#### **BLUEGRASS FAIRNESS ANNUAL RETREAT**

The Bluegrass Chapter of the Kentucky Fairness Alliance had their annual retreat at Blue Licks Battlefield State Park the weekend of Feb. 18-20. The agenda and priorities were mapped out for 2005-2006. See future GLSO newsletters for upcoming events involving the Kentucky Fairness Alliance.

Bluegrass Fairness has no specific events scheduled in March. In April, Bluegrass Fairness will co-sponsor/participate in the Human Rights Commission Fair Housing luncheon, the Kentucky Conference for Community & Justice dinner, and the AVOL AIDS Walk for Life. Fairness will continue to lobby legislators and educate the community at large. Be looking for our outreach materials at local establishments and events.

One highlight of the retreat was a serious discussion regarding building the community from within. In addition to increasing our allied support, we must keep apprised of internal issues. The anti-marriage amendment to the Kentucky constitution was a real blow to the LGBT community. Much of the post-election experience involved a lowering of self-esteem and retreat back into the closet for LGBT persons and sympathetic allies. Bluegrass Fairness is developing a seminar surrounding this dynamic.

Bluegrass Fairness is updating and compiling their referral lists. The latest versions of our LGBT supportive attorneys, counselors, et al. will be available soon.

The monthly meetings of the Bluegrass Chapter of the Kentucky Fairness Alliance have been changed. Beginning March 14th, the steering committee meetings will be held on the 2nd Monday of the month at 7:00 pm at the Pride Center. The meetings are open and all Fairness minded folks are welcome to attend. There are also a variety of committees that would welcome new volunteers.

To better accommodate our needs surrounding the Kentucky legislative sessions, the Annual General Membership Meeting of the Bluegrass Chapter has been changed from January to October and the steering committee will go on their retreat in November.

# Research Study of Same-Sex Couples

Dr. Sharon Rostosky and Dr. Ellen Riggle at the University of Kentucky are looking for gay/lesbian/same-gender loving couples (at least 23 years of age and together at least two years) to participate in a study of spiritual and/or religious values. Couples will participate at a time convenient for them and will be compensated \$50 (\$25 each) for their time (approximately 1 ½ hours).

During this session, the couple will be interviewed (together) about their views and experiences with spirituality and religion within the context of being a couple. The interview will be taped and later transcribed and then all interviews will be compiled for analysis.

Each couple member will also be asked to individually (and confidentially) complete a questionnaire about him/herself and his/her relationships. #### Intersex Research

A number of medical researchers have recently published studies that support the belief of Intersex persons that no surgery should be done on babies that are born with a both male and female traits. They suggest that such children should be listened to as they mature and given the right to claim the gender that they believe fits them.

The Intersex Society of North America (ISNA), the organization of Intersex persons that has called for such research, is celebrating and encouraging the distribution of this information.

Intersex is a relatively new term referring to persons born with mixed sexual physiology, including physical manifestation of genital, genetic, and or endochrinological differentiation that is different from the cultural norm. It is term chosen to include individuals with a variety of issues that place them outside our cultures dichotomous conception of gender. (two genders, very different from each other) There are a variety of ways of viewing gender, other cultures see more than two categories and many people are now viewing gender as a continuum.

"Intersex" is replacing the term "hermaphrodite" which means having physical attributes of "both" genders. Hermaphrodite retains the concept of two genders.

When a child is born with genitals that are not easily classified, doctors check other indicators including sex chromosomes and levels of sex hormones in the babies blood. They use that information to assign gender and often will perform surgery to create genitals that fits the assigned sex.

When the indicators of gender are not conclusive, doctors are likely to assign a female gender to the child and to perform

surgery to make the genitals match this decision. Doctors more frequently chose female in part because the surgery is simpler. The surgery may include "reducing the size" of a clitoris that is "too large", creating a vaginal opening or in other ways creating a more "normal" appearance. This procedure is based on a belief that gender is flexible and that the social conditioning of being raised as a girl will successfully create a person with clear female identity,

Dr. William Reiner, a urologist who performed sex-assignment surgeries on babies, became aware that some of the children he operated on, later came to identify themselves as the "other gender." His interest led him to retrain as a psychiatrist and to study this phenomenon. His latest review of 94 intersex children found over half the children assigned "girl" came to identify themselves as boys as they grew up.

Another researcher, Dr. Eric Vilain, suggests that there are many factors effecting a child's gender identity, including some that we do not know how to measure. Through his research on mice, he identified 54 genes that work differently in the brains of male and female mice embryos just 10 days after conception, before sex hormones are even produced.

Both of these researchers support the position of the Intersex Society of North America (ISNA) of not doing surgery on intersex babies. A child can still be raised as male or female with the understanding that s/he may announce at some point that s/he has been mislabeled.

It is difficult enough for a child or adult to claim a different gender identity without having the issue of infant surgery that can't be reversed. In addition, too often the surgery damages an individuals sexual responsiveness. ISNA's position is that doctors should stop pathologizing children that do not fit their standards for what is "normal" and stop infant surgery.

## Rediscovering Our History

# Bulldagger Blues and More by mary crone

Reading the Barbara Smith essay on African American GLBT History that I printed part of in last month's newsletter, led me to do more reading concerning the gay presence in the Harlem Renaissance, approximately 1920 to 1935. During this period, Black writers, musicians, entertainers, and artists flourished. They truly enriched our american culture.

This was also the time of prohibition, speakeasies, "rent parties" with bathtub gin, and "buffet flats" offering public sexuality and prostitution. White folks came to

clubs in Harlem to enjoy the great music and to experience the unusual mix of races and sexualities common there.

Although I believe that GLBT folks have been present in every

culture and time, there are some periods where the queer presence has been more predominant and influential. The Harlem Renaissance seems to have been one of those times.

Notable African-Americans that we claim as family include Ma Rainey, Richard Bruce Nugent, Bessie Smith, Gladys Bently, Alberta Hunter, Jackie "Moms" Mabley, Ethel Waters, Josephine Baker and Langston Hughes.

Historians question how to label historic figures since concepts of gay identity change over time. But we can look at the writings, song lyrics and behaviors of individuals as we try to understand their lives and know many of them were not straight.

Since this is Women's History Month, I will focus on some stories about Women Blues singers who did not label themselves as lesbians but did present them-

selves in gender bending and women loving ways.

Ma Rainey is credited by many historians as being the first real Blues singer. She first appeared onstage in 1900, singing and dancing in vaudeville shows. In 1902 she married William "Pa" Rainey and from then on became known as Ma Rainey. They toured the south with various vaudeville companies including Rabbit Foot Minstrels, where Rainey befriended and mentored the young Bessie Smith.

By the 1920s Rainey was a solo star of the vaudeville circuit and was promoted in Harlem as the "Mother of the Blues." In 1923 she signed a recording contract with Paramount and recording over 100 songs between 1923 and 1928.

One time Rainey was arrested for hosting an "indecent party." On this occasion, Ma Rainey was said to have been involved in an orgy with a number of women. It is believed

that this story was told, in somewhat vague language, in her well known "Prove It on Me Blues."

Went out last night with a crowd of my friends

Most of them women, 'cause I don't like no men...

They say I do it, ain't nobody caught me

Sure got to prove it on me...

Bessie Smith was another famous singer who was married to a man but didn't hide her interest in women. She had an intimate relationship with Lillian Simpson who traveled with her on the road. Ruby Walker, Bessie's niece, relates an incident that occurred following a quarrel that temporarily separated the two.

Smith went on a drinking binge with five women from her chorus including Walker. Her husband made a surprise visit, catch-

ing her in a "compromising situation" with one of the chorus girls. (Some rumors say more than one) Following a brief but loud confrontation, Smith fled with her friends to her private railroad car.

"That's how I lost the only fur coat I ever had", remembers Ruby Walker, "Bessie took us out of Detroit almost naked." One of Bessie Smith's gay themed songs went like this:

"There's Two things got me puzzled, there's two things I can't understand.

That's a mannish-actin' woman, and a skippin', twistin', woman-actin' man.

"Foolish Man Blues"

Several GLBT history books refer to Harry Hansberry's Clam House as one of the most famous gay oriented clubs. For years Gladys Bentley sang and played the piano at the Clam House dressed in a white tuxedo and top hat. One source quotes Langston Hughes writing that "for two or three amazing years, Miss Bently sat and played a big piano all night long, literally all night, without stopping—singing songs from ten in the evening until dawn, with scarcely a break between the notes, sliding from one song to another."

Gladys was a woman of size, weighing between 250 and 300 pounds. For a number of years she wore a white tuxedo and top hat for her nightly performances.

One writer says that Gladys cultivated a specifically lesbian persona, often wearing masculine clothes, and was widely know as the "Bulldagger Who Sang the Blues." She has been referred to as a male impersonator, a cross dresser, a bulldagger, and a lesbian. It is difficult to know how she identified herself during that time or how she might see herself in today's world.

Gladys flirted openly with women in her audience and dedicated songs to current and former girlfriends. She is said to have had a ceremony of marriage to a woman in New Jersey in the 20's. Later, she was particularly famous for inventing obscene lyrics to popular songs.

In later life Bently married a man, and claimed that her lesbianism was the result of a "hormonal imbalance" that had since been medically corrected. In 1952 in Ebony magazine she was quoted as saying "For many years I lived in a personal hell... I inhabited that half-shadow noman's land which exists between the boundaries of the two sexes."

Bently divorced her husband and in 1960 died at the age of 52. If she had lived into an old age she might have found the emerging proud GLBT community and been able to reclaim a lesbian or trans identity.

# Lexington Friends Meeting (Quakers)

The Lexington Friends would be delighted to have you visit us. We are a relatively small community, generally 40 - 55, including children, attend worship on Sunday mornings. Most of us came to Quakerism as adults, and many of us have found Quakerism to be a more comfortable spiritual path than the religion or church in which we grew up. Many of our current attenders have only been attending a few months or a few years. So, we are a place where newcomers can feel comfortable and welcome.

Lexington Friends Meeting is an unprogrammed Quaker meeting. This means that our worship is similar in form to silent meditation. But, unlike meditation, which is an individual practice, our worship is definitely a group experience. Most of us feel knit together in the silence.

We have no clergy, and there is no sermon, no order of service, and no sacraments. We sit together in silence. Friends "listen" to learn how we are led. If someone is led, he or she may speak from the silence. Such spoken messages are usually brief. Some weeks there may be as many as a half dozen spoken messages during the hour, and occasionally we sit in silence the whole hour.

In our culture, many people are uncomfortable with prolonged silences. But we generally find the silence to be rich and a time to slow down and reach for a profound center within. Many times the messages of others speak to our own conditions. It is not unusual for newcomers to find this experience very moving. But of course, it is not necessarily congenial for all people. Worship usually lasts about one hour.

The Clerk ends the worship by shaking hands with the persons beside her. Everyone then shakes hands with those around them. Following a brief period of announcements, we go around the circle introducing ourselves. (We sit in a circular formation, not in rows facing one direction, as people do in most churches.) During these introductions, Friends may optionally simply give their name or speak about a high or low of their week or about a message that they had during Meeting that did not quite 'gel.' We find this sharing to be a way of getting to know one another that builds community.

Meeting for Worship is at 10:30 a.m. on Sunday mornings. Each Sunday there is singing from 10:15 to 10:30 a.m. There is Adult Discussion ("First Day School") from 9:00 to 10:15 a.m. Child care is available during this Discussion period. There is First Day School for Children (Sunday school) during Meeting for Worship. Children stay in Worship until 11:00 and then leave worship to attend their classes.

Our meetinghouse is at 649 Price Ave... which is about a mile north of downtown Lexington. Price Avenue is a two block street that runs parallel to North Broadway between W. 6th Street and Delcamp Drive. From downtown, take North Broadway out of town. Turn left at 6th Street, and take your second right onto Price Avenue. The meetinghouse is on the left toward the end of the block. From New Circle Road, exit onto North Broadway and head south toward town. Pass under the RR overpass and watch for Delcamp Avenue on the right. Turn right onto Delcamp, then take your second left onto Price Avenue. The meetinghouse will be the first building on your right. Please pay us a visit.
