

Louisville June 1 - 1830

Dear Ma

Uncle arrived here this morning rather unexpect-
edly - He looks remarkably well - He has you a few
minutes since he talks to me with Mr. Inead. Oliver has
remained from Mr. Bess's room in consequence of the badness
of the light - The paper was too bright and highly glazed.
He is better satisfied since his removal to a room over
Morris's apothecary shop. Uncle brought for me in his
trunk some little articles such as pen knives - I am glad
he came by Louisville - He has been visiting his ac-
quaintances all day.

You ask about matrimony - nothing
that should be an impediment has taken place as
far as I know in a certain quarter - But the truth
is I am getting rather too selfish to think about Matrimony
Money. Perhaps it would be better and perhaps not.
I think differently of it at different times - But any
thing worthy that would strongly engage my affections
would do me good - I should like to try the effect of
living with you if it could well be done.
