

Escapees captured after three-day search

SPRING CREEK, N.C. — Two Arkansas jail escapees charged with killing a state trooper were captured yesterday by authorities who had used bloodhounds and helicopters to search wooded mountains for three days.

"We (had) two suspects in custody shortly before 4 p.m. . . in the Charlotte's Branch area," said state Highway Patrol Sgr. George Dowdle.

The area is a hollow with a creek in it behind a ridge that runs parallel to N.C. 209, the general area that had been searched since the trooper was shot Saturday.
"We woke 'em up this morning" about 8 a.m., Trooper R.E. Gant said. "They left everything. . . . We saw 'em going down the other side of the mountain. We've been on 'em all day."


