#### **Campus vandals steal thousands of Kernels**

Students who tried to pick up yesterday's issue of the Kentucky Kernel on the way to class may not have been able to find one.

Early Thursday morning stacks of the Kernel were taken from at least 19 buildings, said Mike Agin, student media adviser.

University spokesman Ralph Derickson, said seven students, both males and females, have been questioned by UK Police about the incident.

Derickson said UK Police stopped two piek sup trucks, and saw stacks of Kernels in the bed of the trucks.

Derickson said he did not know how many buildings had been hit.

Kernels that were taken from either the Administration Building or the Gillis Building were through.

Dean of Students David Stockham said his office is conducting an investigation into the incident.


Derickson said no criminal charges have been filed in the incident, but the Dean of Students Office will decide whether to charge the students with the a violation of the Student Code of Conduct.

#### Newspaper thefts common at colleges

Student newspaper thievery happens — in fact, it happens a lot.

"According to the Student Press Law Center, there have been 30 such incidents this year," said Mike Agin, UK student media adviser. "Many of those incidents led to criminal procedures and to civil procedures to reimburse people for their losses."

UK was added to list of universities who have had their student newspapers swiped. Agin said to his knowledge, this is the first time this has happened to the Kernel.

"In a span of 15 years, there has been no such inci-

"In a span of 15 years, there has been no such incident like this," he said. a representative of the Student Press Law Center were unsuccessful, but a fact sheet from the SPLC highlighted incidents that have occurred at other colleges.

At the University of Florida in 1988, four students "charged with stealing copies of a rival student group's free' conservative newspaper were ordered to pay for their crime," according to an article in The Gainesville Sun.

The article said the students were sentenced to six months unsupervised probation, 25 hours of community service and \$100 in court costs.

More recent thefts of student newspapers at the University of Maryland-College Park, John Hopkins University and others prompted state legislators to get involved.

In May 1994, Maryland Gov. The article said the actions were not related but were similar in that "all of these incidents were the result of student minority groups upset with particular stories or articles in the newspapers, which the groups claimed were racists.

Mark Goodman, executive director of the SPLC, hailed the legislation as a positive step to curb student newspaper thefts.

## After 'breaking the silence,' what next?

Months of heightened racial ten-sions on campus crested last week when hundreds of UK students gath-cred at a "Breaking the Silence" rally. This rally and the events that led up to it, leave several students and admin-istrators asking what can be done to fix the problem.

At the rally, which was sponsored by the Black Student Union, students spoke about the need to cure what they believe are the social injustices afflicting the campus.

Several of UK's administrators were criticized by speakers for handling situations related to racism on campus poorly and for not caring about the lack of a University curriculum related to a culturally diverse history.

The Black Student Union cited several reasons for the rally including the "climate of racism expressed on the UK campus," and the fact that there are no blacks in major administrative positions on campus except for Jerry Brainwell, vice president for research and graduate studies.

Several campus organizations have begun meeting to discuss short- and long-term goals that need to be made in order to statisfy the need to diversify University curriculum. Members of the Black Nudent Union, Students For Social Justice and the Alliance Working to Achieve Racial Equality met last

week with Chancellor for the Lexington Campus Elisabeth Zinser and administrators from the Office of African-American Affairs to open a campus dialogue.

One of the proposals involves upgrading the African-American Studies Program to departmental status.

A broad range of issues were discussed at the meeting, and various suggestions for improving diversity on campus were proposed.

The proposals included creating a a racial harassment policy on campus, holding an African-American faculty, staff and student assembly next year; and placing more of a focus on race relations in UK 101, an extended orientation class geared toward incoming freshman.

Chester Grundy, director of the Office of African-American Affairs, said he thinks I certain tasks are parceled out to the appropriate people and committees in the University, then some changes could start taking place next year.

He highlighted the proposed racial harassment policy, which is already on the books at many other universities across the country.

Hansen, who already owns eight total NCAA titles, qualified to compete for the vault, bars and floor crowns tomorrow.





"I feel like we won this one for the state of Kentucky," Epps said. "It means so much to our fans that it makes it more special for us."

UK notched its sixth national title — second only to UCLA's 11 — and Pittino recorded his first championship as a head coach. Meanwhile, Syracuse coach Jim Bocheim, whose 1987 squad lost the champiroship game in the final seconds, remained titleless.

"I really hadn't had a moment to feel elated, to feel good until now," said Pittino, whose squad finished at 34-2, the third most victories in school history.

Many expected this UK senior disast to someday deliver a national championship, but the highly-lauded group was aided by a rook-ie — forward Ron Mercer. The freshman from Nashville scored a career-high 20 points, including a trio of three-pointers.

"Mercer was the one guy that came in and hurt us," said Bocheim, whose squad finished up the season at 29-9.

Along with Mercer, Delk led the way for the Cats, scoring a team-high 24 points to grab Final Four MVP honors. Delk's even three-pointers tied a championhip-game record.

### Police arrest lunch-time preacher

UK Police arrested David McCracken, a regular lunch-time preacher in the Free Speech Area, yesterday afternoon. McCracken, 55, of Versailles, Ky., was arrested at the Student Center's Free Speech Area for disorderly conduct at about 1 p.m. According to UK spokesman Ralph Derickson, UK police received a complaint of noise and disturbance. Officers came to the area where McCracken was speaking and asked him to move or speak quieter.

Derickson said McCracken refused to leave, and officers asked again. When McCracken did not leave after the second request, the officers arrested him. McCracken was taken to the Lexington-Fayette County Detention Center where he was released on bond.

McCracken, who is pastor of Layfayette Church of the Nazarene, said he has been coming to speak at UK two-three times per week for two years when weather permits. He also said he had never before been asked by police to leave or quiet down.

"The police have been there many times listening and observine, but I've never before been approached by them," McCracken said.

McCracken said a police officer came up to him at about 12:50 p.m., and told him he was too loud and asked him to be quieter.

McCracken told the officer dam and asked him to leave the area, saying he wasn't in the Free Speech Area. He said he told the officer he was almost done and would be leaving in about five minutes.

When he began to preach again, McCracken said he was arrested.

"I thought I was less noisy than previously," McCracken said. "When I started again, they didn't say I was still too loud."

When officers handcuffed him, McCracken said he tried to move to hand a student his bible so officers could put the handcuffs on his other hand.

He said one of the officers then pulled his arm, put him on the ground and cuffed him, causing him to drop his Bible.

"They wanted to get rough and they did get rough," McCracken said.

He said he does preach loudly but does not hink it is a disturbance. He also said as a UK alumnus he should be entitled to use the Free Speech Area.

"I come to preach the gospel to passersby, not just the two-three people who are right next to me," said McCracken. Derickson said a court date has not been set.

said proper channels didn't exist for a lot of the ideas, like holding a convocation for black students and faculty at the beginning of next year.

"We just need to get organized and do them," he said.

Zinser said she wasn't planning on waiting until the fall to start examining the proposed changes for feasibility. She said a lot of the proposed curriculum changes of budget issues.

Boyce Watkins, a mathematics graduate student and an organizational leader for the rally, said he thinks the administration isn't offering its full support to stu-




