Best by far in the above-named group are the English "Illustrated London News," the French "L'Illustration" and Herr Hitler's "Ilustrirte Zeitung."

And, if you are inclined to believe that Germany has reduced Britain to a second-rate power, one peep at the German magazines will drown that opinion in korelschids.

While American gazettes were throwing verbal dirt in the faces of the French and English for letting Mr. Schickelgruber walk hob-nailed over them at Munich, the Continental mags were devoting entire issues to rejoicing over the fact that mothers would not have to send their sons off to be converted into slaves by dum-dum bullets and shrapnel.

"The London News" spread a "coloured" picture of Mr. Chamberlain's mustachioed map on the front cover, and basked him as the savior of London (and therefore the savior of civilization). Inside were picture after picture of the "Big Four" of crowds rejoicing at the Peace, and of the so-longer-needed trenches dug in the London parks. It was most impressive.

We here in America cannot fully appreciate the British attitude toward the Peace of Munich. We are separated from Europe by two thousand miles of deep salt water. It is all very nice for us, sitting cozily in our security, to call the John Bulls cowards because they would rather live in green England than die on muddy French battlefields.

But there is another side to the question, presented very clearly by this able British magazine. One glance at it and you will not only see the Englishman's view, but will actually come to appreciate it.

It represents a country which is supposed to be in just about the worst condition of any major power on the continent. Yet, on close scrutiny, this map appears to be the most intelligent, the most interesting, and the most fearless of the three. It hails M. Deladier as a hero and pictures the average Frenchman's joy over the Peace, and then goes on to devote a dozen or so pages to the very impressive pictures of France's new army tanks in maneuvers. It displays eloquence from cover to cover, and very effectively, too.

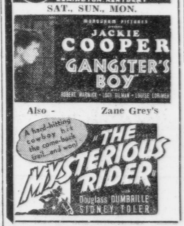

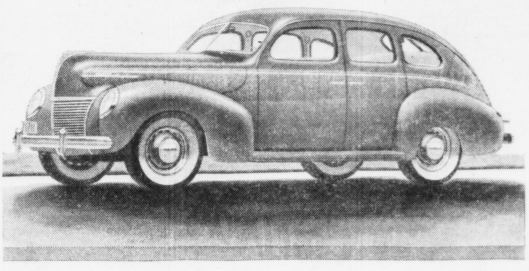

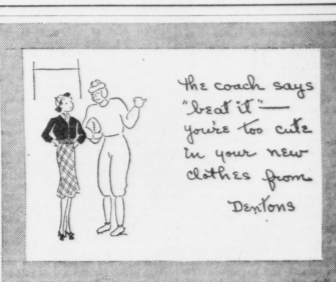

Armistice Day 20 Years Ago Was The McCoy

By STANLEY KNIGHT Student Army Training Corps on the University campus ceased drilling twenty years ago today.

When the Armistice was signed, November 11, 1918, six branches of the University SATC, now the Reserve Officers Training Corps, were in training on Still field.

Forty years later, Memorial Hall was dedicated to those eight men who lost their lives through participation in the World War.

First on the University Honor Roll was Frank Coffee who was killed in action during the fighting in the Dardanelles in November 1915.

Lewis Herndon, second man to die at the front, was killed in action while fighting in the British army when the Huns made their great drive in 1918.

Merritt Powell was gassed and died in a November of 1918, but it took two years to demobilize the army and many more to clean up the last of the mad mad soldiers.

Faced with the problem of furnishing supplies and necessities for the doughboys across the pond until they could be sent home, the United States Government started a campaign to raise funds.

Under the direction of Dr. Paul P. Boyd, dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, the University organized a local campaign in sympathy with the national effort.

On that first Armistice Day, 800 students, including all SATC men, were enrolled in a course in "War Aims" at the University.

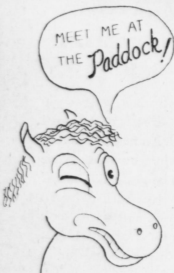

Calling 'Em Wild

QUICK Henry, the bear traps. Drag out those traps and fill the old muzzle-loader with your strongest wad, for tomorrow afternoon a bunch of Tigers from Clemson College will be loosed on Stoll field for the purpose of slaughtering Kentucky's Wildcats in an intra-feline battle. According to reports that have reached Kentucky concerning the strength of the boys from the palmetto swamps of South Carolina, the Tigers of this year are supposed to be the strongest unit to wear Clemson colors since their undefeated team of 1900. Coach Jess Neely felt the big Dame Fortune's kiss and fear of his last year's regulars were trapped by graduation, leaving him a mixture of hardened seniors and still inspired juniors. So far the Tigers have clawed out 6 wins while losing but one game, a 20-7 decision to Tennessee's streamlined Volunteers.

In preparation for the Cats, last week Clemson, with their regulars playing but 20 minutes, swept over George Washington by 27-0. The feature of tomorrow's struggle will be a battle between Wildcat Sherman Hinkebein and Tiger Charley Wood, brothers under the skin in that both are captains of their teams, play center, and are leading contenders for the pivot position on the All-Star teams selected from their conferences. And as brotherly love on a football field is as uncommon as tarras at a fish fry, the bout stacks up as a natural.

Plenty of Tiger Backs

The leaders in the Tigers offense are Don Willis, bonecrushing 188 pound fullback, Bob Bailey, who has averaged 64 yards per ball-carrying try this season, and Banks McFadden, an All-Southern basketball performer who is said to sweep the ends with his runs like fire sweeps around a celluloid collar. In the Clemson line, other than Wood, the leading stumbling blocks are Curtis Pennington, 200 pounds of alternate captain, and Hubert Miller, 200 pound tackle. In the Clemson-South Carolina game three weeks ago Miller seeped through to block a Gamecock punt, scooped up the leather and ran 40 yards to cross the only touchdown he had ever scored in his grid career. Miller displayed a lively interest in the six point land behind the last double stripe when he arrived there in the care of an Indian guide.

Even the grass-eater, Pinkertons who saw Kentucky's battle with Georgia Tech last week agreed that the Cats were by far the superior team in every department but luck. The Blue's passing offense snapped back with 130 and 223 yards were gained through the air. But the rumor that the Tigers are a set-up and the game will serve as a breather after the Alabama and Tech games is the biggest item of misrepresentation to come out of the South since the report that Jeb Stuart's bugler knew how to blow retreat.

Here's The Dope

The only base for a comparison between the two teams rests on Clemson's 14-13 win over Tulane, Kentucky's 26-6 loss to Alabama, and Alabama's subsequent 3-0 win over Tulane. This, on paper, gives the Tigers at least a three touch-down advantage over the sophomore Cats. But look at this angle, Tulane is a notoriously weak early season team and Clemson was the first opposition on the Green Wave book. No one doubts that Kentucky took Alabama's best and against Tulane last week, Alabama had the ball in scoring territory six times before Vic Bradford's field goal settled the issue. Add to this fact the Cats are right now hotter than a shipment of canned heat and—wait till tomorrow.

The whittling down of Kirwan's squad was continued in the Tech battle and two additional members were added to the crutch reserves: Charley Ismael, fullback, and Pete Vires, guard. Larry Spears and Jim Hardin also reported with the mules in their legs Monday but are expected to be in game shape. The previous week had put Harold Black and Cliff Mason on the bench. If the injury jinx lasts, the Cats won't have enough men left to play one-eyed cat, much less football. Unheralded all year, Bill McCubbin, 185 pound junior end, by his performance against Tech following fine assignments in the Vanderbilt and Alabama games, marked himself as one of the South's finest flankmen. The Engineers found that trying to gain around McCubbin's end Saturday was as futile as running chin-out

Jim Hardin and Randall Phillips, ready for the other end, Clemson will find it better to detour.

The Detour

Then when they pounce into the line, Harry Brown, Walter Reid, Ed Jacobs and John Eldred will be there to guard the tackles and as the guards will be Tom Spickard, by the center region is as safe as Bob Palmer and Emmett Willoughby from attack as the Artie from sunstroke.

By his performance against Tech "Hun" Davis, the team's leading server, served notice that his injuries are healed and may receive the right half nod tomorrow. As long as either Dave Zoeller or Hood Combs are in the game flipping strikes, Clemson's passing attack is dangerous. Joe Shepherd, old faithful, and Wilce Carns will round out the secondary.

Repeated requests have been showered upon my head asking that I refrain from picking Kentucky to win a game since my predictions resemble too much Corrigan doing a toe dance 'in reverse', so I assist from the pick and pray party, but just between we girls, I think we'll win.

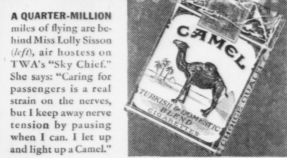
