and to prevent a breach of the peace may be made at any time and at any place. An officer or private person may make arrests without warrant for an indictable offense committed, a breach of the peace threatened or attempted in his presence, and for a felony committed. An arresting officer or private person, may after giving notice of his object, and admittance is refused, break into any dwelling or house in which he has reason to believe the offender may be found. Escaped offenders may be retaken by the person from whose custody they escaped, at any time and in any county without warrant. All offenders apprehended must be taken before the proper officer without unnecessary delay by the person making the arrest. All officers and others who make arrests legally as authorized and required by law are not liable to a civil or criminal action although it may appear that the person arrested was innocent of any offense. Warrants issued by justices of the peace extend to other counties, and justices of the peace may issue warrants for the arrest and return of any escaped offender to the county in which his offense is cognizable. The sheriff and constables may pursue offenders into other counties and in returning prisoners, may place thom in any jail for safekeeping. 38

The sheriff is the county jailer and has custody of all prisoners. 39 He is required to receive and keep any prisoner committed by any justice of the peace, 40 and he must receive and keep prisoners committed under legal process from officers of the courts of the United States, if the subsistence of such prisoners is secured by the officers delivering the prisoners to him. 41 The

sheriff must see that prisoners have medical attention and he must protect them from mob violence. 42

The district attorney must appear in circuit court, and in the name of the State prosecute all criminal prosecutions, and all persons or corporations for any violation of the constitution or State laws; and he must attend grand jury deliberations when required to do so by the jury, to give necessary information as to the law. 43 The county prosecuting attorney represents the State in the justices of the peace court, assists the district attorney in all criminal cases, and represent the State before the grand jury. 44

The sheriff as the executive officer of the court, is required to execute all sentences imposed by the court. 45

Finance

It was not until 1922, according to the records of the clerk of the board of supervisors as auditor, 46 that the first real effort at budgetary control was made in Grenada County. The law of 1922 made it mandatory on the board of supervisors at its September meeting, to prepare and adopt a budget of county expenses estimated for the next year, and prepare a statement showing the aggregate revenue by sources, collected furing the current year. 47 In 1924 the State Auditor of Public Accounts was directed to prescribe a uniform system of accounts for State and county offices and he was required to inspect their accounts regularly. Further, the law made it mandatory that all counties adopt the prescribed system of accounting. 48 Accordingly, in 1928, a uniform system of accounting for counties, including a detailed outline for the county budget, was prescribed by the State Auditor of Public Accounts. 49 The expenditure of all county offices and departments are subject to budgetary control. 50 Since 1936 the superintendent of education has been required to prepare and file with the state superintendent of education, a budget of the expenditures for the support, maintenance, and operation of the public schools of the county for each fiscal year, and a statement of all available revenues. Likewise, the trustees of the consolidated school districts, special consolidated school districts, and all other school districts maintaining a special tax levy must prepare and file with the county superintendent of education, a budget of estimated expenditures and a statement of estimated revenues for each fiscal year. The superintendent must attach copies of these budgets to the county

school budget which he submits to the state superintendent of public education. 51

The revenue of the county is derived mainly from ad valorem taxes levied on all real and personal property and from license taxes. All classes or property are liable to taxation unless specifically exempt. The following classes are exempt: public property, privately owned property devoted to educational purposes, privately owned property devoted to religious and charitable purposes, household equipment and personal effects, agricultural. property, intangible personal property, lands and other property situated between the Mississippi River and the levees, and land classified for reforestation.52

The board of supervisors may exempt, for five years, subject to popular referendum, hotels and many specified new factories and industries of public utility from county ad valorem taxes. 53 In 1934 the legislature exempted homesteads and 40 acres of land from state ad valorem taxes to the extent of \$1,000 and the law of 1935 increased the exemption from state ad valorem taxes to 42,500 and 160 acres of land. 54 The Home Exemption Act of 1938 exempted to the extent of \$5,000 and 160 acres of land, all bona fide homes owned and actually lived in, from all state ad valorem taxes and from all county, road district, and school district ad valorem taxes. 55 Each of the acts directed that all claims for exemption be made to the board of supervisors through the tax assessor, and the board is empowered and required to adjudicate all claims. 56

The board of supervisors fixes the general tax levy annually. 57 In addition, it imposes a number of separate property taxes, some mandatory, others optional. It may levy a special tax for erecting, enlarging, repairing, or remodeling county buildings, and it has power to impose a special tax for maintaining the county public schools outside separate school districts. The board must levy taxes in the various school and road districts of the county for supplementing the county general funds, and for other purposes, if petitioned to do so by a majority of the qualified electors of any district. The board must also levy special taxes to pay the interest on county or county district bonds and provide sinking funds for their redemption. It must also

lovy a special tax to meet loans made in anticipation of taxes.58

After the tax levy has been made, the clork of the board of supervisors certifies it to the sheriff as tax collector, to the State Auditor of Public Accounts, to the State Land Commissioner, and to the State Tax Commission. 59

The tax assessor is required to make an annual assessment of the polls and of all personal property in the county subject to taxation, and a biennial assessment of all real property subject to taxation. 60 The real and personal rolls must be completed and delivered to the board of supervisors on or before the first Monday in July. 61 The board of supervisors is required to equalize and review the tax assessments at its July meeting and within 10 days of its August meeting, and on completing the equalization, must approve the assessments subject to the rights of persons in interest to be heard on objections. The August meeting of the board must be devoted to hearing and determining all objections and exceptions filed by persons dissatisfied with the assessments. It is the duty of the board to send the rolls to the State Tax Commission for final correction and equalization. The commission equalizes the assessments as between counties with regard to the different classes of property and returns the rolls to the board subject to hearing objections from that body. 62

After the assessment rolls have been accepted and corrected by the board, the clerk of the board must make two copies, deliver one copy to the sheriff as tax collector, another to the State Tax Commission, and keep the original in his office as a permanent record. The real and personal property of public

service corporations in the county is assessed by the State Tax Commission, and after the assessments are equalized and reviewed, the Commission forwards a copy of the rolls to the clerk of the board of supervisors who makes a copy and delivers it to the sheriff as tax collector, retaining the original as a permanont record of his office. 64

The sheriff as tax collector, after receiving the tax rolls from the clerk of the board of supervisors, collects both State and county taxes.65 He is required to make monthly reports of collections to the clerk of the board of supervisors as auditor and to the State Auditor of Public Accounts and at the same time he must pay over State taxes collected to the State Treasurer and county taxes collected to the county depository. 66

It is the duty of the sheriff as tax collector to sell both real and personal property on which taxes are delinquent. 67 Redemption of land sold for taxes must be made through the clerk of the chancery court as recorder who remits redemption monics to the proper officials. 68

License taxes are imposed by the State and county on practically every occupation and profession, and are collected for the State by the sheriff as tax collector. 69 The county is authorized and required to collect through the sheriff as tax collector and for its own use, an annual license fee from all owners of motor vehicles in the county. 70 The sheriff as tax collector remits occupational license fees collected to the State Treasurer, and the motor vehicle or road and bridge privilege taxes to the county depository. 71

The county has several sources of miscellaneous revenue. The board of

supervisors has control of sixteenth section lands and lieu lands reserved for the support of the township schools and of all funds obtained from these lands. 72 Another source of revenue is the money derived from fines, penalties, and forfeitures imposed in the courts of the county. The clerk of the board of supervisors as auditor debits the shoriff with all jury taxes, fines, penalties, and forfeitures reported to him by the clerks of the courts, and the sheriff is required to collect and pay the amounts charged to him into the county treasury. 73 The county highway fund is supplemented by a substantial share of the State tax levied on gasoline sold in the county. 74 The poll taxes collected in the county are returned to it by the State Auditor of Public Accounts for the benefit of the common school fund, 75 and the county receives a portion of the State equalization fund for the use of the county schools. 76 Federal aid is received to earry on a program of agricultural and home demonstration work. 77

All claims, accounts, and demands against the county must be presented to the board of supervisors. The board, together with the clerk of the board as auditor, audits the claims and the clerk, on the order of the board, issued warrants on the county depository in payment of all claims which are approved by the board. 78 It is the duty of the county depository to make quarterly reports of all receipts and disbursements and to return with the reports, all cancelled warrants which the clerk of the board as auditor must file and proserve as a public record. 79

The clerk of the board as auditor must audit county officers accounts regularly. 80 In addition the State Auditor of Public Accounts is empowered to audit and examine the accounts of all county officers at least once a year. He is particularly charged with auditing the allowances and expenditures made by the board of supervisors.81

The board of supervisors has power and authority to issue bonds for general county purposes, for creeting and maintaining schools, for refunding outstanding

bond issues, for constructing and maintaining roads and bridges, for meeting outstanding warrants and other legal obligations, for establishing and maintaining a county convict farm, and for erecting and maintaining a courthouse and a jail. 82

Elections

18

A person to qualify as an elector must be a citizen of the United States; at least 21 years of age; a resident of the State for two years, and of the district in which he is offering to vote for one year; must be able to read any section of the Constitution of the United States, or if he cannot read, understand and give a reasonable interpretation of it; must never have been convicted of bribery, burglarly, theft, arson, obtaining money or goods under false pretenses, perjury, forgery, embezzlement, or bigamy; must have paid all taxes legally required of him, and be able to produce satisfactory evidence (poll tax receipts for two consecutive years) of such payment to the officers holding an election; and must be registered as prescribed by law. 83

Prospective electors must register with the clerk of the circuit court as registrar who examines them as to their qualifications and requires them to swear or affirm allegiance to the United States and to the State of Mississippi, that they possess the necessary qualifications to vote, and that they are not disqualified because of conviction for any crime.84

The county board of election commissioners is required, before every election, to revise or purge the registration books and poll books kept by the elerk of the circuit court as registrar. 85

A candidate for public office must be a qualified elector, and in addition, must not deny the existence of a Supreme Being, although he is not required to meet any religious test as a qualification for office; must not have been convicted of bribery, perjury, or any other infamous crime, or of giving or offering directly or indirectly any bribe to procure the election or appointment of a person to office; and must not have participated in a duel or served as a

second to a duelist.86

The Corrupt Practices Act of 1935 requires that candidates for State, district, county, and county district offices make affidavit that they have read the Corrupt Practices Act and they they will not violate it. The act also requires candidates for county and county district offices to file with the clerk of the circuit court itemized statements of their campaign expenses, and it prohibits candidates from promising appointments to office or their influence in other ways, and sets up rigid restrictions against verbal or printed attacks on opponents during the campaign.87

All officers elected or appointed to office in the State, except judges and members of the Legislature must take the following oath before entering upon the duties of their offices; "I do solomnly swear (or affirm) that I will faithfully support the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of the State of Mississippi and obey the laws thereof; that I am not disqualified from holding office; and I will faithfully discharge the duties of the office upon which I am about to enter. So help me God."88

The county board of election commissioners is charged with the preparation of ballots for elections.89

General elections for State, district, county, and county district officers are held every fourth year on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November. 90 Primary elections for party nominations of officers are held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August preceding the general elections, and are governed and regulated by the election laws in force at the time the elections are held, with the county executive committee discharging the duties of the county board of election commissioners, except revising the registration and poll books. 91 As only one major party functions in Mississippi, the Democratic, nomination at primary elections is tantamount to election. When no candidate receives a majority of the votes cast, second primaries or run-off elections are held three weeks after the first primary, between the two candidates who receive the highest number of votes. 92 Special elections for unexpired terms are called by the county board of election commissioners on order of the board of supervisors, if the unexpired term is for more than six months. 93

It is the duty of the sheriff to provide equipment for polling places and he must furnish a sufficient number of voting compartments, shelves, and tables, so that there shall be not less than one of each for each 100 electors in the district.94

The county board of election commissioners, appointed by the State Board of Election Commissioners, is required to appoint the managers of elections.95 It is also the duty of the county commissioners to appoint bailiffs to preserve order at the polls. 96

The votes case in primary elections are counted and tallied at each polling place by the election managers who certify the results and seal all ballots and a certified copy of the result in the boxes. The boxes are delivered to the county executive committee. This committee canvasses and reviews all boxes and deposits the boxes with the clerk of the circuit court as registrar. 97 The votes cast in general elections are delivered in the same manner by the election managers to the county board of election commissioners which canvasses and reviews the boxes and delivers them to the clerk of the circuit court as registrar.98

With respect to party nominations of presidential electors, each political party99 in Grenada County is entitled to two delegates to its State convention held every four years to select the electors. These delegates are chosen by county delegate conventions held every four years. Delegates to the county convention are elected at precinct elections called by the county executive committee, and are apportioned equally among the supervisor's districts or among the precincts of the county in propertion to the number of votes cast by the party at the preceding presidential election. 100

County agencies which participate in the administration of the school program are the superintendent of education, the county school board, and the board of supervisors. Three types of subdivisions of the county, called districts, have been established in Grenada as authorized by law; common school districts, consolidated school districts, and special consolidated school dis-

tricts, with boards of trustees for each. 101

Scparate schools are maintained for children of the white and colored ${\tt races.102}$

The schools in the county are supported by county taxes, by poll taxes collected and retained in the county, by the State per capita fund, by the State equalizing fund, and by local district taxes which the people impose on themselves.

The superintendent, whose duties are administrative rather than supervisory, controls the county school fund composed of State money, county school taxes, and poll taxes; fixes the salaries of teachers; appoints teachers when the local trustees do not select and recommend them by June 15th; and enters into the only contracts made for teaching services. 103

The main functions of the county school board are to organize and fix the boundaries of the school districts; to designate the location of the school house in any district when it has not already been located; to set the date for the opening of the county schools or give assent to the date proposed by the superintendent of education; 104 and, together with the superintendent, lay out all routes for the transportation of school children and let all contracts for such transportation. 105

The board of supervisors, as a direct function in the conduct of the county schools, may levy an annual tax of not more than one mill on all property in the county outside of separate school districts for a fund to be used for building school houses. 106 All other taxes are levied after action of some other agency. County taxes outside of separate districts are imposed only after the levy has been approved by a majority of the qualified electors voting in an election, 107 and district taxes are levied on the petition of a majority of the qualified electors in the district. 108 The board may issue county and

district bonds on the approval of three-fifths of the qualified electors of the county voting in an election, or on the approval of a majority of the qualified electors residing in the district. 109

District school trustees have general local supervision of the school or schools in their respective districts, \$110\$ may borrow money in anticipation of taxes, \$111\$ and must prepare and file with the superintendent of education, a budget of estimated expenses and a statement of estimated revenues for each fiscal year. \$112\$ The trustees of all county district schools elect the members to the county school board. \$113\$

Public Health

The public health program in the county is conducted by the board of supervisors and a county health officer whom the board is required to appoint on the recommendation of the State Board of Health. 114

The board must fix and pay the salary of the health officer, 115 it may establish local quarantine and enforce it by reasonable rules and regulations, 116 and provide for compulsory small pox vaccinations. 117 It may instruct the health officer to make sanitary inspections of schools, prisons, markets, and other public places, and receive reports of the officer's investigations. 118 The board is authorized to appropriate money to be used in the control and eradication of infectious diseases and in the promotion of public health. 119

Under the direct supervision of the State Board of Health, the county health officer must enforce the rules and regulations of this board in regard to the health interests of the county; examine as far as practicable into all cases of malarial, infectious, and epidemic diseases and their causes; inves-

tigate the sanitary conditions of schools, prisons, markets, and other public places; recommend to the governing authorities of the county and of any city in the county, regulations considered necessary to promote the health of the county; report his actions, all information, and the results of investigations to the State Board of Health. 120

Births and deaths in the county are reported to the Division of Vital Statistics of the State Board of Health by the county registrar of births and deaths, 121 marriage statistics are reported by the clerk of the circuit court, 122 and divorce statistics are reported by the clerk of the chancery court, 123

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The board of supervisors has jurisdiction over the relief and support of the poor in the county- 124 The board also has jurisdiction over poor orphan children, 125 and it must advance money for the investigation and removal of insane persons, 126 The board must also provide for the care and maintenance of paupers alleged to be insane, pending investigation, and provide permanent care for such persons after they have been legally adjudged insone if there is no place for them in one of the State insane hospitals. 127 In addition, the board appoints the members of the county board of public welfare of the State Department of Public Welfare, 128 and it has power and authority to cooperate with the Federal relief program. 129

The pension board of inquiry, appointed by the board of supervisors, adjudicates all claims for State-paid pensions, made by Confederate veterans, their widows, and their servants. 130

Public Works

Full jurisdiction over roads, ferries, and bridges is exercised by the board of supervisors in accordance with such regulations as the Legislature may prescribe. 131 The board must provide and maintain a courthouse and a jail, and if there is not a courthouse in the county or if it is undergoing repairs or it is not fit for use, the board must provide a building in which the courts and the meetings of the board may be held. 132

This body is given the exclusive power to make and authorize all contracts in the name of the county. 133

Miscellaneous Functions

Activities in agricultural demonstration and home economics are carried on in the county with the aid of Federal Funds, by the county extension department in agriculture and home economics. 134 The county agents and home demonstration agents in charge of this program are appointed by the board of supervisors on the recommendation of the Extension Department of Mississippi State College and with the approval of the United States Department of Agriculture. 135

Provisions are made for the recording with the clerk of the chancery court as recorder, of charters of incorporation, 136 marks and brands of livestock, 137 declarations of homesteads to obtain exemption from seizure or sale under execution or attachment for debt, 138 discharges and all military records and documents of veterans of the Spanish-American War and the World War, 139 and all surveys of land made by the county surveyors or other surveyors. 140

Records System

The records of Grenada County are in general good condition and have been standardized to the extent that all of the land conveyance records and court dockets are kept in heavy, leather-bound volumes, 25 percent of which are the insertable loose-leaf type. Ledgers and journals since 1922 have been kept in canvas-bound, insertable, loose-leaf volumes and conform to the standard accounting system prescribed by the State Auditor of Public Accounts. At the present time unbound records are deposited in containers that vary in size and composition and include wooden and cardboard file boxes, corrugated cardboard storage boxes, and a small number of steel filing cabinets. All case papers of the chancery and circuit courts are kept in steel file boxes.


The vaults of the clerk of the chancery court and the sheriff are much too small for their needs, and the vault of the clerk of the circuit court, while adequate for the storage of current records, is not large enough to contain all non-current records and records deposited in the office for preservation. However, the courthouse in undergoing repairs which will give the sheriff and the clerk of the chancery court larger and more commodious vaults. 141

Since 1906 practically all permanent records have been typewritten, or handwritten on printed forms with manufactured brands of permanent, non-fading ink. A good quality of ledger paper has been purchased for the record books, but less durable paper has been used in the documents kept permanently on file, especially those documents inscribed on printed forms and furnished by others than county officials.

In addition to the WPA project sponsored by the board of supervisors for the purpose of rehabilitating the courthouse, WPA projects have been sponsored to transcribe the sectional indexes, see entries 41, 42; and to clean, sort, and rearrange the records of all offices.

County officers are authorized and empowered to deposit for permanent preservation with the Mississippi Department of Archives and History, any official books, records, documents, original papers, newspaper files, and printed books not in current use in their offices. 142 Census records of Grenada County made in 1870, 1878, 1880, and 1892 have been placed in the department in the New Capitol in Jackson, see entries 149-151.

- (11) Three members, appointed by the State Board of Election Commissioners.
 Two-year term.
- (12) Not more than 20 nor less than 15 members designated at each criminal session of circuit court from the first 20 names drawn from a list of 62 persons; these 62 being empanelled from a list of not more than 800 nor less than 200 persons eligible to serve as jurors, selected amually by the board of supervisors.

3. HOUSING, CARE, AND ACCESSIBILITY OF THE RECORDS

The Grenada County courthouse is situated on Green Street at the north-west corner of and facing the public square in the city of Grenada. It was erected in 1883-84 as the second county-owned building occupied for the purpose of courts of record and by county officers, and has been in use continuously since that time. 1

By 1883 the building purchased in 1870² had become obsolete, for on August 10, the grand jury, in making its report on the condition of the courthouse and the jail, described the courthouse as "A miserable hold, not even fit for a livery stable." The board of supervisors, evidently aware of this fact, had purchased a lot on July 11 from William C. McLean, Bertha McLean, and Mrs. L. M. Bidford, paying \$2,000 for the land. This lot is described as"... commencing on Green Street 26 feet north of the house now occupied by A. Sandel, running thence north with Green Street to R. Doak's property, thence west 208 feet to the street, thence north along said street opposite the point of beginning, thence east to the point of beginning. ..."

On August 12, the board of supervisors adopted the plans and specifications for a new courthouse presented by George S. Covert, 7 and ordered that the time for letting the contract for erecting the building be advortised in the Grenada Sentinel The president of the board, W. H. Powell, voted against the construction of a new courthouse and gave the following reasons for his action: "First: That the county already has a courthouse. Second: That there is not enough money in the treasury nor can enough be raised without oppressing the people, and Third: That there is a large debt in Litigation that will be burdensome if finally decided against the county."

On September 4, 1883, with president Powell again dissenting, Covert was awarded the contract to erect a new courthouse on his bid of \$15.575, with the stipulation that the building be completed by June 1, 1884. P. P. Lake, D. B. McHenry, J. W. Berry, R. N. Wall, and John George were appointed to the building committee in charge of the work. At its September meeting in 1884 the board, acting on the report of the building committee, received and accepted the new building but reserved \$500 to cover deficiencies named in the report. 12

The two-story, red brick structure has outside measurements of 78' x 52'

x 45' and contains 182,420 cubic feet of space. It is considered 25 percent fireproof, as many of the interior walls, ceilings, and floors are constructed of wood. The three brick vaults are of fireproof construction but contain some wooden shelves on which both bound and unbound records are stored.

The building is heated by stoves. It is well ventilated and natural lighting is good. Artificial lighting is inadequate as the small number of electric lights are poorly placed, and obsolete wiring creates a fire hazard. Approximately 80 percent of the records are kept in the three vaults.

Except for minor repairs made in general upkeop and maintenance, very little work was done on the building until recently. A WPA project approved Movember 29, 1939, provides for the expenditure of \$11,308 to rehabilitate the courthouse. Work being done includes: constructing a new vault for the office of clerk of the chancery court, with an adjoining corridor and areaway; converting newly excavated space under this addition into a washroom and a boiler room and installing a modern heating system; plastering and painting; improving existing floors and laying new cement and Terazzo tile floors; installing new plumbing and electrical fixtures; and laying a new tar and gravel roof. The plans also call for converting the present vault of the chancery clerk into a vault for the sheriff; erecting partitions in the new open office of the sheriff so as to give the tax assessor a larger and more private office; and converting the hall on the south side of the building into a new rest room for women. 13

The new vault for the clerk of the chancery court will be of two-way, reinforced concrete and brick construction conforming with the exterior finish of the courthouse; will have a concrete and Terazzo tile floor, four steel barred windows each $5!6\frac{1}{3}$ " x 3!3", with screened vents; and a steel vault door 8! x 3!6". The vault, 21! x 25! x 10!, and containing 5,250 cubic feet of space, with the corridor, 29! x 10! x 10!, containing 2,900 cubic feet of space, will increase the total cubic footage of the courthouse to 190,570.

The courthouse is in the center of a lot approximately 200' east and west and 90' north and south, and is set back 82' from an iron fence which bounds the front, or east property line. The offices of the board of supervisors, the clerk of the chancery court, the clerk of the circuit court, the sheriff and tax collector, the tax assessor, and the superintendent of education are on the first floor. There are no offices on the second floor but approximately 40 percent of the records for which the clerk of the chancery court is responsible are kept in a storeroom on this floor. Here also are the court room, the jury and witness rooms, and the seed loan office of the Farm Security Administration. All offices on the first floor can be entered from a wide hall which runs the length of the building.

Board of Supervisors: The office of the board of supervisors is on the southeast side of the building on the first floor. The room is 19' x 19'6" x 13'8" and has two doers, 8' x 3', and two windows, 8'9" x 3'4". Space and equipment are adequate for the needs of the board and for public users. No permanent records of the board of supervisors are kept in this office, the

board's records being kept in the office and vault of the clerk of the chancery court.

Clerk of the Chancery Court as Recorder: For the Housing, care and accessibility of the records of the clerk of the chancery court as recorder, see Clerk of the Chancery Court, below.

Chancery Court: For the housing, care, and accessibility of the records of the chancery court, see Clerk of the Chancery Court, below.

Clork of the Chancery Court: The clerk of the chancery court keeps the records of the board of supervisors, of the recorder, of the chancery court, of the treasurer, of the auditor, of the pension board of inquiry, and of the surveyor.

The office and vault of the clerk of the chancery court, situated on the first floor, occupies the northwest quarter of the building. The main office is a room 19' x 28' x 13'8" with two doors, one 6'6" x 2'7" and the other a double door 8' x 2'6", and seven windows, each 8'9". There are 72 linear feet of wooden shelving built under a steel counter, on which are kept 6 linear feet of unbound material and about 66 linear feet of office supplies. There is also one steel filing case, 2' x 3' x 20" in this office. However, no records are kept permanently here. There is sufficient room in the office and some space for expansion. Accommodations for public users are insufficient as to furniture, but ample as to space.

The clerk's vault is adjacent to and just east of his office. It has a communicating fire door 6'6" x 2'7" and one window, steel barred, 6'10" x 3', with iron shutters. The vault contains 156 linear feet of roller steel shelving and 115 linear foot of filing space. There are two steel cabinets, one 4' x 9' x 15", the other 4' x 6' x 15". There are three steel cases, respectively measuring 3' x 4' x 15", 5' x 6' x 15", and 3' x 2' x 15". One wooden case measures 15" x 10" x 5'. There are 22 paper cartons 5'6" x 10" x 24" and four paper cartons 10" x 10" x 23". There is also one bundle 12" x 10" x 12". The paper cartons and bundles are on the floor, filed on shelves, and stacked on top of filing cases. There are five linear feet of bound newspapers and three linear feet of miscellaneous material. Since all the shelves and cases are filled and occupy all available floor space, there is not room for expansion. There are 137 linear feet of bound volumes and 109 linear feet of unbound materials. Approximately 60 percent of all the records of the county are stored here. Although the vault is crowded the records are arranged in an orderly manner and are readily accessible.

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Circuit Court: For the housing, care, and accessibility of the records of the circuit court, see Clerk of the Circuit Court, below.

Clerk of the Circuit Court: The office and vault of the clerk of the circuit court are situated in the southwest corner of the courthouse on the first floor. The office is shared with the two justices of peace of district or beat one. This room is 20'7" x 28'8" and has one double door 8' x 2'6" and a single steel fire door 6'8" which leads into the vault, and seven windows each 8'9" x 3'4". Beneath a counter 12'6" x 3' on wooden shelves and in two bookcases, one 9' x 10' x 15", the other 5' x 10' x 15", are kept nine linear feet of non-current justice of the peace dockets and 84 linear feet of unbound material in file boxes. The clerk keeps only bound records in current use in the office

and places them in the vault at night.

The two justices of peace of district or beat one hold court and keep their records in the northeast and northwest corners of the office. Both have desks, use a large table and one of the bookcases.

The clerk's vault occupies the cast end of his office and is $20\,^{\circ}7$ " x 6' x $10\,^{\circ}3$ ". The north, east, and west sides have 42 linear feet of roller steel shelving and 56 linear feet of filing space, all of steel construction except 12 linear feet of wooden shelving. The shelving contains 56 linear feet of bound volumes and 59 linear feet of unbound materials. Twelve linear feet of bound material are stacked in the southeast corner of the vault. The vault is congested and more storage space is needed.

The office and vault contain all the records kept by the clerk in his capacities as clerk of the court, registrar, and licensing official; the records of the grand jury, the coroner, and non-current dockets of justices of the peace of all five districts or beats in the county.

Courtroom: The courtroom covers approximately three-fourths of the second floor of the courthouse. The room is $49\frac{1}{4}$ ' x 58' x 24'. There is one double door 8' x $29\frac{1}{4}$ " and there are four doors, each 7' x 3', and 12 windows, each 10' x 3'4". There are two book cases in the room, each 4' x 6' x 15", which contain 55 linear feet of books comprising the county law library. A door in the northern part of the east wall opens into the storage room, while one in the southern part of the small wall leads into the seed loan office of the Farm Security Administration. On the west side of the northern door leads into one jury and witness room, while the southern door leads into the other such room. No records other than the books of the county law library are kept permanently in the courtroom.

Grand Jury: The grand jury holds its sessions in the jury rooms on the second floor of the courthouse. For the housing, care, and accessibility of the records of the grand jury, see Clerk of the Circuit Court, above.

Justices of the Peace: District or Beat One, (M. M. Kibben and C. D. Boushe). The justices of peace of this district holds court in the office of the clerk of the circuit court. Of the records of the district, both current and non-current, 94 percent are kept in the office of the clerk of the circuit court, while six percent are stored in the vault of the clerk of the chancery court. District or Beat Two, (No incumbent). Of the existing records of this district, 60 percent are stored in the office of the clerk of the circuit court and 40 percent are kept in the vault of the clerk of the chancery court. District or Boat Three, (M. O. Gray). The justice of the peace of this district holds court in his residence on Route 3 in Big Creek northeast of the town of Grenada. Of the existing records, 20 percent are kept in the home of the justice, while 80 percent are stored in the office of the clerk of the circuit court. District or Beat Four, (D. W. Pickle). The justice of peace of this district holds court in his residence on the Star Route north of the town of Grenada. Of the existing records of this district, 25 percent are kept in the home of the justice, 50 percent in the office of the clerk of the circuit court, and 25 percent in the vault of the clerk of the chancery court. District or Beat Five, (V. W. Carver). The justice of peace of this district holds court in his residence on Route 2 in Holcomb, 11 miles west of the town of Grenada. Of the existing records of this district, 25 percent are kept in the home of the

Of the total of 30 volumes of justice of the peace records of all districts or beats, 10 percent are kept in the residences of the justices of the peace, 16 2/3 percent are kept in the vault of the clerk of the chancery court, and 73 1/3 percent are kept in the office and vault of the clerk of the circuit District Attorney: The district attorney of the fifth circuit court district, to which Grenada County is attached, maintains a private office in the city of Kosciusko, the county seat of Attala County. County Prosecuting Attorney: The county prosecuting attorney maintains a private office which faces the courthouse yard and is situated in a one-story, brick building which parallels the north property line of the courthouse. Sheriff: The office of the sheriff, shared with the tax assessor, and the sheriff's vault, are situated in the northeast portion of the first floor of the courthouse. The entire office is 19' x 36' x 13'8", with a clothes closet, 8'6", occupying the southeast corner. The office space allotted to the sheriff is 19' x 19'6" x 13'8" on the west side of the room. This portion has an entrance door 8' x 2'6", a wault door 6'9" x 2'6", and three windows, each 8'9" x 3:4". Under counters and on U files are eight linear feet of unbound material. No other records are kept in this office permanently, all being placed in the vault over night. The sheriff's vault, 7' x 3'10" x 10'3", and situated to the rear of the office and in the southeast corner of the vault of the clerk of the chancery

The sheriff's vault, 7' x 3'10" x 10'3", and situated to the rear of the office and in the southeast corner of the vault of the clerk of the chancery court, is entered from the office. On 18 linear feet of roller steel shelving on the west wall of the vault, are 16 linear feet of bound records and two linear feet of unbound materials belonging to the sheriff in his capacities as sheriff and as tax collector. Three linear feet of bound records of the clerk of the chancery court are also stored in this vault. All of the current records of the sheriff and tax collector are kept in the vault while all of his non-current records are stored in the storage room on the second floor of the courthouse. Accommodations for public users are adequate.

Coroner: For the housing, care, and accessibility of non-current records of this office, see Clerk of the Circuit Court, pp. 42-43.

Constables: Constables have no offices but are attached to the office of the justice of the peace from whose district or beat they are elected.

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Tax Assessor: The tax assessor occupies office space 10'6" x 16'6" x 13'2" in the northeast corner of the office of the sheriff. This office space has four windows, each 8'9" x 3'4", one door 8' x 2'6", and can also be reached through the entrance door of the office of the sheriff. Records are kept in this office temporarily. Equipment is adequate for the use of the office force and for public users but space is inadequate.

Sheriff as Tax Collector: For the housing, care, and accessibility of the records of the sheriff as tax collector, see Sheriff, above.

Clork of the Chancery Court as Treasurer: For the housing, care, and accessibility of the records of the clerk of the chancery court as treasurer, see Clerk of the Chancery Court, p. 42.

County Board of Election Commissioners: The county board of election commissioners holds its meetings in the office of the clerk of the circuit court. For the housing, care, and accessibility of the records of this body, sec Clerk of the Circuit Court, pp. 42-43. Superintendent of Education: The office of the county superintendent of education is situated in the extreme southeast corner of the courthouse on the first floor. The room is $12\frac{1}{2!}$ ' x 16' x 13'8" and has two doors, each 3' x 8', one door 6' x 2'6", and four windows, each 8'9" x 3'4". There are 59 linear feet of steel and wooden shelves on the west side of the room on which are 19 1 8: linear feet of bound volumes, 20 linear feet of unbound materials, and 20 linear feet of text books. Approximately 80 percent of the records of the superintendent of education are kept in this office. Adjoining the office is a closet 3' x 10.6", having a door 6' x 2'. In it are 12 linear feet of wooden shelves and two corrugated storage files, 12" x 15" x 24", which altogether contain 20 linear feet of unbound materials. Approximately 18 percent of the superintendent's records are stored here. The remaining two percent is housed in the storage room on the second floor. All of the records relating to the county school board and to the school trustees are kept in the office. Accommodations for both office workers and public users are inadequate because of the lack of space. School Trustees: The school trustees meet in their homes, in the school buildings in the various districts, and in the office of the superintendent of education. For the housing, care, and accessibility of the records of the school trustees, see Superintendent of Education, above. County School Board: The county school board meets in the office of the' superintendent of education and in the homes of its members. For the housing, care, and accessibility of the records of the school board, see Superintendent of Education, above. Health Officer: The office of the health officer is maintained in the Grenada Clinic Building on Main Street in the city of Grenada, in the office of this official who is a practicing physician. The office is 10' x 12' x 10' BI: and has two doors, each 6'10" x 2'10", and two windows, each 3' x 6'8". The records are kept in one steel file drawer, $11\frac{1}{2}$ " x 14" x 24". Bound records of the reports of the registrar of births and deaths are also kept in this office. Accommodations for the health officer and for the public are good. Registrar of Births and Deaths: The registrar of births and deaths, who lives in the city of Grenada, does not have an office. For the housing, care, and accessibility of the records of this official, see Health Officer, above. Pension Board of Inquiry: The pension board of inquiry holds its meetings in the office of the clerk of the chancery court who is its clerk. For the housing, care, and accessibility of records of this board, see Clerk of the

Surveyor: The office of surveyor is not filled by a regularly elected incumbent at this time. For the housing, care, and accessibility of the records of former surveyors, see Clerk of the Chancery Court, p. 42. County Extension Department in Agriculture and Home Economics: The county extension department in agriculture and home economics has its offices in the Agricultural Building erected in 1937-38 by the WPA on a lot donated by the county, two blocks east of the public square in the town of Grenada. The building and grounds upon completion were deeded to the Mississippi State College Extension Department for agricultural and experimental purposes. The main office of the county agent is just to the left of the east or main entrance of the building. It is 13' x 22' x 10' and has four windows, each 3'4" x 5'10", and four doors, each 2'10" x 6'10", one, a steel vault door, 6° x $2^{\circ}6^{\circ}$. In this room are eight steel file drawers, each 12° x 14° x 24° ; two 4° x 6° x 14° steel file drawers and four 3° x 5° x 15° steel file boxes.


The office of the home demonstration agent is located just across the hall and directly north of the county agent's office. It is ll' x 13' x 10' and has two windows 3'4" x 5'10" and three doors each 2'10" x 6'10". There are four steel file drawers each 12" x 14" x 24", and 14 linear feet of shelving on which are 15 linear feet of office supplies. Just north of this office is the private office of the home demonstration agent, a room 10' x 13' x 10' which has two windows each 3'4" x 5'10", and two doors, each 2'10" x 6'10". Ten linear feet of shelving contain 10 linear feet of supplies. There are five steel file drawers each 12" x 12" x 24". Just north of and adjacent to this room is the county demonstration model kitchen which is 12' x 18' x 10' and has four windows, each 3'4" x 6'10" and two doors, each 2'8" x 6'10".

The vault is situated in the southwest corner of this room and is 6' x 6' x 10'. In this fireproof vault about 10 percent of the total records of the office are stored; there are 24 linear feet of shelving on which 10 linear feet of bound volumes and 48 linear feet of unbound materials are stored. Just south of and adjacent to the county agent's main office is his private office, a room 12' x

Accommodations and equipment, for both the department and for public users are excellent.

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Store Room: The store room, situated in the northeast corner of the second floor of the courthouse, is 17' x 17' x 24', with one door 8' x 3' and four windows each 10' x 3'. Sixty linear feet of wooden shelving occupy the north and south wells with the shelves on the north wall containing 60 linear feet of bound volumes and 21 various sized boxes of unbound material. The shelves on the south wall contain 19 various sized corrugated cardboard and cardboard boxes, filled with unbound material. Five large corrugated cardboard boxes of unbound material are placed on the floor.




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
GRENADA COUNTY COURTHOUSE

Citations to the acts of the Logislature of Mississippi refer to the year of the acts and to the page or pages of the published volume in which the acts appear.

The inventory is divided into an historical sketch; a short essay on the governmental organization and records system; an essay on the housing, care, and accessibility of the records which pictures the conditions under which records are preserved; this section devoted to abbreviations, symbols, and explanatory notes; followed by the inventory proper, arranged by offices and

Legislative and administrative offices are listed first, followed by recording, judicial, law enforcement, fiscal, and miscellaneous agencies. Each office or agency is treated by an essay which is limited to the creation of the office, its present status, the manner in which it is filled, and the term of office. The record titles are arranged under the office of origin or of final destination and by subject, to indicate insofar as possible, the records system of the office. For instance, the records of the clerk of the board of supervisors as auditor are grouped in the order of sources and receipts of county funds, claims against these funds, payments of claims, and the ledger record of all transactions, and are placed under the general subject headings of "Cash Receipts," "Claims," "Disbursements," and "Ledgers." The descriptions of the records, referred to in this inventory as entries, are numbered consecutively from 1 to 257, are composed of two parts, the title line paragraph and the body of entry paragraph. However, a third paragraph is often added for the purpose of making cross references. Although a condensed form of entry is used, information is given as to the limiting dates of all extant records, the contents of the individual series, and the location of the records. all ...

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The title line paragraph is made up of the entry number, the title of the record, the first and last dates of the period covered by the record, the quantity, the labelling; information as to missing or discontinued records, when missing; variations in the title; and cross references.

Titles are given in capital letters exactly as found on the records in the county archives.

Titles are assigned to records having no title and are given in capital letters enclosed in brackets; see entries 35, 36, 53, 146.

Titles are also assigned in order to explain and clarify records having titles which are misleading, incorrect, or nondescriptive. These assigned titles are given with initial capitals only, are enclosed in brackets, and are inserted as part of the exact but ambiguous title; see entries 27, 79, 80, 128.

Hissing records are indicated by showing the dates of the records which are present. Where no comment is made on the absence, or prior, intervening or subsequent records, no definite information could be obtained as to why the records are missing.

The reason for the discontinuance of a record is given if the reason could be obtained; see entries 61, 90, 95, 143. Where no statement is made that the record was discontinued at the last date shown in the entry, it could not be determined definitely that such was the case.

Continuous records are shown by a hyphon placed between the beginning and

closing dates, as 1830-70, see entry 23.

Lapses in the records are indicated by a comma placed between the groups of inclusive dates, as 1872-93, 1902, 1905-9, 1912-17, 1926, 1940, see entry 97.

Current dates are indicated by two hyphens, as 1870--, entry 1; 1893--, entry 49; and 1924--, see entry 93.

The body-of-entry paragraph sets out the purpose for keeping the record and gives a description of its contents. It further gives statements as to how the record is arranged, that is, numerically, alphabetically, or chronologically; and as to how it is indexed, if it is. The manner of recording is given as handwritten, handwritten on printed form or heading; typed, typed on printed form or heading; mimeographed; lithographed; or photostated. The condition of the record is given if the condition is not good, and when no statement is made as to the condition, it is to be assumed that the condition is good. The average number of pages or documents contained in the record is cited next, followed by a statement as to where the record is located, if it is not kept in the office of the agency under which it is listed in the inventory.

To show the relation of the various records to each other and to complete a series of records, three types of cross references are used; the subject heading cross reference, the title line cross reference, and the third paragraph cross reference.

The cross reference placed under subject headings shows that the records referred to, deal with the same subject although they are placed under a different department of the same office or in another office, see the subject heading "Real Property," p. 59.

The title line cross reference is used to integrate scattered parts of a record series, see entries 2-9, 176, 178, 179, 184. This style of cross reference is also used to segregate logically, different types of records which happen to have been recorded in the same book or kept in the same series of file boxes, see entries 15, 16, 26, and entries 191, 235, 237. The entry containing the title line reference is generally an artificial entry enclosed in brackets, see entries 15, 16, 237. The title line cross reference is always complemented by the reference "Also contains:" placed in the body-of-entry paragraph of the entry referred to.

Third paragraph cross-references are utilized to show the relation between closely connected records as, for example the record of the proceedings of the grand jury, the original indictments returned by the grand jury, and the record of the returned indictments, see entries 84, 92, 129.

The inventory shows the records of the county court of Grenada. While this court was, strictly speaking, not a court of Grenada County, its records are preserved as a part of the archives of Grenada County and were considered as such in the preparation of the inventory.

I. BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

The board of supervisors was established as the general local authority of Grenada County by the creating act of May 9, 1870 as prescribed by the Constitution of 1869. The first members were appointed by the Governor to sorve until members were regularly elected at the general elections of 1871 for State, county, and county district officers, and sworn into office in January 1872.² The board held its first meeting on June 30, 1870, ³ and has functioned continuously in the county since that time.

The board is composed of five members, one from each of the five supervisor's beats or districts into which the county is divided. Until 1890, by constitutional provision, the members of the board were elected for a term of two years, in and from their respective beats or districts, by the qualified electors of each beat. The Constitution of 1890 provides that a member of the board shall be selected from each of the five districts into which the county is divided, but gives the legislature power to determine the method of selection and the term of office. 6 The legislature has prescribed that the qualified electors of each beat or district elect in and from their district at the general elections for State, district, county, and county district of ficers, one member to the board, to serve for a four-year term.

The clork of the chancery court is the ex-officio clork of the board of supervisors, 8 and the sheriff is its executive officer and must attend all its

II. CLERK OF THE CHANCERY COURT AS RECORDER

The clerk of the chancery court is the principal recording officer of Grenada County. The office of recorder does not exist as such in Mississippi county government, but constitutional and statute law provide that a wide variety of instruments must be recorded and preserved by the clerk and that certain records must be preserved in his office. 1

The office of clerk of the chancery court was established in Grenada County with recording duties attached to and incumbent upon it, by the creating act of May 9, 1870 as prescribed by the Constitution of 1860.

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III. CHANCERY COURT

The Constitution of 1869 directed the legislature to divide the State into convenient chancery court districts, and stipulated that court should be held in each county at least four times each year. 1 Grenada County was assigned to the eleventh chancery district by the act of June 11, 1870 which also provided that court should be held the first Monday in March, June, September, and December of each year for 12 days. The first session was held Monday, September 12, 1870,3 and the court has functioned continuously in the county since that time. In 1880 the county was attached to the third district in which it has since remained.4 The Constitution of 1890, in providing for the establishment of chancery courts, requires that sessions be held at least twice in each year. 5 At present court convenes on the third Monday in April for six days, and on the third Monday in October for six days.6

The prosiding officer of the chancery curt is the chancellor of the district. 7 County officers attached to the court are the clerk, 8 and the sheriff

who is its executive officer. 9 The chancellor may appoint masters in chancery, 10 special commissioners, 11 receivers, 12 and since 1916, a court stenographer in the district, 13 and a court probation officer, who may be the county superintendent of education. 14

Until 1912 the chancellor was appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the senate for a four-year term. 15 By an amendment to the constitution, proposed by the legislature in 1912, approved by popular vote in 1913, and made a part of the constitution in 1914, provision was made for the election of chancellor by the qualified voters of the district, the term of office remaining the same. 16

The constitutional office of clerk of the chancery court was established in Grenada County by the creating act of May 9, 1870. The office was filled by appointment by the Governor18 until the general elections of 1871 at which time a clerk was regularly elected and sworn into office in January 1872, 19 and the office has functioned continuously since that time. The clork is clected for a four-year term by the qualified voters of the county at the oral elections for State, district, county, and county district officers. 20

The office of court stenographer, filled by appointment by the chancellor, has functioned in the district and in the chancery court of Grenada County since 1916, the stenographer serving a four-year term unless removed by the chancellor.21

The office of county probation officer was established in Gronada County

IV. CIRCUIT COURT

The Constitution of 1869 directed the legislature to divide the State into convenient circuit court districts and stipulated that the court should be held in each county at least twice each year. I Grenada County was assigned to the thirteenth district by the act of June 11, 1870 which also provided that court should be held on the second Monday of May, September, October, and January of each year to continue for 12 days. The first session was held Monday, September 12, 1870, 3 and the court has functioned continuously in the county since that time. In 1873 Grenada County was attached to the tenth circuit

court district, 4 in 1880 to the third district, 5 and in 1892 to the fifth district in which it has since remained.6

The presiding officer of the court is the judge of the circuit court district. 7 County officers attached to the court are the clerk, 8 the sheriff, who is the executive officer of the court, 9 and the county prosecuting attorney, who assists the district attorney. 10 A court reporter or stenographer in the district, may be appointed by the judge. 11 Indictments and presentments are returned to the court by the grand jury, 12 and cases in issue are tried before the petit jury. 13 The district attorney of the circuit court district represents the State in all criminal proceedings in the circuit court of Grenada County, and the State and the county in all civil cases in which they may be interested.14

Until 1912 the judge of the circuit court was appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the senate. 15 By an amendment to the constitution, proposed by the legislature in 1912, approved by popular vote in 1913, and made a part of the constitution in 1914, the office was made elective by the qualified voters of the district. 16 Until 1890 the judge served a six-

The constitutional office of clerk of the circuit court was established in Grenada County by the creating act of 1870. The office was filled by appointment by the Governor 20 until the general elections of 1871 when a clerk was regularly elected and sworn into office in January 1872. The office has functioned continuously in the county since that time. The clerk is elected for a four-year term by the qualified electors of the county at the general elections for State, district, county, and county district officers. 22

The office of court reporter or stenographer, filled by appointment by the judge, has functioned in the district and in the circuit court of Grenada County since 1890, the stenographer serving a four-year term unless removed from office. 23

The guarantee of the Constitution of the United States of trial by an impartial jury24 is provided for in Mississippi insofar as Grenada County is affected, by the Constitution of 1869 and the Constitution of 1890.25 The first jury panel was drawn for the September 1870 term of court, 26 and juries have been impaneled continuously since that time.

Until 1892 jurors were drawn from lists of eligible persons returned bo the court by the tax assessor, 27 and since 1892, from lists of eligible persons returned to the court by the board of supervisors. 28 Jurors serve for the week for which they are drawn, unless excused by the court. 29

VII. GRAND JURY

The guarantee of the Constitution of the United States that no person shall be held to answer for a capital or otherwise infamous crime, except on a presentment or indictment of a grand jury, 1 is provided for in Mississippi insofar as Grenada County is concerned, by the Constitutions of 1869 and 1890.2

The grand jury was first convened in Grenada County in September 1870, 3 and has functioned continuously since that time at each term of court devoted to criminal matters. It is composed of not less than 15 nor more than 20 jurors, the number being designated by the court, 4 one of whom is appointed

foreman by the court. 5 Until 1892 grand jurors were selected from a special grand jury panel composed of 20 jurors chosen by the board of supervisors, summoned by the sheriff, and in attendance at court. 6 Since 1892 grand jurors have been selected from the first 50 jurors drawn from the general jury panel.7 Members of the grand jury serve for the duration of the court, unless dismissed sooner by the judge.

Until 1890, by constitutional provision, justices of the peace were elected for a term of two years, in and from their respective districts, by the qualified electors of each district.8 The Constitution of 1890 provides that justices of the peace shall be chosen by districts for a term of four years, but gives the legislature power to determine the method of selection.9 The legislature has prescribed that justices of the peace shall be elected by districts at the general elections for State, district, county, and county district officers.10

Justices of the peace must hold not less than one term of court each month, nor more than two.11 Other county officers attached to each court are constables, who are the executive officers of the court, 12 and the sheriff as executive officer in the event there is no constable. 13 A six-member jury must be impanelled if any party to a cause demands a trial by jury. 14

Grenada County, on its establishment in 1870, was assigned to the thirteenth circuit court district, and the district attorney of the district assumed his duties in the county and in the circuit court of the county. The office has functioned continuously since that time in the court and in the circuit court district to which Grenada County has been attached.3

The office of county prosecuting attorney was created and made mandatory in all counties by the act of 1910. As provided in the act, the office was established in Grenada County April 16, 1910 by appointment by the Governor, the county prosecuting attorney being appointed to serve until the general elections of 1911 for State, district, county, and county district officers. 2

The office functioned in the county until 1916^3 when it was abolished at a special election held under authority of the law of 1916 which gave counties authority to do away with it.

In 1924, the office was reestablished by order of the board of supervisors. 5 As this order was not protested or petitioned against by 20 percent of the qualified electors of the county as required by law to nullify it, 6 on July 9, 1924, the Governor appointed a county prosecuting attorney to serve until the general elections of 1927 for State, county, and county district officers, 7 and the office has functioned continuously since that time.

The county prosecuting attorney is elected for a four-year term by the qualified electors of the county at the general elections for State, county, and county district officers. Until 1890, by constitutional provision, constables were elected for a two-year term in and from each district by the qualified electors of the district.3 The Constitution of 1890 provides that constables shall be chosen by districts for a four-year term, but gives the legislature power to determine the method of selection. 4 The legislature has prescribed that constables shall be elected by districts at the general elections for State, county, and county district offices.5

The Constitution of 1869 provided and the Constitution of 1890 provides, that a competent number of constables be chosen in each county by district. No definite number was prescribed by the Code of 1871 but since 1880 statute law has required that one constable be chosen in each district for the election of justice of the peace, and since 1900 has empowered the board of supervisors to provide for the election of additional constables in any district not to exceed the number of justices of the peace provided for in the district.7

XIV. TAX ASSESSOR

The office of tax assessor was established in Grenada County by the creating act of 1870 as prescribed by the Constitution of 1869. The office was filled by appointment by the Governor until the general elections of November 1871 when a tax assessor was regularly elected and sworn into office in January 1872.3 The office has functioned continuously in the county since

XVI. CLERK OF THE CHANCERY COURT AS TREASURER

The office of treasurer was established in Grenada County by the creating act of May 9, 1870, as prescribed by the Constitution of 1869. The office was first filled by provisional appointment made by the Governor. A general election of all county officers was held in November 1871, and the treasurer elected and sworn into office in January 1872. The office functioned until it was abolished by a constitutional amendment approved by popular vote in 1922, and made a part of the constitution of 1924.

Until 1890, by constitutional provision, the treasurer was elected for a two-year term by the qualified electors of the county at the general elections for State, district, county, and county district officers. The Constitution of 1890 increased the term of office to four years, prohibited the treasurer

In 1932 the legislature enacted a law requiring the clerk of the chancery court in his capacity as clerk of the board of supervisors as auditor in counties having county depositories to perform the former duties of the treasurer. 9 Since Gronada County has a regularly designated depository, the clerk of the chancery court has assumed the duties of the treas-

XX. SUPERINTENDENT OF EDUCATION

The constitutional office of superintendent of education was established in Grenada County in 1870 after the county was organized, and has functioned continuously since that time.1

Until 1896, by constitutional provision, the superintendent was appointed by the State Board of Education, by and with the advice of the senate, in 1896 the legislature made the office elective in Grenada County. 3 Since that time the Superintendent has been elected by the qualified electors of the county at the general elections for State, district, county, and county district officers.4

The term of office was set at two years by the Constitution of 1869^5 but was increased to four years by the Constitution of 1890.6

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The board of school directors, created by the law of July 4, 1870, was established in Grenada County on August 5 of the same year. It functioned until 1873 when it was abolished by law and its powers and duties were given to the board of supervisors and to the boards of school trustees.³

This board was composed of six members appointed by the board of supervisors and selected as far as was practicable from the five supervisors' districts or beats. 4 Two of the members were appointed for a one-year term, two for a two-year term, and three for a three-year term, their terms beginning October 1, 1870. The superintendent of education served as president of the board and the clerk of the circuit court was its secretary.6

XXII. SCHOOL TRUSTEES

Boards of trustees for each school district situated outside of towns were established in Grenada County by the law of 1873, and have functioned continuously in the county since that time. At present there are three types of these school districts in the county; common school districts, consolidated school districts, and special consolidated districts.2

The boards of trustees of common school districts and consolidated school districts are composed of three members, 3 while the boards of trustees of special consolidated school districts are composed of five members, 4 All are selected in their districts by school patrons who are qualified electors.5

Until 1894 trustees were elected for a one-year term, 6 but since 1894 they have been chosen for a three-year term with one member being selected annually. 7 Trustees of special consolidated school districts are elected for

Until 1930 the members of the board were appointed by the superintendent of education, subject to ratification by the board of supervisors, to serve a four-year term. 5 Since 1930 they have been elected by the trustees of the county public schools other than the trustees of municipally operated districts, for a term of five years, one member being chosen annually.

XXIV. COUNTY HEALTH OFFICER

The office of county health officer was established in Grenada County April 2, 1880^{1} as provided for in the act of Harch 4, 1880, and it has functioned continuously since that time.

Until 1892, this official, called the chief health officer, was appointed by the Governor on the nomination of the State Board of Health for a term of two years beginning on the date of appointment.³

Since 1892 a county health officer has been appointed by the State Board of Health itself, to serve a two-year term. 4

XXVI. PLNSION BOARD OF INQUIRY

The payment of pensions by the State to Confederate veterans was instituted by the law of 1888 which also provided for the establishment of boards of inquiry in the counties to adjudicate claims for pensions. 1 The pension board of inq.iry was organized in Grenada County in 1888 and has functioned continuously since that time.

Until 1902 this board was composed of the five members of the board of supervisors, the sheriff, and the clerk of the chancery court.²

The acts of the legislature require the state board of health as the bureau of public health of the state department of health, to establish a bureau of vital statistics for the purpose of providing an adequate system for the registration of births and deaths, for the preservation of vital statistics on forms prescribed by the state board of health, and for providing adequate methods for enforcing the laws and orders of the board relating to health matters of the state (Ibid.). With respect to other vital statistics, the clerk of the chancery court since 1926 has been required to report diverce statistics (L. Since 1902 the camp of Confederate veterans in the county has been authorized to select and recommend to the board of supervisors for appointment to the pension board, five of their number, one from each supervisor's beat or district is possible. The first board appointed by the board of supervisors was names on July 7, 1902. In 1910 pensioners were excluded from serving as members of the board. The board of supervisors has been required since 1924 to appoint a World War voteran to the board, and since 1924 recommendations for membership have been extended to include not only Confederate veterans, but other citizens who are qualified electors. 6 Since 1928 the county prosecuting attorney has been a member of the board. The clerk of the chancery court is the clork of this body, 8 and the sheriff is its executive officer. 9

No definite term of office for the members of the pension board of inquiry has been prescribed.

XXVII. CORONER AS RANGER

The office of ranger was created in Grenada County in 1870, with the establishment of the office of coroner, $^{\rm l}$ as the coroner is by law the exofficio ranger. $^{\rm 2}$

When there is no coroner in the county, the ex-officio duties of the coroner as ranger may be discharged by justices of the peace. 3

Until 1890, by constitutional provision, the surveyor was elected for a term of two years by the qualified electors of the county. The Constitution of 1890 provides that the surveyor shall be elected for a four-year term but gives the legislature power to determine the method of selection. 8 The legislature has provided that the surveyor be elected by the qualified electors of the county at the general elections for State, district, county, and county district officers.9

ment was organized in Grenada County on October 10 of the same year, 2 and has functioned continuously since that time. The law of March 28, 1914 authorized counties to establish a county department of home economics. 3 On April 1, 1916 a department was created in Grenada County, 4 and has functioned continuously since that time.

In 1932 counties were empowered to carry on agricultural demonstration home economics programs through a single department to be known as the county extension department in agriculture and home economics.5

Until 1932 the officials directing the activities of the department of agriculture and the department of home oconomics (required by law to be women), were appointed by the board of supervisors, 6 but since 1932 have been appointed by the board upon the recommendation of the Extension Department of Mississippi State College and with the approval of the United States Department of Agricul-
