Yours of the 13th just to hand
excusing my absence at the meeting
of the Curators 12th proximo. In reply I
would say, it will not be convenient
for me to attend, besides as stated to
you in my letter last Dec^r, I have
been so disgusted for several years past
at the proceedings, I have thought when
attending them I would not return again
- indeed I deem it best, the Curators be
- side in Ky, and all in sympathy with
the brotherhood of Ky, for I fear as long
as other States are represented in the
Board there will likely be alienation
and strife, I would not be understood
harshly, because I am not at present
a resident of Ky, but therefore I am
not in sympathy with them.

On the contrary. I am thoroughly a New
tuckerian, in this matter, and it has been
a source of great grief to me to see
the interest of the institution, for which
I paid in Cash \$2500, and much val-
uable time, - so managed as to destroy
its usefulness. I fear for all time to
come. I had hoped by this time all
of the Curators would have seen the
necessity of a change in the management
of its affairs, a desideratum I have
urged for years. If it is deemed
essential, that I should be present
I may possibly attend, but not un-
less indispensably necessary. I should
be glad you give me some idea of
the programme you so often expect
to carry out.

Dear Bro. Withers.

In 1860 the city Council of
 Leesington proposed to our church in that place to transfer
~~Leesington~~ Pennsylvania University with all that belonged to it
 to our University, if we would remove it from Harrodsburg
 to Leese. Of course the consent of the State legislature was
 necessary to consummate the arrangement. But the legislature
 had always in the past consented to any arrangement that Leese
 desired with reference to the transfer of this institution —
 The Leese Church accepted the proposition. Bro J. H. Smith
 and I were appointed to draft & publish an address to the
 donors setting forth the advantages of the proposed removal
 This was done and extensively circulated — The Leese Church
 also sent me on a tour of weeks to visit the churches and
 obtain the signatures of the donors in consent to the removal.
 I made a string of appointments in Mason, Fleming, Boyle, Garrard
 Lincoln & for that purpose — I got without hesitation almost
 their unanimous consent — The Curators too were largely in
 favor of the removal — At a regular meeting of the Curators

in Nassauburg in June 1880, I laid the matter before that body for its approval - stating that the fifty thousand ^{Mercer} had subscribed would be surrendered - the sixty five thousand dollar endowment that we would get from Pennsylvania, with its grounds, building and Libraries (the medical college with its splendid Museum & mineralogical specimens then being intact) would more than counterbalance the loss of the Mercer Co donation - But as this donation was made with the distinct understanding that Ky Uni. was to be located in that county I felt we were in honor bound to surrender to them their subscription in the event of a removal -

When the matter came up before the Board of Curators Phil Thompson & Jno. Ray Williams (Bowman being in full sympathy) not only opposed but said in substance "If the Curators vote for the removal, we will leave you to the better end before you shall have Ky Uni. at Lees. And if you do succeed, we will go to work and build up our Bacon College and be a rival aspirant for patronage forever" - It was also said that if the present legislature should consent to the removal, Gov. W. Goffin was pledged to veto it" I arose and said "That if a war between Churches & brethren was to be the result of a removal and two colleges to spring up where we needed & could sustain but one I would, with consent withdrawn the proposition. That as fully satisfied as I was of the advantages to be gained by the removal I could not advocate at the cost of the destruction of the peace and harmony of the Churches" - Consent was given and I withdrew the proposition. Brethren Pickett & Worthington were then as now Curators and know the above statements to be true - I do not know that the above history is important. But I think almost any great fact in the history of the effort to locate Ky Uni. at Lexington, is of interest if not of importance, at the present juncture of affairs }

I have made you a written statement in
^{interesting} regard to an important historic circumstance in connection
with the removal of Ky. Uni- from Harrodsburg to Lexington -
J. B. Bowman then opposed it with all the influence he
possessed - though he now claims to have the distinguished honor
of having both suggested and carried out the arrangement - At
least I so understand him - His intention as shown by
his bitter opposition at the time, was to oppose every thing how-
ever advantageous to the cause of Christ, that originated with
any one ~~than~~ ^{but} himself - Indeed rather than divide the honors
of building up the University with another, he would divide the
Church by the Ky River into two factions - build up a rival Col-
lege to the university - go to law with his brethren and indeed
sacrifice the cause of Christ upon the altar of his un-
hallowed ambition, unless he was to be allowed to have
his own way - even if that way then as now was in oppo-
sition to both the wishes and judgment of nearly nine hundred of

his brethren and friends of the University —

In the mean time the war came on
Jones in prison or in the South and out of the way —
Smith (then a true Southern man) had enough to do to keep
out of prison to interfere with Bowmans plans — Gano and
all our preachers in sympathy with the Confederate struggle
had enough to do to take care of themselves & Bowman an
intense Radical in politics had things his own way
Bowen College about the close of the war perhaps was
destroyed by fire — Bowman always believed that Lee was the
place for the Uni — The State Legislature & the Governor was Rad-
cal — He has the offer of the Transylvania Uni. removed —
Receipts — gets credit the University removed & used up to suit him
with a Radical majority in the Board — fills nearly every
chair with a Radical and was carrying things with a
high hand — His aim was to radicalize the University in politics
and to liberalize (in fact) it in religion — He could
not do this against the influence of the Apostolic Jones and
of the Church — For so he knew the Church — sets up one
for himself & is excommunicated — Now he claims to be
a persecuted benefactor of his race — That the desires of his
great loving heart and the outreach of his catholic spirit are
checkmated by the tyranny and bigotry of the Church in Lee
& that Mr. Gano, Lord & Wilkes ^{of the Jones} in total forgetfulness of his sacri-
fices for the Cause of the dear Lord, have been conspiring to
unseat him ~~forth~~ from the Regency — But enough — but hypocrite
out! — This sheet you had as well destroy — the other is
not written for publication — It is not in shape shape being
written currently Column — But as a statement of facts you may
show it to whom you please — Christward. H
