Professors get props because of social study

Two professors of management at the Gatton College of Business have been receiving much recognition for their research in the field of social networking.

Professors Giuseppe "Joe" Labianca and Daniel J. Brass both have done extensive studies on social network analysis, or, put better into a common phrase, "it's just not what you know, but who you know."

The Academy of Management Review, a leading journal in business management, judged a research paper by Brass and Labianca as the runner-up for best paper of the year in 2006.

"This research paper is a theory piece pointing out that a lot of what happens within a business is based on the negative verses the positive," Labianca said. "A lot of the success of a business is determined by who doesn't like whom."

In order to prove this theory, Labianca and Brass collected a network of all the religious ministers in an anonymous state. They questioned each minister on which of the other ministers they did and didn't like within the network and compared that to the church's attendance.

"We found that the more dislikes a minister had for other ministers within the network, the worse his or her church is doing," Labianca said.

Ministers who have more conflict with other ministers had a smaller church following, Labianca said.

"Avoiding conflict is the easiest path for most people," Labianca said.

The research is significant in the science of networking because it emphasizes differences of communication and the building of relationships.

In addition to the AMR award, Labianca has also received recognition for a project he conducted in the Ukraine with three other scholars.

Cyclists bike Bluegrass

On Saturday, more than 1,000 expected cyclists will travel to Paris — not France, but Kentucky — to begin a scenic bicycle ride to benefit and promote awareness for the American Heart Association.

Sponsored by the UK Linda and Jack Gill Heart Institute, this year's first-ever Tour de Kentucky will be something different than in years past and other events that UK and the AHA have been involved together in, said Jacquie Peterson, marketing specialist for the institute.

The Tour de Kentucky is a 70-mile trek starting in Paris at the Wal-Mart parking lot at 9:30 a.m. Late registration and entry packets are available beginning at 8 a.m. The route continues through Scott County and into Woodford County before returning to Paris. The route will be marked, and turning points will be noted for those who want a shorter ride, Peterson said.

The event will start in Paris to provide a Tour de France theme, Peterson said.

"The idea came about from cyclists (who) work for the Gill Heart Institute, and correlated with the AHA for the event," Peterson said. "It will hopefully start to be an annual event."

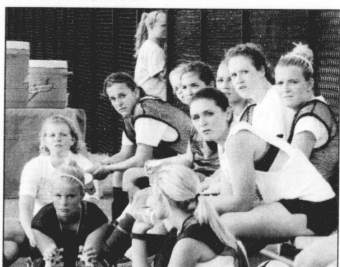

Student Government closes in on new adviser

Student Government is one step closer to filling an adviser position, the first position of its kind in the organization's history.

"The windows to apply have been closed and we have a large pool of applicants," said SG President Nick Phelps.

SG and the office of Student Involvement will begin interviewing the candidates next

week either in person or over the phone, Phelps said.

"We are setting up the interviews now," Phelps said. "Our goal is to have someone for the position as soon as possible without rushing it. I hope by the end of the month."

The new hire will serve as SG's adviser 60 percent of the time and as an assistant to the office of Student Involvement the remaining 40 percent, according to UK Human Resources.

"We want to take enough time to make sure he or she is a fit for both positions," Phelps said.

Stepping away from the adviser search, four representatives from SG, including Phelps and Senate President Tyler Montell, will spend two days in Washington, D.C.

The campus representatives will discuss higher education legislation with members of the Kentucky delegation.

"We're really excited."

Phelps said. "Only two college Student Governments have done something like this before. There is so much to discuss about improvements that can be made."

The group will meet with Sen. Mitch McConnell (R-Ky.) tomorrow morning, Phelps said. The topics may include tuition, classes required by the university, and student benefits.

New UK strength coach looks to rebuild basketball team's power

The UK men's basketball team has gone through a substantial facelift since April as virtually the entire coaching staff has been replaced.

Todd Forcier, hired as the strength and conditioning coach a week ago today, is the most recent addition to the basketball coaching staff.

"We're just excited to have Todd on board," said John Hayden, assistant di-

rector of UK Athletics Media Relations. "His enthusiasm is contagious and you can tell that he's excited to be here. We fully believe he's going to help prepare our guys for the professional level. His resume speaks for itself."

Forcier was an assistant coach with Syracuse for five seasons. He has also worked as the basketball strength coach at Dayton for four years, the University of Nevada Las Vegas a season and three years with the NBA's Seattle Su-

personics. Forcier will do everything he can to excel in the position and he plans to help keep UK's winning tradition, he said.

"If (head coach Billy) Gillispie tells me to stand on my head for four hours a day and that's going to help us win, that's what I'm going to do," Forcier said. "If he tells me to drink old milk and that's going to help us win, that's what I'm going to do."

As the basketball team's strength and condition coach, Forcier will cover

a broad spectrum of duties.

"Anything that pertains to the game physically," he said.

Forcier will oversee the nutrition of the players and be in charge of pre- and post-game meals. He is in charge of making sure the players wake up and go to sleep on time.

Also, Forcier will guide the players' conditioning and weight training. If a player is injured, Forcier will oversee his rehab once that player is cleared by a doctor.

"Basically, I'll do anything that it takes to get the players prepared to play," he said.

The job was open for Forcier because the previous strength and conditioning coach, Scott Holsopple, who served under former head coach Tubby Smith for one year, left UK in May to become the assistant director of strength and conditioning at the University of Florida.

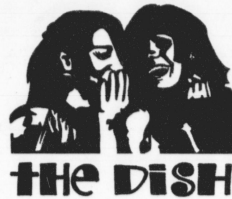

He's no angel: Actress' fling with illusionist ends; the magician was married all along

Any magician can pull a rabbit out of a hat, but Mindfreak star Criss Angel may be the first to shock his fans with a surprise wife. On June 29 in a courtroom in his native Long Island, N.Y., the illusionist's estranged — and heretofore unknown — wife, Joanne Sarantakos, 37, sued him for divorce. She accused Angel (real name: Christopher Sarantakos) of mental cruelty and abandonment over his affair with Cameron Diaz, even threatening to subpoena Diaz for testimony. "We read about Cameron and Criss' relationship in the paper like everyone else," Sarantakos' father, Richard Winkhart, tells Us. "Everybody feels betrayed. (He and Joanne) were married for five years and had dated for 10 years before that. He tried to keep up this image for his act."

But Angel's rep insists to Us that if anyone's guilty of hocus-pocus, it's Sarantakos. The rep claims that she initiated divorce proceedings in May 2006 — an entire year before the magic man, 39, met Diaz, 34. Diaz's rep also dismisses any suggestion that the actress is a home-wrecker, saying, "When Cameron met Criss, he had been separated from his wife for over a year. They went on only four dates over a month ago and have no current relationship."

Michael Lohan) had Angel followed by a private investigator for six months in order to amass evidence in the case. At the court hearing June 29, Barbara announced, "We will subpoena (Diaz) as soon as she comes back to New York." ("If Criss was using marital money to entertain Cameron, then Joanne would have a claim," explains divorce attorney Stacy Phillips. "It could affect division of property and support.") Diaz's rep fires back, "These are meaningless, attention-seeking attempts to unfairly and unnecessarily exploit Cameron's celebrity by trying to involve her in matters she has nothing to do with."

Angel's rep, though not certain whether Diaz was aware of Sarantakos while dating him, insists that her existence had been common knowledge among people working on A&E's "Mindfreak." "It was no secret that he'd been married and was going through the divorce," says the rep, adding, "It's sad they tried to attach Cameron's name to this." As for why Diaz and Angel stopped dating, the rep explains, "Their lives got busy, and it petered out." Indeed, just a day after the hearing, Angel was mixing work with pleasure, performing at Atlantic City's Borgata casino and flirting with female fans at club Mixx.

Perhaps most discomfiting for the notoriously private Diaz is a New York Post report that Sarantakos' lawyer Dominic Barbara (who has represented

love of nearly four years, Justin Timberlake, in December, is on her own again. The actress recently completed a tour of Peru, where she hiked to the ancient Incan city of Machu Picchu. And for the time-being, she at least has work scheduled to distract her from the divorce drama: She'll soon film "What Happens in Vegas," a comedy about a couple who discover they're married after a drunken night in Sin City. Hmm, on second thought... she he said, she said courtroom drama!

NOT A GUARDIAN 'ANGEL'

Sarantakos' lawyer, Dominic Barbara, accused the magician of not giving his wife "a cent" of his earnings. "She lives very modestly," her father tells Us. "She left her position in the garment district in Manhattan to support Criss. She thought they'd have kids, and his priorities changed." Angel's rep denies Barbara's charges, telling Us that Angel has been giving her \$6,000 to \$7,000 a month and unlimited access to his credit cards, not to mention paying for her brother's apartment. "He was continuing to support her completely. He's disappointed and sad about all this." Judge Arthur Diamond suggested an out-of-court settlement; their next hearing is scheduled for Sept. 19.

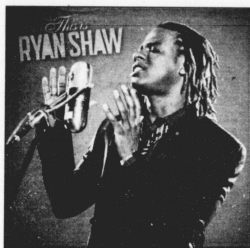

Some of this week's CDs have been out for a while, but each album is featured on iTunes' "The Next Big Thing" list and can be purchased from the site for \$6.99 or less.

Ryan Shaw — "This is Ryan Shaw"

Ryan Shaw should have been born fifty years ago. On his first album, "This is Ryan Shaw," Shaw sings a mixture of covers and originals that all sound like they could have been recorded during the Motown heyday. Actually, nine of the album's 12 songs are covers from that era, including a cover of "Looking for a Love," originally by Bobby Womack. Despite Shaw's convincing covers of these classics, the standout tracks are the originals such as the eminently catchy "We Got Love." If you aren't a fan of classic soul or R&B then this isn't for you.

For fans of Otis Redding, Sam Cooke, Joss Stone



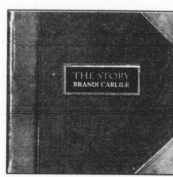
The Kooks — "Inside In/Inside Out"

Joshua James — "The Sun is Always Brighter"

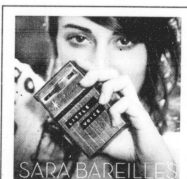

The Boy Who Lived is back with a proverbial vengeance.

In the fifth installment of the renowned "Potter" series, "Harry Potter and the Order of the Phoenix," the boy wonder-wizard juggles school, friendships, angst, and new ways to defend himself and those he loves from the evil Lord Voldemort and his minions. "Dark and difficult times lie ahead," warned Albus Dumbledore, headmaster of the Hogwarts School of Witchcraft and Wizardry, in "Harry Potter and the Goblet of Fire."

And now, in the new film, those ominous words come true.

This doom and tension is realized through the directorial views of David Yates and the works of first-time "Potter" screenwriter Michael Goldenberg.

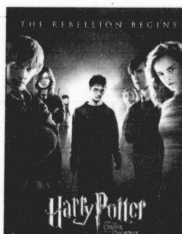
After the fourth film, "Goblet of Fire," we knew Lord Voldemort had returned

to power. Nearly the entire wizarding world is put in danger, especially Harry, Voldemort's arch nemesis and the only person to ever survive the fatal Avada Kedavra Killing Curse.

Meanwhile, the Ministry of Magic denies the return of "He-Who-Must-Not-Be-Named" to avoid mass panic. Daniel Radcliffe delivers a strong performance of an angst-ridden Harry, who digs for answers no one is willing to reveal. Emma Watson and

Rupert Grint shine while defining the relationship of Hermione Granger and Ron Weasley.

Gary Oldman's Sirius Black exudes the warmth of a loving godfather and simultaneously portrays a youthful, rebellious recklessness. All the old characters are back, with the new inclusion of Helena Bonham Carter as Sirius' cousin, Bellatrix Lestrange, pitch-perfect as an imprisoned Voldemort loyalist.

"Phoenix" captures the magical essence of the book, contains the apprehension from beginning to end and will keep viewers' eyes glued to the screen.

Laud Kentucky for its educational aims and awards

Kentucky isn't exactly a bastion of intellect — a quick perusal of the national rankings prove it.

It's a disheartening open secret: many Kentuckians understandably loathe to analyze.

In fact, "Thank goodness for Mississippi," a state routinely ranked low on the educational totem pole, is a familiar jibe and Hall Mary of sorts for Kentucky's own lackluster system.

But we're keeping our metaphysical fingers crossed for the betterment of the state and its commitment to improving education.

With initiatives like UK's own push to reach top-20 status as a public research institution and educators who strive to reinvigorate school curricu-

lums around the state, Kentucky stands, at the very least, a better chance of growing its intellectual commodities.

Two recent awards add more fuel to this hope.

Last month, the Institute for Rural Journalism and Community Issues received national recognition at the first National Rural Assembly in Washington, D.C. Al Smith, chair of the institute's steering committee, was recognized for his efforts to organize the institute at UK.

"With the solid support of the fac-

ulty (School of Journalism and Telecommunications Director) Beth Barnes, (College of Communications and Information Studies) Dean David Johnson

and director Al Cross, this program has moved significantly in the direction of our vision for it to become a major national information source for rural media," Smith told the assembly on June 25.

Smith is right — the program is flourishing, and the recognition it has

received proves this. The institute is part of UK President Lee Todd's plan to overcome what he calls the "Kentucky Uglies," like illiteracy, poor health, low-wage jobs and inadequate housing.

In the coming years, if it continues to expand, the institute will only be a boon for UK, Lexington and the rest of the state.

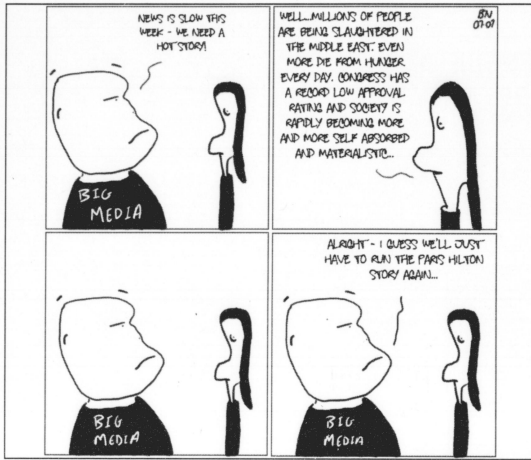
In addition, "Faces of Kentucky," a history textbook targeting elementary school children, received the American Association for State and Local History Award of Merit. The book was published by the University Press of Kentucky, and authors James C. Klotter and Freda Klotter will be honored for their work in September.

These two notable awards are encouraging, not only for UK, Lexington and the surrounding communities, but for the entire state.

And there are other reasons to be proud of Kentucky; the state can claim an impressive plethora of talented, contemporary authors, including Bobbie Ann Mason, Barbara Kingsolver, Gurney Norman and Wendell Berry.

With such accolades and an ever-increasing roster of homegrown talent, it's more than possible for Kentucky to combat the negative education stereotypes that plague the state. To do that, it's imperative that we invest our time, our energy and our support.

While education in Kentucky can be scoffed at thanks to negative stereotypes, the state is making strides to combat its intellectual woes

Don't allow infotainment to taint your worldview

We've forgotten.

But this editorial board has vowed to remind its audience, ourselves included.

A year ago today, the media turned their cameras and notepads to Lebanon while the rest of the world watched and read. On July 12, 2006, nearly 4,000 Hezbollah rockets hit northern Israel, according to Israeli police reports. Israel responded to the attacks with force, and for 34 days, the Israel-Hezbollah conflict raged and a country already ravaged by past wars was decimated again.

But once the cease-fire went into effect Aug. 14 and the conflict formally ended Sept. 8 — once the dead were counted and the wounded catalogued — the media turned to other, more "pressing" items of business. Then Hezbollah, Lebanon and Israel faded into no more than background noise in the collective consciousness of most Americans.

And now, some news outlets are actually covering Lebanon again, reporting on the aftermath of a conflict — or the "July war," as the Lebanese are forthrightly calling it — that left 159 Israelis and 908 Lebanese dead, more than 4,877 wounded from both sides, and displaced an estimated 1.4 million people. BBC News has sent reporter Martin Asser, who covered the conflict last summer, back to Lebanon.

On the BBC News Web site, Asser has described firsthand the fear, the uncertainty

and the sociopolitical unrest that still exist in Lebanon; the same fear, uncertainty and unrest that have underscored the country's psyche since international attention ebbed. Asser and BBC News are reminding us — and while reports like Asser's are long overdue, as the adage goes, it's better late than never.

We applaud the efforts of BBC News and reporters like Asser for taking initiative and reporting on issues that truly matter, from rebuilding efforts and turmoil in Lebanon to stories from Iraq and special reports on the AIDS pandemic.

These stories are prime examples of what journalism can and should be. In an era where Paris Hilton's contested 45-day jail sentence gets more attention than crises on the Gaza Strip, such reports are not only a breath of infotainment-free air, they're inherent to the preservation of true journalism.

So today, on the one-year anniversary of the beginning of the Israel-Hezbollah conflict, we should all take time to absorb the magnitude of last summer's international emergency. Pick up a newspaper, read a magazine, visit Google. Learn and absorb. Remind yourself that the world is more than UK's campus, than Lexington, than Kentucky — more than the United States.

We'll be doing the same.

Aaaaaaand, 'Action!' How Hollywood 'reads'

I don't know if "Harry Potter and the Order of the Phoenix" is a good movie — I haven't seen it.

But I'm pretty certain that it shouldn't be judged as a movie at all. It is a visual representation of a book in which millions of people are already heavily, even

cultively, invested.

When we see it, we are taking part in a ritual that addresses the old, and to me irrelevant, question of whether a film is "faithful" to its source — in this case, the fifth novel in J.K. Rowling's series about a brave and resourceful wizard manqué.

Of course the picture will be faithful; there would be no point in making it otherwise.

There is something paradoxical in the demand for slavish care in the adaptation

of hugely popular novels. By the end of the weekend, more people will have seen the new "Harry Potter" movie than can possibly have read the book on which it is based. They're just out for a rattling good yarn with plenty of special effects, and you probably could put a few variants on the book's plot over on them without eliciting an outcry.

But why bother? It is foolish to risk the cult's wrath — or its return business — by offering a product tainted by some screenwriter's nifty new idea.

It's a very lucky novelist who creates a sacred text, something the movie folks dare not screw around with.

Movies, as they have developed over the past century, are a romantic, melodramatic, fantastical and, above all, narrative-driven medium.

They remain consistently dependent on the most popular and time-tested story-

telling forms — everything from the fairy tale to the mystery story — for their basic materials.

Even when they are creating an original story, the movies remain in thrall to the basic tropes of 19th century fiction for their most reliable effects. In our postmodernist age, they are stubbornly premodernist in their tastes.

They only rarely encounter a fan base as exigent as that of "Harry Potter," holding them to the highest standards of faithful narrative replication.

In the new digital age, this irony abides: A technologically venturesome medium remains wedded to Dickensian storytelling; and, a few cinematic theorists aside, everyone is content with that state of affairs.

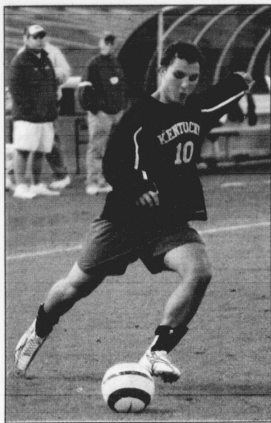

Former midfielder plays in U-20 World Cup

Former UK men's soccer midfielder Michael D'Agostino earned his first minutes in the second biggest international soccer tournament in the world last Saturday, representing his native country of Canada in the FIFA U-20 World Cup, played every two years and hosted this year by Canada.

In the second game the Canadians played against Austria, D'Agostino entered in the 13th minute as a substitute on defense.

D'Agostino is the second UK player to play for the Canadian U-20 national team.

Former UK standout forward Riley O'Neill, who now plays professionally in Germany, also played for the U-20 team.

Both players led UK to second place in Conference USA and an overall No. 13 national ranking last season.

The FIFA U-20 World Cup is trumped in size only by its parent tournament, the FIFA World Cup.

UK-UofL football game will air on ESPN Classic

After six months of waiting, Louisville and UK football fans both found out where they could watch this year's annual state rivalry game.

On Monday it was announced that this season's Louisville-UK football game will be televised nationally by ESPN Classic, an ESPN sports affiliate channel not offered on basic cable. The game will also be shown live in both Lexington, on WKYT, and in Louisville, on WHAS.

The game will be played at Commonwealth Stadium, with kickoff for 7:30 p.m.

This is the sixth-consecutive time the game — nicknamed the "Battle of the Bluegrass" — will be shown on an ESPN channel.

In previous years, the game was the inaugural start of the season for both teams, but was moved back to the third week of the season at UK's request.

UK will now have at least two games that will be played on national television. The UK at South Carolina game will be shown on ESPN Thursday, Oct. 4, at 7:30 p.m.

Track and field team members compete in Pan Am games

Sophomore UK track and field sprinter Jenna Martin earned second place in the Women's 400-meter finals of the Pan American Junior Athletics Championships in Sao Paulo, Brazil on Saturday, Martin, representing her home country of Canada shattered her lifetime personal-record time in the 400-meter dash and became the first female runner in school history to break the 52-second mark in the event. Martin finished with a time of 51.91 seconds, barely behind the winning time of Jamaican Bobby-Gaye Wilkins' 51.72 seconds.

Also in the Pan American Junior Athletics Championships, sopho-

more thrower Emily Bernhardt finished fourth in hammer throwing. Bernhardt is a part of Team USA.

The Pan American Junior Athletics Championships are held every four years, in conjunction with the Pan American Games, which will be held in Brazil later in the month.

Two Kentucky women's golfers, senior Beth Felts and recent graduate Katie Johnson, were named by the National Golf Coaches Association to the 2006-07 All-American Scholar Athlete team.

Felts highlights the returning players to new-coach Myra Blackwelder's team in 2007-08. Johnson is a two-time member of the NGCA Academic All-American team. The Lexington native was also named to the SEC Good Works team.

That paper was selected as the recipient of the 2007 Organization and Management Theory Division of the Academy of Management Best Paper Award.

The research in that paper deals primarily with career progression and how individuals can move through the promotion ladder quicker, Labianca said.

"If you build your network the right way, most people will get ahead at the rate of one major promotion every four years," Labianca said. "The best thing you can do for yourself is to have a diverse network."

Among other things, Labianca and Brass have teamed up for a UK project called LINKS, which is the International Center for the Study of Social Networks in Business.

Brass, the director of this organization, will use the center to help connect students with businesses in their fields of interest and help them build networks while doing so.

Brass hopes the work he and Labianca do will help better the university, he said.

"Our primary goal is to become the link between social network researchers at universities around the world and businesses that might benefit from our research," Brass said. "We want to link the academic world with the business world."
