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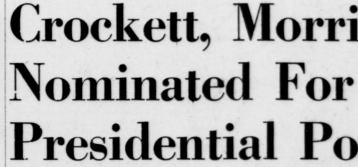
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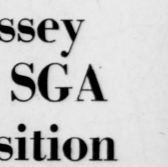

The committee's task is now in the process of contacting presidents of all Kentucky colleges and Universities for their permission to contact student leaders. It is planned to carry out the educational program through collegiate representatives who will approach students of high schools in the vicinity of the college on the subject of instituting a curriculum of constitutional education.

The University team scored 852 points to place behind Oklahoma A&M with 913, Nebraska with 888, and Alabama with 870. Thirty-five teams from the nation's colleges and universities entered the competition.

Firing on the Kentucky team were Kenneth O. Pagan, Ronald C. Dertman, Donald W. Stanfill, and Frank A. Bryson. Stanfill, with an individual score of 192, was the highest marksman in the race for national individual honors. Col. Lerner said, Pagan rated eighth with 180 and Bryson gained 20th place with a score of 178.

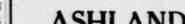

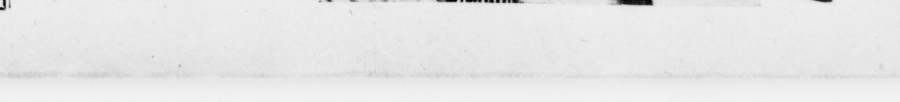

Former UK Students Plan Construction Of Shopping Center

Arthur Rouse Jr. and Robert Rouse, former students of the University, have announced plans for the construction of a new theater and shopping center for Lexington.

Arthur Rouse, a Lexington attorney, graduated from the College of Law in 1941, and Bob Rouse, a local merchant, attended summer sessions here.

The new theater, to be known as The Ashland, will be part of the Ashland Shopping Center which will be housed in one building of over 120 feet fronting on Euclid Avenue at the northeast corner of South Ashland Avenue. The structure is to be of brick and tile, and store space will be leased to various local merchants and services.

Construction will begin on the theater as soon as materials are available. The building will be fire-proof and plans include an entrance lobby, a large foyer, and air-conditioning equipment. It will be operated by the Lexington Theater Company.

The center will serve the entire Southeastern section of Lexington with a population of 20,000. Construction will start in the near future.

Camera Club Elects Cooper For President

Harrison Cooper was elected president of the Camera Club and William Masche vice president last week.

The club voted to sponsor an exhibit of photographs taken by University students in the spring and to provide a darkroom for students to study photograph repressing.

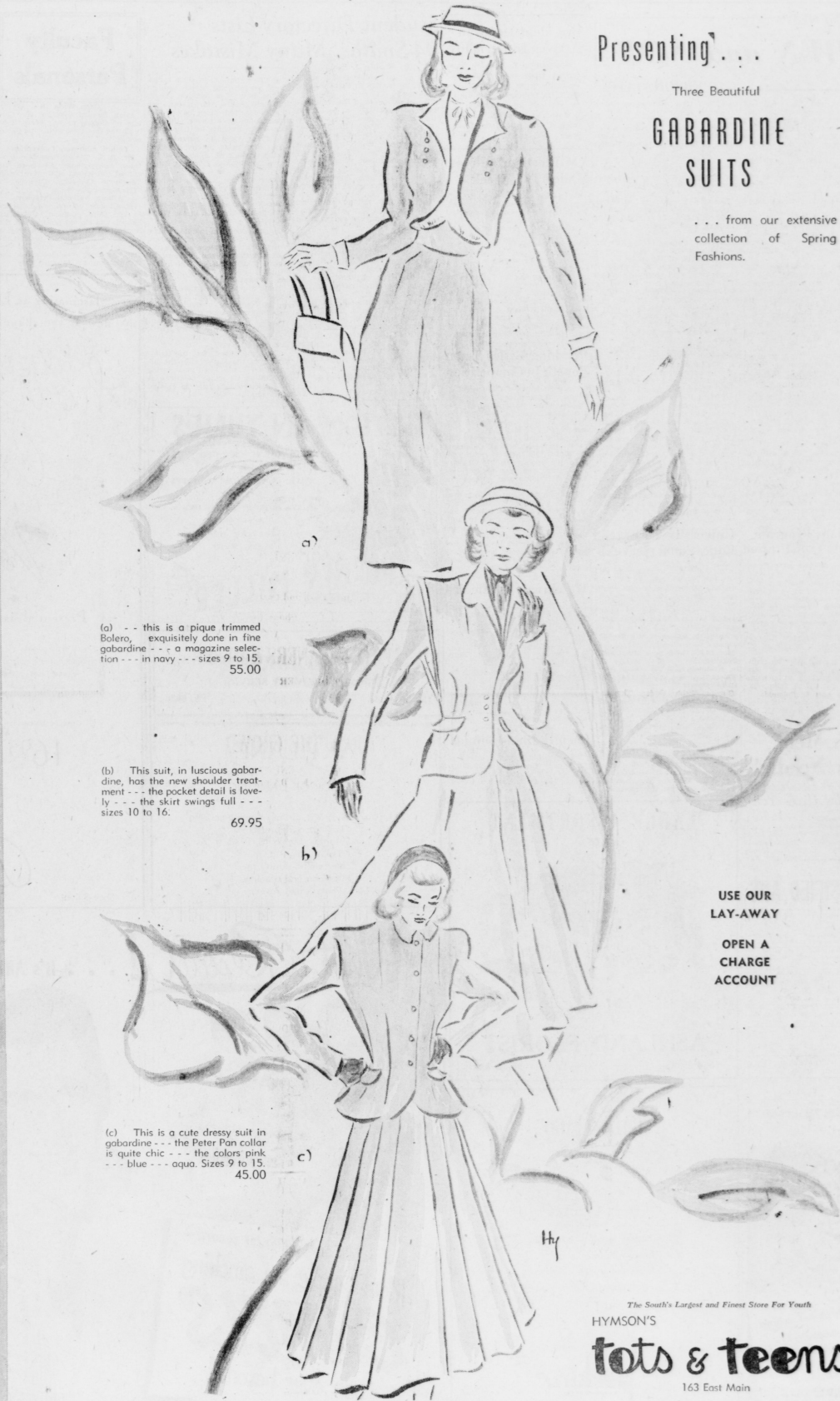

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Cat Clippings

Ned Irish, basketball promoter of Madison Square Garden in New York City, sent us the following information which will help clear up any confusion the reader may have regarding the two major cage tournaments held in New York this month.

NCAA
The National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) has split up the country into eight geographical districts, four east of the Mississippi River and four west of it. Each district has a selection committee of three men to pick its representative. In the Eastern bracket, Kentucky, Holy Cross, Michigan, and Columbia have been named, while the Western representatives have not as yet been decided, pending the play-offs by leading candidates.

The first round of the Eastern division, to be held in Madison Square Garden, will be six days hence. Thursday night, March 18, Kentucky will battle Columbia in the opener while Holy Cross, national winner last year, defends its title against the Michigan Wolverines. The winners of these two games will meet the following Saturday.

The Western division games will get underway on Friday, March 19, in Kansas City's huge Municipal Auditorium and will finish on Saturday night also. The winners and runner-up of each will then meet in New York City on Tuesday, March 23, for the championship and consolation games.

NTT

The National Invitational Tournament (NTT) is conducted by a body composed of 12 New York City colleges and is headed by Mr. Asa Bushnell. Serving Mr. Bushnell on the selection committee are representatives of four colleges whose teams were not considered possible NTT teams. This committee was not bound to select a team from each part of the country but operates on the theory of getting the eight best available, even if some of them come from the same sections.

This tournament, which got underway last night in Madison Square Garden, is made up of Western Kentucky, NYU, North Carolina State, St. Louis U.—seeded in that order—plus DePaul, Texas, LaSalle of Philadelphia and Bowling Green of Ohio.

Holy Cross, a possible opponent of the Wildcats for the Eastern division championship, has two of New England's outstanding basketball players in Forward Bob Cousy and Center George Kafan. Cousy, Temple, Cousy scored 20 points while the 6'3" Kafan sank a total of 18. Incidentally the "Wizards" whipped Temple that night, 71-44, a margin of 27 points.

Kentucky's margin over the Philadelphia Owls in their first month was 20 markers. Final score in that game was UK 58, Temple 38. Holy Cross led 19 to 18.

One-beaten Columbia, UK's foe in the initial round of the NCAA, inflicted upon the Holy Cross Crus-

Track Men Badly Needed

With the exception of a half dozen men, the 1948 track team headed toward a dull season unless a few men of men report for practice in a hurry, according to the sentiments expressed by Coach Don Seaton. The track mentor expressed hope, however, that things would brighten up as soon as spring football practice ends, and several of the more-track-wise graders have time to unpack their spiked-shoes.

Only a handful of men have reported to practice regularly this spring, all of whom have shown promise of developing into good competitors. However, there isn't enough of them to fill up the berths in all the events being held. Men eligible for the varsity and freshman teams all have a good chance to take part in the spring sport.

Seaton will run trials tomorrow for positions on the ten-man team he hopes to take to the Purdue Relays, March 27. At present, only Johnny McHaux, Don Phelps, and Tony Dallas loom as certainees. Seaton also reported that he hopes to take a squad to Austin, Texas, for a meet there on April 2.

With track men so scarce, Seaton reports that any freshman who reports in time will have an excellent chance of seeing action in Irish meets this spring, the first of which is a May 1 engagement with Union College.

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Beard, Jones, Rollins Honored As Cats Win SEC Tourney

Doing "good" naturally, the Wildcats of Kentucky won the Southeastern Conference crown for the fifth successive year last week in Louisville as they clipped Florida, LSU, Tennessee and then Georgia Tech to run up their string of SEC tournament victories to 19. The last Kentucky defeat in the Conference meet was to the Volunteers, 20-23, in the finals of the 1943 session.

As a result, the UK Cats have set several new records for the SEC. They are the initial team to win five straight titles; the first to win as many as 10 crowns; and the first to play in the finals as many as 12 times. The Big Blue basketballers have been in the last 19 championship games.

High scorer in the tourney was Jim Nolan, Georgia Tech's junior center, with a total of 71. The record for the meet is 74 set by LSU's Joe Adcock in 1946.

Gross High For UK in Tourney
Alex Groza was the top individual scorer for the Kentucky quietest player in the SEC. He had a total of 34 points in the four games; Jim Line finished second with 24; Ralph Beard tallied 41; Wah Wah Jones, 29; Kenny Rollins, 24; Cliff Barker, 23; Dale Barn-

ham, 20 against Georgia; 15 against Tulane, and 11 in the final contest against the Rupp Rifles for his total of 71 points.

Two Wildcats On Second Team
Cliff Barker and Alex Groza, at forward and center respectively, made the second team for the Wildcats. Others selected were Forward Billy Joe Adcock, of Vanderbilt, who scored 20 points in the Commodore's only game; Guard Alex Albas, Tulane, who flipped in 40 markers in three contests; and Bill Colin Anderson, a guard for the Yellow Jackets, who counted for 26 tallies

in his four games.

Rollins hit a hook shot to break the 41-41 tie. Immediately thereafter, the Cats went on a scoring spree as Alex Groza, Jim Line, Dale Barnstable, and Wah Jones all hit the basket for field goals, while Tech managed to make only two additional tallies on two free throws by Guard Colin Anderson.

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Kentucky's Wildcats were below their championship form in the recent defense of their SEC crown, and as a result didn't make as favorable an impression with the sportsman covering the tourney and the fans witnessing the play as did the 1946-47 squad. Columbia and either Michigan or Holy Cross had better watch out—the Cats just recently got four bad games out of their system. If it hadn't been for Jones Saturday morning, Tennessee would have been playing Georgia Tech in the championship game. And if it hadn't been for Rollins Saturday night, the Yellow Jackets would now be the proud possessors of their first SEC tourney championship.

The Wildcats only placed three men on the all-SEC first team, and two on the second squad this year, as compared with five gaining top honors last season, and one a second choice.

Big Alex Gross missed a first place spot on the all-conference team by just 20 minutes. It was generally conceded by those who cast the ballots that the first place spot was a toss-up between Gross and Tech's Jim Nolan before the final contest. Big Jim had carried the Engineers to the finals, and he had been a bright star on a poorly lighted squad. While Big Alex had been a demon under the boards and a constant help to the Wildcats was a bright star on a star-studded squad.

The ballots were collected at half time in the championship game. At that point, Nolan held a nine-seventy count in scoring, with both boys rebounding showing both good and bad. However, during the next 20 minutes, Alex pitched in 11 points to Jim's two, and the two boys finished the contest with Alex holding a 12-11 margin. Had the balloting been held until the end of the game, giving both boys a good ball, there is no doubt in our mind that Kentucky would have placed four men on the coveted team.

Coach Cliff Welis of Tulane would never be able to coach in Kentucky. All during the Green Waves' three post-exhibition, the diminutive mentor just sat on the bench with his legs crossed and his arms folded. After each game, he only commented that his team was flat and there wasn't anything he could do. Compare that with our own Adolph Rupp. Western's Sam Hines, Eastern's Paul McBrayer, or Louisville's Peck Hickman. But seriously, he's a great coach, and has done much and will continue to do a lot to improve the brand of basketball played in the SEC.

The two teams from which the fans and sports writers expected the most and got the least during the tournament Kentucky and Tulane, the two top seeded quintets.

Former Kentucky Kernel Sports Editor, Baxter Melton, was in Louisville covering the tournament for the Nashville Tennessean. Or at least he covered it until Vanderbilt met Tulane. "Gee if we just had one good substitute, we might be able to win this one," Melton mused.

Columbia Lions First NCAA Tourney Foe

Madison Square Garden, which sets stages for ice shows, dog shows, fights, track meets, and circuses, will probably set up a jungle scene March 18 when the Wildcats of Kentucky meet the Lions of Columbia, Kentucky, champions of the Southeastern Conference, will play Columbia, champions of the Ivy League, in the first round of the NCAA basketball tournament at 7 p.m. CST.

Although no teams were seeded in the tournament, the New Jersey bookmakers placed Kentucky in the favorite role with betting odds of 3 to 2. Holy Cross is a good risk at 5 to 2, and the Wolverines of Michigan are a 6 to 1 shot. Columbia, with a 19-1 season record, defeated only by a mediocre Princeton team, is an outside chance with the doopers, at 10 to 1.

If Kentucky wins the first round, they will play Saturday night, March 20, and if they win again, will play the Western NCAA until March 23.

Holy Cross, defeated only by DePaul, St. Louis U., and Columbia, is slated to emerge victor in a closely fought contest with Michigan. The

Franc Faulconer, junior in the College of Arts and Sciences, represented the University in the state oratorical contest here last night in competition with the 11 colleges in the state.

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
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
