Scared: Unless you're a sophophobic and are afraid of learning, read on to discover why snakes frighten people

As long as she can remember, Emily Burnett has been an ophidiophobic.

While the name may sound confusing, Burnett's fear is not so uncommon. Burnett, a nursing junior, is afraid of snakes, and her phobia is one that many people can relate to. of snakes, and her phobia is one unit.

"I don't know why I'm afraid of snakes; I just always have been," she said. "I don't even like watching them on TV."

Burnett said she became terrified of snakes when she was a little girl. Her story began when her family was riding bikes through their neighborhood. It ended when Burnett's father found a snake.

"I screamed and started peddling fast. I beat everyone home, threw my bike on the lawn, ran inside and locked the door," she said.

Burnett is not alone. More than 10 million Americans suffer from phobias, said Thomas A. Widiger, a psychology professor.

Widiger defines a phobia as an irrational fear that the special control of the state of the said. Widiger along the said with it, even if it's with a reasonable amount of dread, it is not a phobia but a ratesonable amount of dread, it is not a phobia but rather just living normal.

"It's unrealistic to think that you can go through life without feeling anxious," he said.

A common theory about phobias is people are genetically predisposed to them, Widiger said. His reasoning—Sperent of human genetic makeup comes from the days when people were hunters and gatherers.

An irrational fear today may not have been irrational at that point in human history. Widiger said.

People when have a fear of heights will feel anxious looking out the window of a tail building because their ancestors were adraid when looking off the edge of a cliff...

"While there were people in the past who didn't have fears, Widiger said, they were the ones doing the more dangerous things and were therefore more likely to die and not be able to pass on their "fearless" genes.

Because of this, the theory states the fearful individuals of years past were more likely to pass down their genes, ensuring today's people suffer from phobias.

As another example, Widiger said there are campers who die every year in the Daniel Boone National Forest. "If they were hardwired to be arriad of the dark, they wouldn't go out there." he said.



But companies should not exploit the flag to make a profit Lately, we've been bombarded with the message that to support our country we must spend money. Many banks now display posters reminding us of our national duty to Patriotism is a tremendously strong sentiment, and it's unfair for businesses to take advantage of its power of patriotic debtors.

If find it difficult to believe that Uncle Sam will love more if I deposit all of my money at the Waterfront instead of in the stock market. But the government only encourages the companies' behavior by reminding us that economic stability depends on our shopping expenditures.

In the past months, the president and top government officials have reminded us that it is our duty to spend mory and keep the economy going. To a certain extent this is valid — the last thing that our economy needs is for people to panic and pull out on all of their investments. A strong economy requires consumer confidence.

The first Bush recession had saddled us with wage stagnation, unchecked corporate greed, an enormous Cold War national debt, a glut of low-wage service jobs and the skyrocketing cost of college and home ownership. 
