Napster down, almost out

Napster's plug may finally be pulled.

A federal appeals court ruled Monday that the company must stop people from freely sharing copyrighted music until a lawsuit filled by the recording industry has Napster must also stop users from receiving access to content on its search index that could infringe copyrights, according to the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals. Though the ruling hurts Napster, it will remain in business until U.S. District vidil remain in business until U.S. District judge Marilyn Hall Patel rewrites her injunction that requires the site to close.

Patel's injunction must be narrowed because the Court of Appeals found it to be

overly broad.

Many UK students oppose the Court's decision to shut Napster down.

"This is a clear victory," said Hilary

Napster has an estimated 50 million users. Webnoize, a monitor of the digital entertainment economy, estimated that 250 million songs were downloaded over the weekend using Napster. Webnoize also estimated that as many as 1.5 million users were logged on to Napster at any one time.

Major record companies hope the ruling will force people to begin paying for music that they had previously swapped for free.

The second-annual Virtual Career Fair begins next Monday. Students and alumni who register by Thursday can visit the online fair until March 2. There is no registration fee.

So far 121 employers, including school districts and financial and health care companies, have registered for the cyber event.

Here's how it works: During the designated week, registered students and alumni can link to the Virtual Career Fair web site through the Career Center homepage (http://www.uky.edu/CareerCenter).

From there, a student can search for employers alphabetically or by industry.

After finding an employer in whom he or she is interested, the student or alumnus enters

that organization's "Virtual booth."
There, he or she will find a link to the organization's Web site, employment opportunities and contact information.
Students and alumni may

contact organizations according to the instructions on each "Vir-tual Booth" from February 19 to March 2.

"There is a possibility that the bodies are still in the vessel," Coast Guard Capt. Steven A Newell said Sunday, more than 48 hours after leading the search would continue through at least Monday afternoon and that weather conditions had been favorable with good visibility, light winds and water temperatures at 77 degrees.

Bush pledges military pay raises

WASHINGTON — President Bush is reassuring U.S. troops he intends to bolster what he sees as sagging military morale, carrying a promise of pay raises directly to the field. The new commander in chief was touring Fort Stewart near Savannah, Ga., on Monday, where he was to announce he will seek \$1.4 billion to improve pay and living standards, plus \$1 billion for incentives to retain highly skilled service members. Accompanying him to the base was a delegation of top administration officials and lawmakers, including Defense Secretary Donald H. Rumsfeld, national security adviser Condoleezza Rice, five senators and six House members.

Hassan Mussalam, 54, a captain in the National Guard, held his head in his hands as he sat behind the bars of a holding cell when the judge read out the sentence Sunday. Mussalam was arrested by Palestinian authorities last November and accused of working with Israeli intelligence since 1994. He was the latest of several Palestinians sentenced to death for working with the Israeli security services.



Pease named offensive coordinator

Brent Pease, who was named UK's quarterbacks and receivers coach in January, was elevated to offensive coordinator on Monday by new head football coach Guy Morriss.

Pease also will serve as the Cats' quarterbacks coach.

"I'wanted a strong quarterbacks coach and offensive coordinator who is familiar with our system, and Brent is the right choice," Morriss said. "We've been sharing information with Brent the last two or three years when he came to visit us, so he knows our system and he brings some ideas of his own.
"As a former NFL player, Brent has a strong technical background. He'll be good for our young quarterbacks, and he is the guy our quarterbacks wanted."

Pease spent the past two seasons as

Pease spent the past two seasons as assistant head coach/offensive coordinator at Northern Arizona, and spent eight years as an

assistant at Montana.

Pease, who played quarterback at Montana for two seasons and led the nation in total offense in 1966, was drafted by the Minnesota Vikings and played three years (1987-89) for the Houston Oilers of the NFL. He also has playing experience in the Canadian Football League, the World League of American Football League, and the Arena Football League.

"I'm very grateful to Coach Morriss and excited about the challenge ahead of us as an offense and a team," Pease said in a statement.
"The offensive system I've been using is similar to the one here. Our offensive philosophy is not going to change."

Pease will replace Tony Franklin, who parted ways with the team at the end of the Wildcats' disappointing 29 season. Former head coach Hal Mumme, who resigned last week amid allegations of NcAA violations within the football program, said at the time that he would take over the offensive coordinator's duties himself.

Wilkinson hits bankruptcy wall

Former governor Wallace Wilkinson leaves poor reflection on students and Kentuckians alike

One has to wonder what thoughts ran through former Gov. Wallace Wilkinson's head as he filed a petition for bankruptcy last Monday. That's right, the owner of our very own UK Bookstore is hitting the skids of financial ruin. We believe that Wilkinson is

reaping what he has sown.

According to wire reports, Wilkinson took tens of millions of dollars in efforts to buy textbooks that would be resold for large

Wilkinson currently owns 63 college bookstores under the

wirkinson currently owns as conege bookstores under the name Wallace's College Books Co.

Ecampus.com, one of a few online textbook companies, serves as another of Wilkinson's textbook venues. Ecampus, while expected to be an investment success, is supposedly to blame for the bankruptcy petition. Ecampus' no stock sale combined with change and the company of the c ing economic conditions apparently caused the company's failure.

Amazingly enough, Ecampus is not included in the bankruptcy

petition.
Yet, the controversy surrounding Wilkinson does not end at bankruptcy. In recent articles, the Lexington Herald-Leader stated that the textbook company had often been accused of buying stolen

books to be resold. The most recent accusation came in 1995.

Many students have felt the pressures inflicted on the UK Bookstore because of the lack of textbook selection this year, among other issues.

Who knows what will happen when the UK Bookstore and oth-

Who knows what will happen when the UK Bookstore and otherbookstores come under new ownership and management? In a nutshell, we believe that while Wilkinson did not intend for anything of this sort to occur, the result was inevitable. Thus Wilkinson is getting what he deserves. He should have known better than to just let the debt pile up without paying any of it. Some aspects surrounding Wilkinson's dealing appear shady and even seem like a railroading. The Kernel believes that Wilkinson's actions reflect poorly on students and all Kentuckians, given his tenure as governor of this state from 1987 to 1991.

Many years ago. Europeans decided to look elsewhere for happiness and opportunity. They left for different reasons, for different dreams and for different freedoms. As a part of the new society and economics, a new class emerged in European society: slaves. Not since the Roman times had slavery been so vast as on the American continent in the early

American continent in the early years of its existence. Even through the Civil War, slavery was an entrenched institution in United States law. February is Black History Month. I'm not usually one to celebrate or do something special for the "of the month" programs which encompass just about every month of the year (many monthay having several). Yet I have a differhaving several). Yet I have a differhaving several). having several). Yet I have a different perspective on it this year.
Last semester, I took a class on major black writers as a University Studies requirement. While I knew much of the story, understood the arguments, and had a strong anger toward the mistakes of my forebears, I learned many things. I learned a lot from the

readings. I learned even more from my classmates. I talked with them both in and out of class. I asked questions, discussed politics, history, motives in the characters in the texts, ideas and ideals of the black community. I gained a lot more knowledge from them than I can

community. I gained a lot more knowledge from them than I can imagine they gained from me. I learned of my own lack of knowledge in many things with which they have intimate knowledge. I learned of anger which I can never know or understand. I learned of feelings which escape the bounds of my own. I learned more about who and what America is.

I have relatives who would decry Black History Month as special treatment and something which whites cannot have without an uproar. To an extent, they are right. However, I believe Black History Month is needed. We as a nation, do not, and cannot, understand all that the black community (or any other minority) feels and know of my control of or microtities developed through centuries of mistreatment and abuse. Now, I see

Black History Month as a chance to familiarize myself with the struggle of my fellow man.

I am white. I cannot fathom "owning" another man. I cannot fathom being "owned" either. I cannot imagine struggling to have the right to vote, the right to decent schooling, and that community's place in it.
