



We've played ball since I was in the seventh grade, except when we went to high school. He went to Lafayette and I went to Bryan Station. But to be compared with George, that's a great honor because he's done some great things."

Wildcat Coach Jerry Claiborn whiteat coach serry carbon said: "I think Mark Logan has t'physical capabilities to be the same type of runner. Mark has just got to stay healthy and play more plays than last year."

Adams set UK records last year for most all-purpose yardage (1,684 yards) and scoring (84 points on 14 touchdowns). He was also the leading receiver (33 catches for 330 yards) and rusher (1,085 yards) for the Wildcats.

"Mark Logan is the type of player who can come in and fill George Adams' shoes," Claiborne said, "and I'm not trying to put pressure on him. He can be an outstanding player, but he has to improve on his pass-catching abilities."

together now," Logan said. "When
two people have played together for
so long, they know how to communicate. I know what he's going to do
and he knows what I'm going to do:

And Logan is sure of what he is going to do this year — get that ball and run hard.

He also has the luxury of running behind an offensive line that has 11 years of varsity experience under its belt, the most-tested linemen UK

belt, the most-tested linemen UK has had in many years.
"That's a big asset for us right now to have the experience on the offensive line," Logan said. "They really look good right now. They pat me on my back. They have confidence in me, which makes me feel good. If they have confidence in me, they're going to be good blockers for me."

After Adams gained more than 1,000 yards last year, he treated his linemen to a steak dinner. Logan says as long as he stays healthy and the guys keep patting him on the back and picking him up, he'll give them the same treatment if he gains 1000.

And so what if "Heisman" is not among the top candidates to win the coveted trophy. Logan just smiles wide, shrugs his shoulders and say, "It's not where you start, it's where

The 0-10-1 record of the 1982 Ken tucky team is more than just another season in UK's football history—it's become a landmark.

Secondary may come to Cats' defense this season

Ranked 10th in SEC in pass defense last year, defensive backs have a mission to 'instill fear' in '85

The secondary this season should rank as one of the team's strong points, despite the loss of All-South-eastern Conference safety Paul Calhoun. And they're planning to use Rambo-style tactics to get the job done.

In the wide-tackle six defense that UK employs, three defensive backs are used — Maurice Douglass and Tony Mayes at cornerbacks and Russell Hairston at safety as start-

"This is a good group of hitters," and defensive back coach Chip Garber. "If you let those receivers roam around there and just concentrate on catching a pass, then you're going to get beat. It's important to try to intimidate receivers."

Warning: Entering the UK secondary may be hazardous to your health.

As hard-hitting and intimidating as they may try to be, one statistic still lingers for the defensive backs: the Wildcats finished 10th — dead last — in the SEC last season in pass defense.

defense.
"They were a little embarrassed and their pride was hurt last year by being 10th in the conference." Garber said. "But I think we'll be a better secondary this year." Douglass, a 5-foot-11, 202-pound senior transferred to Life from Coffee.

nior, transferred to UK from Coffey ville (Kan.) Community College in 1984, where he was first-team Grid Wire All-American, leading the Ra-vens to the national championship.

"I try to instill as much fear into my opponents' heart as I can on each hit," Douglass said, "so they won't want to go for the ball the next time."

Although Douglass is a big-reputation hitter, Mayes doesn't figure to get cheated on aggressiveness, ei-ther. Mayes originally came to UK as a quarterback from Paintsville High School but was switched to de-fensive back last spring.

In his first season as a defensive In his first season as a defensive back, the 6-1, 192-pounder intercepted four passes After spring practice this year, he won the "Big Stick" Award, given to the player who delivers the most authoritative hits in spring drills.

"If receivers catch a couple passes on us, and we come up and hit them real hard, they're going to be looking to be hit the part time.

be looking to be hit the next time they catch the ball," Mayes said. "They might be a little wary and not catch the ball sometimes.

Hairston, who stands tall in the middle at 6-foot-4, steps into the safety spot vacated by Calhoun, Al-though he's never been a starter like Douglass and Mayes, Hairston has seen a lot of playing time the past two seasons and was UK's ninth leading tackler a year ago. He, too, figures to get into the intimidation

"We're trying to get them (receivers) to where they don't even want to come down field," he said.

Depth in the secondary, Garber admits, is "probably the thing that concerns me the most. I've been pleased with the way (the backups) have come along, but it's a whole different ball game when you're out in front of \$8.000 people." in front of 58,000 people.

Ron Mack, a redshirted freshman, Carmichael Caldwell, a senior with two years of varsity experience, and Gary Sexton, another experienced senior, figure to be the primary backurs.

Two other redshirted freshmen, David Johnson and Ray Gover, are expected to see action this year.

As a team last season, UK intercepted 18 passes

Garber wants this year to be different. "We've set a goal," he said. "We definitely want to get more than 18 interceptions. That's our job. We've got to stop the passing game."

He also said the team record for interceptions (28 by Bear Bryant's 1949 club) is not out of reach.

According to Garber and the play-ers, this year's secondary has more speed, more experience and more aggressiveness than the 1984 team.

"We've got more experience this year than we've had in the past," Garber said, "All have super ability, but now they've got to take that ability and turn it into something on the football field."

If a preseason prediction about this year's gridiron Cats is what you're after — don't bother questioning the one who leads them into battle.

Not only does this quarterback shy away from predictions and comparisons, but he also sidesteps personal acclamation as well as he sidesteps a pass rush. "I'll be as good as the rest of the team," he said.

swers revolve around "the guys," not himself.

Whether discussing this year's team or his own goals, Ransdell concentrates only on the here-and-now. The only speculating he seems to enjoy involves the stock market.

At the beginning of last year, however, Ransdell had some hesitations. For the first time, he was going to lead the charge — a charge of determined guys just itching to prove they could win the big games — and a bowl game.

"I wondered if I could do the job. I've always grown up watching UK football and have seen seasons in the past. We wanted to have such a

the past. We wanted to have such a good season wonder.

There was never any doubt in Ransdell's mind that last year's offensive line could do the job. And he says this year's line is probably even better than it was last year. A possible prediction? No, just a statement.

As for himself, Ransdell doesn't quantify his improvement. As he puts it, "Apparently I've made some or I wouldn't be where I am."

He doesn't focus on success be-cause of his performance. "I don't get caught up in personal perspec-tives. I don't sit down and evaluate myself. It takes 11 guys on offense and 11 on defense."

Even if he doesn't dwell on his own abilities, his teammates often do. Former Wildcat wide receiver "Joker" Joe Phillips, Ransdell's former roommate, gave him a nickname two years ago that has stayed with him. He was labeled "Dollar" Bill because he is "always on the money."

Ransdell's response? "I don't now why he did that."

The one thing Ransdell does know is that right now, football is his life. "I love it. I wouldn't trade it for anything," he said, but "it all comes down to the actual game. All the practices during the week before a game don't make any difference because nobody sees what you do or how hard you work until Saturday. We play for 11 Saturdays a year and that's what it all comes down to."

One of toughest in country, Southeastern Conference features top-notch teams, All-Americans

Over the past few seasons, the Southeastern Conference has been gaining a reputation as one of, if not the best, college football conferences in the country.

In 1983, seven of the 10 SEC teams In 1983, seven or the 10 star con-went to a postseason bowl game. Last season, the SEC had a won-lost record of 36-13-2 against outside competition, the best winning percentage of any conference

The SEC is a star-studded confer The SEC is a star-studded confer-ence with several legitimate Heis-man Trophy candidates and a host of potential and current All-Ameri-cans. Here is a look at the 10 teams in a predicted order of finish.

Auburn — Coach Pat Dye calls this "a year of challenge" for his Tigers, after a disappointing 94 record last season. Auburn will be running out of the "i" formation this year instead of their customary "wishbone," and with good reason. Bo Jackson is potentially the best ball carrier anywhere. Quarterback Bobby Walden and receiver Freddy Weygand must also have good seasons for Auburn to succeed. Lineman Gerald Robinson leads the defense.







The linebacker is often the blood and guts of any football team, and the UK linebacking corps this year couldn't be defined any more accu-

rately.

The loss of the graduated Cam Jacobs — UK's leading tackler last season, who was drafted by the Pittsburgh Steelers and remains on their injured reserve list — did not seem to hurt the position.

"The depth is there," he said, "and I believe I can play four or five backers a game."

The linebackers will be led by returning starters. Jeff Kremer and Larry Smith Kremer, an outstanding high school athlete, was recruited by UK as a safety. Standing at 6-foot-2 and weighing 190 pounds, he toughened up after his first spring season and increased his weight to 231.

Kremer, a sophomore, did not go through any special weight training but gained the 40 pounds through the

The younger Smith was the leading tackler for the Cats before the injury brought him down, and he admits that he still feels soreness in the knee. But pain or no pain, he is anxious to begin where he left off when UK opens against Bowling Green tomorrow.

Strock was impressed with Smith's performance last year and is confident the 6-1, 220-pound junior will be the stopper Jacobs was last year. "Larry gave us a great effort last season and should be strong again this year," he said.

The athletic ability of both Kremer and Smith is symbolic of the entire UK linebacking corps this season

Pressing both Kremer and Smith for starting positions are junior Don Yarano and redshirted freshman Chris Chenault. Yarano saw action in all junior varsity games last year and should be strong this season de when Smith suffered a knee injury spite a knee injury. Chenault backed up Kremer in spring drills and is expected to be a solid player this year. He has gained weight and strength since last year and is playing well, Strock said.

Also adding strength to the line Also adding strength to the line-backer position are juniors Guy Neal and Jacky Crawford, Neal was the leading tackler in the Hall of Fame Bowl last year with eight solo tackles and two assists. Crawford participated in all junior varsity games last season and saw some varsity action. varsity action

Even though the competition among this year's Wildcat lineback-ers is intense, both Kremer and Smith agree that the competitive spirit is good for the team.

"Everybody will really be pushing everybody else," Kremer said, and Smith agreed that the depth of the linebackers "makes us all better players".

Despite a tough road schedule, players and coaches expect that UK will have another winning season. "There's no reason we shouldn't have one if we play like we have the past two years," Smith said.

Preseason polls had UK ranked low this year, but Kremer said they mean very little. "You can't listen to them, it's what you do when you go out there and play."

Florida — The Gators have the best of both offensive worlds, a quarterback who can pass and a running game that is one of the best in the nation. Last year, QB Kerwin Bell not only had the highest passing efficiency rating (148.0) of any freshman in NCAA history, but he garnered SEC Player of the Year honors as well. Senior running backs Neal Anderson and John L. Williams are likely to wind up being the top two rushers in Gator history.

Oklahoma — Defense, defense, defense. That's the word coming from Coach Barry Switzer this year. In 1984, the Sooners ranked first nationally against the rush and second in overall defense. Leading the way is consensus All-American Tony Casillas, a 6-3, 270-pound noseguard. To get points on the scoreboard, Switzer looks to sophomore tailback Spencer Tillman, who gained 1,047 yards last season.

Auburn — The Tigers have the best backfield in the nation: Bo Jackson and whoever is beside him. At 6-2 and 222 pounds, Jackson has world-class sprinter speed and is considered the best college baseball

prospect in the country. As long as Pat Dye's boys keep winning and staying in the Top 10, Jackson is the the man to beat for the Heisman.

Southern Methodist — In the three years Coach Bobby Collins has been at SMU, the Mustangs have been the second-winningest team in the nation, going 31-41. A year ago, quarterback Don King led the Southwest Conference in nessing and Ideal quarteroack Don King led the South-west Conference in passing and total offense, and tailback Reggie Dupard rushed for 1,154 yards. But one tan-gible for this year is that SMU will be at home on New Year's Day, watching the bowl games on TV, the result of an NCAA suspension.

Southern Cal. — Check out these rumbers: offensive tackle James FitzPatrick, 6-foot-8, 270 pounds, and guard Jeff Bregel, 6-4, 270, who bench presses 465 pounds. If the Troian running backs ran behind these guys on every play, they'd be 11-0. Fred Crutcher will be that man, who has joined the Simpsons, Bells and Allens in the USC Tailback Hall of Fame, after gaining 1,155 yards last

Florida State — Averaging 45 points and 450 yards per game in 784, the Seminoles return most of their offensive threats this year, minus All-America running back Greg Allen and wide receiver Jesse Hester. But this is the same FSU team that beat Nebraska 17-13 at Lincoln last week. They are tested later in the season with games at Auburn and Florida.

✓Maryland — Put an asterisk next to the Terrapins because of their proximity to the North. Coach Bobby Ross has the advantage of

playing in the Atlantic Coast Conferplaying in the Atlantic Coast Confer-ence, but he also has the disadvan-tage of playing one of the hardest non-conference schedules in the land. Fullback Ron Badanjek is the John Riggins of the college ranks. With an offensive line that averages 6-foot-4½ and 275 pounds, who's going to stop the Terps? Their schedule.

There it is, the hottest teams in the country.

Put on your shorts, grab your sun-glasses, bring your Gatorade. See you at Commonwealth Stadium to-morrow at 1:30 p.m. The heat is on, and there are no signs of cooling off.


