My Dearest Wm.



tonight. She is writing


to one of her girl chums.

I always feel very much disappointed when I look for a letter from you and look in vain.

This has been a very pleasant day for me. Flossie came down this forenoon and then this afternoon we went to Benton to see the ruins the shirt factory burnt down last night between ten and eleven o'clock. I feel so sorry for it throws so many girls out of employment. I saw Joe Young ask about you Ha! Do you believe it? Charlie McHenry and Miss Feeler were married yesterday. In regard to Ernest getting married I do not know I have not seen his wife or heard any one say.

Well dear I rather think I will go to Berwick soon Dr Hills wants me to come there, I dont want to go before the 2nd of May. But I am afraid I will have to go before, there is only four in family

how sad I felt when  
my grandma died I

this forenoon I got over a-  
bout three or four times a week.  
I have been here two weeks

and one day it seems  
to me like about two  
months. I am very tired  
tonight & help move Mr  
Doe brother this afternoon  
I think moving is very

now? I had a letter from  
home yesterday and said  
<sup>they had</sup> been pretty near all sick  
they said the men had  
been doing the work  
they can not get any  
girl because they are  
afraid of the small pox

We have quite a reunion here to-night all of Papa's

brothers and sisters are here  
except Aunt Sallie Keler. I forget  
whether I told you or not that,  
Harold's father Uncle Byron  
came east when dear grand-  
ma was buried. There are five  
boys of them and two girls.

Do you drive that fine team?

I imagine how proud you  
look holding the ribbons.

I hope the roads soon get good  
so you can come home for I  
am very anxious to see you.  
It seems so long since I last  
saw my Billie dear.

We heard Mrs Shultz had the  
smallpox then the word came  
that it <sup>was</sup> only French measles I

you.

arm is paining me terrible I  
am resting it on a pillow  
O dear don't get vaccinated.
