It Was Fate

Saw an old ex-neighbor the other day. She smiled and spoke and her girlfriend had nothing to say. That smile worked loose a tucked memory. Fifteen years ago we both lived in one of those high rent/lousy maintenance apartments on Alexandria Dr. near the Versailles Road intersection. We lived on opposite ends of the same building. Money was tight for both our households and it wasn't economically wise to leave the air conditioning unit running all day in order to maintain a constant 80degree temperature inside the apartment. According to the apartment owners, 80 degrees was a lot cooler than 98 degrees and the air conditioning units were working just fine.

Maybe that was so, but those bricks felt just as hot as the ones I remembered from the days of living in the housing projects. And since my daughter was spending the weekend with family and the person I was living with had forgotten to come home, it seemed like a good night to sit on the back step and wait for the temperature to go down. My neighbor must have had the same idea, because she came out to her back step also.

We were having a right cordial conversation about nothing in particular - the heat, low pay, crappy air conditioning units, and the like. Somewhere in the brume of the conversation, she asked me if I would like to go out. Women go out together all the time, right? Of course they do and she had presented the idea in such a gracious

manner. Maybe a girl's night out on the town would be just what the doctor ordered, so off I went to get ready.

My apartment was still hot, but I managed to do a quick shower, two fresh braids, and a pressed outfit without dehydrating myself. A quick check in the mirror and that's when it hit me, I had been asked out on a date. Not knowing what that meant exactly, I had a brain belch that flooded my nervous system with panic and euphoria all at the same time. I started sweating all over my cute outfit.

Someone knocked on the door and when I opened it, there stood my date and the neighbor from downstairs. By a stroke of luck, or misfortune, they both had started up the back stairs at the same time, but for different reasons. The neighbor from downstairs was older and in more of a hurry, so she spoke first.

"Reinette, I need your help, there's a man a hollering in my fan "

It was a bit late in the evening for riddles, so my date and I asked the older woman to repeat herself. Maybe the heat had gotten to her.

"I said, there is a man a hollering in my fan. I need you to come back downstairs with me."

Going downstairs didn't seem like the right thing to do if my neighbor had a man inside her fan. My downstairs neighbor was a goodhearted woman who kept an eye out for my daughter and me; I couldn't just send her away, so I invited both the neighbor and my date inside the hot apartment. My date was giving me the wristwatch signal. The older woman was crying and going on about the man in

her fan, she obviously needed help beyond my student financial aid counseling expertise. So, I suggested that she call the police from my apartment.

"Hello? Is this 911? Who is this? Give me the police! Yes, this is an emergency. The problem... well, there is a man a hollering in my fan. Is he caught in the blades? No, he is hollering inside my apartment. No, he is not in my apartment, he is hollering inside my apartment inside the fan."

"Reinette, she said that I should call the police. Honey, is it ok if I make another phone call?"

"Hello? Is this the Lexington Fayette County Urban Municipal Police Department? Well good, because there is a man a hollering in my fan. You heard me, I said there is a man a hollering in my fan. Don't you ask me what am I talking about; I am speaking English. A man, m-a-n, in my fan, f-a-n, downstairs and I am not spelling that one! Why is he downstairs? Because I live downstairs. Yes, I will give you my address and please hurry up because that man's breath does not smell very nice and I want him out of my fan. "

With that all taken care of, my date informed me that she would wait with us for the police, but we should cancel the rest of the night. We were both relieved. The Ten Commandments A Pagan View, Part 2 by Patrick Buck

Once, the Ten Commandments were by law posted in schoolrooms in the great Commonwealth of Kentucky and other places around the USA. (They were removed after the courts said (repeatedly) that this violated the seperation of Church and State.) Now, efforts are again being made to post them here and elsewhere.

Commandments 5 - 10 deal with social relationships in what was for the time a fairly complex and well-organized society. (I discussed those Commandments last month in part 1.) Commandments 1 - 4 are of a different nature entirely. Here we enter the fascinating but obscure realm of myth and tribal taboo.

1. "I am the Lord thy God, who brought thee out of the land of Egypt. out of the house of bondage. Thou shalt have no other Gods before me." First of all, "before" seems to imply that Jehovah isn't insisting on Monotheism, just star billing. In either case, what a prima donna! Jealousy is more suited to spoiled brats than to Gods! My understanding is that "beside" would more accurately reflect the meaning of the original Hebrew. Be that as it may, I was never a slave (at least not in this lifetime) and I've never even been to Egypt! Most of my ancestors came here to the USA from the British Isles. In any case, it's none of the government's business whether an individual believes in one God, twenty Gods or no God at all! Thomas Jefferson said so, and he was right! This IS a free country, after all.

2. "Thou shalt not make unto

thee any graven image." This can be interpreted in a number of ways. Strict Muslims won't even make a representation of the animal or human form for fear someone might worship it! Orthodox Jews, however, can keep a copy of the Venus de Milo or other image of Pagan Deities in their homes as long as they make a small scratch on its nose to show that they pay it no reverence! Neither of the above religions makes use of images as aids to worship.

By the way, folks who do, don't worship the image, they use the image as a means to connect with what it represents. Christians have argued over this commandment almost from day one of their religion's existence, and have reached various conclusions. Please note that the vast majority of the world's Christians are members of The Roman Catholic and Eastern Orthodox Churches and DO use images (statues or icons) in their worship. I doubt they'd want stuff put up on public buildings accusing them of idolatry!


3. "Thou shalt not take the name of the Lord thy God in vain." When I was a kid, I used to get this quoted at me every time I'd get mad and yell "Oh my God!" However, in Spanish "¡Ay Dios mío!" (which means exactly the same thing) is as mild as milk!

I think this shows that Commandment #3 is open to various interpretations. I believe the original meaning was to prohibit using Jehovah's name (primitive belief often equated a thing's name with the thing itself; remember what I said about tribal taboo) to make a false oath. Lying is definitely un-cool, unless, of course, you have Jews hiding in your basement and armed


Nazis are asking you about it. In that case, lie away with a big smile and a clear conscience!

4. "Remember the Sabbath day, to keep it holy." Folks, the Sabbath is SATURDAY (or, more precisely, sundown Friday to sundown Saturday), making this perhaps the most violated of the Ten Commandments! Saturday is still "sábado" in Spanish. Everybody needs a day off every now and then, but that's not what this is about. This is a holy day of the Jewish faith (Christians appropriated the Jewish scriptures without permission and then added their own writings.) Obviously, none of this is any of the government's business, but just try to buy a bottle of wine on Sunday to go with your after-church dinner! Baptists aside, most of the world's Christians would see nothing wrong with the above scenario.

It should be obvious from the above that the government of a free country has no business endorsing the first Four of the Ten Commandments! The other Six are as a whole good ideas, despite some outdated language and concepts. However, I am sure there are better ways to encourage individuals to behave in an honest and socially responsible manner than quoting ancient texts in whose inspiration the majority of humanity does not believe. Religions belong in homes and houses of worship, not the government! This is the only way to preserve freedom in our religiously diverse nation and world.
