The report of the Auditing Committee in reference to the Treasurer of the Freshman class was referred to the Discipline Committee.

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The following recommendations of the Rules Committee were approved:

"The Committee on Rules recommends to the Senate for approval the following provisions regarding Physical Examinations, Mental Tests and Personal History Blanks:

✓ First. Regarding Mental Tests and Personal History Blanks

That at 1:40 Wednesday afternoon of registration week all new students and seniors whose records are not filed be directed to report at specific rooms; that they then be given a series of mental tests, fill out personal history blanks, and all new students fill out blanks for the Hygiene Department. The total time to be required is not to exceed two hours

2 Second. Regarding Physical Examinations

1. Assignment of time for physical examinations will be made at the time of registration.

2. If the student does not report at the assigned time, a notice will be sent to him, setting the second time. A duplicate of this notice will be sent to his parents.

3. If the student does not report after this notice, he will be summoned before the Discipline Committee.

4. So far as possible students will be examined after 3:30 p. but in case some cannot come at that time, privilege will be granted of calling the student out of class one hour during the year for examination."

The following recommendations of the College of Arts and Sciences were approved:

- ✓ English 122 - John Ruskin, Man of Letters and Critic. 1 hour a week for one semester. 1 credit.
- ✓ Economics and Sociology 112 - Current Economic Problems. 2 credits
- ✓ History and Political Science 55 - Comparative Government. To be changed from a 2 credit to a 3 credit course.

✓ Dean Boyd submitted Dean Anderson's recommendation that Art 11 required of senior engineers, replace Art 11, heretofore given to freshman engineers.
