

Minutes of the Meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky, Tuesday, May 4, 1965, Board Room, Administration Building.

The Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky met in the Board Room of the Administration Building on the campus of the University at 10:00 a. m. , Eastern Standard Time, on Tuesday, May 4, 1965, in regular meeting as provided in KRS 164.170, with the following members present: Dr. Ralph Angelucci, Vice Chairman, Judge James A. Sutherland, Secretary, Dr. Harry Denham, Dr. R. W. Bushart, Mr. Sam Ezelle, Mr. W. F. Foster, Dr. H. B. Murray, Mr. Clifford Smith, Mr. Gilbert Kingsbury, Mr. Robert Hillenmeyer, and Professors Paul Oberst and Lewis Cochran, non-voting faculty members. Governor Edward T. Breathitt, Mr. Wendell P. Butler, Dr. Harry Sparks, Mr. Smith Broadbent, and Mr. Floyd Wright were unable to attend. President John W. Oswald, Vice Presidents A. D. Albright, Robert F. Kerley, William R. Willard, and Robert L. Johnson, and members of the press were in attendance.

A. Oath of Office Administered to Dr. Angelucci

Dr. Ralph Angelucci, reappointed by Governor Breathitt for a term ending December 31, 1968, qualified as a member of the Board of Trustees by taking the Constitutional Oath, which was administered by Judge James A. Sutherland.

B. Meeting Opened

Dr. Ralph Angelucci, Vice Chairman, assumed the chairmanship of the meeting in the absence of Governor Edward T. Breathitt, and asked Judge Sutherland to pronounce the Invocation. Following roll call, the secretary reported a quorum present, and the meeting was declared officially open for the conduct of business at 10:05 a. m.

C. Minutes Approved

On motion by Mr. Hillenmeyer, seconded by Dr. Bushart, and so ordered, the reading of the Minutes of the April 6, 1965, meeting of the Board of Trustees was dispensed with and the Minutes were approved as published.

D. President's Report to the Trustees (PR 1)

President Oswald prefaced his presentation of the report by reminding the Trustees of the commencement activities--the Baccalaureate-Vesper Service

followed by the President's Reception on Sunday, May 9, the Commencement Exercises on May 10, followed by luncheon and the special Medical Center Ceremonies--and urged as many of the members to attend these events as could do so.

Copies of the President's Report to the Trustees (PR1) were available to those present and the Trustees were reminded that copies of the report are also distributed to the faculty and certain key alumni.

Particular attention was called to Item 2, Centennial College History Series, in the report and President Oswald indicated that complete sets of the published histories were in the folders of the members of the Board. Special attention was also given to the Centennial Conferences already held and the ones scheduled for the fall semester.

Without dissent, the chairman accepted the report on behalf of the Board and it was ordered filed.

E. Recommendations of the President (PR 2)

PR 2, Recommendations of the President, is important but routine items of business and the report is prepared for distribution to the Board of Trustees in advance of each meeting. President Oswald indicated that the Board was, therefore, familiar with the recommendations contained in the report but he wished to call particular attention to the following items:

1. The gift from the IBM Corporation of the podium which was first used at the University of Kentucky on February 22, 1965, by President Lyndon Baines Johnson. At that time the podium was on loan but IBM has now presented it to the University with the following inscription on a plaque on the podium: "This lectern was used by President Lyndon B. Johnson for delivering the principal address to the University of Kentucky Centennial Founders Day Convocation on February 22, 1965. Presented by the IBM Corporation."
2. Item VI - Promotions. A total of 45 promotions are recommended--12 from associate professor to professor; 18 from assistant professor to associate professor; and 15 from instructor to assistant professor. In addition, 24 persons are recommended for continuous appointment (tenure).
3. The approval of the 15 persons who are the first to complete the program for the Associate in Science in Nursing Degree, the first such Degree to be awarded by the University of Kentucky.

On motion by Dr. Denham, seconded by Judge Sutherland, and carried, PR 2,

Recommendations of the President, was approved as a whole and ordered made a part of the Minutes of the May 4, 1965, meeting. (See PR 2 at end of the Minutes.)

F. Supplemental Recommendations of the President (PR 3)

Since the items contained in PR 3, Supplemental Recommendations of the President, are received too late for distribution in advance to the Board, the members took a few moments to examine these recommendations.

There being no questions relative to any item contained in the report, on motion by Mr. Hillenmeyer, seconded by Dr. Murray, PR 3, Supplemental Recommendations of the President, was approved as a whole and ordered made a part of the Minutes of the May 4, 1965, meeting. (See PR 3 at end of the Minutes.)

G. Approval of Degree Candidates

The following list of names of persons who are candidates for degrees at the Commencement Exercises on May 10, 1965, was distributed to the members of the Board. It was pointed out that the list included the names of those persons who completed their work in August 1964, December 1964, and those who expect to complete their work in May 1965. It was also explained that since the Commencement Exercises will be held this year immediately following completion of examinations, it was not possible for the Office of the Dean of Admissions and Registrar to certify satisfactory completion of requirements for the latter group prior to the Commencement Exercises and, therefore, candidates will be presented folders containing a certificate stating the following: "In your studies at the University of Kentucky, your name has progressed to the status of candidacy for a degree and, as soon as it has been determined that all degree requirements have been satisfied, your diploma will be mailed."

Inasmuch as the list of candidates had been sent to the Board in advance of the meeting and they were, therefore, familiar with it, Mr. Sam Ezelle made the motion that the President be authorized to confer upon each individual whose name appears on the list presented herewith the degree to which he is entitled upon certification by the Dean of Admissions and Registrar that said individual has satisfactorily completed all requirements for the degree for which he has made application. The motion was seconded by Judge Sutherland and was so ordered.

H. Operating Budget for 1965-66 Approved

President Oswald stated that the Proposed Operating Budget for the Fiscal Year 1965-66 was mailed to the members of the Board of Trustees under date of April 24, 1965, with a cover statement as to educational programs provided through the adoption of the proposed budget. Extra copies were available for those who wished to further examine the document.

Before going over the budget, President Oswald expressed his deep appreciation to Vice President Albright and his staff for the excellent job which they had done in bringing together this budget which represents all sources of income in the University regardless of source and then, in turn, budgets these out to the various activities of the University. For the first time this budget document presents a complete financial picture.

The total estimated income for 1965-66 is \$54,106,436 as compared with \$47,816,705 for 1964-65. The state appropriations for the University for 1965-66 total \$31,205,685, of which \$26,437,908 is the general appropriation

for instruction and research, \$4,114,652 for indigent patient care, and \$653,125 for geological projects. The per cent each part of the income estimate is of the total is as follows: State Appropriations - 57.7%; Student Fees - 8%; Federal Funds - 7.7%; and the balance of 26.6% comes from such other sources as county appropriations, gifts and private grants, sales and services, endowment and trust income, contracts and grants, hospital income, restricted fund income, auxiliary enterprises, and fund balances appropriated.

The proposed budget provides for new faculty positions as follows: Division of Colleges - 58; Medical Center - 18.5; and Community Colleges - 35. These increases barely maintain the present student-faculty ratio, the President emphasized.

A budget is basically the financial expression of the University's educational programs. This document, therefore, embraces several features such as salary increments for faculty based upon merit and aimed to keep the University in as competitive a position as possible, as well as increments for faculty for promotion in rank; continuance of the summer faculty research fellowships and the initiation of faculty fellowships for the improvement of teaching; initiation of a few new instructional programs including planning education and computer science; activation of four interdisciplinary research programs; continued activation of programs in the health service fields; continued activation of the University Hospital; opening of two new community colleges and the extension of the sophomore year in two other community colleges; expansion of terminal technical programs of nursing, forestry, mining, and agriculture in the community college system; and increased support for research and service in agriculture. The budget also includes provisions for other features including merit increments on salaries of classified personnel, establishment of Workman's Compensation, extension of the University's planning program for physical facilities and land-use development, and expansion of professional preparation for vocational education in cooperation with the State Department of Education.

In commenting on the proposed budget, Dr. Albright reiterated that the document presented as complete a picture of the University's current operations as possible. Many programs which have been budgeted separately in the past are now incorporated in the proposed budget for 1965-66. Restricted funds and former restricted funds now reclassified as general funds have been incorporated. Reappropriation of budget savings into another year has been eliminated and in 1965-66 the University will be more current than ever before.

Mr. Ezelle questioned the increase in the budget for county agents which amounted to approximately \$95,000. Dr. Albright explained that there were approximately 400 county agents in the state and they were on a merit basis as other parts of the University are. In answer to a further query relative to the duties of the county agents, Dr. Oswald explained that that was an area which was changing rapidly and that these men no longer confined themselves to working in

the field of agriculture but were now concerned with urban and general development as well.

On behalf of the Board of Trustees, Dr. Angelucci expressed their thanks to Dr. Albright, President Oswald, Mr. Kerley, and their staffs for the splendid job which had been done in preparing the budget and said that it was the first such document that he had seen in which he was able to find the answers to questions and to have a clear picture of the total University financial operation.

The following motion was then made, seconded, and carried unanimously: that the 1965-66 operating budget as submitted be approved and ordered recorded as an integral part of the University's financial system with the necessary fiscal control being exercised for the collection and appropriation of income and the expenditure of departmental appropriations in accordance with authorized fiscal policies and procedures and accepted as a basis of maximum expenditures for the year 1965-66. The inclusion of the name of any person in the personnel roster which will be mailed to the Board in late June which breaks down the personal services portion of the budget is not to be considered a contract of employment and the Board of Trustees or the Executive Committee shall be authorized to make such changes in the budget as may from time to time be deemed necessary.

I. Establishment of Two New Institutes - Institute of Public Administration and Institute of Theoretical and Applied Mechanics (PR 6)

President Oswald reminded the Board that authorization had already been given for the establishment of a Water Resources Institute and a Developmental Change Center, both of which were included in the 1965-66 budget. In addition, the budget contained funds for an Institute of Public Administration and an Institute of Theoretical and Applied Mechanics. He called attention to PR 6 which gave the background material relative to the need for such Institutes and the proposed functions of each.

On motion by Mr. Smith, duly seconded, and carried without dissent, the President was authorized to establish a University-wide Institute of Public Administration and a University-wide Institute of Theoretical and Applied Mechanics, and was further authorized to search for a director for each Institute. (See PR 6 at end of Minutes.)

K. Presentation of Resolutions and Citations to Mrs. Willena Long and Mr. Walter Penix

At the meeting of the Board of Trustees on April 6, 1965, Professors Paul Oberst and Lewis Cochran were appointed to draft resolutions for Mrs. Willena Duncan Long and Mr. Walter Penix. Dr. Angelucci asked Mrs. Long,

who was present, to step forward and read the following Resolution:

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, Mrs. Willena Duncan Long has been a member of the Staff of the University of Kentucky for almost 45 years

WHEREAS, during this period she has served in the Office of the Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences

WHEREAS, her work has at all times been noted for accuracy and careful attention to detail

WHEREAS, her cheerful personality and helpfulness to the faculty and students of the College of Arts and Sciences have made their work here more pleasant

Be it resolved, that the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky in this Centennial Year gratefully recognizes the services of Mrs. Willena Duncan Long as a member of the Staff of the College of Arts and Sciences and expresses its deep appreciation to her for her loyalty and wishes her many long and happy years ahead.

Dr. Angelucci then asked Mr. Walter Penix to come forward and read the following Resolution:

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, Walter Penix has been a member of the Staff of the University of Kentucky for almost 40 years

WHEREAS, during most of that period he has been the houseman at Maxwell Place, serving with four of the six presidents of the University

WHEREAS, his faithful service and loyalty to the presidents and their families gave them great comfort and support in carrying out their official duties

WHEREAS, his genial personality and helpfulness to the thousands of guests entertained yearly at Maxwell Place epitomized the spirit of hospitality of Maxwell Place, of the University and the Commonwealth of Kentucky

Be it resolved, that the Board of Trustees of the University of Kentucky in this Centennial Year gratefully recognizes the services of Walter Penix as a member of the Staff of the University and expresses its deep appreciation to him for his loyalty, and wishes him many long and happy years ahead.

L. Appointment of Dr. Charles F. Haywood as Dean of the College of Commerce

The College of Commerce has been headed since last July by an acting dean, Dr. Robert W. Rudd, who will return to his former faculty post, professor of Agricultural Economics, on July 1. President Oswald lauded Dr. Rudd for his effective performance and leadership during this interim period and added that his service as acting dean has been invaluable to the College of Commerce and the University.

About a year ago a search committee of senior faculty members was appointed whose responsibility was to recommend an individual with the best qualifications for the deanship. The committee, with President Oswald's concurrence, now recommends the appointment of a native Kentuckian who has achieved recognition in both the academic world and the world of business--Dr. Charles F. Haywood. Dr. Haywood was born in Ludlow, Kentucky, received his early education in the public schools of Kentucky, his A. B. degree from Berea College, his M. A. degree from Duke University, and his Ph. D. from the University of California with a major in Economics. In the academic world he has served at Tulane University as an Assistant Professor, and at the University of Mississippi as Professor of Economics and Banking and as Provost. In the business world he has served as an Economic Analyst for the American Bankers Association, Financial Economist for the Bank of America, and as Director of Economic Research for the Bank of America in San Francisco, which position he currently holds. He has published widely and his background and experience fit him admirably for the position of Dean of the College of Commerce at the University of Kentucky.

On motion by Mr. Ezelle, seconded by Judge Sutherland, and without

dissent approval was given for the appointment of Dr. Charles F. Haywood as Dean of the College of Commerce and Professor of Economics (with tenure), effective at a time to be agreed upon between the President and Dr. Haywood but no later than August 1, 1965.

M. Teaching Improvement Report (PR 9)

The next item on the agenda concerned a report on the Improvement of Teaching a copy of which is included as PR 9 at the end of the Minutes. Following the presentation of the report, Dr. Oswald indicated that about 40 applications had been submitted by members of the faculty for the 10 Summer Faculty Fellowships for Teaching Improvement approved by the Board of Trustees at the April 6, 1965 meeting. Dr. Cochran felt that so many good proposals had been received that an additional 10 fellowships could be awarded with great advantage to the University. Inasmuch as several of the Summer Faculty Research Fellowships have been released for various reasons by persons to whom they were awarded, President Oswald requested the Board to authorize 10 additional Summer Faculty Fellowships for Teaching Improvement if funds are available within the overall approved amount for Summer Faculty Research Fellowships.

Dr. Angelucci commented that this was one of the most important reports before the Board in a long time since he felt a great deal of the unrest among college students is due to the lack of good teaching. Dr. Denham agreed and asked whether plans were being made to improve counseling and guidance techniques, areas about which he had heard many complaints from students. Dr. Oswald indicated that the University realized the problem in this area and the overall academic plan would address itself to this matter.

On motion by Dr. Denham, seconded by Dr. Bushart, and approved, the Board authorized 10 additional Summer Faculty Fellowships for Teaching Improvement (making a total of 20 for the summer of 1965) provided funds were available from money already appropriated for the Summer Faculty Research Fellowships.

N. Report on Admission Policies and Practices - College of Medicine (PR 10)

In order that the members of the Board of Trustees might have a clear understanding of the admission policies and practices of the College of Medicine, Dr. Roy Jarecky, Associate Dean for Admissions and Student Personnel of the College of Medicine, presented an interesting and timely report of the many factors involved in selecting from a large number of applications the limited number of students for admission to the College of Medicine. The Selection Committee makes a careful evaluation of each applicant in terms of his own performance as well as in comparison with others and attempts to select those students who give

indication that they can succeed. A copy of Dr. Jarecky's report, PR 10, is appended to the Minutes.

The members of the Board asked Dr. Jarecky and Dr. Willard and Dr. Wayne, who were present, a few questions and expressed their thanks for the informative report.

O. Appointment of Special Committee on Insurance

The University must reach a decision soon relative to the Group Life Insurance Program and Workmen's Compensation Insurance Program and, therefore, the Board felt it desirable to name a special committee to study the insurance programs of the University. Dr. Angelucci named the following members to serve on this committee:

Professor Paul Oberst, Chairman
 Judge James A. Sutherland
 Mr. Gilbert W. Kingsbury

P. Selection of External Auditor for 1964-65 Fiscal Year (CR 14)

Mr. Clifford Smith, Chairman of the Finance Committee, presented this item on the agenda indicating that it was the recommendation of the Finance Committee that the firm of Haskins & Sells, which made the audit for 1963-64, be engaged to perform an examination of the accounts of the University of Kentucky Fund Groups, the Kentucky Research Foundation, the Fund for the Advancement of Education and Research in the University of Kentucky Medical Center, the Athletics Association, and the Thomas Poe Cooper Agricultural Foundation, Inc. for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1965 and render reports for a fee, including expenses, of not more than \$20,000.

On motion by Mr. Smith, seconded by Judge Sutherland, the recommendation of the Finance Committee as stated above was approved unanimously. (See CR 14 at end of Minutes.)

Q. Recess Called

Dr. Angelucci indicated that the next item on the agenda would be presented in Room 245 of the Student Center and, having first determined that there was no further business to be taken up at this time, called for a motion to recess.

On motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Board of Trustees recessed at 11:45 a. m. to reassemble again at 12:00 noon in Room 245 of the Student Center.

R. Presentation of Long-Range Plan for Central Campus

At approximately 12:10 p.m., Dr. Angelucci reconvened the meeting in Room 245 of the Student Center. President Oswald presented Mr. Gorwic of Crane and Gorwic, who explained the completed plan for the three-dimensional development of the "Central Campus". The major portion of this plan had been presented to the Trustees at the January 15 meeting, been approved in principle at that time, and Crane and Gorwic authorized to proceed with the final phase of the plan. Therefore, the main discussion was centered around the area east of Rose Street, west of the new University Drive, south of Euclid, and north of Huguelet Drive.

After discussing the plans for this area which would include two groups of residence centers and a student activities center, Mr. Gorwic explained that the plans would be implemented over a long period of time as buildings occupied by present groups needed to be replaced. President Oswald suggested that area north of Columbia in which many present student related buildings were located should be restudied by Crane and Gorwic and the Board was in general agreement.

The location of future housing units as recommended by Crane and Gorwic was then discussed and it was pointed out that it would be necessary to locate three residence halls and a dining facility within the very near future in order to provide housing for an additional 2,000 to 2,500 single students.

After some general discussion of the plan as presented, Mr. Smith made the following motion: that the President be authorized (1) to designate sites for three residence halls and a dining facility to be located in the area bounded by Huguelet Drive, Boone Alley, Clifton Avenue, and the proposed University Drive in order to accommodate 2,000 to 2,500 single students; (2) that formal action on the overall plan be deferred until there is more time to review it; and (3) that Crane and Gorwic be directed to restudy the plan for the area east of Rose Street and north of Columbia Avenue. The motion was duly seconded and carried without dissent.

S. Adjournment

President Oswald reminded the members of the Board of Trustees that luncheon would be served immediately following adjournment in the President's Room of the Student Center and that Mr. Ray Harm, artist-in-residence, would be a guest of the Board and would give them a special showing of his paintings, which were on exhibit in the Student Center, following the luncheon.



SUPPLEMENTARY RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE PRESIDENT

ESTABLISHMENT OF INSTITUTE OF PUBLIC ADMINISTRATION

Recommendation: that the President (1) be authorized to establish a University-wide Institute of Public Administration, and (2) be authorized to search for a Director of the Institute.

Background: The present public administration service functions in the University are many and varied, performed by numerous departments. The volume of requests for such service has reached such a point that it can no longer be accommodated by the existing operation. Needs have also arisen for interdisciplinary cooperation between departments. In order to maximize the resources of the University of Kentucky in this area and to provide more complete service and research results to public officials and agencies (state, county, and municipal), a new University-wide Institute of Public Administration has been planned. The establishment of such an Institute has been recommended by a special committee of the faculty. The Institute embodies research and service programs in public administration through which the needs described above can be met. Under the leadership of a director, the Institute will involve faculty and other professional specialists within the University from related disciplines and activities (political science, economics, law, agriculture, health fields, etc.). The institute will enable the University to obtain extramural funds for pure and applied research on government and public administration; for training programs, maintenance of a library, conferences, consultations, and the dissemination of knowledge by publishing reports of general and special interest.

ESTABLISHMENT OF AN INSTITUTE OF THEORETICAL AND
AND APPLIED MECHANICS

Recommendation: that the President (1) be authorized to establish a University-wide Institute of Theoretical and Applied Mechanics, and (2) be authorized to search for a Director of the Institute.

Background: Modern scientific progress is characterized by the increasing overlap between the physical, mathematical, and engineering sciences. Inter-relationships between these disciplines have yielded hybrid fields such as physical metallurgy, engineering mechanics, materials science, etc., creating the need at the University-wide level for interaction between several departments and colleges. Such interaction should now be acknowledged and formalized by the establishment of the Institute of Theoretical and Applied Mechanics.

Such an Institute will (1) bring together distinguished scholars in engineering mechanics, mathematics, and related disciplines, (2) develop a stronger inter-action

between Engineering, Mathematics, Physics, and Chemistry through research programs involving joint efforts in research, graduate training, and publication, (3) attract extramural financial support of these activities, (4) sponsor seminars in inter-disciplinary areas, and (5) invite visiting scientists for short time periods. The Institute director will serve to coordinate these activities under his supervision, and to function effectively with the academic components involved.

THE IMPROVEMENT OF TEACHING

Every significant university in America now is experiencing a two-fold expansion: rapid growth in enrollment and swift enlargement of knowledge itself. This expansion has become a challenging invitation to the nation's universities to make certain that the quality of teaching not be adversely affected by such awesome growth. In the case of the University of Kentucky, much of our strength in the past has rested upon a strong undergraduate teaching program. This has resulted in thousands of its alumni succeeding in the professions, in business, and in the finest graduate schools of America and abroad. At this point in its history the University of Kentucky is in a position that it may yet take timely steps to preserve and strengthen this excellence in teaching before the University's size and complexity becomes such as to make these steps less effective.

In this context, the University must immediately examine its instructional effort recognizing that an enlarged undergraduate and graduate student body will necessitate some change. While the University must cherish its tradition of close association between students and professors, these professors must share some of their burdens with younger faculty and with outstanding graduate teaching fellows. In so doing, these young faculty must be encouraged to treasure the University's tradition of providing excellent instruction at all levels.

The academic analysis presented to the Board last June and studied by the faculty during the past year bluntly admonished that the University's future offers many perils to good teaching. It said that these difficulties "must be confronted at once if a vigorous intellectual climate is to surround all the University students". Already the University has moved to insure that the quality of teaching shall be maintained and even improved.

Under the mandate of the Academic Analysis, three faculty committees have studied and reported on aspects of the challenge to strengthen teaching. These committees were concerned with improving the academic environment of the faculty; with new teachers, experimental teaching, and teaching techniques; and with student academic environment. A fourth committee of faculty and students continues to consider means of evaluating teaching at the University. The reports of these and other faculty committees at work during these past months are to be incorporated into an Academic Plan for the University drawn by the Office of the Provost. This Plan will be presented to the University Senate early in the autumn of 1965. Funds have been requested from the Ford Foundation to study a further aspect, the relation of campus physical planning to our academic requirements.

The reports of faculty committees indicate now how the University ought to move toward an invigorated teaching program, one capable of accommodating the two-fold expansion already beginning at the University of Kentucky.

Plans for Immediate Implementation

1. Already the Board has approved ten grants for summer fellowships for the improvement of teaching. These and an enlarged program in the future are to give faculty members extended periods of time to redesign and strengthen courses, especially at the undergraduate level.
2. Each department shall construct an orientation program for graduate teaching fellows and report its plans for approval by respective Deans and the Provost. Departments that already have such programs shall be asked to strengthen present procedures. All departments that employ graduate students shall have orientation programs in September 1965.
3. New faculty members other than graduate students are to be encouraged to take part in orientation programs. Such faculty will learn a great deal about the operation and aims of the University through this participation.
4. For use in these orientation programs and more broadly, the University shall draw up guidelines for this improvement. This will necessitate examining present principles and seeking additional means of enhancing teaching. For instance, ways must be found to insure that lower-division students receive instruction from the most able professors in the University.
5. The University shall encourage wider recognition for excellence in teaching; for instance, the establishment of additional outstanding teaching awards to that presently offered by the Alumni, with the recipients receiving annual public tribute at commencement. It is also necessary that the University find more accurate criteria for denoting superior attainment in teaching since it is crucial that such achievement have a vital role in all determination of merit.
6. The current study of means for evaluating teaching being made by a faculty-student committee has progressed sufficiently that the University plans during the Fall Semester to offer for each faculty member's consideration a method of self-evaluation.
7. The endeavors described above shall be led by the Office of the Provost where general direction of instructional affairs must reside.

Further Plans for Subsequent Implementation

1. Recognize that in all future physical planning that the broad process of learning at the University certainly transcends the classroom. It should involve the entire campus experience.
2. Arrange residence hall programs and policies so that they too contribute to the academic objectives of the University.

3. Improve such student programs as orientation, advising, and lecture and cultural series. Especially should the latter at the Lexington campus be shared with the Community Colleges.
4. Consider with the faculty the establishment of a special officer for Institutional Affairs to work under the Provost to coordinate all efforts designed to improve teaching and the overall intellectual climate of the University.

ADMISSION POLICIES AND PRACTICES - COLLEGE OF MEDICINE

Admission to a college of medicine is a procedure which, at times, is only partially understood by applicants, their parents and friends. The purpose of this report is to provide information which describes the current admissions situation, both as to national and local levels. It is hoped that the data herein presented will clarify those admissions problems which it appears will be with us for some time to come. Although a report such as this cannot cover its subject in detail, it is hoped that enough can be said to establish clearly the major dimensions.

A five year decline in the number of applicants to American medical schools was reversed in 1962. Since then a renewed interest in medicine as a career has resulted in the following increase in applications.*

With an enlarging applicant pool, the academic performance of those undergraduates accepted to medical schools has shifted somewhat to the A and B grade levels. Thus, the percentage of C level students admitted to medical schools has decreased from 17.4 in 1961 to 11.6 in 1963. The proportion of B level students has increased while that of A students has remained at approximately 12 percent of the total.

Besides demonstrating good academic ability, successful applicants are those who score well on the Medical College Admission Test, an examination required of all medical school candidates. This test is "designed to measure general academic ability, general information and scientific knowledge".** Its scores are utilized along with an applicant's academic record and premedical committee evaluation in assessing his potential ability to deal with the demands of a medical curriculum. In general, the higher the scores the less the probability of academic failure. Scores on the various subtests may range from 200 to 795 with strong scores being those well over the 500

level. Average scores of students admitted to medical schools for the past few years have been as follows:

The results of careful selection can be viewed in terms of the small number of students who are permanently dropped from medical school rolls. In 1962-63, 889 students or three per cent were not advanced with their classes. However, of this group 541 students were permitted to repeat unsatisfactory work. Thus, the true attrition was 350 persons or less than two per cent of the total of 31,491 students enrolled in 1962-63. Over a four year period the national attrition rate would be about eight per cent.

The College of Medicine of the University of Kentucky has attempted to develop an admissions program which enables each applicant to receive careful evaluation in terms of his own performance as well as in comparison with others. In general, to achieve favorable action by the Admissions Committee a candidate must have demonstrated that he is broadly educated as well as intellectually able, that he can present information accurately and effectively, that he has thought carefully about medicine and the responsibilities devolving on those who achieve an M. D. degree, and that he has a realistic understanding of himself and the quality of his relationships with others.

Each year since 1960 when the first medical class was admitted, the number of applicants to this College of Medicine has greatly exceeded the seventy-five places available in the first year class. In 1963, for example, 249 residents of the Commonwealth submitted applications to medical schools. Of this number, 138 (55%) were eventually enrolled somewhere. One-hundred eleven (45%) were not. Of the 138 enrolled, 39% entered the University of Kentucky; 36%, the University of Louisville; and 25%, sixteen other medical schools. Thus, better than half of the total number of applicants were viewed as sufficiently well prepared by some medical school to warrant their admission. Along with applications from residents, the University of Kentucky College of Medicine also received hundreds of applications from non-residents for the few places available to them. Thus, the competition for admission was and is exceptionally keen.

The medical class entering the University of Kentucky in September 1963 achieved the following scores on the Medical College Admission Test: Verbal, 520; Quantitative, 534; General Information, 545; and Science, 531. As previously noted, the scoring range on this test is from 200 to 795. The scores achieved by our students compare well with those of students enrolled in medical schools in the south central area of the United States but are not as strong as the average scores for all accepted applicants. (See Medical College Admission Test Table on page 2.)

With respect to overall grade point average our successful applicants average slightly less than a 3.00 out of a possible 4.00. However, it is important to note that a grade

point average is analyzed carefully with respect to courses taken, consistency of performance, colleges attended and the like. The percentages of "A", "B", and "C" students admitted here are quite similar to the national figures as presented earlier.

The Admissions Committee's task is one requiring considerable time and effort. It must select from among many applicants those best prepared to cope with a medical curriculum. Of the total number of applicants submitting full credentials to the College of Medicine, some three hundred are invited to the Medical Center for personal interviews. Each applicant talks with three members of the Admissions Committee. This procedure affords a candidate the opportunity to present his background in detail and in turn, to be personally assessed by his interviewers. Complete reports are then filed with the Committee. After detailed consideration of the total application and supplemental information, including academic performance, performance in the Medical College Admission Test, interview reports by members of the Admissions Committee and letters of recommendation, especially those from the applicant's teachers in the physical and biological sciences, the final decision relative to admission is made.

During the entire process, the focus of evaluation is the individual's overall record as appraised in its own terms and in comparison with those of other applicants. Each potential entrant must stand on his own merits with respect to his adjudged aptitude for medicine. The Committee feels a strong responsibility to Kentuckians as well as to medicine itself to select only those applicants whose intellectual ability and level of maturity meet the high standards that the profession demands.

SELECTION OF EXTERNAL AUDITOR FOR 1964-65

Recommendation: that the Board of Trustees engage the firm of Haskins and Sells, Certified Public Accountants, to perform an examination of the accounts of the University of Kentucky fund groups, the Kentucky Research Foundation, the Fund for the Advancement of Education and Research in the University of Kentucky Medical Center, the Athletics Association, and the Thomas Poe Cooper Agricultural Foundation, Inc., for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1965 and render reports for a fee, including expenses, of not more than \$20,000.

Background: The firm of Haskins & Sells has performed the examination of the accounts of the University of Kentucky and affiliated corporations for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1964. The administration has advised the Finance Committee of its satisfaction with the audit performed for 1963-64. The experience of the members of the firm in the examination of accounts of colleges and universities is such as to enable them to render an audit report which is significant to the administrative officers responsible for the business and fiscal affairs of the University.
