



Old Anderson goes down to make way for new facility

The sound of wrecking balls striking brick rang through the air last Wednesday and over seventy years of memories were brought down as the Anderson building fell.

The Anderson building, built in the 1920s, is in the process of being demolished and removed to make way for a new facility, which officials say will be better equipped to handle the demands of the future.

"We are all looking into the future," said Andy Seybert, a mechanical engineering professor. "In order to maintain the high quality of education within our department we need to have better laboratories and teaching

facilities."

Meanwhile, the undergraduate mechanical engineering labs have been moved to lab facilities in the civil engineering building, and the machine shop is being temporarily housed in the mining and minerals building.

"Things are going to be tight for the next two or three years until the new facility is completed, but it will be worth it in the long run," Seybert said.

The plans for the proposal for the new facility were approved by the state legislature this spring. The building is projected to cost \$23.6 million, with \$4 million in private donations, and the balance in state bonds.

"It would have ended up costing more to remodel the build-

ing to the extent that we needed it remodeled, than it would be to build a new one," said Tom Moore, the business officer in the college of engineering.

Although the building hasn't been designed yet, UK decided to go ahead and get the demolition done while there weren't many students on campus.

"We wanted to get everything cleared away before students came back for the fall semester so there wouldn't be big trucks lumbering through campus," said Tom Lester, dean of the college of engineering.

Lester said the new building will include computer and study labs and a small auditorium, which are features the old building lacked.

But it may be a few years before students will be able to take advantage of the new facility. Construction of the new building may not start until the fall of 1999.

Greeks kicked off campus for hazing

Investigation of hazing practices leads to suspension

Charges of physical and mental abuse of prospective members of the Delta Sigma Theta sorority have led to its temporary suspension from the UK campus.

A phone call to Dean of Sororities Susan West from a Delta Sigma Theta alumna triggered suspicions among Greek Affairs officials and a two month investigation ensued. West, and Dean of Students David Stockham conducted interviews with chapter officials, pledges, and members involved in the alleged activities.

The information we received from our interviews led us to

believe that formal actions should be taken," West said. "Hazing is not supported by Delta Sigma Theta's national chapter and we are working with the national group in Washington, D.C. on this specific case."

West also confirms that the Greek Affairs Office has no suspicions that any other organizations are currently hazing pledges. West has indicated that other violations of Greek policy and regulations regarding prospective members may also have occurred, including that of fraternization with pledges prior to the established initiation dates. No comments were made about the current investi-

Kerley takes Chapman's place as LCC president

On Tuesday, June 9, the new president was named for Lexington Community College.

Dr. James Kerley, who is currently the president of Hopkingsville Community College, will take the helm starting July 1.

After former LCC president Janice Friedel left last summer to take a position in Iowa, Dr. James Chapman temporarily assumed the position.

The search to permanently fill the slot began this past January when the vacancy was advertised

in publications such as The Chronicle on Higher Education, The Community College Journal and the Lexington Herald-Leader. The advertisements yielded 100 applications from across the nation.

UK President Dr. Charles Wethington appointed a six-person Presidential Search Committee, composed of various personnel affiliated with the community college.

Committee members polled LCC faculty, staff and students to find out what characteristics they would like their new president to have.

In May the committee completed its work by forwarding three names to Wethington for consideration. The candidates

Cats to stay at Rupp

New lease pleases both UK and city officials

A new lease that will keep the UK men's basketball team playing at Rupp Arena through the start of the next millennium has been approved by the Lexington Center Council and UK officials.

The lease includes a six-year commitment by the university to hold basketball games at Rupp and provides an option by which UK could purchase the arena after July 1, 2000. Such a purchase would require approval from state, local, Lexington Center, and UK officials.

Lexington Center Council Chairman Cecil Dunn said keeping the Wildcats in Rupp was the council's top priority in the recent negotiations.

"We felt we needed to keep UK playing downtown for two reasons," he said. "The first was that the city and community needed them to play there because of the jobs and revenue that the Wildcats create. The second was that Lexington is not, in our opinion, large enough to support two facilities the size of Rupp Arena."

UK officials were also eager to keep the team in Rupp, provided they could achieve what they felt was a more equitable

lease agreement, said Kathy DeBoer from the UK Athletics Department.

"Rupp has been a very good site for us," DeBoer said. "We felt that if we could get more favorable terms for our lease, along with the possibility of purchasing the arena in the future, it would be a win-win situation, both for us and for the Rupp Arena people."

DeBoer would not speculate on the likelihood of UK exercising its option to buy Rupp; however, she said it is a possibility.

Both Dunn and DeBoer said the negotiation process went very smoothly. Both said they were confident that the new agreement will have a positive effect on the University and the city.

Susan Straub, a spokesperson for the mayor's office, said the lease will have no impact on other Rupp Arena events such as hockey, the Sweet 16 or concerts.

The lease also saves the university approximately \$485,000 per year in rent reduction and revenue from signage.

The lease was approved on May 21 by the Lexington Center Council, and became official on June 4, when it was signed by UK President Charles Wethington.

"We're confident that the new agreement will be a major plus to

both the University and to the city of Lexington," Dunn said.

UK students were pleased by the news.

"It's good that they'll be playing in Rupp for a while," said journalism senior Kevin Hall. "It's also good that they've got one less controversy to worry about and they can just play the game."

recommended were Dr. Greg Braxton-Brown, a visiting professor at Wright State University; Dr. James Kerley, president of Hopkinsville Community College; and Dr. Alvin Marrow, dean of instruction and chief academic

officer at Catonsville Community College in Maryland.

Choosing from these three, Wethington recommended his choice of candidate Kerley to the Board of Trustees for its approval. "The search went smoothly," said Saunier, an LCC mathematics professor and chairperson of the search committee.

Kerley, 48, has served the UK Community College System since 1986 and has been the Hopkinsville Community College president for the past nine years.

"He understands how community colleges operate and how to work in the community. We are very fortunate to have him aboard," Saunier said.

Kerley said that he is looking forward to working to bringing the community college and the Lexington main campus closer together.

"Lexington Community College is in an era of transition, and I have been very impressed with (Wethington's) commitment to making it a top-notch community college," Kerley said.

gation due to the pending appeal by the sorority granted by the university student code of con-

duct. Chyrita Banks, president of Delta Sigma Theta was unavailable for comment.

The charges brought against the sorority are the result of a zero tolerance hazing policy that David Stockham plans to enforce. "At UK hazing is not an acceptable practice. Students should not have to submit to dehumanizing and degrading behavior in order to join an organization."

Stockham explained UK officials simply want to react responsibly and adhere to the standards of conduct that the university prescribes.

"Once the suspension is over they will return to campus in good standing," Stockham said. Should the sorority's appeal be declined, Delta Sigma Theta will be reinstated for the 2001 fall semester.

"She always had a ball with her.

My neighbor used to say, 'When she becomes famous I can always say I knew her when she was 2 years old.'

When she was five years old she was playing organized basketball in the "Pee-Wee" league at the YMCA in her hometown of Huntington, W.Va., where she has been practicing daily for the past few weeks.

It was at the YMCA that Meadows received training from the hometown boys.

"I try to play with guys more because men are stronger and quicker. That helps me improve my game a lot," said Meadows, also a member of the All-Southeastern Conference freshmen team.

At the YMCA Meadows also got a lot of training from the hometown girls.

She played and practiced with her high school teammates, two of which moved on to play at West Virginia and Howard. They were seniors when she was a freshman and, "the experience really paid off," according to her mother.

Meadows' neighbor was not the first person to make predictions about her. She came into UK highly regarded as a second team member of the USA Today All-USA Basketball Team.

After scoring 18 points in her first game for UK, Head Coach Bernadette Mattox predicted that she would break records at UK. She further expressed uncertainty about whether Meadows would complete four years instead of going to the pros.



'Truman Show' asks the rare question of 'How will it end?'

The odds of Jim Carrey's name being mentioned in the same sentence with the word "Oscar" were pretty slim until the recent opening of his latest film, *The Truman Show*, last Friday.

Carrey stars in the film as Truman Burbank, a baby who is purchased by a corporation and unknowingly placed in front of cameras from the moment he was born. His life is broadcast to millions of viewers, worldwide, unbeknownst to him.

Since Truman is unaware of the 5,000 cameras strategically planted in a community about the size of UK's campus, all of his actions, thoughts and feelings are natural, which leaves the audience wanting to watch every second of his life.

Like every great movie, there must be a good supporting actor/actress. Ed Harris does just that as he plays Christof, the egotistical, somewhat demented creator of the show/life. In order for his plan to succeed, Christof creates not just a set, but a Biodome-like structure which encompasses an entire town called Sea Haven.

The movie opens on day number 10,000 and something of Burbank's life. He is married and works as a sales representative.

Everyone Burbank has ever known is an actor hired to play a specific part. Even his life-long best friend is an actor, sometimes reading lines that have been given to him just moments before his line is delivered.

We learn that Burbank is afraid of water because of a boating accident that took his father's life. Christof created that episode to make it easier to contain Burbank in the fake community because Sea Haven is on the coast.

Burbank becomes suspicious of his life when he bumps into a homeless person and recognizes him as the same actor who played his father years before.

One would think that a mogul rich enough to build an entire city could avoid recasting a person Burbank would easily recognize, but hey, that's trivial.

After several more questionable events and confusing situations, Truman decides to leave town.

The network producing the show can't allow that to happen and thus begins a comical sequence of events, (a genre quite familiar to Carrey,) as he tries to leave by plane (pay attention to the poster on the wall as he sits down in the travel agent's office), by bus and by car.

From this point on, it's Burbank vs. Christof.

The advertising on the show is another source of humor as ads pop up at the weirdest times and places. Perhaps the funniest of these is the plug Burbank's wife gives to a brand of coffee.

What makes this movie so enjoyable is the artistic illustration of the strange fascination we seem to have with other people's lives. So much that we can forget about

our own.

Unlike the summer's other disaster flicks, *Deep Impact*, *Godzilla* and *Armageddon*, this movie is original and lacks a specific formula; *The Truman Show*'s slogan is "How Will it End?"

And while it's difficult to call *Godzilla's* \$55.7 million opening weekend a letdown, the big lizard didn't even come close to stomping *The Lost World's* opening weekend record.

The remainder of June rests on the shoulders of FBI Agents Mulder and Scully. The big-screen adaptation of Fox's hit TV drama "The X-Files" is looking to cash in on the 20 million viewers that tune in every Sunday night.

Also in June is *Doctor Dolittle*, a remake of the 1967 film about talking animals starring Eddie Murphy. Rounding out the month is the Harrison Ford romantic comedy *Six Days, Seven Nights*, the George Clooney crime story *Out of Sight*, Norm Macdonald's *Dirty Work* and Disney's Chinese legend *Mulan*. Finally, look for *Can't Hardly Wait*, with its Tiger Beat-cast, to be one of the surprise hits of the summer.

As the summer heats up, so does the competition for the consumer dollar. July brings us the latest in the line of doozy disaster flicks. In *Armageddon*, the panic is about an asteroid the size of Texas hurtling toward the earth. A star-studded cast that includes Bruce Willis, Liv Tyler, and Ben Affleck should help *Armageddon* make a sizable crater in the summer business.

July's other can't-miss comes from the super-duo of Steven Spielberg and Tom Hanks. *Saving Private Ryan*, a World War II drama, also employs Matt

Damon as the title character.

Elsewhere, Chris Rock tries to breathe some life into a tired series in *Lethal Weapon 4*. Dennis Quaid stars in a remake of the 1961 classic *The Parent Trap*. Antonio Banderas dons *The Mask of Zorro* and mega-talents Samuel L. Jackson and Kevin Spacey team up in *The Negotiator*.

As the summer winds down, so does the glut of intriguing films. August is highlighted by the chaotic murder-mystery flick, *Snake Eyes*, starring Nicolas Cage. Another big late-summer release is *The Avengers*. Based on the old British secret agent series, the film has star power (Uma Thurman, Ralph Fiennes, and Sean Connery) and should see its share of business.

Wrapping up the summer releases are the Mike Myers' controversial *54*, which is furiously cutting footage to avoid an NC-17 tag, and two comic book adaptations, *Virus*, starring Jamie Lee Curtis, and *Blade* starring Wesley Snipes.

UK Computer Store lacks byte on price

In months to come, students from across the state will visit campus to meet with advisers, sign-up for classes and bask in the awe that is the William T. Young Library. And they will wonder — perhaps aloud to their parents — if it's time to invest in a personal computer.

We sincerely hope, they will not take the UK Computer Store up on its offer to supply them with the latest wizardry from Bill Gates and the folks at Intel. It's not that UK sells junk, with names like Dell, Gateway and IBM there's little doubt of receiving top quality merchandise, but price to be paid is another matter entirely.

For instance, take the "low-end" Dell computer offered by UK. It lists for about \$1,400 and features a 233mhz Pentium MMX processor, 32MB RAM, CD-ROM, 2.1GB hard drive, 2MB of video memory and a 15" monitor.

Now take a look at last Sunday's Best Buy advertising supplement. It lists a similar entry-level computer by Acer. For \$1,300 this system features a faster 300mhz MMX processor, 32MB SDRAM, CD-ROM, 5.7GB hard drive, 2MB Rage Pro graphics accelerator, 15" monitor, plus a Canon color printer and a 56K modem for cruising the net.

Other examples of cheaper, more powerful systems abound in the pages of Computer Shopper magazine. One

company, Zenon Computers, offers a \$1,400 system that can only be described as heavenly compared to UK's Dell computer. The system features a 300mhz Pentium II processor, 64MB SDRAM, CD-ROM, 6.0GB hard drive, 8MB AGP 3D graphics accelerator, a 17" monitor, 56K modem and Lotus Smartsuite 97.

These examples are typical price disparities found everyday when comparing systems offered by UK and other retail outlets.

In fact, a similarly equipped Dell system can be found elsewhere for about the same price as that at UK. So we have to wonder where the real savings to students and faculty can be found.

It seems to us that as we head into the new millennium, a university of our size should be able to offer more affordable alternatives.

Admittedly, few students take advantage of our campus computer store, but that might change if the prices were more competitive.

Perhaps it's time UK establish a service to match students with outside vendors that can offer lower prices and greater bang for the buck.

The UK Computer Store might even considered further cooperation with the UK Federal Credit Union towards not only locating the best system for the dollar, but also providing the financing to purchase it.

Time away from family and friends makes for awkward summer returns

▼ **Communicate:** Your key to a peaceful summer break is discussion and negotiation, according to Gini Goulet, psychotherapist and substance abuse specialist for the Northeastern University Counseling Center.

Compromise on a curfew and chores. Realize your home is not the same as it was five years or even one year ago. Give your

parents your ultimate plan; they'll be less critical if they can see an end to your break from the real world.

▼ You're not a star: "As students go home, there's a period of appreciation," Goulet said.

Students appreciate going home to familiar territory, and their parents are thrilled to have them around. This honeymoon period will be short-lived so be prepared to realize the world doesn't stop for you.

Students may feel abandoned when they see their old bedroom transformed into their father's study area. If your room is intact but dusty, clean up your first week home to feel comfortable.

▼ Deal with old issues: If a family member or friend has died this past year, this summer may be a time for grief work. You may have dissociated yourself from home while at school when you were busy. With extra time, you'll notice the person's absence.

"It might come back to you," Goulet said. "Talk to other people in your family who went through this sort of thing."

▼ Don't live in the past: Your friends, like you, may be older and wiser. They've probably changed in so many ways that they may seem like new people entirely.

"That's probably the hardest

time, when you're back after your freshman year and see your family and friends, and you're really not as close as you could be," Goulet said.

If you've grown apart from your high school buddies, invite your college friends over for a weekend excursion. Volunteer in your hometown community to meet new people or work a part-time job.

Speaking of jobs and money, decide with your parents what your responsibilities are. Are you helping to pay tuition? What expenses do you need to cover?

▼ Make the most of free hospitality: Most likely, your parents won't charge you rent for the summer break. In that case, volunteer with chores. Respect a reasonable curfew; parents have a right to know where you are, Goulet said.

"The parents need to realize the student wants to go out and they're young, and the student need to realize the parents need to have a life," she added.

▼ Use your college experience: Being college students, you're used to your life changing every few months as you're here and there and everywhere. "Sometimes it's hard to maintain friendships," Goulet said.

"You learn to cope with it in different ways."

▼ Have fun but avoid boredom: "I think people who hang out all summer get pretty bored," Goulet said.

So don't forget to catch some rays and soak in some summer music.

Cats set to sign deal with Heels

Forget Louisville and Indiana, Kentucky's men's basketball team will have a new rival — but not for two years.

Kentucky and North Carolina, one and two in college basketball all-time wins, will renew their rivalry, beginning with the 2000-2001 season, UK publicist Brooks Downing said last week.

The agreement, which had not been signed at press time, calls for a 4-year series to be played in Chapel Hill the first and third years and in Lexington the second and fourth.

The Tar Heels and Wildcats last met in Birmingham, Ala. at the NCAA Southeast Regional final in 1995. UNC won 74-61 to advance to the Final Four.

Mohammed heads to the NBA

Any hopes that All-Southeastern Conference center Nazr Mohammed would have a change of heart and return to UK for his

senior year were dashed last week when he hired an agent.

NCAA rules hold that players lose their amateur status and consequently their eligibility when they hire an agent.


Mohammed declared his intention to enter the June 24 National Basketball Association draft on May 4, just over a month after leading the Cats to their second championship in three years.

Mohammed said initially that he would retain his college eligibility by not hiring an agent.

He had until June 17 to withdraw his name from the draft.

Nazr led Kentucky in rebounding with 7.2 per game and blocked shots with 75. He was also second in scoring with 12 points per contest.

Declared by many scouts as the second-best center available in the draft behind Pacific's Michael Olowokandi, Mohammed is expected to be chosen within the first 15 picks.

Borne, a Lexington native, went to the Chicago White Sox as the 179th overall pick.

In 19 games this season, Borne had a 3-6 record with a 7.78 earned run average and a team-high 68 strikeouts.

Loggins, a transfer from Purdue, was selected by the San Diego Padres as the 322nd pick. This is the second time in four years he has been drafted by a professional baseball organization.

The Pittsburgh Pirates selected him out of Harrison High in West Lafayette, Ind.

Loggins led the Cats in eight different offensive categories, including batting average (.384), hits (93) and runs batted in (63)

while tying for the team lead in home runs with 15.

'Fast' Eddie moves on

UK men's basketball trainer "Fast" Eddie Jamiel resigned from his position for personal reasons Tuesday, UK head coach Tubby Smith said.

Jamiel served as the Cats' trainer for the past three seasons. He had joined former head coach Rick Pitino's staff in 1995 from Providence College.

"I really appreciate everything he's done for us this past season," Smith said. "He had our players back on their feet and competing quicker than any trainer I've ever been around."


