## Part-time jobs taboo for law students, says faculty group

Under a policy adopted yesterday, some UK law students are "strongly" advised not to hold a part-time job, while others are told to limit themselves to 15 hours of employment per week.

However, there is no provision for punishing students who violate these quidelines.

The law faculty yesterday approved

The law faculty yesterday approved a resolution supporting an American Bar Association policy that discourages part-time employment of law students. The resolution prohibits first-year students for meseking employment and limits second- and third-year students for a maximum of 15 hours per week.

The limitations will be in effect for only the fall and spring semesters of the academic year— summer sessions aren't covered.

The policy states:
"Employment during the school semester often impairs a student's ability to devote the time needed for full-time law school study. The faulty strongly urges full-time students not to undertake any employment during their first or second semesters, except in extraordinary circumstances and only after consultation with the dean's office."

This, said Associate Dean Paul Van Booven, is "a reaffirmation of current school policy."

One important detail of the resolution is that it is a policy, not a rule—no provisions have been made for disciplinary actions against students who violate the work load limits.

BRITAIN AND THE TWO SIDES in the Zimbabue Rhodesian guerrilla war agreed yesterday in London on the principles of a cease-fire, apparently overcoming the last major hurdle to peace in the breakaway British colony. British Foreign Secretary Lord Carrington, announcing the accord, said a final settlement should be posted within a few days. Detailed arrangements were to be worked out by military specialists.

Carrington told the House of Lords he was sending a gover-nor to Salisbury to take control of the government pending

elections and internationally recognized independence aimed at ending the 7-year-old war which has taken more than 20,000 lives.

THE STATE DEPARTMENT said yesterday that the United States is closing its embassy in Tripoli until the Libyan government acknowledges responsibility for a mob attack in which the building was ransacked and burned.

U.S. officials said the action does not amount to severing relations with the government of Col. Moammar Khadafy.

## Sturgill needs to avoid conflict of interest, prove desire to contribute

Environmentalists are raising serious questions about William Sturgill's appointment as energy secre-

about William Sturgili's appointment as energy secre-tary — these questions must be answered before he assumes office Tuesday. Last Monday, the Appalachian Research and Defense Fund in Lexington said, "Putting Bill Sturgill in as secretary of energy is like letting a butcher loose in the henhouse as he is one of the most notorious of the early Eastern Kentucky strip-miners

A six-state environmental group, the Appalachian Coalition, called Sturgill the "father of strip mining." Given his background and his many associations with the coal industry, it doesn't appear Sturgill can support his statements that the job won't constitute a lict of interest

The 55-year-old Floyd County native is president of operates four strip mines in

southeastern Kentucky, a land and mineral leasing organization, and Hazard Explosives.

He is also director of Seaboard Coast Line, the Florida-based parent of the Louisville & Nashville Railroad Co, which transports the majority of eastern Kentucky coal from the coalfields.

The fact that he is a good businessman is revealed through his different postions in companies which if linked - could form one of the best coal operations

According to Sturgill, his appointment as energy department secretary won't create a conflict of interest because, he says, it doesn't involve issuing mining per-mits or involve agencies which regulate coal

However. Sturgill has said he will work to change

the federal strip mine law which has hampered the production of coal. Won't this affect agencies which regulate coal production?

Sturgill said he imagines he'll have a supervisory role on Brown's Coal Policy Council, which Brown has said will coordinate coal-related activities within the state and represent Kentucky's coal industry in Washington and overseas.

He is still chairman of UK's Board of Trustees; UK has fought to protect Robinson Forest from stripmining. If the federal strip mine law is changed to allow more coal production despite damage to the environment, wouldn't this benefit the coal industry and possibly harm the environment or even UK's

He said he accepted the position for three reasons

because he has a "strong and deep desire to make a contribution to Kentucky:" because he "wanted to do contribution to Kentucky; "because he "wanted to do something in a meaningful way for the coal industry;" and because he "wants to support to the fullest extent the aims and desires of John Y. Brown, Jr."

Last week, Brown said Sturgill will be responsible for other — still unnamed — departments and he will

have a voice in the state's overall policies toward the coal industry.

This power combined with his extensive control over companies involved in the coal industry could point to dangerous times not only for environmental-ists, but for all Kentuckians. If Sturgill is sincere in his aim to make a contribution to Kentucky, he should consider resigning some of his positions in the interest of impartiality, and more importantly, in the interest of Kentucky

## Letters to the Editor

It is with great reluctance that I react to the anti-Semitic letter of Chris Westover and Larry Simpson, that appeared on these pages some time ago. As a Jew and Israeli I have every reason to detest anti-Semits. In fact, I feel that every American should detest them, since what they advocate is the absolute contrast of anything that. America has ever aspired to represent. However, the sad past has taught us that ignoring anti-Semites only encourages them, and gives them the feeling that they can get away with it. So we have to overcome our disgust

My friend Steve Goldstein went their reasoning. Our two writers didn't have to work very hard to formulate their ideas. Some of their arguments ("the unholy alliance of New York banking interests and the forces of international Zionism...") are remar-kably similar to those employed by Hitler in the 20s and 30s. Others ("the repressive dictatorship in Tel Aviv") follow the favorite Soviet anti-Semitic terminology. Reading the letter I actually wondered how the writers had failed to mention the fact that we murdered Christ, and that we tried to take over the great mosque in Mecca in order to use it for Passover.

Anti-Semitism is old, almost as old as Judaism. And it has changed very little through the years. Therefore the most suitable answer I could give this letter is the one the Prophet Isaiah gave Rabshakeh, the Assyrian general who came to cuss and threaten the people of Jerusalem, some 2700 years ago:

"The virgin, the daughter of Zion hath despised thee, and laughed thee to scorn; the daughter of Jerusalem has shaken her head at thee. Whom hast thou reproached and blasexalted thy voice, and lifted up thine eyes on high? even against the Holy One of Israel." (Isaiah 37:22-23)

Dear anti-Semites, please accept my sincere apologies for spoiling the party. But the Jewish people have existed for 4000 years, and we intend to stick around for a little while more, even if it gives you ulcers. Sorry.

The human being interested in living a balanced, healthy life tries to evenly integrate those three aspects to create a whole being. While a jockhead is a pitiful spectacle indeed, I consider it no less a sorry sight to observe a mental genius packaged inside a lousy excuse for a body. And the sad fact is, too many poeple are pitifully out of shane.

Good health does not necessarily
indicate physical fitness. A healthy
person is simply one who is not sick.
Good physical fitness indicates

excellent health.

I recall hearing a professor exclaim, "When I feel the urge to exercise, I lie down until the feeling goes away," With that statement, this academician demonstrated his total disregard for his physical self. He, as well as others who share his negative attitude toward exercise, should realize that studies have shown that exercise increases a person's ability to think clearly, as well as one's attention span and concentration. Definite benefits of the intellectual! Other general benefits of the concentration. Definite benefits to the intellectual! Other general benefits of exercise include reduction of mental stress; a cheerful outlook on life; improved sexual ability, deeper, more restful sleep; and more self-confidence. Though no one can guarantee you a long life if you keep physically lift (lifespan is determined primarily by genetics) a healthy body will make your life more enjoyable and meaningful.

Physical fitness consists of Physical Ittness consists of cardiovascular ability, muscular strength, and flexibility, as well as a general feeling of energy and well-being. The factors involved in acquiring a high degree of any or all of these aspects include I) proper diet, 2) sleep, 3) absence of debilitating habits and 4) exercise.

Same person would never think of filling the gastank of his car with alcohol and expect the car to run, although he might use gasohol (10) percent alcohol). However, many people think nothing of eating Twinkies and Ho-Hos and drinking Cokes all day long. Then they wonder why they feel so lousy all the time. Your body can only be as healthy as your diet. Using the gasohol analogy, a diet consisting of 90 percent nutritive loods and 10 percent junk will allow you to satisfy your sweet tooth and help improve your health as well. If you don't know what a healthy diet consists of, find out! Look at books on nutrition in the library or ask a doctor or dietician for help. For a start, make sure you eat some foods from each of the four basic food groups (dairy products, meats, whole grains, fruits and vegetables) every day. Virnikies do not count as whole grain foods.

Sufficient sleep is needed so that the

body can rebuild itself properly. Remember what you learned in basic human biology — the body is always building new cells (out of the food you eat) to replace old ones. This occurs primarily during sleep. Because of metabolic differences, the amount of sleep needed varies from person to person. Though most people seem to need eight hours nightly to function at make efficiency some people need only. need eight hours nightly to function at peak efficiency, some people need only four and others need as many as 12 nightly. Find out how much sleep you require by noting how long you sleep at night when uninterrupted by an alarm clock, and try to get that amount of sleep each night. Of course, the demands of college sometimes make it impossible to always get rough sleep but do the best you can be consulted to the control of enough sleep, but do the best you can.

Exercise is probably the most widely misunderstood of all the factors involved in physical fitness. Pust simply, an improvement in the cardiovascular or muscular system is the result of compensation by the body in response to stress. Read that sentence again and think about it. Exercise is a form of bodily stress and the body compensates for this stress by Exercise is a form of bodily stress and the body compensates for this stress by increasing either its muscular strength and/or cardiovascular efficiency, depending on the type of exercise done. So, understanding this basic officiency, depending or a walk around the block will not lead to high levels of polysical firess. These activities physical fitness - these activities simply are not stressful enough to simply are not stressful enough to cause a compensatory response in a person of average health, although they might slightly improve the condition of a person in poor health. (Incidentally, stress is not a negative term. Stress can be either beneficial or harmful, depending on its source and effect on the body. Stress, as defined in this article, is beneficial.) Since the compensation produced

by the body in response to exercise represents an improvement from the normal condition of the body, exercise must be continued on a frequent and regular basis or the body tends to revert back to its original state. This is why people get "out of condition" when they discontinue exercise.

In addition to the above, the body.

In addition to the above, the body operates according to a law of specificity. This means that in order to improve your endurance (cardiovascular efficiency) you must engage in activities which cause the body's cardiovascular processes (heart rate and breathing rate) to work hard, thereby causing the stress that forces the body to improve its cardiovascular system. If you want to improve your thereby causing the stress that forces the body to improve its cardiovascular system. If you want to improve your muscular strength, you must engage in activities that cause the muscles you want to strengthen to work as hard as possible, thereby causing the stress which leads the body to compensate in the form of increased muscular strength. This means that you choose your physical activity according to your goals. If you're interested solely in cardiovascular fitness, you'd choose running. If you're interested solely in cardiovascular fitness, you'd choose weight training.

If you're interested in balanced physical fitness, what do you choose?

While team sports are fun for most people, as fitness builders they rate low marks because they cause very little strength increase and generate only a light property of the pr

people, as fitness builders they rate low marks because they cause very little strength increase and generate only a slight cardiovascular response. (Note that team athletes use exercise other than that provided by their sport to get into shape.)

Swimming is a good endurance builder, but it tends to strengthen, certain muscles at the expense of others, which leads to lopsided muscular development. The same argument holds true for tennis and similar sports. Running is probably the best endurance builder, but it does nothing to strengthen the upper body muscles. Running does strengthen the leg muscles, but only to a certain degree. I won't explain the reasons here, but it is not true that by increasing the distance you run, you increase your leg strength proportionately. What you increase is your bodily endurance, as well as the muscular endurance of your leg muscles, but not their strength. Again, bear in mind that endurance refers to sustained effort, while strength refers to a short, maximum effort.

Weight training is the best form of exercise, not us for muscular strength.

to a short, maximum effort. Weight training is the best form of exercise, not just for muscular strength alone, but also for the best results in balanced fitness strength, endurance and flexibility. The key is to know how to apply weight training to your goals, and I will cover this, as well as disprove the many ridiculous myths regarding weight training and bodybuilding, next week.



## Arts Council seeking big money to put life into promised ArtsPlace

Lexington is traveling backwards — towards its 19th century position as the "Athens of the West."

The remaissance began with the removation of the Lexington Opera House, continued with the establishment of UKs. 
Center for the Arts and should continue to blossom with the completion of ArtsPlace, a community arts center conceived by the Lexington Council of the Arts. 
ArtsPlaces is designed to provide programming, rehearsal and storage space for Council members and the Lexington Community. The center will be obtained from the Kentucky. The renaissance began with

community. The center will be located at 161 N. Mill St., the former home of the Young Women's Christian Associa-

Although the building was purchased in spring of 1979, only minor alterations have been made in the interior. Offices for Arts Council administration should be finished within the next month, along with a furnace for that area of the building only. zations to be headquartered there will be held up until the Council receives outside funding.
"The best estimates we've

had (for completion) would be Christmas '81," said Pete Reynolds, executive director of the

Partial funding may also be obtained from the Kentucky Heritage Commission since the building (erected as a Y.M.C.A. in 1905) is an exam-ple of turn-of-the-century Beaux-Arts classical architec-

Not all of the funds needed Not all of the funds needed for the restoration will come from grant applications though. A portion of the processor arised by the Feb. 26 Henry Mancini Boston Pops concert in Rupp Arena will go to the Lexington Council of the Arts.

However, "the Council has not made a decision" as to

whether the funds will be app-lied to the nearly \$80,000 Council operating budget or to Arts Place, said Reynolds. Marie Hochstrasser, president of the Council, said the event is seen less as a fundraiser than as part of the overriding goal to establish Lexington once more as a cultural center

Right now, and until the needed financial support is secured, the building is in shambles. Peeling greenish wallpaper lines the walls of the entry hall. In the lobby, black and white checkerboard linoleum hides wood floors, strips of paint hang from the ceiling, and partitions obscure what was once unbroken space. The building is freezing.
"It's a good solid building."

ville architect who helped draw up the tentative design program for ArtsPlace. "We are going to try as carefully as possible to restore it to its original condition.

"The Council will restore it architecturally and modernize its engineering (heating and plumbing) systems," she added, noting that records show the lobby once displayed marble trimmings and oak woodwork with handsome finishes which
